THE SPECIAL MINISTERIAL SESSION of the BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE, convened in the Pandora Avenue Methodist Church, Victoria, B.C., on Wednesday, May 20th, 1891, at 9 a.m. Devotional exercises were conducted by the President, Rev. C. BRYANT.

At 9.30, the General Superintendent, Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., took the chair, and addressed the Conference.

The roll was then called, and 23 ministers answered to their names.

The President presented the report of the Transfer Committee, as follows:—

*Into the British Columbia Conference.*—Thomas D. Pearson, Superannuated, from Niagara Conference, to take effect forthwith; J. D. P. Knox, Probationer, from Bay of Quinte Conference, to take effect on June 3rd.

Moved by Rev. J. F. Betts, seconded by Rev. A. E. Green, and

*Resolved*,—That the Revs. E. Robson, C. Watson and Joseph Hall be a committee to nominate a Committee on Conference Relations.

The Committee presented the following report, which was adopted:—

*Committee on Conference Relations.*—J. F. Betts, T. W. Hall, J. A. Wood, James Turner, A. E. Green, E. Robson, J. P. Bowell, and D. Jennings.

**QUESTION.**—Are there any objections or charges preferred against any of our Ministers or Probationers?

**ANSWER.**—They were examined one by one. Chairmen of Districts reported that no objections or charges had been preferred since the District Meetings.

**QUESTION.**—Who have resigned from the Ministry of our Church, and entitled to Credentials of Standing?

**ANSWER.**—Matthew J. Stevens, to whom Credentials of Standing shall be given, to take effect on the rising of Conference.

**QUESTION.**—Who are dropped in silence for irregular withdrawal from our work?

**ANSWER.**—None.

**QUESTION.**—Who are suspended from the Ministry?

**ANSWER.**—None.

**QUESTION.**—Who are deposed from the Ministry and expelled from the Church?

**ANSWER.**—None.

**QUESTION.**—What Probationers for the Ministry are now received into full connexion with the Conference and ordained?

**ANSWER.**—None.

**QUESTION.**—What Probationers for the Ministry remain on trial?

**QUESTION.**—What Candidates for the Ministry are now received on trial?

**ANSWER :**

Cha'n Sing Kai, who is given standing as a probationer of two years. (See Resolution.)

Liu Yik Pang was also recommended by the Westminster District as a candidate for the ministry.

Moved by Rev. J. Hall, seconded by Rev. J. F. Betts, and

*Resolved.*—That the President, Chairmen of Districts, and Rev. E. Robson, in consultation with the General Superintendent and the General Secretary of the Missionary Society, be a committee to examine the Chinese brethren as to their fitness for the work of the ministry, and report to the Conference.

The above Committee reported as follows :—

Your Committee beg to report that we have examined the two Chinese brethren, Mr. Cha'n Sing Kai and Dr. Liu Yik Pang.

1. Bro. Cha'n having been, by permission of the Conference, employed in our Chinese work two years ago, and having for the past two years engaged in that work in Vancouver and New Westminster, we recommend that he be received as a candidate for our ministry, and that the time he has served in our work be allowed him on his probation.

2. We recommend that Dr. Liu Yik Pang be employed under the direction of the Chairman of the District.

3. That we admit these brethren without the regular preliminary course of study.

4. That the Board of Examiners prepare a suitable course of study for Chinese missionaries.

The report was adopted.

The Stationing Committee recommended that Bros. C. H. M. Sutherland, J. P. Hicks, J. E. Gardner, and Cha'n Sing Kai receive ordination for special purposes. It was so ordered.

On motion, the time and place of the ordination of the above-named probationers was left to be arranged by the President of Conference.

**QUESTION.—Who are the Superannuated Ministers?**

**ANSWER.**—William Pollard, Thomas D. Pearson.

**QUESTION.—Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?**

**ANSWER.**—None.

**QUESTION.—Who are now Located?**

The Minutes of the Special Session were read and adopted.

The FIFTH SESSION of the BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE opened in Pandora Avenue Methodist Church, Thursday, May 21st, at 9 a.m. After devotional exercises conducted by the President, the General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. CARMAN, took the chair.

The ballot for President was then cast, and Rev. C. WATSON was declared elected.

Mr. WATSON thanked the Conference for the honor conferred upon him, and at once tendered his resignation, on the ground that pressure of Circuit work during the present year would render it impossible for him to satisfactorily discharge the duties of the presidency. His resignation was accepted.

Conference again proceeded to ballot for a President, and Rev. J. F. BETTS was declared elected.

