

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



# NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to struggling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and

parsonages.

A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the elergy.
 A Pension Fund for aged and infirm elergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books, and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

6. To aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools

for their children.

7. To receive and transmit contributions towards the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, or towards missions to the heathen in foreign lands.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a.) The Central Board is composed of all the clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society.

(b.) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Education, the Depository, the Land and the Investment Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee which manages (a.) the Episcopal Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c.) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a.) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b.) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c.) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, the Secretary, or to Mr. Edwin Jones, the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Mr. George Veasey, the Treasurer of the Church Society.

#### ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting was held on Wednesday morning, 2nd February, at ten o'clock, in the Committee Room of the National School.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

The reports of Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Flind were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

A very interesting and valuable report was presented from the District Association of St. Francis, which was adopted and ordered to be printed.

The report of the position of the Sherbrooke Depository was ordered to be printed in accordance with the expressed wish of the District Association.

The several Treasurers of the Society, Clergy Trust and Diocesan Board, presented their annual accounts, which were received, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The following resolution upon the management of the accounts was unanimously adopted.

Moved by Dr. Marsden, seconded by F. H. Andrews, Esq.,

"That the Investment Committee and respective Treasurers are entitled to the best thanks of the Society for the able manner in which they have conducted its financial affairs."

Geo. Veasey, Esq., Treasurer of the Society, was unanimously elected a Vice-President.

The Rev. C. Chetwood Hamilton was elected a Life member. Fourteen gentlemen were elected members of the Corporation.

Twenty-two gentlemen were elected members of the Central Board.

The members of the Clergy Trust Committee were re-elected.

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ry. tary. Mr. W. G. Wurtele gave notice that he would move an amendment to Article IV of the By-Laws, making the hour of meeting two in the afternoon instead of ten in the morning.

The Secretary was instructed to issue Blank forms of application to be elected members of Corporation.

An interesting discussion took place upon the positions of the Widows' and Orphans' and Pension Funds of the Society.

The Lord Bishop closed the meeting with the Benediction.

# ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1875.

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The Central Board, while anxious to express their deep thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church for the increased means of usefulness which have been vouchsafed to them during the past year, must at the same time urge upon the members of the Church throughout the Diocese, the necessity for greater exertions in the Society's cause; for the increase over the amount received last year for the General Fund is exceedingly small, and last year's receipts showed a decrease of \$174.98 from 1873.

The general stagnation in trade has undoubtedly had a very serious effect upon the funds of the Society, and in consideration of the extreme duliness in all branches of Commerce, it is a matter of thankfulness that the General Fund has been enabled to deal in such a liberal spirit with the many pressing applications made upon its funds during the year.

The amount expended for Church building has been greater than usual, and it is a pleasing fact to record that five churches, viz: Denison's Mills, Island Brook, Westbury, Melbourne and Ascot Corners have been commenced and completed during the year, three of which have been consecrated. The Society has been obliged to withhold the usual grants to Melbourne and Ascot Corners, in consequence of the exhaustion of its funds.

It is very satisfactory to find that the amount for the Algoma Bishopric Fund has been met by voluntary subscriptions and collections, without encroaching upon the Funds of the Society.

The Diocese has also responded to the appeal on behalf of the noble Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. It is to be regretted, however, that the amount is not quite equal to that of last year.

#### MISSION FUND.

There has been a decrease of \$221.00 in this Fund. The report of the Diocesan Board furnishes a full account of Missionary labour.

The Board desires, however, to state that the long vacant office of Travelling Missionary has again been filled in the appointment of the Rev. E. A. W. King, M.A., late Incumbent of Durham, who also holds the offices of Chaplain to the Quarantine Station of Grosse Isle and Rector of Nicolet.

The Mission of the Magdalene Islands, reported vacant last year, has been efficiently filled by the appointment of the Rev. J. Chambers, who formerly did good service for the Church, in mission work at Hong Kong.

#### WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

This fund is in a really flourishing condition. The Treasurer reports that the following Clergymen have duly qualified themselves as participants, viz:—Reverends Jas. Boydell, M. M. Fothergill, C. W. The clergy are reminded that their annual payments to this fund are due at the Treasurer's office on the first day of May in each year. No subscription will be received after that date, except by special vote of the Central Board.

#### PENSION FUND.

The amount received for this much-needed fund is exceptionally small, being only \$861.83, a decrease of \$608.53 from last report.

The importance of this Fund to the best interests of the congregations, as well as the just claims of the Clercy to a retiring allowance for their declining years, were clearly and forcibly set forth by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in a circular issued some two years ago, when it was considered that the prosperous state of the W. & O. Fund would justify the appropriation of the collections hitherto made in its behalf to the Pension Fund.

The effect of the Bishop's Circular was seen in the large amount contributed to the Pension Fund in 1874.

The revenue of the Fund is not sufficient to meet the claim of even one aged and infirm Clergyman at the small rate of \$400.

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in the neumain to icolet. The Central Board carnestly hope that both Clergymen and Laymen will give a careful and favourable consideration to the position of this Fund and the strong claims which it presents for a generous support.

#### DEPOSITORY.

The number of books sold during the year shows that the Depository is in a satisfactory condition.

#### EDUCATION.

Additional aid has been extended during the past year to schools in various missions of the diocese, and from reports furnished by several of the Clergy, it seems an established fact that our schools are becoming known as being the only ones in the country parishes where education is not divorced from religion. In the department of education the Society meets with most hearty co-operation from the Colonial and Continental Church Society; a Society which has for many years rendered very valuable assistance in securing a sound education for the young in several of our missions.

It is to be regretted that some of the Society's schools are closed from lack of teachers.

The usual salaries being so small, it is difficult to secure the services of competent persons.

The schools of Marbleton, Maple Grove and Coaticook are doing excellent work, especially the former, and too much praise cannot be accorded to the Reverend T. S. Chapman for his zeal in the cause of education.

Many of the other schools are also well managed and doing good service.

### ABSTRACT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF CENTRAL BOARD DURING THE YEAR 1875.

January.—One hundred dollars granted to new Church at Windsor. Permission given to sell the Barford land for \$3.50 per acre. One hundred dollars granted to the new Church at Island Brook. Fifty dollars granted for outfit. Circular on certain lots of lands. Annual Report adopted.

February.—Appointment of Committees. 1400 copies of Annual Report ordered to be printed, together with the By-laws of the Church Society. Resolution on the Stoneham Parsonage.

March.—Correspondence with the Rev. J. H. S. Sweet with reference to the Stoneham Parsonage. Opinion of the Lord Bishop on the employment of Lay Readers.

April. -- One hundred dollars granted to the New Church at Denison's Mills, Kingsey, also seventy-five dollars granted to the enlargement of St. Peter's Church, Malbaie. Fifty dollars increase granted to South Durham Church. Fifty dollars granted to the proposed new Church near Black River. Opinion of Counsel on the proper mode of investing Church property. "(1) The Church Temporalities Act, Sec. 6, provides that the Church Wardens shall be a corporation, this clause would only apply to churches in which the Vestry is composed of Pew-holders, that act does not seem to contemplate the case of churches with free sittings. (2) In case of any church in which the Church Wardens are not Pew-holders, the property belonging to it may be vested in either the Bishop or the Church Society in Trust for the particular church or Parish." Application for Lay Readership on the Magdalene Islands from Mr. G. C. Phinny. Resolution accepting Mr. Phinny's services for four months. Opinion of Counsel sought on the position of certain Clergymen with respect to the W. and O. Fund by-law.

May.—Certain Clergymen placed upon the list of participants in the benefits of the W. and O. Fund By-law. One hundred dollars granted to the new parsonage at West Frampton. Resolution on insurances. Committee on titles of certain Church property. Report of the Education Committee. Six hundred dollars granted for payment of salaries of teachers.

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SEPTEMBER.—Letter from Rev. J. S. Sykes upon the position of the Frampton Endowment Fund. One hundred dollars granted to the new Church at Westbury. Fifty dollars granted for outfit. Sixty dollars granted out of the Labrador Mission Fund for the purchase of a boat for the coast. Rev. J. Chambers having qualified himself, was placed among the number of participants of the W. and O. Fund. The resolution ordering the Finance Committee to meet on the same day as the Central Board was rescinded, the Finance Committee to meet at least three days before Central Board.

November.—Letter of thanks to Mr. Jas. Patton, junior, for the very valuable map of the Diocese which he presented to the Church Society. Treasurer's Statement. Resolution informing Revd. Messrs. Thompson and Boydell that the Finance Committee had reported favourably of grants to their respective churches, but that in consequence of the unfavourable state of the funds, the report of Finance Committee cannot for the present be entertained. Information sought upon the position of the Church at Ascot Corners. The Lord Bishop informed the Board of the appointment of the Rev. E. A. W. King to the office of Travelling Missionary. Eight hundred dollars per annum and travelling expenses granted to the Travelling Missionary. The Secretary was directed to issue a Circular to all the Clergy, containing a list of special collections.

DECEMBER.—Letter from the Rev. Professor Roe, having reference to the formation of a new endowment fund. One hundred and fifty dollars granted to the Brompton endowment Fund. Committee on arrangements for the anniversary meeting. Application for outfit referred to the Finance Committee. Resignation of auditorship by Mr. Judge. Mr. Jas. Patton, junior, appointed one of the auditors of the Society. Letter to the S. P. G. upon endowments.

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It may be proper to observe with reference to the unusually large amount remaining in the hands of the Board (\$2596.31) at the close of the year, that it includes the sum of \$1400 received from the Clergy Trust Fund, and that in view of the fact that the revenue derived from the Mission Fund is not available till the last quarter in the year, the whole of this balance will be absorbed in the first two quarters.

No bonus is now given to the clergy, but they are paid their full stipends, quarterly, according to the increased scale., When the bonus was paid, it was not till the close of the year, when the whole revenue for that year had been received.

This belance then, on the creditor side of the account, is not to be taken as an indication of an overflowing treasury, since in reality this amount properly belongs to the resources of 1876, and has been received in order to provide for the liabilities of that year: on the other hand, a comparison of the above statement with those published in previous years will elicit the fact that the expenditure of the Board has been greater in 1875 than in any former year, whilst one source of its revenue has suffered a decrease.

The Mission Fund of the Church Society has contributed \$221 less than in 1874, \$554.22 less than in 1873, and \$1025.16 less than in 1872.

As the S. P. G. Grant is fixed (if we may call that fixed which is only pledged for one year, coupled with the warning that any falling off in this Society's subscriptions in England will involve a reduction,) it is evident that the Board must look to the missions themselves to provide the means of maintaining the ministrations of the church among them.

Your Board is glad to report that an improvement in respect to the payment of the assessments has taken place during the past year, the sum of \$406 having been received in excess of the amount paid in 1874. This is very satisfactory to the Diocesan Board and very creditable to the church wardens of the various missions, whose labours, (too often

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made unnecessarily difficult,) have brought about this improvement. Your Board however, while acknowledging with satisfaction this step in the right direction, would wish to urge upon the congregations the duty of manfully observing the engagements they have entered into with the Board in all respects.

After a new assessment has been fixed, it is not unfrequently followed six months after by a petition for a reduction. "Some few people have removed from the mission, or the products of the field have not been so abundant as formerly, or very little money is circulating," and these are alleged as fair grounds for demanding a reduction. The Board is far from wishing to convey the impression that in all cases such reasons as these are unworthy of consideration, but they are of opinion that in view of all the circumstances of the case, the congregations ought manfully and cheerfully to do their utmost in assuming any additional burdens before asking the Board to relieve them,—that it is their duty to make real sacrifices and honestly consider whether they are in truth doing all they can for themselves.

The funds of the Board, including the S. P. G. grant, are equal, but barely equal, to the maintenance of the present number of Missions. Were the S. P. G. to materially reduce its grant, many missions which now exclusively enjoy the services of a clergyman would have to put up with much fewer services. Those missions which have taught themselves the duty of self-support will then be independent! Those which have made no progress in this direction, but have been only eager to drive as hard a bargain as possible with the Diocesan Board, will find themselves compelled to share the ministrations of the church with some other mission, or be placed in the charge of a travelling missionary.

It has been usual every two or three years for your Board to confer with the congregations and endeavour to obtain an increase of assessment. The agreements for the last period terminated on the 31st December last, but owing to the depressed condition of trade throughout the country, it was decided to allow a year to pass over, renewing the same agreements for 1876. It is hoped that during the current year matters will have so far improved as to enable the congregations to offer a considerable increase when called upon for the next period.

There are at present 35 missions aided by the Diocesan Board, and of these only two are temporarily vacant, viz: Shigawake and Magog. This is happily a smaller number without clergymen than has been reported for many years.

Details of the work, more or less varied, with which the Clergy are engaged, will be found in their reports hereto annexed. They evidence in many instances very gratifying progress; from all we may gather the assurance that much earnest work has been done which, by the blessing of the Great Ruler of the church, will bring forth fruit in due season.

The following are the changes and appointments which have been made during the past year.

In the month of April, the Revd. M. Ker to the mission of Stoneham and Lake Beauport.

In the mouth of May, the Revd. G. T. Harding to the Mission of Durham, and the Revd. Albert Stevens to the Mission of Barford and Hereford.

In the month of August, the Revd. James Chambers to the Mission of the Magdalene Islands.

In the month of September, the Revd. M. Ker to the Mission of Sandy Beach, and the Revd. J. Boydell to the Mission of Kingsey.

In the month of October, the Rev. A. J. Woolryche to the Mission of Stoneham and Lake Beauport.

In the month of November, the Rev. C. Thorp to the Mission of Bury.

The Revd. G. H. Parker resigned the Mission of Kingsey on his appointment to the Rectory of Compton.

