Our wise men of the East, who legislate for us in the senate at $\$ 6$ pr. diem, coem to have little to do, add have therefore entered upon a crusade against tavern keepers. They last year impoeed an additional $\$ 12$ upon licenses; and a Bill is now in transitu, prohibit ing the sale of liquors after 7 o'clack on Staturday ovenings. This we regard as an infringement upon the liberty of the. eabjech and doubt if its action will proluce beneficial results; as those determined wo obtaln hquor will do so at greoury storea, and enjoy a BacchanaSime Saturnalin at home at less cost than they could obtain a proper modicum at a respectable tavern, from which they would be ejicted, if they endeavored to endulge in excess.

We are adrocates of Temperance in every respect, and indulge only in the "cep that cieers but nut inebriates;", and we conceive that the existing municipal laws are sufficiently stringent, if properly administered. They provide a penalty for druakennees and \$esecration of the Sebbath, and would, under firm administration, be found a sufficient panacea for the evits complained of; and which at a great cost. tas exercised the wisdom of our legisLaton to invent a remedy for.

If something more worthy of note is not done we shall begin to think $\$ 6$ pr. diem pr. solon a bad investment; and that the Bar of the houge had better be abolished, as it would enable hon. members to legislate with clearer heads and at loss cost.

We would call attention to the fact, that licenses are only granted for 12 months, no malter how short the time they are used; and that under the recent great depression, and hard Cimes, many persons of respectability and education have adopted tavern 'kerping as a means of livalhood, through being unable to obtain employ. pient at their legitimate callings.Upon these persuns it presser very hard. Why not iague a license for three montina?
A. Double Nuzancre.-We have received frequent complaints since commen-
cing the publication of the Ghronicles, of the boisterons and indecorous mamer in which the religious (?) extercises are conducted at the Africin chapel on Rebecea street : but beitg andilling to say a sylla. ble against any religious denomination, we have hitberto refrained from what has now become our daty as public journalists and conservators of the peace. We went; we heard ; we saw-and readily acknowiedge that if the colored persons who exercised their stentorian longs in the meeting of Sunday night, keep up the same pitch during their nightly meetings, which have been now held about fuar weeks, the people in that locality have strong grounds to complain of the house as a nuisance, and have the inmates tanght the deportment becoming a place of worship.
Soon as the exercises were concluded Sabhath night betore last, (about eleven o'cluck) exercises of anuther character commencel in the saloon next door to the chapel, and were kept up almost withont intermission till three o'clock on Monday morning. Never, we are iufurmed by respectable persons i:a the neighborhood, was there euch a scene enacted thareaboute, as that. The stillness of the sacred night was broken by the most disgusting profanity ; and that name which had been spoken with reverence and aldoration but a few moments before by the despised and ridiculed colored peaple, was blas. phemed and taken in vain by this white man. who holds the city broad seal fur keeping a "doggerel" and dealing out damnation by the glass. These unbecoming exhibitions age not rave; they are, we hear of too frequeat occarrence, and ought, tor the chatacter of the city, be put a atop to. W\& are told, too, that sone of our city ralers froquent this estabiishment, au:) that that is why this crying nu:sance is tolerated by the ufficers of the law. We hope this is not trae, and if it be not so, let same effectual means be adojpted to prevent a recarrence of Sunday night's dingracefal proceedings. In lact, is does appear, (and we say it reverently, as far as the chinch people are conceraud) as it they make aH the noise they can on thuir way to heaven; whilst the parties naxt door keep op a louder din on their way to the other place.
