JOE TAIT WANTS FREE TRADE

AS FAR AS THE INTERESTS OF

REVENUE RENDER POSSIBLE." He Speaks on "Trade Unity and National Rivalry" at Rochester-Has No Use for Retaliation, But Advises Canada to

Legislate Solely in Her Own Interest-

"The 'Hon, M.P.' Preached Sunday. ROCHESTER, N.Y., Feb. 5. — "Trade unity and national rivalry" was "Hon." Joseph Tait's subject at the Chamber of Commerce dinner this evening. He pre-faced the solid portion of his address by a pleasant reference to the Earl of Aberdeen, Governor-General of Canada, and a humorous narrative of his experience on a former visit to Rochester. Referring to the importance of such events as the one being celebrated, he said: "It is well that such meetings should take place and such opportunities be thus afforded for a free exchange and comparison of onlyings. not change and comparison of opinions, not only between citizens of one country, but only between citizens of one country, but where citizens of neighboring countries, living under different flags, owing allegiance to different forms of government, yet deeply interested in the welfare of all, can meet and discuss matters of mutual interest. Just as business men thrive and prosper amid prosperous neighbors so nations thrive and prosper by cultivating commercial relations with other nations which possess the essential elements at prosperity.

"At home in Canada during the past 15 "At home in Canada during the past 15 years, when men have been pointing to the high tariff walls of other countries and saying, Let us build our tariff walls as high as theirs, shouting for retaliation, tit for tat, shut them out of our markets as we are shut out of their markets, my answer has always been, let us do what is best for ourselves. I Don't let us foolishly hurt ourselves by attempting to injure our neighbors, but let us continue to legislate solely in our own interests.

"International commerce is not only a desirable supplement of home trade, but an inspiration and an incentive to the advancement and extension of every genuine native industry. To place the trade relations of the United States and Canada in such a position that the natural products and the manufactured articles of each country shall have a fair place in the markets of the other as nearly on a basis of free trade as the inas nearly on a basis of free trade as the in-terests of revenue will render possible, is my understanding of the sentiment of trade-unity that ought to be accomplished."

Large Batch of Improvements B quested—Appointment of Assessors and Health Officers at the Meeting Yesterday.

At the meeting of the York Township Council esterday all the members were present, Reeve ill in the chair. Communications were re-sived from John Kew re charity grants by council; from John Kew re chartly grams of council; from John Muiritead, applying for consistion of assessor for division No. 2; from E. A. Macdonald re Toronto Aqueduct Company; from William Rennie, requesting the appointment of William Smith as road commissioner for Swansea; from David Smith, president Todwards Recent Company. Swansea; from David Smith, president Todmorden Property Owners' Association, forwarding copy of bylaws of the association; from Alexander Genmel, withdrawing his signature from the petition for the appointment of Mr. Coe and requesting the council to appoint Mr. William Smith; from Dr. P. H. Bryce, enclosing a copy of a resolution passed by the St. Clair Ratepayers' Association, which stated that improvements are required as follows: 1. Sidewalk up Bathurst-street to ravine above St. Clair. 2. Completion of Hilton-street sidewalk to Vaughan-road. 3. Sidewalks in Murray-street and Ossington-avenue. 4. Continuation of Helena-avenue sidewalk via Alcina-avenue to Christie-street. 5. Macadamizing of either Davenport road and Bathurst street or Christie-street from Turner's Hill to city limits eastward. 6. One electric light or large gas lamp on Wells' Hill; one at Turner's Hill and one at St. Clair-avenue, near Methodist Church, and one at Vaughan-road.

avenue, near Methodist Church, and one at Vaughan-road.

The committee also pointed out the necessity of the township being divided into definite assessment districts and the keeping of an exact account of the receipts and expenditures of each in the matter of general tax, statute labor tax, general local improvement tax and receipts and expenditures for school purposes.

A communication was received from W. H. Givens, calling the attention of the council to the advertised list of lands for taxes, who states that a number of persons described as having property on lot 2, concession 2, never owned a foot of land nor ever paid taxes on any in that part of the township. A 27-foot lot, very meagrely described as being on lot 2, concession 2, and owned by a man named "Gibbons," is also advertised for sale. Mr. Givens states that he is the only one in this locality whose name nearly approaches "Gibbons," and being the owner of a lot beying a frontage of 27 feet on Danforththe only one in this locality whose name nearly approaches "Gibbons," and being the owner of a lot having a frontage of 27 feet on Danforthavenue, also being on lot 2 concession 2, Mr. Giyens notified the council that he owns this lot and that he has paid the taxes, and concludes: "If the list for York Township is as erroneous as in this section I am afraid that what is claimed as an asset for the Township of York will terminate in a mere bubble." Hudson's Bay Company stock is up a fraction, king and Victoria-sts., Toronto. The specie and legal tenders in the New York banks now amount to \$249,650,000, as against \$143,021,000 a year ago.

The deposits of these banks are \$551,800,000, as compared with \$495,475,000 a year ago, while the loans are only \$419,530,000, as gainst \$464,910,000 at the corresponding date of last year.

The continued uncertainty as to what Congress may finally do in respect to the tariff and the income tax, says Henry Clews, keeps business at large in a very dull and hesitating position. The Wilson bill with the income tax provision attached now goes to the Senate, where its fate will soon be foreshadowed. Whether defeated or successful, the final disposal of the measure will bring great relief by ending suspenso. The continued extensive resumption of factories and works closed for months past shows that manufacturers have become sensible of the close exhaustion of stocks in many branches of trade, and that they now feel it safe to make provision for the later wants of the spring season and for the fall trade. There seems to be no doubt that the country, especially in the interior, has now fairly entered upon a process of recovery; but its progress must be expected to be slow.