The Revd. R. Mathers has left the Diocese, having accepted a cure in the Diocese of Fredericton.

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The Revd. A. Balfour, after over forty-three years active service in the Diocese, resigned his charge of the Mission of Magog.

The following resolution was adopted by the Board on the occasion of his retirement:

"Resolved, That the Board in accepting the Revd. A. Baltour's resignation of the charge of St. Luke's Church, Magog, do place on record the expression of their warm appreciation of the service which he has generously and faithfully rendered to the Church in this Diocese, after his well-earned pension had fairly purchased for him a period of rest from active labours in the ministry."

# TION OF THE ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIA-TION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY, DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

The St. Francis District Association acknowledges with devout thankfulness the continued success which appears to attend the efforts of the Church in this District.

It is hoped that the appended extracts from Reports of the Clergy will be found to contain gratifying intelligence as to the condition and prospects of the Church in this pertion of the Diocese.

To form a correct estimate of past operations, as of future prospects, it is necessary to bear in mind some of the special difficulties which beset the Clergy labouring in this District.

Some of these difficulties may be thus particularised:

There are few missions, if any, in this District in which the members of the Church are not thinly scattered over an area of many miles.

- 1. The elergyman is consequently obliged to divide his mission into districts, assigning to each its own stated services, not always with reference to the number of souls, but to the number of stations. In not a few instances the labours of the missionary are unnecessarily multiplied by the unwillingness of a few individuals or families to put themselves to any inconveniences for the purpose of attending a central place of worship on the Lord's day. Either a clergyman must defer to their wishes or leave them a prey to one or other of the numerous seets which everywhere abound. And when there is not public worship every Lord's day, habits of nonattendance at Divine worship are easily acquired and with difficulty removed.
- 2. Experience has proved that the country school-house in which, at most of the outlying stations, Divine service is held, is a very imperfect substitute for a church. It is most

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difficult to train those who meet together in school-houses in habits of reverence.

3. Seldom is a clergyman fortunate enough to secure lay agency in carrying on his work, and lay-readers are not boked upon with favour by country churchmen.

Notwithstanding these drawbacks, the District Association confidently appeals to the present condition of the several Missions in the District as an evidence of life and growth of the Church and of what may be expected in the future, as in the past, with God's blessing, from the harmonious co-operation of both clergy and laity.

It is with feelings of duty no less than of gratitude this Association desires here to make mention of the frequent visits paid by the Bishop to the Eastern Townships during the past year.

Nothing in their opinion could tend more to the well-being of the church than the frequent intercourse of the Bishop with both Clergy and Laity.

The genial and simple habits of the Bishop have done much to bring before those with whom he has come into contact the pastoral aspect of the apostolic office; may he long be spared to feed the widely scattered flock committed to his charge by the Chief Shepherd and Bishop of Souls.

It affords the District Association very great satisfaction to be able to report that the Compton College for young ladies bids fair to fulfil the hard-earned expectations of its founder, the Rev. J. Dinzey. The working of the institution has received the high commendation of the Metropolitan, and of the Bishop of the Diocese, and of other competent judges. It is confidently expected that churchmen who desire to secure for their daughters a sound secular and religious education, will gladly avail themselves of the advantages which in this Diocese are now, for the first time, offered them.

In church building the District Association have to report one at Milby, in the Parish of Lennoxville, owing its origin and completion to the untiring energies of F. C. Emberson, Esq.

One at Westbury, owing its successful completion and consecration to the Rev. Thomas Chapman's self-denying sacrifices, which have been of no ordinary character.

One at Ascot Corner, under the auspices of the Rev. Professor Roe, and one at Island Brook, owing its successful completion mainly to the praiseworthy zeal of Mr. James Weston.

One at North Coaticook, consecrated June 13th.

One at Denison's Mills, consecrated on the second of October last.

One on Gallup Hill, Melbourne, consecrated on Dec. 3rd.

All of these churches are of ecclesiastical design and appearance, and have been put up at the least possible cost.

Reports have been received from the following Parishes and Missions:

Sherbrooke, Lennoxville, Hatley, Drummondville, Danville, Robinson, Coaticooke, Hereford, Barford, Georgeville, Brompton, Acton.

No reports from Stanstead, Kingsey, Compton, Magog, Melbourne, Marbleton, Durham.

The report from the co-rector of Sherbrooke presents a very satisfactory account of the work of the church in all its branches, in the Parish of Sherbrooke. From the Report we gather the following particulars:—A church population of 900; 240 communicants. A Sunday-school of 12 classes supplied with zealous teachers and numbering 150 scholars. A Sunday-school library of 400 vols. A Parochial library of 600 vols. Amount raised for church purposes, \$3,903.73. During the year there were 44 baptisms, 12 marriages, 25 burials, 32 candidates confirmed.

The Rector of Lennoxville states that, notwithstanding the financial depression which has been felt in the parish, the church has been thoroughly repaired and the debt on the Parsonage reduced by \$400. It also mentions the consecration

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of St. Barnabas Church, Milby, which has an average congregation of 86; communicants, 26.

The Rector of Drummondville writes: "We have succeeded in clearing off the greater part of the debts which have been oppressing us. We have also been enabled to pay off our arrears to Diocesan Board." He also mentions a gift of \$100 to the Endowment Fund.

The Missionary of Bury refers to the purchase of a beautiful font, costing \$65.

The Missionary of Coaticook mentions the consecration of a new church at North Coaticook; a confirmation of 57 persons; the satisfactory condition of the church school, under Miss Sutton; an increasing congregation at St. Stephens, which will soon require further accommodation.

The Missionary of Barford and Hereford concludes an interesting report of work extending over Dixville, Stanhope, Hereford and Perryboro, with the following words: "I have visited nearly every Protestant family in both townships, and have been received with kindness and hospitality. But the necessary work of the Mission is more than one man can successfully accomplish; if another man could be sent, the whole field would soon be ours."

The Missionary of Georgeville writes: "Our church debt, originally \$1000, is reduced to \$150. The people have promised to provide a residence for their elergyman, there being no Parsonage."

# REPORT OF THE CHURCH DEPOSITORY AT SHERBROOKE, FROM AUGUST 1st, 1874, TO DECEMBER 1st, 1875.

This Depository was opened in Sherbrooke on August 1st, 1874: it is kept at the store of Mr. T. J. Tuck, Bookseller and The Committee, not wishing to interfere with Mr. Tuck's sale of Bibles, Prayer Books, and Hymn's Ancient and Modern, determined to limit the stock of the Depository to Church Literature, outside the above three departments of the Literature of the Church. A hand-bill, issued on December 1st, 1875, containing a list of the Books and Pamphlets now in the Depository, classified the present stock in hand thus: (1) Works of Christian Poetry and Devotion; (2) Works on the Doctrines and Principles of the Church; (3) Narratives and Tales. The first division embraces several of the devotional series of books now being issued by Messrs. Rivington & Co., London. They are beautifully got up and very cheap. The second division contains Sadler's well-known books and tracts; the telling pamphlets by Dr. Thompson, of New York; Works by Bishops Oxenden, Randall, Lay, Kip and Coxe; Dr. Liddon's Bampton Lectures, Missionary Tracts and Catechisms, and many other books and pamphlets calculated to produce an intelligent acquaintance with the doctrines and principles of the English branch of the Church Catholic. The third division, which would be increased if the funds of the Depository allowed, contains several books which will be found attractive to the young, in which fiction is made a means of commending and explaining the principles of the Church. The Committee appeal to the clergy and laity in the Townships to sustain and encourage the Depository by purchasing from its stores of church literature, and by making it known amongst their friends.

The present financial position of the Depository may be gathered from the following particulars. The Depository now at Sherbrooke was originally at Lennoxville. The proΥ ΛΤ [4,

Hamilton, Esq., of Quebee, to be expended in advertising and otherwise making the Depository known through the Townships. All other receipts have arisen from sales at the Depository, or from orders given by the clergy direct to the Secretary.

## EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF MISSIONARIES

#### ACTON.

During the past year the parish work was carried on in the usual way every Sunday, there being Divine service in both Churches of the mission; and it is with thankfulness that the incumbent can record that for the last two years he has not failed in one single instance in being at his post for his Sunday duties. There are measures in progress in the adjoining diocese of Mentreal, to withdraw Upton from the mission, in lieu of it substituting Roxton Falls, a village lying five and a half miles south of Actonvale; as yet; however, no change has been made.

The Slate Quarry, mentioned in last report, is at present in a state of abeyance. Another, however, two miles east of the village, was opened during the summer, and the work is being successfully carried on. This has induced several English families to settle in the neighbourhood. In this the goodness of God towards us is apparent, for Providence prevented our hearts from failing when several members of the congregation removed their families to localities better adapted for their line of business. Thus has the mission kept

up its numbers with prospects of future increase.

The section of the Southeastern Railroad between Sorel and this village, is almost completed, and notwithstanding the unprecedented intense cold that rules the weather at this season, the work is progressing as speedily as could be expected. As Actonvale will be the junction of this line with the Grand Trunk Railroad, it may be the means of materially improving the temporal interests of the locality and indirectly ameliorating our Church temporalities.

The social gatherings were continued through the winter, and from that source of income the mission netted the respectable sum of \$56.50. With this amount we were enabled to renew one-half of the roof of St. Mark's Church,

which was in a very bad condition.

On account of the distance of the Parsonage from the Church, it was impossible, especially in cold weather, for the clergyman so to oversee the preparing of the Church for Divine Worship as to secure for the congregations the freedom from discomfort needful for their undistracted participation in the Service of the Lord's Sanctuary, consequently, at the suggestion of Thomas Maefarlane, Esq., one of the Church Wardens, who offered, and afterwards gave a deed to the mission of a site in the east side of the Church-yard, a new Parsonage, of brick, neat, comfortable and commodious, was built

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rom the for the urch for he freearticipantly, at Church the mislew Parvas built at a cost of over \$3000.00. To meet this expense, the old Parsonage was, with his Lordship's consent, sold for \$1000.00; other moneys were likewise received, so there remains but \$900:00 to be met, not a very great sum, including, as it does, the debt of \$150.00 that still remained due on the old Parsonage.

On June 20th and 21st we had the privilege of entertaining our beloved Bishop, who visited the mission on his confirma-

tion tour, when fifteen were confirmed.

On September 21st we inaugurated a harvest home, on which occasion we had the pleasure of having the presence of the Rev. Professor of Divinity of Bishop's College, Lennox-ville, who came to assist in the proceedings of the day. Not-withstanding the unfavourableness of the weather, which prevented the out-door sports, as indicated by our programme, the whole resulted in a success, as there was a creditable attendance, and we realized the sum of \$50.00.

Last spring the Church Warden of the congregation, at his own expense, caused to be creeted a platform between the chancel elevation and the pews, a distance of twelve feet.

On this platform were placed on each side stalls for the use of the choir. The reading desk and pulpit were also set forward 12 feet, near the front pews.

This was a sensible change, and is a great improvement in

the appearance of the interior of our little church.

Another change, however, has taken place in our church affairs, which to my mind appears to be a retrograde step. For many years we have had free seats, and notwithstanding my opposition, the majority of a meeting of the congregation, duly called, voted to adopt the pew system. This was urged as a measure of necessity, as the subscriptions to Diocesan Board, owing to various causes, had been tardy in coming in; and as a remedy, it was thought expedient to make the change. Time will soon tell whether this step will turn out to the pecuniary advantage of the Mission, but I fear it will not make any material difference in the receipts, while, no doubt, it has been a plausible plea of excuse to several for not attending the services of the sanctuary.

#### BOURG LOUIS.

I have been in charge of this mission a year, and am now fully able to appreciate its advantages and its disadvantages. The services at Pont Rouge, mentioned in my report last year, collapsed with the failure of Mr. Webb, so that I have now only the congregation of St Bartholomew's Church to look after. The people are mostly poor. I think they value the services of the Church, as the Church is usually filled with worshippers, unless prevented by bad roads, and as many of them live five and six miles away, I suppose some of them have a reasonable excuse for occasional absence. During the first three months of the year I had several cases of small-

pox, some of which were very distressing.

In October the Bishop confirmed fifteen young people, whom I had prepared for confirmation since my appointment here. Out of two hundred and twenty parishioners, I have fifty communicants, people who have communicated during the past year at least three times. The average number of communicants, I am sorry to say, is not above twenty. We have recently effected a few improvements in the church. The two hideous pulpit erections have been removed to make more space. The altar has been raised two steps higher, and with the magnificent altar-cloth which was recently given to us, and with the new carpet in the chancel, the building has assumed a more decided ecclesiastical appearance. My warmest thanks are due to the Rev. C. Hamilton, for a silver altar service, to Mrs. Williams, Mrs. C. Hamilton, Mrs. Fredk. Montizambert, Mrs. Walker, Miss Walker, Rev. G. Hamilton, Ernest Benson, Esq., and the congregation of St. Peter's church, for an altar cloth, the beautiful embroidery being a present from Mrs. C. Hamilton. Mrs. T. Sissons and Mrs. McElrea kindly collected twenty dollars for a carpet for the chancel, and Mr. T. Sissons, our lay-delegate to the Diocesan Synod, gave the lumber required to make the long-needed alterations in the church. Mrs. Wm. Gale and

some anonymous friends sent some clothing to enable at aged and destitute woman to attend the church services, and Miss Gugy sent a package of books for school prizes for the three schools in the Mission aided by the Church. We are very grateful for their gifts; may a blessing fall on all their undertakings.

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In the midst of our financial troubles, we are cheered by the donation of one hundred and fifty dollars by Mrs. Gordon Mack, (a name endeared to us all), to meet the \$300 some time since promised by the ever-generous Robert Hamilton, to form an endowment fund.