On ballot, Rev. J. H. WHITE was elected Secretary.

Rev. C. M. TATE and SAMUEL GOUGH, Esq., were appointed Assistant Secretaries, and Rev. D. JENNINGS, Journal Secretary.

General Superintendent Carman then addressed the Conference.

On motion, the hours of Conference were fixed: 9 a.m. to 12 noon; 2 p.m. to 5.30 p.m.

On motion, the Bar of the Conference was fixed at the sixth seat from the front in the main auditorium, and within the gallery pillars.

Moved by Rev. J. H. White, seconded by Rev. C. M. Tate, and

*Resolved*,—That the Chairmen of Districts do now nominate a committee, to consist of one minister and one layman from each District, who shall nominate the Standing Committees of the Conference, not otherwise provided for.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee believe that there is in this Province a pressing need for an academy or college for the education of the youth of both sexes, and that the time has come when steps should be taken for the establishment of such an institution under the auspices of the Methodist Church. We, therefore, recommend the appointment of a committee to collect information, formulate a scheme, and take such action as may be deemed best under the direction of the Conference Special Committee; and we most heartily commend to the members and friends of our Church, and of higher education generally, the favorable consideration of this most important subject.

We also hail with pleasure the enactments of the Provincial Legislature, by which provision is made, as far as regards legislation, for the establishment of a Provincial University, with faculties in Arts, Science and Medicine, upon a thoroughly non-sectarian basis, where the youth of both sexes, and of all denominations may receive instruction in the secular branches of a higher education.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report that we find a gratifying increase in the Sunday-school work throughout the entire Province. The statistics from the various Districts impress us with the opinion that all our schools are efficiently managed. Over 2,500 children and young people are receiving instruction in the Methodist Sunday-schools of British Columbia. This is an increase of nearly 500 over last year.

We would, however, make the following recommendations with a view to the further extension of this profitable work:—

1. We find that there are fifty-seven preaching appointments where no Sunday-schools are reported, and we recommend that the Superintendents of Circuits and Missions take steps to organize a school in connection with each preaching appointment wherever practicable.

2. We earnestly recommend that the provision of the Discipline, which requires the holding of annual Sabbath-school Conventions in connection with the District Meetings, be complied with.

3. We deplore the fact that the Methodist Catechism is taught in so few of our schools, the number of scholars learning it being under seventeen per cent. of the whole. We recommend that Superintendents of Circuits and Missions request the Superintendents of their Sunday-schools to introduce the Catechism into the exercises of the school wherever practicable.

4. We recommend that Rev. J. P. Bowell be appointed Conference Treasurer of the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund for the ensuing year.

#### REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following report:—

1. That while we do not desire to see a pharisaic or puritanic observance of the Christian Sabbath, we nevertheless deplore the apparent disposition of many professing Christians to tamper with the sacred obligations of the Lord's Day, thereby lowering the tone and weakening the influence of our common Christianity.

2. That we view with profound sorrow the callous indifference of railway, steamboat, tramway and other companies, to the divine command, "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," completely disregarding the social, moral, and spiritual claims of their employees, and utterly ignoring the earnest and repeatedly expressed desire of all that is Christian in the Province.

3. Your Committee gratefully recognize the fact that by the legislation of the last session of the Provincial Assembly, all places where intoxicating liquors are sold are to be closed during the Lord's Day, believing as we do, that this will greatly conduce to the better observance of the Christian Sabbath. We would also express our high appreciation of the noble efforts of the honorable the Premier of the Province, and other members of the House, to have the hours of closing still further extended, and also to secure the enactment of a general law for the better observance of the Lord's Day throughout the Province, and our profound regret that a majority of the House should have given to that important measure, framed in the interests of our social order and moral well-being, a treatment so different from that awarded to it by the large majority, including the wisest and best of the statesmen of Great Britain, Canada and the United States of America.

Your Committee most earnestly hope that the excellent measure now before the Dominion Parliament will meet with a very much better fate. For this our prayers have already gone to the Dominion House—let them also ascend in the same behalf to Him whose throne is above the heavens, and whose kingdom ruleth over all.

#### REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Statistics beg to report that they find a very encouraging increase in membership on the Victoria, Westminster, and Kamloop Districts, but a decrease on the Simpson District, which materially affects the increase for the Conference.

The Connexional Funds are, with the exception of the Sunday-school Aid, all in advance of last year. We call special attention to the Westminster District, which has nearly doubled the amount raised last year.

In Sunday-schools we find there has been an increase of nearly 500 scholars, making the present number 2,504.

