I condon Hotels. An American correspondent of The London Times complaius bitterly of the impositions practiced upon his country-men by London hotel-keepers, servants, and tradesmen. He declares that Ameri-cans are the chief sufferensai their hands, being suppossed to possess promese of un-time contemplation of the sole, which he designates as the smallest fish known in the British Isles, and a vertehed-looking object, done up in some kinl of a baffer, designed probably to disguise its lean carcass and serve as an aid to digestion. For two specimens of this curions and unlovely fish, two stale eggs, some weak tes, and bread, he has had the pleasure of paying 38, 6d, and 4s. for each person indulging in that gorgeous fare. Natural-ly he rebels. He mentions with despir the ampant and uncerthly joy with which every hotol staff greets the appear-ance of his American trunks; and the extortion of the porter, who, if he takes a letter round the corner, asis twice as much for the service as he would do if his employer were & Londoner. The charges for " attendance" in the bill are large, yet every sorant expects a graun-ity. And it is not always possible or probable that the guest will be served. An American friend of this correspondent, staying at a famous West End hotel; tried very hard to get a glass of water and a bisouit at half-past L1 at night. He rang repeatedly, but no one came. Mean-while he was paying unreasonable oharges for attendance. The Editor of *The Times* in a leading article confesses that English hotels and inns are among the most discreditable of the country's belongings, differing almost wholly from their so-called continential models. The fare is particularly meagre and mono-tonous; one is made to pay ike a mil-lionaire while he lives like an anchorite. In short, the English hotels in all their grades and phases are bleak, cheerless, disagreeable, and absurdiy and dishon-estiv expensive. 

Ottawa, May 7. After some unimportant business, Mr. lelson moved a resolution in favour of stablishing reciprocal trade between anada and the Sandwich Islands. Hon. Mr. Tilley promised consideration. After recess several Private Bills were assed.

After recess pertent transfer passed. Mr. Mills resumed, the adjourned de-bate on his metion in favour of an elec-tive instead of a nominated Senate. A suggestion to adjourn the debate having been made and withdrawn, Mr. Mackenzie desired to speak with all re-spect of the Senate, but it was an inevit-able tendency of the Government to place their friends in the places that became vacant, and it must be admitted that the character of the Senate had greatly changed since its first appointment in 1867.

1867. Hon. Mr. Tilley said that until a good and sufficient reason should be found for changing the Constitution, it was well to leave things as they were. The vote was taken shortly after mid-night, with the following result :--Yeas 46, nays 61. Mr. Hillyard Cameron's Blll relating to bills of exchange was then read a second time.

Mr. Colby moved the second reading of his Bill to relieve certain charitable and educational institutions from the disabili-ties they labour under as to rates of

interest. The House adjourned at midnight.


REDISTRIBUTION OF SEATS IN BRITAIN. —In the Commons on Tuesday night, Sir Charles Dilke moved a resolution that in the opinion of the House it is desirable to redress inequalities in the distribution of political power in the United Kingdom. He com-plained that the legitimate influence of large and important towns was swamped by small and decaying bo-roughs, in which the power of a single individual was paramount over the constituency. Mr. G. Anderson, member for Glagory, seconded the motien and showed that England was entitled to 440, instead of 449, is tead of 60. 