By God's help, we hope to keep the Mission in existence, trusting that there are better times in store for the faithful.

#### BURY AND LINGWICK.

Divine service has been celebrated with regularity in St. Faul's Church, Robinson, and in St. Peter's, Lingwick. Morning and evening service in Robinson, alternating with morning service in St. Paul's, and afternoon in Lingwick.

I regret very much to have to state that the station of St. Thomas has been closed, in consequence of the congregation tailing to pay the amount of assessment levied by the Diocesan Board.

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The congregation both at Robinson and Lingwick, have been equal to the average, and the collections at St. Paul's are nearly double what they have ever been before.

Confirmation classes have been held in Lingwick, Canterbury and Robinson, which resulted in the confirmation of eight candidates in St. Paul's, and seven in St Peter's, while the earnestness evinced in preparation gives the pastor good reason to trust that that holy and edifying rite may prove a fresh source of strength and comfort to those who, in the presence of the Church, solemnly ratified and confirmed with their own mouth, the promises made for them at their baptism.

The Sunday-school at St. Paul's has been a great comfort, the scholars numerous and, as a rule, diligent, and the teachers

zealous, earnest and interested in their charge.

In material progress, I have the happiness to record the purchase of a beautiful Font, \$28 towards which had been subscribed last year. The total cost was sixty-five dollars.

We have also a very nice set of new lamps, at a cost of

forty-five dollars, which efficiently light the Church.

I have great pleasure in acknowledging the receipt of many kind and useful donations from Lingwick, and from Robinson, testifying to the good will of the donors, and theoring the heart of him who laboured amongst them.

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## CAPE COVE.

The welcome visit of our Bishop in August, when his Lordship confirmed forty young persons within the Mission, is about the only noteworthy occurrence of the past year.

While his Lordship was with us he approved of a site for our new church, as well as of the plans kindly given us by the Rev. II. Roe, according to which we proposed to build. Since then a commencement has been made. A solid stone foundation has been laid, and the frame has been raised and partly boarded in. The work, even at this rudimentary stage, gives promise of a handsome and commodious building.

One of our wardens, the Hon. T. Savage, has contracted to finish the exterior of the church for \$1800, of which amount we have raised about half amongst ourselves.

I am glad to testify to the willingness with which many of our people have supplied material, including the large quantity of stone necessary for the foundation; in this giving their own labour, and that of their men and horses, freely and cheerfully.

That there are a few here, as well as elsewhere, who grudge labour and trouble of any sort, and look on complacently while their neighbours tax themselves for the general good, is much to be regretted.

The services of the Church have been as well attended as usual during the past year: our Sunday-school has also flourished.

I am thankful to say that, with the exception of an interesting child, the daughter of one of our wardens, whose loss was severely felt, and of two aged persons who were called away in the course of nature, our Cape Cove congregation has suffered no diminution by the hand of death.

The little congregation at Percé lost two of its younger-members by consumption; they bore their tedious and trying illness with Christian patience and resignation. I am sorry to report that owing to the failure of the fishery, upon which most of the people depend, our financial prospect is not very bright or encouraging.

I am shery, upon prospect is The third year's subscription to the building fund, due in August, have not yet been paid up, and for this reason also, the special collections have been smaller than usual, and some of them have been omitted.

I have from time to time noticed the fact that our congregation are heavily taxed, considering their means and numbers.

It is my conviction,—a conviction in which I am supported by the opinion of those best able to judge,—that while the number of familes in the mission is no greater than it was ten years ago, the ability of the people to contribute for church purposes is actually less.

The failure, to a greater or less extent, of the fishery, year after year; the increased expense of building and fitting out boats; the credit system, under which the planters, as the employers of fishermen are called, make advances to their fishermen at great risk, and frequently with heavy loss, and the want of a more general attention to agriculture, have all contributed to a state of depression from which this mission, as well as others on the coast, is now suffering.

It is a hopeful sign, and one for which I feel much thankfulness, that in the face of the very real difficulties to which I allude, my people, with few exceptions, are exerting themselves to maintain their liberal and punctual character.

I append a statement of contributions for church purposes made within the current year.

#### COATICOOK.

In sending in my Annual Report to the Church Society for this year, I have briefly to state as follows:—On the thirteenth day of June last, the Bishop held a confirmation in St. Stephen's Church, at which 57 candidates presented themselves, 54 of whom partook of the Holy Communion, which

was administered on that day.

In the afternoon, his Lordship consecrated the new church at North Coaticook, where there was an overflowing congregation. The seats in this church are free, and the services are joined in very heartily by all who attend. This congregation has had great difficulties to contend against, owing to the financial depression, which is so severely felt here.

There are two Sunday-schools (one at each church) which

are fairly attended.

I have three full services every Sunday, and 1 also teach

in one of the Sunday-schools.

Parochial visiting is kept up regularly, and as much of my time is given to that duty as is consistent with other departments of my work.

The Church school is in a very satisfactory condition, under the management of Miss Sutton, who takes a lively interest

in the Sunday-school also,

The attendance at St. Stephen's Church is increasing, and I hope the day is not far distant when we shall have either

to enlarge the present, or build a new church.

My Church-wardens have worked most heartily and harmoniously with me during the year, for which I am very thankful. During the year I have had several adult baptisms, thus increasing our numbers, and very materially increasing our ability to do the work which is before the Church in this mission.

## COOKSHIRE, EATON.

Considering the depressed state of the times, which has been felt in Eaton as elsewhere throughout the Eastern Townships, we have reason to be thankful for the progress of Church matters during the past year. While the Church population in Eaton cannot be said to be increasing by any influx of settlers from abroad, Island Brook is drawing to its rich wild lands new-comers daily, many of whom belong to the Church of England; and the prospect is that in a few years we shall have a thriving congregation there.

#### DUDSWELL.

It is with feelings of gratitude that I report regular ministrations throughout every part of my extensive and straggling mission, considering the rather severe attacks of sickness that have periodically fallen upon me for the last few years. Extra services have been given at some of the old posts, and at some new points in the mission, through the able assistance of a clerical friend. One of these new stations on Ham Road I shall probably maintain, while South Ham, which I have regularly visited for twenty-five years, I have at last reluctantly abandoned. French colonization, and the removal of all the church families, except three, I give as the cause. This systematic work on the part of the French will eventually cripple many, and totally destroy-

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some of our Church missions. Could we not organise some scheme by which vacancies produced by removals of Church families might for the most part be filled up by Church people? Can we not get our share of the stream of immigration from the British Isles which is now setting in so decidedly towards Canada, and which contains so large a percentage of people of our own faith? If we cannot do this, we must increase our efforts and multiply our agencies to win back not only recreant churchmen, but assume the aggressive so far as to endeavour to enlighten those who are walking separate from us as to the superior claims of our communion as a genuine branch of the Church Catholie. The assiduous dissemination of Church literature, and kind, considerate and courageous preaching, would, I think, do something to make our Church successfully aggressive, as she ought to be,

Through the close attention given to the erection of the new Church at Westbury, my Sunday-schools, six in number, have not been so successful as last year. An effort to increase the libraries and text books will, I trust, put them on a better basis. Poverty and the decentralised character of our people are two of the most serious drawbacks to uniform success in the Sunday-school effort.

The Marbleton model school is still doing a good work in the cause of education. It is still sending its quota of successful candidates before the board of examiners for common school diplomas, and lately some have obtained the model

school diploma with honours.

His Lordship the Bishop has just held a very interesting consecration service in the new Church at Upper Westbury. We were cheered by the presence of numerous friends from Sherbrooke and parts adjacent. This Church is almost a model for neatness, durability and cheapness. It is 48 feet by 22, with entrance porch in western tower. The windows are of stained glass, by Spence and the internal finish is all of ash, oiled. Will seat 150 people, and cost something less than 1000 dollars.

Although my people are comparatively poor, and struggling in these hard times under a heavy railway tax, yet I am about to make an effort to start an endowment fund. It will be up-hill work, but we must try hard to succeed.

## DURHAM.

As in 1871 it was my duty to report upon the last seven months of that year, so now I can speak only of the first seven months of 1875.

During this time the number of services held has been as formerly, at least four a week on an average, viz: three in the three Churches on Sundays and chief festivals and fasts, some every second Sunday in the centre of the parish.

The Holy Communion was administered in one part or other of the Mission about once a month; frequent house to

house visitation was continued as heretofore.

I am thankful to say that the "supreme effort" which the Bishop had exhorted the people to make, was very heartily made, and the hope expressed in the last report in reference to the freeing of all Church property from debt has been realized.

Fresh efforts in other directions have also been made, as testified by the financial statement handed on to the Rev. Mr. Harding to report, and in reference to which I must offer some remarks.

The contributions for books were made to meet an equal amount reported last year as coming from Robert Hamilton, Esquire.

The \$9 given the Incumbent by the people of Black River were devoted, along with his own subscriptions, to this object.

The presentations mentioned were made to Miss Trenholme and Miss Stevens (organist), to the (late lay reader) Rev. A. Stevens, B.A., after his ordination, and to the Rev. Ernest King, on his departure to a new field of work.

Here I feel bound to mention that the purse sent me as a parting gift from South Durham was not an entirely unanimous offering, owing to some ungrateful and narrow-minded displeasure at my efforts to have the furniture of the church what it should be, in order that the rubries (or rules of the

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Church for ministering before the people) may be faithfully observed. I have therefore found myself unable, I am sorry to say, to accept that gift otherwise than as partly paying a considerable sum still due me personally by that congregation.

Opposite building funds are placed subscriptions not as yet

reported.

Four socials, given by Messrs. W. Burrill, N. Lyster. C. Lyster and W. Hall, with a concert, brought in \$100, for Upper Durham, and the anniversary dedication festival about \$230, including \$10 each from Messrs. Wm. and Solomon Lyster, and T. H. Grant, Esq. There were also collected in addition, \$140 for the taking up of a note in favour of Mr. G. K. Foster, who consented to relax his claim for interest upon the same to the extent of \$10.

The Church of the Holy Trinity now possesses the valuable font promised by the Rev. and Mrs. G. H. Parker, also a hand-

some chancel chair from Miss Breadon.

St. James Church, South Durham, received a cabinet organ and a chancel chair from Mr. King and his mother, also the font that belonged to Upper Durham. A flagon has been added to the altar vessels. The \$150 granted by the Church Society in 1869, were at length made available by the deeding of the Church property to the Bishop, and came to hand generously increased by \$50.

Mr. Gardner Stevens has, by a gift-deed, conveyed to the Bishop for the use of the church 4 acres of land near Lisgar

station:

Mr. Joshua Rick and Mrs. Medley, of the same locality, have given, the one a half, the other a quarter of an acre for the site of a small church, with the promise of selling as much more on reasonable terms, if it shall be needed. Mr. Geo. Blake has given enough land for a similar purpose close to Danby station.

These are all very generous gifts to the Church, and will, I trust, ere long, prove of great value indirectly, in the spiri-

tual well-being of the inhabitants of those parts.

Mr. Wm. Cross has forgiven, in favour of the church, an old debt of \$11, and Mr. Wm. Whittaker another of \$9.

The site of the church and the graveyard at South Durham

has been suitably fenced in.

The Church Society has granted \$50 towards the erection of the proposed small Church in the centre of the parish (as referred to in last report,) but no suitable site has yet been obtained.

In L'Avenir, Mrs. Arthur Mountain has collected a considerable sum to be added to that already in hand, towards new altar vessels for Saint Paul's Church, and Miss White,

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ted a coni, towards iss White, \$16 for a new chancel carpet. The Vestry of this Church has also been made very comfortable, through the untiring energies of Mr. Geo. Atkinson.

These various sums given, collected or subscribed for Church purposes, together with the assessment and the offertory and missionary collections made since my absence, and to be reported by my successor, make up a sum of more than \$2,000.

As a further indication of the importance of this Mission, I would add, that more than once when I have had help, and services were held in six different parts of the parish on the same day, there have assembled for the enjoyment of the privileges thus afforded by the church, not less than an aggregate number of 500 people. Many other interested persons, it must be assumed, were unable to be present. In connection with such extra services, I have great pleasure in recording the name of Mr. R. J. Harvey, divinity student of Bishop's College, who did some voluntary and zealous missionary work, as my much valued companion and helper, for about a month of his holiday time.

Very interesting days in the annals of the parish were the Queen's birthday, when the anniversary dedication festival was again celebrated at Upper Durham, also the 22nd of June, when the Church at South Durham and the burial ground were at last consecrated; six children baptized by the Bishop

and nine persons confirmed.

On both of these days, intellectual and festive entertainment was furnished to large gatherings, and in connection with which the most sincere thanks of myself and parishioners are due to our beloved Diocesan, to our representatives in Parliament, to Colonel Rhodes, to the Union Cornet Band of Richmond and Melbourne, to the "Welsh Singers" of Rockland Quarry, and to the many others who kindly did all in their power for the general good.

Before closing this my last report of Durham, I must be permitted to express my devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the measure of health, happiness and success, which one so unworthy as myself has undeservedly received from

His bounteous hand.

I would also ask permission to thank most heartily all those who have been the generous instruments in His hands of contributing to my own personal comfort and welfare during the four years and a quarter throughout which I had charge of the Mission.

#### DURHAM.

I entered upon the duties of this mission in the end of July last; was received in every part of it with the greatest kindness and consideration; and since my entrance upon the work, have met with much to encourage me. But not having been long here, my report this year will necessarily be short.

There are now in the mission three handsome churches in good repair, cleared of debt, and consecrated; all of which is the result of the zealous labours of former Incumbents.