Ten Epworth Leagues have been organized, with a membership of 588. Present membership, 2,979; increase, 584.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

It is with feelings of unfeigned gratitude that your Committee report advancement at almost every point in relation to temperance sentiment and work throughout this Province.

One proof of this you may find in the fact that the various temperance organizations have, during the past year, increased in numbers, strength and efficiency; another in the fact, that in several instances, through the influence brought to bear on the Licensing Boards, parties anxious to engage in the traffic have been prevented from securing licenses. Perhaps the strongest proof of all is the fact that the Hon. John Robson was able to introduce, and carry through the House at its last session, a measure rendering it compulsory that all bars where intoxicating drinks are sold be closed from 11 p.m. on Saturday, until 1 a.m. on Monday.

We feel it to be our duty to place on record our high appreciation of the good work accomplished by the committee appointed last Conference to deal with the question of the illicit sale of liquor, and the prompt measure adopted by the Government to suppress the traffic when fairly brought to its notice, and beg to suggest that the same, or a similar committee, be appointed for the ensuing year.

We must not, however, conclude that we have attained a position of perfect security. There is still enough of the evil to call for the most careful and prayerful vigilance and zeal on the part of all temperance workers, and especially the Methodist Church.

We would urge the importance of all who are in sympathy with temperance work being duly registered, so that they may legally cast their votes on the right side, and for the right man when opportunity occurs.

We would again call the attention of the proper authorities to the way in which the law is violated by the steamboats. Liquor is sold at the landings, for which they have no license, and great trouble and annoyance is the consequence. We strongly urge upon the authorities that more stringent measures be taken to abate this evil.

It is also a matter of deep regret that the law prohibiting the sale of liquor to minors is by no means strictly enforced. We would earnestly call attention to this fact, and strongly recommend that all necessary measures be adopted by the Government and the city officials for the enforcement of the law.

Your Committee deprecates the fact that notwithstanding the growing temperance sentiment in several communities throughout the Province where licenses exist, there is no legal enactment for the cancelling of

such licenses. We are of opinion that the same formalities and guarantees should be required in case of an application for the renewal of a license as are required in case of application for a new license.

We would earnestly recommend the constant and faithful inculcation of temperance principles in the homes of our people, and also in the Sunday-school, so that the young, who are the hope of the future, may grow up in an atmosphere that will naturally qualify them for taking an intelligent and loyal stand on the great question of Prohibition.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

1. In the judgment of the Committee, it is expedient that the President of the Conference give as much of his time as possible to visit the Circuits and Missions within the bounds of this Annual Conference for the purpose of stimulating the religious work and increasing the liberality of the people in the support of the missionaries and the Connexional Funds of the Church.

2. The matters referred to in the memorial on the Naas work, can, in the opinion of your Committee, be best dealt with by the Simpson District and the General Board of Missions.

3. Your Committee have given careful attention to the state and prospects of mission work among the Indians in this Province, and beg to submit certain statements and recommendations touching the same.

The results of this work during the last seventeen years present many encouraging features. Among the Tsimsheans of Port Simpson, the Hydahs, The Bella Bellas, the people of the Naas and Skeena, and the tribes of the Fraser, valuable work has been done. Whole villages have been reclaimed from heathenism, and many of the converts maintain a steadfast profession, but the missionary force on the District is insufficient to meet the present demands of the work, not to speak of extension to villages on the west coast of Vancouver Island and elsewhere that are yet untouched. More missionaries are urgently needed, and these, it is hoped, the Board of Missions will speedily supply.

But it is to the educational side of the work that we would especially call the attention of the Conference. If we are to conserve the results of our mission work, if we are to lift the Indian tribes out of barbarism and prepare them for the duties of citizenship, the education of the children is an indispensable condition, and this education must cover industrial pursuits as well as ordinary school duties. There are reasons growing out of the unsettled habits of the people which neutralize the efforts of our best teachers, and indicate the necessity for a radical change of policy. Where the people are frequently migrating from point to point in connection with hunting and fishing operations, the work of the ordinary school is entirely broken up, and the result of months of labor is altogether dissipated. The successful missionary must go with his people and carry on his work alike in the settled village or the temporary camp; but with the school-teacher this is impossible. For the success of his work, the children must be got together in one place and kept there.



