The point of view taken by Mr. Bryant is a reform not in the minister but in the ministration of education. The present system, Mr. Bryant believes, allows the minister too much power. As for in stance among the things that lie within his discretion alone are the selection and dis continuance of text books, the arrangement of courses of study, the classification and promotion of pupils, the conduct of provincial examinations, the assignment of studies and the appointment of percentages therefor, the grading and certification of teach. ers, the appointment of examiners and inspectors, and the determination of their qualifications and rules. Matters such as these can never be fixed by the legislature, but must almost entirely remain in the pro

visory body in the central committee, but, as Mr. Bryant points out, the central committee has no legal existence; that therefor it is not responsible to the public; that its members are appointed by the minister himself: and that he does not generally take their advice and is not bound to take it. STOCK INSURANCE COMPANIES. We do not think it necessarily follows

that because stock insurance companies make big profits and distribute them among the shareholders, that an injustice is done to the policy holder, as the critics in our columns of the Canada Life and the Ætna have endeavored to prove. A company that can give undoubted security can always command high premiums, just as certain stores can command prices for the same line of goods. Insurers must choose for themselves : a cooperative-plan policy, or a mutual-plan policy, may realize all right for the heirs at a less cost than one in a stock company; or they may in the end turn out a poor investment after long payment of assessments In the same way stock companies with higher premiums have gone to the wall and left many ruined policy holders. An insurer has to weigh well for himself : settle whether cheapness and virtue go together. or whether the latter can only be secured by comparatively high premiums. But inordinate profits in any case are an unfair tax on the policy holder.