In each of these churches a service has been held, with one exception, every Sunday since I began the work, making in all 59 services during my four and a half months residence. Besides these, others were held during the month of Angust, at Duffy's, Jameson's, Black River and Carson's schoolhouses, for which many thanks are due to Mr. R. J. Harvey, a Divinity student of Bishop's College, who devoted his time during the vacation to this work.

Since Mr. Harvey returned to College, the school-houses have been without services on Sundays, as I thought the churches on those days had the best claim upon my time. I may here mention, however, that weeknight services have been held at Jameson's, and that it is my intention to begin others after Christmas at Black River, and perhaps, also, at

Duffy's or Carson's.

Through the kindness of the Revd. the Rector of Melbourne, and the Revd. the Incumbent of Drummondville, Holy Communion has been celebrated in the mission three times, the average number of communicants being about 20.

The attendance at the Churches on Sundays has been extremely good, and would average, I think, at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Upper Durham, 70; St. James' Church, South Durham, 50; St. Paul's Church, L'Avenir, 40.

The Church at Upper Durham has the largest average, and the people there deserve the most praise for attendance; because they always turn out in fair numbers, no matter how tad the weather may be.

The attendance at Jameson's school-house has also been very good, the services there altogether very encouraging.

With regard to Sunday-schools, there is not as much interest felt in the mission as one would like to see, and it is greatly to be desired that parents here could be awakened to see the immense importance of such institutions. It has always been found a most difficult thing to keep them up in country places even during the summer, and in winter it is aimost impossible. The late Incumbent informed me of the

difficulties which he himself met with in this respect; and

I have fully realized those difficulties since he left.

The Sunday-school of St. Paul's Church, L'Avenir, which was kept up through the autumn under the able superintendence of Mr. George Atkinson, has lately been closed for the winter. After several unsuccessful attempts on my part to organize schools in the other two Churches, the matter was abandoned for the present. I have, however, found a plan upon which to reorganize all three in the spring, and by which I hope to create a greater interest in the work throughout the mission. If this plan meets with success, a better account of Sunday-schools may be given at the end of next year.

Some interest has lately been awakened here with regard to a parsonage, and it is proposed to start preparations during the winter for the erection of a building next summer, but it is difficult as yet to say what the prospects of success

are

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#### DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Anglican Parish of Drummondville, so far as regards temporals, has no very encouraging report to present. Our people, largely depending for their support on the lumber business, are suffering severely from the stagnation at present existing in that and other branches of industry.

We have succeeded, however, in clearing off the greater part of the debts which have been oppressing us for some time past, partly by means of a bazaar and entertainment.

We have been enabled also to pay up our arrears to the Diocesan Board, with the exception of a sum of \$75, kindly remitted in consideration of circumstances referred to in my last report.

I am in hopes that we shall be able to maintain our present comparatively high rate of assessment, a matter on which I had occasion last year to express a serious doubt. The coming winter, however, threatens to try us very severely.

I may mention further, as a cheering incident in our financial history, the gift of \$100 to our Endowment Fund by Mr. James Duncan, well known as a staunch member and generous helper of the Church.

The Bishop visited us this summer, and confirmed eight candidates, a small class, but one of the most satisfactory and promising I have ever presented for that ordinance.

## EAST FRAMPTON.

In submitting my report from this mission for the year 1875; and reviewing during that period many encouraging mercies vouchsafed; I truly have reason to be thankful.

When I last reported, Standon Church was closed on account of arrears of assessment; since then the deficit has all been duly paid to the Dioeesan Board up to time of closing, and the Wardens have entered into some new arrangements

with the Board, and by permission of the Bishop, it was my pleasing duty to resume the usual services in June last. Truly, if ever I felt with the Psalmist, I did on that occasion, and I think I am expressing the feelings of every member of the congregation, when I quote the words: "I was glad when they said unto me: let us go into the house of the Lord." The services in this Church have been duly kept up, and well attended. May it never again be subjected to the almost indelible disgrace of being closed, but that we may see our folly and work hard to place it on so permanent a basis that we may go from "strength to strength."

As will appear by the subjoined statement, Church matters at St. Paul's, Hemison, present an encouraging aspect also. My parishioners here, labouring in common with Standon congregation, for they use the one burying-ground, have expended about one hundred dollars worth of time and timber towards creeting a substantial fence round Church and graveyard, as well as other improvements of Church property,

which I here acknowledge. Total expenditure: -

It will readily be perceived by the above that there never has been as much done within the mission any one year since I took charge of it, now about six years, and I challenge any year to show more accomplished since it became a mission, now extending over a period something near a half century, and this in the face not only of hard times, which are felt generally, but a large number of my congregation were sadly afflicted this last summer, rendering them quite incapable of affording much assistance towards Church in this way. About the latter end of July, when the crops were in full bloom, we were visited in a place known as the Tenth Range, with a tornado, accompanied with hailstones, many of which were as large as hen's eggs, which literally

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ploughed up the country for miles, destroying everything before it, leaving ten of my families almost in a state of destitution to face the asperities of winter. This calamity resulted in two families leaving the country for parts west, and to the sorer result of, chiefly leading to, the closing of the Church school in that place, for some time at least.

We have been visited (twice, I believe,) by our worthy Rural Dean during the year which is about closing; whose keen eye soon detects a want, and his candid tongue points out the same, which I am glad to say, is thankfully attended

to by my people.

Next summer we expect a visit from our Bishop; meanwhile I will be occupied in preparing candidates for the rite of Confirmation, concerning which an account will be given

you in my next.

This report would be incomplete were I not to acknowledge the kindness, daily increasing kindness, which I meet with at the hands of my congregation. I cannot breathe a want which is not promptly attended to, and I know often by those who are in many instances leaving their own work undone at their respective homes.

## GEORGEVILLE.

In sending you a report of the state and prospects of the Church in the Mission of Georgeville, for the year 1875, I am happy to think that notwithstanding the many difficulties with which we have had to struggle, the Divine Head of the Church has graciously blessed our endeavours to a greater extent than we had dared to expect. Our Church debt, originally \$1000, and at the beginning of this year \$600, is now, I rejoice to say, reduced to the comparatively small sum of \$150. For this most gratifying result of our efforts, we are chiefly indebted to one whose praise is in all the Churches of this Diocese, Robert Humilton, Esquire, of Quebec. That gentleman, in the first instance, had promised to aid us in the purchase of a parsonage and glebe by contributing \$300, to meet which we had raised, viz: \$100. That project having unfortunately failed, he then promised to give us \$150 towards paying off the Church debt, provided we raised our collection to \$300 before the end of this year. This is now an accomplished fact. Within the last few months that unfortunate debt which had so long crippled all our efforts for the progress of the Mission, and depressed the spirits of all interested in its welfare, has been reduced to the extent of \$450, leaving a balance of \$150, as mentioned above, and some small arrears of interest due. Collections for this object were taken up in our own Church on successive Sundays, amongst the inhabitants of this place, and the visitors who came amongst us in the summer season kindly assisted us. Amongst others who, in a kind and generous spirit, came to our aid, I would gratefully mention the Bishop of New Hampshire, who when present in our Church commended the work we had in hand to the consideration of all present, besides giving a liberal contribution himself towards it. But I must not omit to say that we could not have succeeded so well had it not been for the generous and liberal citizens of Quebec, Three Rivers and Sherbrooke, who, notwithstanding the great commercial depression which prevailed, most kindly responded to our appeal, thus enabling us to fulfil the conditions upon which Mr. Hamilton had promised his donation.

Nor has the progress of the Mission been altogether of a financial character. The services of the Church have been regularly held throughout the year, and are better attended than they formerly were. The Sunday-school holds its ground, and is doing, we trust, a good work amongst the young. The people of the place evince a greater interest in Church matters and greater attachment to the Church. Of this a satisfactory proof has lately been given. The Diocesan Board having sent the Rev. J. Foster as a deputation to propose that Georgeville should be annexed to Magog, the Revd. gentleman was met by several inhabitants of this village, who turned out on a very stormy evening and unanimously requested that they might still be allowed to have a resident clergyman amongst them, promising with equal unanimity to provide him with a residence, should their wish be complied with. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese favoured us again with his presence, in the month of June last, and confirmed five candidates, another having been kept at home by illness.

#### HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

With every disposition to comply with the wish of the Board, it is yet not always easy to compile an accurate and interesting report of missionary work. The bare detail of so many services held, so many celebrations of the Holy Communion, so many pastoral visits paid, and the like, is to most people uninteresting.

Nor is it easy to describe the gentle and noiseless growth of spirituality which one fondly hopes God is graciously effect-

ing in the hearts and lives of one's people.

One event, however, has occurred within the year, to us of more than ordinary interest, and one which we often recall with pleasure. I refer to the welcome visit of the Bishop in June last, when his Lordship administered the sacrament of Holy Baptism to thirteen adults, and the rite of Confirmation to forty-one. These combined services formed one deeply solemn and impressive; the appropriate and sweetly sung hymns and anthem, and the pretty floral decorations of the church contributing to its solemnity and impressiveness.

Having thoroughly painted and otherwise much improved both church edifices last year, little has been left us to do in this respect this year. In Hatley, a small debt of \$55 due upon repairs has been removed; a very handsome altar cloth purchased, (towards which I have to thank the Rev. Mr. Parker for \$10;) the Church under-pinned, and some much needed improvements made in the appearance of the burial ground, for which the community are indebted, and that not a little, to Mr. Fletcher, Church Warden. In St. John's Church, Waterville, mainly through the kindly offices of Mr. and Mrs. Paige and Miss Parkin, the old harmonium has given place to a very sweet-toned Easty cabinet organ, the reduced price of which was \$150.

The public services of the church have been as follows: Every Sunday at St. James Church, Hatley, and at St John's Church, Waterville, and on alternate Sunday evenings at Massawippi and the Bowen school-house. In addition to this, through the kind assistance of Mr. Proeter, Principal of the Academy, I have been enabled to give a fortnightly Sunday service in Barnston. During the last season of Advent, a course of Friday evening lectures was given in St. James Church, Hatley, for which I am greatly indebted to the Rev. Professor Roe, the Rev. J. Dinzey, and the Rev. J. Foster.

Two and, during part of the summer, three Sunday-schools have been maintained, with a combined roll of about 85, and average attendance of about 50.

## HEREFORD.

I was licensed to the Mission of Barford and Hereford in June last, and consequently have been here but six months. Congregations have been established and regular services held in four places, viz: Dixville, Stanhope, Hereford and Perryboro'.

Dixville is an incorporated village of about five hundred inhabitants, situated about half-way between Coaticooke and the boundary line. Regular services were established here by the Rev. J. Foster, but after he left the Mission they were held irregularly and the congregation became very much disorganized.

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Here we feel very much the effect of "our unhappy divisions," as there are no less than four different congregations trying to establish themselves, viz: the Church, Methodists, Baptists and Adventists. About twenty-five families attend our services, but all are not Church members. We have the names of forty Sunday-school scholars and three teachers on our list. The service is held in the Good Templars' Hall, of which we have a lease for 99 years. We hope to build or buy a Parsonage here next summer with the proceeds of part of the land given to this Mission by Miss Green, of Quebec. The thanks of the congregation are due to Mr. and Mrs. George

Mayhew for the gift of a new surplice and stole.

Stanhope is situated on the boundary, and with the village of Norton Mills, just across the line, contains four or five hundred inhabitants. There are about forty Protesant families who have no religious service but our own. This I consider a very promising field. The people are all anxious to have the service continued, and it has been a source of great regret to me that I could be with them only once a fortnight. hope, however, with the assistance of a Lay Reader, to have service here and at Dixville every Sunday. A Union Sundayschool has been earried on by Mr. John Wright, an exemplary young man whose parents are Baptists. He is ready to hand it over to us as soon as we have a weekly service. It is hoped that, with the generous assistance of the proprietors of the Norton Mills, a Church will be built next summer. Several persons have offered to give the site, and all will contribute according to their means. We have procured a small melodeon, and the services are generally well attended and the responding hearty. The little Church built by Dr. Ward is about half-way between Dixville and Stanhope, and can never be used but by one or two families in the immediate vicinity.

At South Hereford the Church has suffered very much from the lack of regular services. Quite a number have gone to the neighbouring town of Canaan, Vt., and joined the Methodists or Congregationalists. The little Church is not yet furnished, but it is warm and comfortable, and the rough benches answer very well. The people had lost nearly all interest and began to despair of ever seeing a clergyman again, and it will be some time before they have confidence in our being able to hold the ground permanently. There are twelve families who attend our services. About thirty dollars have been raised towards purchasing an organ, and a new pale fence has been built around the Church and buryingground. A Sunday-school with about twenty-five scholars was carried on during the summer by Mr. and Miss Workman,

but has been given up for the winter. I have no doubt that if they had a clergyman stationed in their midst, the congregations would soon be doubled, as there is plenty of ground

to work upon.

Perryboro' is a comparatively new settlement in the Northern part of Hereford, and is distant from South Hereford fifteen miles. There are about twenty Protestant families surrounded by settlements of French. There are eleven families professedly members of our Church, and three or four others are looking favourably towards us. The Methodists have established a weekly service here and have a few members. The people are for the most part poor and have many difficulties to contend against, but they are all very anxious to have the services of the Church, and will contribute according to their means.

I have held a number of services on Hall's stream, which is the oldest settled and by far the richest part of Hereford. There is only one Church family, and the rest are Nothingarians, Adventists, Spiritualists and Universalists, and they are occasionally blest with the preaching of some itinerant evangelist from the neighbouring republic. I am sure, however, that if our Church could only be fairly represented many would be led to see the beauty of her ways. This can only be done by giving Hereford a clergyman of its own, who will go in and out among them and identify himself with their best interests, both temporal and spiritual.

