
Formal Welcome to the City



important bearing on having an irrigation works in Southern Alberta was given today by the judicial committee of the privy council when the appeal was allowed in the case of the King vs. the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company. This appeal was taken from the supreme court of Canada and related to a dispute as to the cost and maintenance of bridges over the irrigation canals of Alberta.

In giving judgment their lordships stated they were of the opinion that section 37 of the irrigation act to which frequent reference in the argument had been made had no applica tion to road allowances. It deals only with public highways heretofore traveled as such.

The action was concerned with two typical cases. Land at a crossing orizinally vested in the crown for a single purpose comes to be vested for two purposes to some extent antagonistic ooth touching closely the public inter est and both perpetual. The first was he convenience of wayfarers; the second was improving the country The first is still the priirrigation. mary and paramount purpose, and the second is subordinate. Then followed the report of the commission suspending Tommy Gifford and George Rennie for rough work, but letting Ions, a Vancouver player, who has pulled down more fines than any two players this season off with a \$10 fine. To clap the climax, the Vancouver commissioner refused to accept Alex. Turnbull as referee for the next game. Turnbull is an old Salmon Belly and this was like adding insult to injury.

At midnight on Friday, July 19, Vancouver morning papers were notified that there would be no game on the morrow, but acting, probably under the instructions of Con Jones, they refused to publish the story of the cancellation. The next move of Vancouver was to tamper with the schedule, and while the Vancouver team will probably line up in that city tomorrow, the Salmon Bellies will also line up in New Westminster and will claim the game on the ground that adjusting the schedule without the mutual consent of both teams was a violation of the constitution.


