The preniams of this Issoclation are open to the world, - the best specimens to win.

Hulf 1. The term "exhibit" or "specimen" implies anything entered for competition, or exhibition.
2. All exlibits must he entered with the secretary, R. J. Wilaon, P. O. box 590, Halifit, or with the treasurer, A. Mackinlay, 137 Granville Street, Halifan, at least one weck previons to the exhibition, namely, not later than Tuesday, 1 sith Fobruary, and exhibitors failing to forward their ehtry papers by that date will not be allowal to compete for prizes. Entry papers will be supplied to intending exhibitors by the secretary or teasurer.
3. In order to identify the coops, \&c., ufter the prizes are awarded, an entry or coop ticket, with a number, but no exhibitor's name, will, on receipt of the entry paper properly filled up, be given by the secretary for each exhibit, which ticket wist be astached by the exhibitor to his coop or cage before delivery at the hall.

Fhihitors must be eareful to have sperimens correctly named in theirentry pripers, as uny error in this respect will bo fatal to successful compretion.
4. The premin'ns oflered at this exhibition are of two classes - "regular," offered by the Association ; and "special," offered by indiviluals.

The entries for the regular preminus for poultry must be in ${ }^{\text {mirss }}$, one male and one female.- Eutry fee, 50 cents.

Pigeons, in pairs, " " 25 "
Cage birds, as single birus, Entry fee 15 cents.

Specimens entered for the regular preminms compete also for the special premiums for pairs and single specimens, without special entry, or additional entry fec.

Single specimens entered for the special premiums only, will be charged an entry fee of 25 cents.

The collections of poultry for which special premimms are oflerel, must connid of it cock inel not leso than four hens.- lintry fee, 50 cents.

A pair in a collection maty compete for the regular pair premimm, provided the sock and hen, competing as a puir, be separatad from tho uthers by a purtition in the same coop, and an additional entry lee paill for the par-25 eents.
$W$ With the exception of the collections above refered to, each pair must be in a sejurute coop.

No entry fee will be chargeed on specimens ontered for exhibition, but not for competition. Such entries will be marked "for exhibition only" on the coop ticket.

The entry fees must accompmy the entry paper.
lexhibitors paying entry fees to the amount of $\$ 1.50$ will be entitled to a season ticket, not transferable.

Nembers have the privilege of exhibiting tree.
5. All specimens must be enterel in the name of the actual orone:

Any attempt to evade this rule, as in botrowing one or more specimens of a coop, or in buying with the molerstanding that the specimens shall be returned ufter the exhibition, or that they shall be returned unless solit, or onany other condition, will exclude all coops entered by the offending party if discovered in time, and if not, the premiums shall be withheld.
6. Specimens must be exhibitod in attractive and convenient coups or carges.

Coops must be open only at the front, which must be of wire or of twine netting. They must be so constructed as to be easily opened by the judges, and must be furnished with proper appliances for food and water. For convenience and uniformity of arrangement, they must be of the following dimensions, outside measurement:-21 ft . high, 2 ft . deep, $2 \frac{1}{2}$ to $3 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{ft}$. long. For bantams and pigeons, 19 inches high, 12 inches deep,
and 18 to 28 inches long. For turkey and geese, 3 ft . high, $\frac{21}{2} \mathrm{ft}$. deep, and 3 to $3 \frac{2}{2} \mathrm{ft}$. long.

The length of each coop must be stated on the entry papers.
7. All specimens must be exhibited in their matural condition, except Games and Game lautums, which may bo dubbed or trimmed in the ordinary manner.

Pulling foul feathers, coloring, shaping spurs, inserting or splicing a feather, and similar practices, are prohibited, Any violation of this rule will incer the penaltics mamed in rule 5 .
8. The hall will be open for the recep. tion of specimens on Monday, the 24 th day of lebruary, at 9 o'elock, n. m. Those not receivel by 9 o'clock, p. m., will be debarred from competition, unless it is shown that delay is unavoidable, in which case, by special permission of the committee, they may be delivered at the hall previons to 9 o'clock, a.m., on Tuesday, the 25 th

No perqon, except those engaged in making arrangements, will be admitted previous to the opening of the exhibition.
9. It will not be necessary for exhibiturs to accompany their specimens, which may be sent direct to the hall, where they will be receivel, and properly cared for by the committee, during the exhibition, and at its close will be delivered at the hall to order or by direction of the owners.
10. All expenses of transportation to and from the hall must be borne by the exhibitors.
11. The committee reserve the right to reject any specrmens which they may consider unworthy or unfit for exhibition. All exhibits shall be under their sole control, and none can be removed before the close of the exhibition without their permission.
12. Any specimens showing symptoms of disease must be removed from the hall by the exhibitor, or at his ex. pense and risk if he be absent.
13. Althongh every care will he taken, tho Assoriation will not he responsible for loss or damage that may occur during the ext `ition.
14. Compelent julses will he employen to make the awarls; theis decision shatl be timal, and mo protest will he entrortainel, exeept in ease of evidence of trumb, or of error other than of juld ment. No jumpe shall be a competitor in a variety where his decision is to be given. Judters mast not let their nwarils be known, except through the seceretary.
15. Judges are cmpowed to withhohl a prize, shonld they think the combeting specimens marorthy of it.
16. No second prize will he awarded in any class, muless there are three competitors in the elass.
17. In the event of recripts being insuffiejent to eover expmuliture, the association prizes will be paid pror reta.
18. The revisel "Ameriem Standard of Excellence" will he the guide of the julges in all variences describen therein.
19. The julges will meet at 10 o'clock, a. 11., on Thesilay, and proceed with their work of determining paizes, after which they will hand their books to the Secretary, and obtian and phace the prize tickets before the upening of the exhilition to the public at 2 o'clock.
20. Any person interfering with, or attempting to influence the decision of the julges by his presence or remarks, shall forfeit all right to any promimens to which he might otherwise be entitled.
21. The treasurer will commence to pay the premiums on Thurshay, the last day of the exhibition, at 10 o'ciock, a. in., at the hall. Prizes not drawn within one month will be forleited.
23. Exhibitors having birds for sale at thar exhibition, can obtain a priec card from the secretary to alfix to their coops, and no other cards than those issued by the association will be allowed on the coops.

All sales must he male through the seeretary, who will dednet a per cent, lis the benclit of tho nssociation.