On the whole I feel very much encouraged with my work. I have visited nearly every Protestant family in both townships, and everywhere have been received with kindness and hospitality. But the necessary work of the Mission is more than one man can successfully accomplish. The field may not be in some respects an important one, but when one considers the character and condition of the people, and the great need there is of religions instruction, it certainly has a claim (equalled by no other in the Diocese) upon the sympathies and assistance of Churchmen. If another man could be sent, the whole field would soon be ours, but if we neglect to do so others will step in, and we shall, I fear, be able to maintain only a sickly existence, which will be no less dishonourable to ourselves than to God.

The work among these congregations is carried on with moderate success. Necessary repairs of Churches, parsonage, &e., earefully attended to. Missionary addresses by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, for Society for the Propagation of the Gospel; by Secretary, Rev. M. M. Fothergill, for Church Society. Three social festivals held for libraries, for lamps, and for debt to Mr. Wood, now paid up. Following grants and donations thankfully acknowledged; to Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and Diocesan Board for usual grant.

#### KINGSEY.

I am writing the report of the past year for the Mission of Kingsey with mingled feelings of pleasure and regret. With pleasure, because of what has been done in the Mission during the year. With regret, because it is my last report for the Mission, having left it in October to take charge of the Parish of Compton.

It will not be a matter of surprise that I should express very great regret at leaving a Mission which I had under my charge for more than nine and a quarter years. I can truly say, I experienced almost uninterrupted happiness, with hardly a cloud to east a shadow—where, too, I had many and sincere friends, and from whom I experienced very great kindness and consideration.

In June the Bishop visited the Mission, and held a confir-

mation in St. Paul's Church, and confirmed sixteen.

During the months of July and August, I had charge of the congregation at Riviere-du-Loup, during which time the services in Kingsey were kindly undertaken by several of my clerical brethren, to whom I would wish to offer my warmest

The event of chief interest during the year was the erection and consceration of a handsome Church in a distant part of the Mission, at Denison's Mills. The contract was given out late last winter, and the building erected during the summer, and was consecrated on the 2nd of October. There was a large gathering of the laity, and a hearty and cheering service; a luncheon was provided by the ladies of the congregation at the house of Mrs. Dension. For a long, long time had I talked of and wished to see a Church built to take the place of the miserable school-house in which I have so long held service, and I had almost given up any hopes of seeing my wishes realized, so little encouragement did my suggestions receive. But when once the idea was entertained by the people, it was pushed through with a hearty determination, not often equalled, seldom or ever surpassed. And all who had any part in it may well feel pleased at the result, a church well and substantially built and thoroughly well appointed, and second to few in the diocese. One thing is wanting to make it complete with the requisites for divine offices, and that is a set of altar vessels. I venture to hope that some one may be found willing and able to make an offering of a set to the Church. A word must be said about the cost, and how the money has been raised-complete, it has cost about fourteen hundred dollars, this includes really handsome chancel furniture, and a furnished vestry also. Of

this sum, one-half was raised by the people themselves, \$100 came from the Church Society, and the remainder from gene-

rous friends in Quebee and Montreal.

The financial statement shows that a goodly amount has been raised in the Mission. Of the spiritual condition of the Parish I do not think it right to speak, one only knows and can judge of that, to Him we should be content to leave all results.

I would allude briefly to the retirement of Sir Edmund Cox from the office of Church Warden, which he held for a great number of years, the duties of which office he discharged with much real self-denial. It is not too much to say that he was the founder of the Church in the Mission, and has been her main-stay through a long course of years, and I am sure I am earrying out the wishes of all in the Mission in taking this opportunity of alluding to, and thanking him for, his long continued and unselfish services.

In concluding this report, I wish to mention two most kind addresses which were given to me on leaving by the different congregations, one at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Denison's Mills, accompanied by a purse of \$31.00, the other by the congregations of St. Paul's Church and Spooner's Pond, together with a handsome silver pocket communion-service. Often do I look back with pleasure and thankfulness, and not without regrets, upon the Mission which I have left, and pray God that He may bless it in the future, as I humbly believe He has done in the past.

up. The services have all been kept up, as heretofore, and the congregations continue about the same as when last reported. The sick and the whole have been visited, and I am not aware that the people have any wish for a change, still there is a great lack of interest in the Church as "The Church," though to myself personally all are very well disposed. St. James' Church, Leeds, has been under repair for more than a year, but the work is still unfinished; we expect, however, to complete all the necessary alterations during the coming year. in which we hope to include a chancel formed out of what is now used as the Vestry, and also to clean, put in thorough repair, and color the interior of the building. The roof has been new shingled, one side new clapboarded, the tower renovated, and we intend to paint the exterior walls, all which, when done, will make it practically a new Church, for although about forty years old, the timbers are just as sound and good now as when first put in.

Last March (passion week) we had the pleasure of a visit from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese and the Rural Dean, who favoured us with missionary addresses. Last month his Lordship again visited us, holding confirmation in St. Mark's Church, Kennear's Mills, on the 11th, and gave a missionary address in St. James' Church, Leeds, the same evening, holding confirmation in the said Church, Sunday, December 12th, the number confirmed being,—St. Mark's Church, twenty-four, St. James' Church, twenty-three.

Broughton had to stand over for the present.

The subscriptions and collections for the Church Society amount to a very respectable sum, a trifle in advance of last year.

### LABRADOR.

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Being called upon after a two years' absence to return to Labrador, I at once assented. True, the Mission has some objectionable features, but it has also its good ones, and if it had not, yet being so extensive and important, some one must go to take charge. In coming here the Missionary must be aware that he is followed by the wishes and prayers of the whole Church at home. Probably more interest is taken in Labrador than in any other Mission of the Dioceso at the present time, and much sympathy is felt for the Missiona,, so that although alone in one sense upon arrival, he knows he is not alone. If any were to doubt this, I can warrant that his doubts would be removed when he became aware of the treatment extended to me on all sides, and especially by my brethren the clergy. It would be invidious to single out names, for all acquainted with me, and many others also, did whatever lay in their power to start me fair.

I had the advantage of meeting Mr. Allnatt and learning from him the state of the Mission, so that I was prepared at once to carry on things as he had arranged. A house frame had been cut the previous winter, and accordingly having nothing to finish it with, on arrival in Quebec I solicited help from different friends, who, as on all occasions, showed themselves kind and generous. The necessary amount was quickly raised, and a surplus, which went to the purchase of a harmonium, an instrument much to be desired for the Mission, both for religious purposes and also for va-

riety in amusements.

The season was far advanced when we landed (Oct. 8th.) but fortunately the autumn was very propitious, and when all became carpenters together, the house soon was habitable. We were so situated that we were obliged to take possession a few weeks before it was finished, and this style of building a house and living in it at the same time, I cannot recommend to others, that is, if they can possibly do otherwise. When the hammers ceased to be heard, my sister said it seemed as if something were wanting, yet it was a something we were glad to be without.

At the same time that this work was going on, we had to turn attention to the Chapel used by Mr. Allnatt, in order to fit it up for a school, so that the children might be instructed. It is a mystery to me how he and Mr. Butler, the schoolmaster, succeeded in passing the winter. I am not delicate in the least, but sleeping in it for a fortnight from the middle of October, gave me such a cold that it required all my resolution to fight against it. Then I had to snatch a week to go

to St Augustine River (40 miles,) for lumber to build another house in the summer. After arranging the work, started home, rowing all the way. That night a very heavy frost froze over the river, and my party barely succeeded in getting away with their cargo, the boat being badly cut into by the ice. When this general business was over, I settled down comfortably to my proper work, and the house being warm and quiet, enjoyed myself immensely.

Following up Mr. A's plan, we had Wednesday and Friday Evening and Saints Day Services. To him is due all the credit of organizing the present system of working. When he arrived there was no centre. The immigration of several Newfoundland families led him to choose Mutton Bay (now called St. Clement's) for head-quarters, and there we may consider ourselves established and doing a work something like parish work at home, only with borders more extended.

School was opened November 15th, with twenty-eight scholars; one sister took charge of the teaching while the other cared for the house. Thus, quietly and peacefully, Christmas came and New Year, and on January 19th I set forth with dogs to Nataskonan, my Western limit, 175 miles

distant.

Travelling was very heavy, and frequently we had storms, but we always succeeded in finding a house, and returned within a month. It was on this trip that I encountered the coldest day I ever remember. Heard many tales of frost-bites afterwards. Fortunately the road was good, and my driver and myself, considering we were proof, did not like to be beaten, so we journeyed on for four miles, and then were glad enough to rest for the night.

On return home, I visited an outside island five or six miles distant, and next day returning in a blinding storm on foot, was in imminent danger for a while, not knowing where I was and the force of the storm nearly suffocating me. Life is dear, and I resolutely faced it and went for shore as quickly as legs could carry me. Having wandered some distance I

was three hours gaining the house.

Resting for the Sunday, I proceeded East to Red Bay, 150 miles, taking in the Fortean Mission, which has been vacant for several years. In this district the inhabitants are more thickly scattered, journeys are therefore shorter and congre-

gations larger, and work is more satisfactory.

Good Friday and Easter services in the Forteau Church were very interesting, more than a hundred people assembling from thirty miles around. Contributions in this Mission towards defraying the expenses connected with the erection of a summer residence amounted to \$60.00, a very respectablc sum for a poor neighbouring parish.

Returned home to headquarters by the middle of April,

where I had a week or two to myself.

Being disappointed about creeting a summer house, two families packed in together and vacated one for us. We did what repairs we could in a hurry and then took possession. In good weather we are very comfortable, but when wind or

rain come upon us, we cannot say the same.

The summer has been a very trying one. Along the whole coast, fishery almost a total failure to the last. Had it not been that herring came in in great abundance, I do not know what would have happened. Some families, who could, removed to Newfoundland in hopes of saving themselves, but many others could not, and nothing but starvation stared them in the face. Certain ones are still in a very poor condition, but the timely assistance from home in the way of elothing and flour will alleviate their suffering. My appeals for help were all answered in a wonderful way, and I have now little cause to borrow trouble. I desire to tender my warmest thanks to Mr. William Price, M. P. P., for his most generous gift of 50 barrels of flour sent us per Captain Stiles, of the schooner Vivid; to the mothers' and daughters' meeting of St. Matthew's and St. Peter's, Quebec, and to Mrs. Williams and many other kind friends, for their timely presents of cloth-The papers and books supplied by friends are thoroughy appreciated.

The boat purchased by Mr. Fothergill, in Quebec, for the Mission, and sent down by Captain Blais, in the spring, answers admirably. She is perfectly safe in almost any kind of weather, and I am now sufficiently expert as a sailor to take

charge and enjoy the business.

Measles distressed the shore last summer, as the number of

deaths below can testify.

A sad, sad occurrence took place early this spring. A poor fellow of Meccatina committed suicide. This was the most melancholy event I ever had to deal with, and I do hope never to have any like it again. My Register shows, marriages 6; baptism 13; deaths 14; exclusive of those in the Fortean Mission, which I duly registered.

### MALBAIE.

I am happy to be able to chronicle improvement in both the spiritual and temporal affairs of my parish during the past year.

With few exceptions the Sunday services have been regularly maintained and well attended at Malbaie, Corner

of April,

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have been tie, Corner of Beach and Barachois, also a monthly service about four miles from the Parish Church

In July we had the benefit of a visit from the Lord Bishop, when twenty-two candidates received the Apostolic rite of confirmation, all of whom on the same day availed themselves of their fuller Christian privileges, by partaking of the Holy Communion.

In the evening, at the cell of the Bishop, a large congregation gathered together, for the purpose of forming the first Missionary meeting ever held in this Parish. I trust that, notwithstanding the isolved position of the clergy in Gaspé, this good example will be followed, and that for the

future Missionary meccines will be held yearly.

In August, with the Bishop's consent, I visited Anticosti Island, and St. John's, Land Point, Mingan and Esquimaux Point, fishing stations on the North Shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. (Through the kindness of James Collas, Esq., I obtained a free passage in one of his vessels as far as St. John's.) At all the places I received a very hearty welcome and many invitations to visit them soon again, as those had not joined in a Protestant service nor seen a clergyman for five years before. Whenever practicable I held service. At Esquimaux Point, a large village of 200 families, there is a fine centre for Missionary work. Here I staid a week and held daily services, all were well attended by both Romanists and Protestants. At the last service I received six persons into the Cauch, two of whom had been previously baptised by a Romish priest. There are several families still unbaptized at Moisie and Sheldrake; these, unfortunately, I could not visit on account of the unfavorable state of the weather, without being absent too long from my Parish.

Since my last report, we have built a new chancel, eighteen feet by eighteen feet, to the Parish Church, and added about seventy-five sittings to the Church accommodation. We owe our best thanks to the Church Society for its liberal grant of \$75 towards this much needed improvement. Two new chancel chairs, a font and lectern, all in ash and black walnut, a handsome chancel window of stained glass, new carpet for chancel and matting for the aisle, and a new altareloth, have been placed in the church at a cost of a little over \$200. The font was the gift of John LeGresly, Esq., our energetic senior Church Warden—Towards the rest, the Ladies' Aid Society of the Parish contributed \$135, the pro-

ceeds of a bazaar held last October.

Last winter we realized \$60 by a concert, which was devoted to the chancel fund.

Through the exertions of Mr. P. Hammon, who circulated a subscription list for the purpose, we have obtained three

chandeliers and four bracket lamps at a cost of \$75. We can now hold evening service without being, as previously, in almost total darkness. The inside of the Church has been painted throughout, and fitting arrangements made for heating it. Some repairs have yet to be made on the outside of the building, which we hope to accomplish next summer.

The chapel at the Corner of the Beach is now nearly finished, and will soon be fit for occupation. Mr. Peter

Vibert has defrayed the cost of the stoves for it.

The register shows 22 baptisms, 9 marriages and 13 burials.

From the Mission of Magog I have nothing specially attractive to report; though the past year has not gone by without some tokens of progress and encouragement, as it respects Church membership, and, I humbly hope, a deepening conviction of her spiritual life and edifying worship in the hearts of most who frequent her courts.

Divine Service, morning and evening, has been sustained with little interruption, and the Holy Communion monthly, on all proper occasions, with apparent devotional feeling. There are sixteen Communicants. The Apostolic rite of confirmation was administered on the 18th of June to five

recipients, including one lately baptized.

On account of impaired ability, I felt constrained to resign the charge of this Mission on the 1st of November, to seek rest and retirement, at least for a season. From the absence of the Vestry book, I am unable to report the financial affairs of the Church. I may, however, say that all dues and demands were fully settled up till the time of my departure.

## MAGDALENE ISLANDS.

Three months in the Magdalenes will restore health to the sick, vigor and elasticity to the most impaired constitution, and, in fact, benefit in a thousand ways any whose good fortune it is to be stationed there.

Unmindful of obstacles (for the most part anticipated, I am happy to say,) I drifted here about the 1st of June, and the change from the dusty city and impure air to that of the purest, wafted for miles over the Gulf of St. Lawrence, infused new life into me, and I launched my little bark in the cause of Christ, to ferry souls to his fold.

I remember the days which I have spent in the Magdalenes as the happiest of my life, and I regret that duty's calls elsewhere deprives me of the privilege of ministering longer to these simple, christian people.

I visited all the islands, viz: Amherst, Entry, Grindstone. Allright, Grosse Isle, Coffin and Brion, and nearly all the people; distributed four hundred tracts, held seventy-eight services, besides the short services with confirmation classes, and buried two persons. The attendance at service was always good.

The visit of His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, and Rev. Professor Roe, was a great source of pleasure and comfort to the people.

They spent a fortnight on the islands, held sixteen services, confirmed twenty-seven, baptized five children and married two couples. Administered Holy Communion four times, to the sick once; a goodly number was always found at this sacred feast. Readers were appointed for Grosse Isle, Entry, Grindstone and Amherst. I established Sunday-schools at the two last-named places; books for their encouragement will be sent them by Mr. Roe.

The Mission and Algoma funds were collected at the missionary meetings of His Lordship the Bishop.

I am glad to say that there is a good prospect of getting a Protestant Board of Examiners for the Islands. I wrote to Dr. Fortin, M. P. P., concerning its necessity, and he not only

wrote me back favourably, but called on me while on the islands, and faithfully promised to intercede for us when he returned to Quebec. John D. Tuzo and the resident missionary, whoever he may be, will form two members of the Board.

The Parsonage and Churches are well cared for by the Wardens, the former has been furnished throughout by Admiral Coffin. I took an inventory of the furniture, and found it the same as when Rev. S. Riopel left it. There is a strongly built and well fitted-out boat for Church purposes, called the "Messenger of Truth," a very suitable name, and one feels how great the responsibility is that rests upon the Missionary, when he reflects that, while being wafted from island to island, he is intrusted with the messages of God to his fellow-beings, and that their life and death, perhaps, depends upon him.

The boating, bathing, fishing, &c., are unsurpassed, and

afford ample amusement for spare time.

A word in behalf of the people in closing. A more quiet, inoffensive, harmless, and christian people I never met. They received me kindly, gave to me the best their homes could afford, gladly assisted me in everything I required to be done, and forwarded me wherever I wished to go, thus endearing themselves to me, and I take my leave of them with a feeling of sadness, fearing that ere they receive a pastor their little flock will be lessened by the cold hand of death, and they be compelled to perform that saddest of services without the assistance of a kind and loving minister.

### NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

This Mission, situated on the Baie des Chaleurs, has been under my charge for the past year. I will now proceed to lay before the Society a detailed report of the Mission during that period.

The two Churches are within about four miles of each her. The head Church at New Carlisle, is in sad want of repairs, both inside and outside. The pews are old-fashioned and high, and not at all suited or adapted to devotional purposes-kneeling being difficult. Soon after my arrival, a resolution of a previous vestry meeting was carried into effect, and two huge, unsightly family pows were taken down and replaced by six new ones of moderate and reasonable dimensions. I hope, during the ensuing year, to make some arrangement by which the service of praise and worship may be facilitated; and by which a large number of the poorest class may feel that they are not shut out of the Lord's House by the pew system, which, I am sorry to say, obtains here. I am persuaded, and never more so than since I have been here, that the Church will never hold her own, nor the gospel be preached to the poor, while the rich, or those able to do so, are allowed to buy the privileges of the Church for themselves. If the Synod ever enacts a canon, (and it is to be hoped she will soon do so) making it a breach of Canon Law for Churches in the diocese to be otherwise than free, she will have done much for the spiritual well-being of the Church

within her bounds.

St. Peter's Church, Paspebiac, is a pretty, convenient Church, and with one or two minor internal arrangements in default, is all that I could wish. The pews here are certainly appropriated, but the baneful effects of the system is not here so apparent, as there are sufficient pews for the different families in connection with the Church. There are not so many families, and none of the extreme poor in Paspebiac,

as there are in New Carlisle.

One of the first steps I initiated last January was to summon a meeting to consider about the building of a Parsonage, the want of which had never been experienced till now, as the former Incumbent lived upon his own property. The matter, I am happy to report, was cordially and energetically taken in hand; the congregations arranging to provide rooms for the elergyman till the house should be built. A good site was obtained, about half-way between the two Churches, containing about eighteen acres, with a good barn ready to hand, which was sold to us for the moderate sum of \$400, through the kindness and liberality of Mr. Daniel Bisson, senior. We commenced the building last spring, and we hope to have it finished early next summer. If what remains to be done is finished with as much care and good workmanship as the earlier parts, it will make a good, warm and convenient house—not too large, a fault with many Parsonages, nor yet will it be found too small, if the Incumbent fortunately, or unfortunately, happens to be a family man.

We have Sunday-schools in operation in connection with both Churches, with a band of devoted teachers. These were formerly only held during the summer months, but as the disadvantages to the children of a school interrupted by the long winter months are so great, I determined to keep them on during the whole year, and have done so, so far, without any great diminution of scholars. We have a good school-room over the horse-shed at Paspebiac, and the want of such is badly felt at New Carlisle. The inconvenience of holding schools in Churches is very great, the attention of the children cannot be fixed, nor, indeed of the teachers, when they are constantly being interrupted by the incoming

worshippers.

We made an effort, and I am happy to report not altogether an unsuccessful one, to refence the Church-yard of St. Andrew's, New Carlisle. The parts adjacent to the roads are now protected by a neat paling fence, and next spring we hope to finish the remaining two sides. Mr. Gavin Hamilton kindly took this in hand, and it is mainly owing to his

exertions that so much has been done.

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We have good harmoniums in both the Churches. A new instrument, soon after my arrival, was placed in St. Andrew's, owing to the exertions of Miss Eliza Murison, who, with her wonted kindness in Church matters, collected subscriptions for it among the people. A choir has also been started during the year at this Church, and as much pains has been taken with it by the organist, (the young lady just mentioned,) the singing has been considerably improved. At our Easter meeting it was unanimously decided to present a bible to Miss Murison, as a small acknowledgment on the part of the people of her valuable services in conducting, during a period of nine years, the musical portion of the service. We subsequently decided to exchange the two harmoniums now on hand, the old and new one, for a larger and better instrument, upon which a small debt still remains, but this I trust will soon be liquidated.

We have provided St. Peter's, Paspebiac, with four new three-branched chandeliers, which give us, what we had not before, sufficient light for our week-day evening services. I began these last Lent at both Churches, and with great success, so far as good attendance can be taken as such. I wish I could speak of success in another way, but cannot do so; however, we must work on in faith, planting and watering, and leaving the increase to God. These lenten services were given under great difficulties at New Carlisle. As there was no provision there for proper lighting, the few lights improvised for the occasion being just sufficient to make darkness visible. This induced me to make an effort to provide the Church with proper lamps, and by the kind assistance of many friends, I was able to give a concert with that object in view, which was a great success, and provided us with what we wanted. propose holding alternate services between the two missions one evening during the week throughout the winter, making them weekly during such seasons as Advent and Lent.

In the summer we were cheered by the presence of the Bishop, accompanied by his Chaplain, the Rev. Professor Roc, who came among us on a confirmation tour. Our confirmation Sunday was a happy day for us all, and one which I trust, will ever be remembered by those who then renewed before God and the congregation their baptismal vows, and were placed in possession of their full privileges as members of the Church. Seventy-five were confirmed. Some of these have become communicants, but yet I am sorely vexed by the few, not only of the newly-confirmed, but of others also, who fulfil not the command of their dying Saviour. The Holy Communion is only irregularly attended by some, never by others. I have tried faithfully to

set the holy ordinance before them in its true light, and I am happy to say not without effect. Many have had difficulties removed, and others have been enabled to overcome prejudices of long standing; and I have locked within my own breast instances of repentant and awakened sinners, undergoing real, heart-searching preparation for the blessed sacrament. These are signs that I long for, and without these, all else is nothing to me. If spared till Lent, I hope to start a communicant class in preparation for Easter.

We had two very hearty Missionary meetings during the Bishop's stay, a novelty to many of my people, the results of which, in a pecuniary way, will be seen in my financial

statement.

I have nothing more of interest to report. It would, however, he gross injustice on my part to close this report without bearing witness to the faithful services rendered the Mission by the late Incumbent, the Rev. Geo. Milne, who for a period of thirty-three years, with untiring energy, contented with the vineyard allotted him by God, watched over the interest of the Church in these parts. His labours were recognized at our Easter meetings, and an address was presented him by both congregations, expressive of their love towards him, and of their regret that the infirmities of age rendered his resignation of the Incumbency unavoidable.

I have not had the heart to make any special appeal to the individuals of the congregations in behalf of your Society, for the people have now much on hand, and have heroically expressed a wish, if possible, to erect the Parsonage without appealing to the Society for aid. What they would give now, would simply be taken from the Parsonage Fund, and render such an appeal inevitable, so that the Society (supposing our appeal was granted,) would not be bettered in the end. The fisheries this year have not been the best, and, even in this Ultima Thule, we feel the effects of the stagnation of

trade elsewhere visible.

My register for the year marks,—baptisms, 31; marriages, 5; burials, 9.

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By way of a Postscript, I should like to say a word with reference to the Mission of Shigawake. For the whole year the people comprised in the three Congregations of Shigawake, Port Daniel, and L'Anse-aux-Gascons, have been without a resident elergyman. I have done what I could for them, so far as my duty to my own people would permit, generally giving a service throughout the Mission every fourth Sunday. The extra trouble and consequent long drives which this has entailed upon me, have been more than amply repaid by the hearty way with which the people appreciate the presence of a minister among them. I trust God will soon raise up a good, strong and zealous clergyman for this Mission. There is much to do there, and much to encourage one. Mr. Grier, (a divinity student of Bishop's College,) worked very hard, and with much acceptance in the Mission as a lay-reader during the summer vacation. By his exertions a new carpet was provided for the Church floor of Port Daniel Church, as well as a considerable sum collected towards the proposed spire for the Church at Shigawake. Of L'Anse-aux-Gascon I am happy to report very favourably. There are only about half a dozen families or so here, but they have worked nobly, thanks to the perseverance of Mr. Acteson, in finishing their little Church sufficiently for divine service, and managed to do so in time for the confirmation in the summer, when a very happy and hearty service was held within its walls. While writing this I am away from the Church Wardens, and so cannot furnish the Society with their financial state-

All I have to report of Hopctown, which has now been joined to my own Mission, I can say in one word, and that word is Ichabod!

### PORTNEUF.

I do not seem to have much of special interest to record about my work during the past year. We have felt the general depression of business, and hopes of future prosperity to be brought on by the construction of the North Shore Railway, have been so far disappointed. Again in the present year some past mismanagement in school affairs was discovered, and Church affairs have suffered therefrom; but yet I believe the work of the past year has not been in vain. The services in the Church have improved, and in the village we now have a large room well filled with a congregation who respond fairly in the services, sing heartly, and apparently take more interest in what pertains to religion, and I hope that this increase of outward zeal and interest is but the token of more life within.

During last winter I was sent for to visit a woman who was said to be dying at Ste. Geneviève de Batisean, thirty miles from this. I went, and have been several times since to hold Divine Service for the few Protestants who are there.

I am greatly indebted to Mr. John Ford, of this place, for aid in the Sunday-school in the village, as well as to Richard Newton, whilst he was in charge of the day-school.

## ST. SYLVESTER.

The Mission of St. Sylvester is, with the exception of Labrador, and the Magdalen Islands, and the district recently assigned to travelling Missionary, the most extensive in the diocese. There are seven stations where divine service is

held,—St. Sylvester, St. Giles, St. Margaret's, St. Patrick's, St. Mary's, Cumberland Mills and St. George's,—besides which the Missionary visits some settlers in Jersey county, on the Kennebec Road, who live not less than ninety miles from his own house. The English population of this large district is

small, scattered, and decreasing.

In St. Margaret's, the Rev. W. King reports eight Church families and four other families, who do not belong to the Church, but attend its services; together with four families from the neighbouring Parish of St. Catherine, who show their appreciation of the opportunity of common worship by the hard travelling through the mountainous country they endure in order to participate in it. So appreciative indeed are all in this congregation, that the Missionary, when he has overcome the difficulties of the road, never fails to find in the heartiness of their worship a refreshment for his own soul.

At St. Patrick's, which is within a few miles of the Missionary's residence, he is able to give a service every Sunday when not upon his tour to the remote parts of the Mission, but he is not much encouraged in this part of his work. There are six families, or parts of families; no schools. At-

tendance at Church, from four to ten persons.

At St. Mary's there is only one family; but the Missionary must needs pass their door on his way up the Chaudiere, and in no part of his Mission does he find a warmer welcome, or a

heartier worship.

Cumberland Mills lie six miles off the main road, not far from the gold diggings. The mills have long since gone to decay, but there are still twelve families who are visited whenever Mr. King passes to St. George's, which is the furthest station or centre in this direction, though the Missionary penetrates for some miles beyond.

Returning now to St. Sylvester—in families of English origin and creed the most populous part of the Mission,—Mr. King reports the gradual diminution of their numbers. Three families have sold out this winter, and are leaving in the spring. Two leading members of the congregation have been

removed by death.

There are two day schools, and a Sunday-school.

St. Giles' is served on Sunday with St. Sylvester. The congregation is small and scattered; but they assemble. The children are catechized each Sunday, during divine service.

Summaries like the foregoing, however useful, are apt to be a little dry; and, in their unavoidable generality of statement, to conceal not a little of their significance. The following extract from a private letter is, therefore added, in the belief that, whilst possessing in itself the interest of per-

"On the last day of the New Year," writes Mr. King, who is a man over seventy, "I visited St. Giles; examined school, visited the sick, administered the Holy Sacrament to an aged child of the Church, and then hastened to the place where I was to spend the night.

"The New Year broke upon us, and a mighty rushing flood had surrounded the house. Divine service was appointed, and I in the immediate neighbourhood of the Church, unable

to get there.

"It was not until Sunday morning, when I should have been at St. Sylvester, that I could leave the spot where I was hemmed in. I then made a move, but was soon stopped by the floating ice. Two young men saw me in this condition, and came running to my help. I had to leave my horse and cross the river in a boat. I had service in the afternoon at Mr. Lefebvre's, when about twenty were present. I could not reach home until the fourth day, and then had to leave my horse behind me, and at the close of the journey walk three long miles."

### STANSTEAD

The present year has been in some respects, an eventful one with us. In pecuniary matters, I think some advance has been made, not in the actual sums raised for the various objects, for in some cases, owing to the stringency of the times, these have fallen short of last year's, but in a spirit of increased liberality and in a true grasp of the great principle that underlies giving.

But apart from this, two events serve to put a definite mark upon the present year. First, the holding of an Ordination in Christ Church, on Trinity Sunday, when the Bishop of the Diocese admitted to Holy Orders two candidates for the Diaconate, and four for the Priesthood. Secondly, the removal of the last remnants of a long-standing Church debt, and the subsequent consecration of our Church to the service of God.

The ordination derived a peculiar interest and solemuity from the fact of its being the first ever held in this neighbourhood. Its dignity and impressiveness were not soon to be

forgotten.

On the 16th of June, the Bishop of the Diocese held a Confirmation in our Church, administering the rite to thirteen persons, all of whom, I am thankful to say, have presented themselves at the Holy Communion of the Lord.

The attendance at public worship has not varied materially since last year. The number of regular communicants has

increased from about eighteen to twenty-five.

In the course of the year I have administered the sacrament of baptism to twenty-two persons, ten of whom were adults. The number of burials for the same period is eight, and of marriages, two.

Our morning and evening services have been kept up during the year, and the Sunday-school, after morning prayer,

is doing well.

In addition to these regular labours, I have sought employment in the neighbouring settlements on Sunday afternoon.

Holland has received occasional visits and services, though

the interest in Church work here is very slight.

For some months, I have been holding a fortnightly service at Libby's mills, a small settlement and flag station on the Passumpsic Railroad, some seven miles from Stanstead Plain. Though there are but one or two Church people in the vicinity to give me support, the services have been fairly attended, and the worship is gradually increasing in heartiness. By patient perseverance, I think the Church may eventually be established in this new ground.

At New Boston also, I have for some time held a monthly

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 $241 \ 15$ W. Kind. service; and the people, though in many cases very poor and degraded, are, without exception, hearty and appreciative. I trust and believe my labours among them will not be thrown

away.

The actual progress made in these out-stations has not been great indeed, I hardly dare say, as yet, that a beginning has been made in them, but considering that for miles around us the people know positively nothing of the Church's system and of the inner beauties and perfections of her services, nay, that in many cases they are strongly prejudiced against her as formal if not worse. I am satisfied, and mean to persevere.

The improvements mentioned in my last report as being effected upon our Church have proved quite satisfactory, yet

much remains to be done.

We are busy at present building a shed for horses, which in a climate like ours, is almost a necessity, if people from a distance are to attend Church.

A new furnace is also in course of construction, the old one having proved itself utterly worthless. Both these projects, which are to cost about \$100 each, will, we hope, be completed

and paid for by the close of the year.

What gives me most satisfaction and fills me with thankfulness to God, is the evidently earnest, and, I think, the increasing devotedness and piety of some among us. I pray God that in the coming year his Holy Spirit may not only deepen the life he has already imparted, but through it may quicken many who are as yet indifferent or wavering, that our Church with her services and ceremonies may be not herself an end, but an effectual and lively means of glorifying God and saving souls.

## SANDY BEACH.

As we are now approaching the close of the year, it becomes my duty once more to submit a statement of the condition and prospects of my cure. But before I enter upon it,

perhaps I will be pardoned in making some personal remarks,

bearing on my connection with the Mission.

In June last, with the consent of the Bishop, I resigned this Mission, and was appointed to that of Stoneham. There I continued but three months, for failing to secure the advantages to my family which I expected, and which were my only motives for a change, and learning that the congregations here were desirous of my return, and that the Mission was still vacant, I made application to be permitted to do so, and my request was most kindly granted by his Lordship the Bishop. Accordingly in the latter end of October, I retraced my steps, having been just four months absent, and entered once more on my duties as Missionary in Sandy Beach.

The year, like so many that have preceded it, has, through mercy, been calm, tranquil and uneventful, and the Mission is going forward in silent, yet effective growth; in which there is indeed nothing striking to engage the attention of those at a distance, yet is there sure advancement made.

There is but One who seeth the heart and can speak assuredly of the spiritual state of men. We can but judge from outward appearance; taking that as a mark and a test, there is some progress being made among us in the divine life. The services of the Church have been regularly held and well attended; the gospel of the Grace of God has been statedly announced to attentive ears, and we are warranted to hope and believe that the word will not, and cannot, be in vain.

Last winter a most energetic effort was made by this congregation to improve that important part of Christian worship, the psalmody, by procuring a better and more powerful musical instrument than the small melodeon which they possessed. For this end the exertions of the ladies of the congregation, and especially of Miss Maria Miller, and our school teacher, Miss White, and Mrs. Ker, were most self-denying and unwearied. They worked hard in preparing a tea-meeting, and in organizing and perfecting a concert, the proceeds from which, aided by what was gained by a few penny readings; the sale of the old instrument, and a subscription paper, enabled them to complete their object. So now our Church is in possession of an excellent reed organ, bought for \$137, an ornament to the building and a proof of what a determined, zealous effort can do.

We have our sorrows too, as well as our successes. One excellent young person, a member of our choir, and a regular communicant, Miss Margaret Patterson, has been called by the Master from assisting in singing his praises in His earthly

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acs. One a regular called by is earthly

temple, to join in the song of "Holy, holy," that ceaselessly rises to His glory in the temple above. Her end was peace, and from sharp and long continued sufferings, borne with quiet resignation and unshaken trust in her Heavenly Father, she entered into the perfect peace of Jesus.

# WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

In this Mission, though we cannot boast of having done everything necessary to be done, yet I think we can fairly

claim to have done something towards bettering its condition.

Let the facts speak.

The services of the Church have been regularly kept up

and well attended.

There has been a fair attendance at the Lord's Table. The attendance during Lent Lectures was equal to that on Sunday. We have introduced the practice of taking up the offertory in the evening as well as in the morning, with fair results.

We induced the former proprietor of the Parsonage, R. S. Knight, Esq., to sell for \$725 instead of \$750, in consideration of our paying in one payment. To accomplish this, however, we had to mortgage the building to the Municipal Council for the sum of \$250 for three years, at 5 per cent interest.

We took possession on the 9th of June, and here I take the opportunity of thanking all those who so kindly and willingly carted my household effects without damage, and free of

charge.

Also I would give expression to my gratitude to those who wished us "good luck and health to enjoy our new house," and backed up the wish with something to go on with, till we should be a little bit settled. I am happy to state that the tokens of good-will did not cease here.

Our best thanks are due to R. J. Ross, Esq., P. L. S., for gratuitous services, surveying, and writing out a description

of the property to be incorporated with the deed.

I am also under great obligations to Miss Ross for her kind aid in getting subscriptions for the Church Society, and Christmas tree. I may mention that all the new names on the society's list are due to this lady's energy and zeal.

Another indefatigable collector, Miss Mary Ann Bartholomew, deserves honourable mention for her cheerful and willing services, acting out a wish to be useful in the Mission. Well would it be if more in our country Missions understood the greatness and true nobleness of being useful.

In July a stable 15 by 25 was commenced for the accommodation of your Missionary's horse, wagon, &c., but the snow coming so very early this year, caused us to suspend for a time our energetic efforts towards completing it. A winter's rest, however, will enable us to hammer away with redoubled vigour when spring comes. Our best thanks are due to the many men who spent so many days on its partial construction.

The assessment has been regularly paid, and all appeals for contributions to special objects liberally responded to. s condi-

During the year we lost an excellent Church Warden, by

resignation, and found a good one in his successor.

In anticipation of the Divine "good will toward men," we again decorated our Church for Christmas, when we were greeted with the "many hands," which make good work light.

Our Christmas-tree will not be lighted up till after the New Year, but we expect it to be, as a matter of course,

## HISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The stations which are now served from Bishop's College are Capelton, Milby, Moulton Hill, Ascot Corner and Sandbill. For the first two of these I have no responsibility, Capelton being in the exclusive charge of the Reverend Professor Tambs, and the Rector of Lennoxville, in person, taking the oversight of Milby.

At Moulton Hill, the service and Sunday-school were conducted by Mr. (now the Reverend) G. T. Harding, down to Trinity Sunday last, when he was ordained to the charge of the Quarantine Station. Mr. Harding's work at Moulton Hill was marked by earnest zeal and quiet persistency, and followed by very marked results for good. His loving sympathy with the people among whom he laboured, having won him the hearts of all, both old and young, and the visible results of his two year's labour of love on Moulton-Hill, during his hours of recreation from study, were the baptism of eight

adults, twelve candidates presented for confirmation, and the addition of twelve communicants, and of several families as regular attendants at the Parish Church. These results were accomplished by diligent house to house visiting, and by regular weekly classes for singing, study of the bible, confirmation, &c., besides the regular Sunday service and Sundayschool. A three days Mission on the Hill in the early part of the winter, made a deep and lasting impression upon the neighbourhood. Mr. Harding handed on his work to his coadjutor, Mr. Alfred Lee, divinity student of the diocese of Montreal, who has since been joined in it by Mr. Robert

Colston, of the diocese of Quebec.

To Ascot Corner I gave all my own Sunday mornings for rather more than twelve months, beginning with October 1st, 1874. During my absence for the midsummer vacation, however, this station was indebted to the Rev. Rural Dean Reid for a fortnightly service. With that exception, morning service and Sunday-school have been kept up regularly every Sunday. The congregation has been from the first steadily on the increase, the average now being about sixty. The singing and responding are very hearty. We have, I think, gained the good will of the entire community, and our work here need no longer be considered as tentative. The Sunday-school is doing a good work. On the 25th day of June last, a very pleasant Sunday-school pie-nic was held in Mr. Lancelot Storey's grove, and on the same day the foundation-stone of a Church was laid by the Rural Dean. Mr. Reid has always manifested a warm interest in Ascot Corner, and has helped on the building of the Church of which he laid the first stone, not only by a liberal contribution, but by many a word of cheerful encouragement spoken to the people as he chanced to meet them in Sherbrooke. The Church is fast progressing towards completion, and we hope to occupy it early in the year. It will cost about \$1,200, of this sum the people on the spot contribute \$400; Sherbrooke Church people, ever cheerfully generous in giving, \$200; Lennoxville and Quebec, so far, respectively \$50 and \$350; and for the remainder I am responsible. The Church is built upon a valuable village lot, one aere in extent, beautifully situated. fronting upon two roads, and containing enough land to form a site for a Parsonage at some future day. The lot was the generous gift of Mr. Alfred Stacey.

Six weeks ago, my services being required at Sandhill. I associated with myself in the work at Ascot Corner, two of our students, Mr. Guy Phinney and Mr. Rodley Walters, resigning to them the conduct of the services and Sanday-schools for three Sundays out of the four. These gentlemen

In addition to the Sunday services, they have instituted a Saturday evening practice of sacred music, with readings, which is very largely attended.

The Sandhill school-house lies on the Eaton Road, between Lennoxville and Cookshire, between five and six miles from the former, and just within the borders of the township of Eaton. It is built at a place where four roads meet, and is admirably situated to form a convenient centre for a large surrounding section of country. The Rev. Principal Nicolls broke ground here some twenty-five years ago, but after two years of labour, abandoned the field. Doubtless those services were not without fruit. Two months ago a young man from that neighbourhood was at our Ascot Corner service one Sunday morning, and being impressed with what he saw and heard, came and begged of me to begin a similar work at Sandhill, promising me his hearty co-operation. After visiting Sandhill, making inquiries, and obtaining the sanction of the Incumbent of the Mission of Eaton, I resolved to accept the invitation, and entrusting Ascot Corner for three Sundays out of four to students, to devote two of the three Sundays which remained to this new opening. As it is, however, of great importance in beginning a Mission work at a new station to keep up the services, if possible, every Sunday, I secured this advantage for Sandhill by obtaining the assistance of two more of our divinity students, Mr. Richard Harvey, of the diocese of Ontario, and Mr. Fred. Webster, of the diocese of Quebec. Six weeks ago we began with a regular Sunday morning service at eleven, preceded by a Sunday-school at ten. We have already an attendance at the Sunday-school of twenty-live scholars, and the numbers present at the service have not yet fallen below fifty. The young men go out also for a musical practice every Saturday afternoon, Mr. Webster's musical attainments being of great value here. I may here perhaps be permitted to mention, as an indication of the carnest spirit in which these gentlemen have entered upon their work, that for the sake of being more useful, they have both joined the local Temperance Association at Sandhill. Our Instrumenta Missionaria here, as usual, are the Paged Prayer Book, Hymns Ancient and Modern, the Calvary and Church Catechisms and the Holy Bible. We hope to report some progress next year.

#### SHERBROOKE.

A systematic visitation of the whole parish during the past five months, yields the following statistical information. Families connected with the Church, about 190. Number of single persons, not included in the above families, 30. Total of the Church population, about 900: of these, about 580 attended the services of the Church with more or less regularity. The number of professed communicants is about 240. The average attendance at the Holy Communion for the past year is a little under 60. On Easter Day, between the first and second celebrations, there were 103 communicants, In the Sunday-school there are a little over 150 children on the roll, with an average attendance of about 110. There are twelve classes, all at present supplied with zealous and efficient teachers. In the Colonial school there are 75 children on the roll, and for the last three months the daily attendance has averaged nearly up to 50. Our Sunday-school library, which is greatly appreciated by the children, numbers now over 400 volumes. Our parochial lending library has now over 600 volumes, of which we have now a printed catalogue. We have about 80 subscribers to this library. I conduct an adult Bible class every Sunday afternoon in the Church; this numbers over 30 members. With a view to instruction in the principles of the Church, I am taking this class through some of the pamphlets in our Church depository; at present we are ragaged in Dr. Thompson's tract, entitled: "Concerning the Kingdom of God," a most lucid argument for a divinely or ganized Church from the New Testament. The members of the class have all purchased the tract at our Church depository.

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Lately, at the earnest request of the Rector, I have beging a fourse of sermons on Sunday evenings, bearing more or less directly on the errors of the Church of Rome. I commenced on Sunday, October 24th, with this subject: "The Church of England, Catholic yet Protestant;" this was followed by two sermons on the foundation question of the whole controversy between the English branch of the Church Catholic, and the Church of the Roman obedience, namely: "The supremacy of the Bishop of Rome;" and these sermons by two on "The gradual growth of error in the Church;" and these by a sermon on November 28th, suitable for the Advert season, "The prophecy of the revelation of the man of sin:"

This course is still continuing.

The usual services at St. Peter's Church, and the Protestant reformatory have been carried on through the past year by Nev. C. P. Reid, Rector, and Rural Bean, and by mys-

e Protestical bast year by I by myst The Sunday-school at the reformatory is at present carried on by one of our zealous Sunday-school teachers. In all but the junior classes of our Sunday-school, we have used during the year, the lessons published by the Rev. H. Holland, of St. Catherine's, and found well adapted for our work: In the junior classes the Church and Calvary Catechisms have been chiefly used.

On Saturday evening, June 26th, the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of the diocese held a confirmation in our Church, at which 32 persons from this parish (18 males and 14 females,) were confirmed. The Bishop kindly remained for the following Sunday morning, and administered the First Communion to these young persons. He preached on that occasion, in behalf of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. I am glad to report that our offering for that venerable society of our Church is \$15 in advance of that collected in 1874.

During the year ending November 30th, 1875, there have been 44 baptisms, (4 of these adults,) 12 marriages, and 25 burials. I append now the financial statement for the year:

00 00 9 75 2 00	and partly from the fact that some few of the annual subscribers to the Society find themselves unable, on account of the financial depression or from other causes, to contribute this year.

Last year I reported that the interior of the Church had been painted and in other respects much more fitting for Divine Service, now I am glad to state the outside has been thoroughly repaired. The debt which was incurred in the repairs of the Parsonage has been reduced by four hundred dollars, and efforts are now being made to clear off the re-

mainder, which I hope may be successful.

In the month of June last, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese administered the Rite of Confirmation to thirty-five candidates, all of whom have since been admitted to the Holy Communion. There has been no intermission in the usual services of the Church. The Holy Communion has been celebrated once a fortnight, on the great festivals, on the day of thanksgiving for the ingathering of the harvest, and on the day of intercession. There have been baptized in the Parish, cleven adults and thirty children. I have had one marriage and eleven burials.

Five miles distant from the Parish Church, on the Compton road, is the little Church of St. Barnabas, Milby. This Church was consecrated by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese on the festival of St. Barnabas, and eight candidates received the Apostolic Rite of the laying on of hands and were admitted to the blessed privilege of the Holy Communion. Since that time, Divine Service has been regularly held by Mr. Simpson, one of the Students of Bishop's College, who is in charge of the station, and by myself during the holidays. The Holy Communion has been celebrated once a month through the kindness of the Rev. Dr. Nicolls and the Rev. C. H. Badgley, M. A., the average attendance being twenty-six.

The average attendance on Divine Service is eighty-six.

The Sunday-school is progressing favourably, the scholars

numbering forty.

Since the consecration sheds have been erected for horses, and the outside of the Church has been painted, so that it is now quite finished and, I am happy to say, free from debt. The following is the financial statement of this Church from St. Barnabas Day till the end of November.

#### TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.

On the 25th of July last, my incumbency of Durham being at an end, I was appointed Travelling Missionary by the Bishop; and in connection with that position was licensed and instituted Rector of Nicolet, and also named Chaplain of the Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle. Here were my headquarters up to Nov. 7, since that they have been at Quebec, and hence I have started out almost every week up or down along the south shore of the St. Lawrence, to seek for those of Christ's sheep dispersed abroad in that district, who directly or indirectly are embraced within the fold of the reformed National Church of old England.

This work is spoken of in a circular issued by the Bishop as

follows:

"In order that the members of our Church, living in such small bodies that they are unable to provide for themselves the services of a resident elergyman, may not be altogether without the ministrations of the Church, a salary has been provided for a Travelling Missionary who may visit such scattered families, to hold divine service and minister the Sacraments among them.

"The Church Society, having found the salary for the Missionary, looks to the people who receive the benefit of his

labours to defray the expenses of his visits.

"And, for the manner of doing this, I strongly recommend that there be an offertory at all services held, and the proceeds duly transmitted to the Treasurer of the Church

Society.

"It would be further desirable that each of the congregations or groups of families visited, should undertake,—in case it should so happen that the offertory be insufficient,—to make good a fairly proportioned share of the expense. But I advise that the offertory be first used, because I think that all who worship should have an opportunity of making that free-will offering to God in which, along with prayer and praise, our worship consists." The

In several other places besides those named in the table, datics have been done accidentally, or in taking the services of dergymen on the sick-list, or Administering Holy Communion when the Incumbents are not yet in Priest's orders.

1 will but mention St. Sylvester, Durham and Bedford,

where I seemed more especially to be called.

At Batisean, on the North shore, which I supposed quite isolated, I mexpectedly found the Rev. Mr. Debbage faithfully at work, although this place is 33 miles distant from his Parsonage.

This instance vouches, no doubt, for a similar care being bectowed upon the outskirts of other parishes in the Diocese.

Some infant baptisms have been performed. Some candidates for adult baptism and for confirmation are being prepared, and some younger children encouraged to apply themselves to learning the first principles of religion; whilst parents have been reminded of the greater responsibility resting upon them in this matter, on account of the few

parochial advantages which surround their children.

The tabular statement will show that (not to speak of the occasional duties done elsewhere as referred to) about a dozen places not included in organised parishes have been visited periodically, the chief of them at an interval of about a month: that about 300 souls, young and old, have received such ministrations as they could accept; that a good average number have availed themselves of the same; that more than 100 public services have been held during the half year, in these places alone; that the Holy Communion has been frequently administered, and that more than half the travelling expenses have already been made up out of the offertory: at Grosse Isle. \$1.74 were given to a poor family, \$15 devoted to the Parsonage, and \$12.40 invested, making \$29.14 locally applied, which with \$22.95 for Mission and Pension Funds, constitute the total, \$52.09.

The other items seem to demand the comment that Rimouski will be seen to have contributed, through the offertory, more than four times as much as any other place, in acknowledgment of the ministrations received. I have good hope that this unfavourable comparison will be made up for in the coming half year, and that a fair proportion of the Missionary's expenses will be sent to the Church Society

from all places visited.

The following contributions in addition to the offertory, have been spontaneously made through my hands, and added to the Society's funds:—W. Russell, Arthabaska, \$2; W. Smyth, River du Loup, \$2; Mrs. Braithwaite, (fee for extract from register of Nicolet,) \$2; James Yeo, Trois Pistoles, \$5; James King, River Onelle, \$8—in all \$19.

The thanksgiving service and service of intercession were held at the chief stations at or about the appointed times.

All families and individuals not known to be Roman Catholics have been duly visited, and such visits, as well as the public ministrations, have been gladly welcomed.

In fact I have found, whether on the part of those whose forefathers at no very distant day were embraced within the folds of our national Church, but who may themselves have been brought up under some other system of reformed worship, or again on the part of the more intelligent and liberal minded among our Roman Catholic brethren, a readiness to acknowledge historically and practically the scriptural, primitive and comprehensive character of our national portion of Christ's "one holy catholic and apostolic Church," and also a readiness to respect and hospitably to entertain her clergy.

Moreover, I have found all who assemble for worship most willing to try how far they can enjoy and profit by the Book of Common Prayer, and it is used aptly and heartily; and quite spontaneously have its services been confessed to be more beautiful and solemn than was supposed, and more impressive than any previously participated in. Now and then opportunities are offered for the distribution of tracts, French as well as English, and I am sure that well chosen

ones, carefully used, must do a great deal of good. Many interesting details of travel and duty might be recorded, but I have chosen rather to speak as briefly as possible of the general character of the work entrusted to me. with some of its actual results. Other results there are, I am convinced, which have not been specified or alluded to, but which are, I trust, included in the fact that provision is now made, as far as practicable, for the shepherding of many sheep who would otherwise run the risk of being overlooked and lost from our fold, and of having some cause to reproach their spiritual mother with neglect. At the same time I cannot but think that many of these are responsible before God for placing themselves beyond the reach of communion with their brethren, that is, from such means of grace as they can conscientiously use, and which elsewhere they and their children might be enjoying regularly. No one can justify himself for acting in direct reversal of the precept "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all other things shall be added unto you,"

# ANNUAL REPORT

## OF THE

# CLERGY TRUST COMMITTEE,

Presented to the Church Society at the Annual Meeting, February 2nd, 1876.

The Clergy Trust Committee beg leave to report that no changes in investments have taken place since last year, and that the interest arising from the several investments has been paid.

It is with great satisfaction your committee are able to state that three new endowments have been formed, viz.: Brompton, to which Mrs. Mack has generously given one hundred and fifty dollars; Dudswell, and South Durham with L'Ayenir.

A handsome donation of one hundred dollars has been made to the Drummondville endowment by Mr. James Duncan. This fund having reached the required amount, the clergyman serving that mission will be entitled to receive two hundred dollars per annum.

The period for receiving the munificent grant of £500 stg., from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel to meet a stipulated sum of £2,500 stg., to be raised by this diocese, having expired, the Bishop has written for an extension of time. Your Committee beg to report the sum of eight thousand dollars in hand, and hope that by the 1st of March the whole amount will be completed, in order to enable the Society to draw upon the Treasurer of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

The seigniorial claims held by the Society are still in the hands of the Government, bearing interest at 6 per cent.

11. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

#### NOTICE.

The Annual Sermons in aid of the various funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached—

FOR GENERAL PURPOSES, on Quinquagesima Sunday.

FOR THE MISSION FUND ON the Sunday nearest to Michaelmas FOR THE ALGOMA BISHOPRIC FUND, on the third Sunday in Advent.

FOR THE PENSION FIND, on Thanksgiving Day.

The attention of applicants for grants is particularly directed to the following rules.

1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.

2. That grants be payable when the amounts shall be sufficient to free the property from debt; or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the value of the property or building when finished.

3. That the Treasurer when transmitting the amount of any grant of money made by this Society to any parish or mission in the diocese shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the church-wardens.

4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

5. That when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.

6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.

7. That no grant shall be made to any parish, mission or station, in which at least one sermon in aid of the Pension Fund shall not have been preached, and from which the subscription shall not have been sent in during the year.

8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary in time to be submitted to the Finance Committee, who hold a meeting in the fortnight immediately preceding each meeting of the Central Board.

9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the duty of congregations to keep all their church property in good repair.

10. Clergymen desirons of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first of May in each year.

11. No school shall be assisted for a longer period than twelve months without being Inspected and reported to be in a satisfactory condition.

12. That no application for grants in aid of churches, parsonages or buildings of any kind be entertained by the Central Board without a resolution from the Congregation approving of such application be sent at the same time to the Board.


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