In our judgment, the remedy for the state of things referred to will be found in a system of residential schools established at given centres, into which the children from a wide area might be brought, and where they might remain until qualified to earn their own living. It is also our opinion that in order to achieve the best results, these schools must provide for the industrial training of the pupils—the girls in all kinds of house-work, sewing, etc., and the boys in various trades suitable to their capacity, and the needs of the country. The benefits of such a system are obvious. The children will be kept away from the demoralizing influence of village and camp life; their education will be continued without those frequent and disastrous interruptions which mar its efficiency. The compulsory use of the English language will not only open their way to the elevating influence of a wide literature, but will prepare them for an intelligent discharge of the duties of citizenship, while the atmosphere of civilization, home-life and teaching in which they would move would form the best safeguard against temptations to intemperance and licentiousness, which have ruined so many of their race.

Already the nuclei of at least two such schools are in existence, one at Port Simpson and the other at Chilliwack. At the former place there is a girls' home, with twenty pupils, under the charge of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the beginning of a Boys' Home, with only seven pupils at present, but capable of expansion if only the means were available. A site has been secured by the Woman's Missionary Society, on which they propose to erect a home that will accommodate fifty pupils. If a similar building were erected for the boys under the control of the General Board of Missions, with provision for industrial training, it would meet the needs of the case so far as that religion is concerned, and it would be quite practicable to carry on the school studies of both sexes in the commodious village school building already erected, thus increasing efficiency and reducing cost.

Similar remarks will apply to Coqualeetza Home at Chilliwack. The results of that institute, so far, are most encouraging, and by an extension similar to that proposed for Port Simpson, and the acquisition of some land for farming purposes, would answer admirably for the tribes of the Fraser, and to some extent for those of Vancouver Island.

There are two other centres at which we think industrial schools should be established, but we need not refer to them more specifically just now. We recommend that a copy of this report be sent to the General Board of Missions, and to the Executive of the Woman's Missionary Society, and that prompt and earnest action be urged in both cases. We also recommend that careful estimates of probable cost for site, buildings, and equipment and maintenance accompany said report.

4. In regard to the steamer *Glad Tidings*, your Committee are of opinion that the time has not yet come when the services of the boat can be dispensed with, but they think some change should be made in her management and work. They therefore recommend:—

(a) That the *Glad Tidings* be brought down to Vancouver Island, to such place as may be hereafter determined, and put in a state of thorough repair, including a new boiler.

(b) That a missionary be appointed who shall have charge of the *Glad Tidings* during the coming year. He shall visit regularly, and as

often as possible, the tribes on the east and west coasts of the island, the islands of the gulf, and the tribes on the mainland, so far as they are not reached by any other Protestant missionary. He shall also, if possible, make two trips in the year to the Simpson District, and convey the Chairman to all points in the District that the boat can reach, spending say four weeks in this work on each occasion.

(c) In order to conform to the laws of the Province, we recommend that a certificated captain and engineer be employed, that these be selected in view of their suitableness to do missionary work and assist the missionary in charge.

(d) We further recommend, that for the present year, Nanaimo be the port, and that the house erected for the teacher at Nanaimo be utilized as a house for the family of the *Glad Tidings* missionary.

(e) We recommend that Rev. T. Crosby be instructed to go on and get needed repairs to the *Glad Tidings*, including a new boiler, made immediately, and that a recommendation be forwarded to the Missionary Society for a grant to cover expenses.

5. Regarding the discontent of our Indian brethren on the land difficulties, we recommend that the General Secretary be requested to confer, and arrange with the Governments concerned, and secure the highest possible advantage for our Indian people, and that inasmuch as our Indians complain that they have received no answer to their former representations, that a special embassy, consisting of the General Secretary and President of the Conference convey the reply secured by effort with the Government, either as to land, schools or other advantages, and that our Conference agree, through its authorities, to render the General Secretary and General Board all the aid in this matter in our power. We would further recommend that our decision on this matter be referred to the General Board, and that in case the embassy above named is unable to go to the Simpson District on this business, the General Board be requested to make suitable provision.

6. In reference to the resolution of the Rev. J. P. Howell, concerning the basis upon which the salaries of missionaries on Domestic Missions be calculated, we recommend that the Financial District Meetings consider all cases of special necessity, and report their finding to the Missionary Committee of the Annual Conference through the Chairman.

#### REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Although the information accessible to your Committee is of the scantiest description, we are glad to report that this new social and religious organization, which has been recommended by the General Conference for universal adoption in our Churches, has made considerable progress in British Columbia, as shown by the fact that ten Leagues are reported in active operation, with a membership of 588. It is cause for rejoicing that so large a number of our young people have been banded together with the high purpose of securing for themselves and for others, the highest New Testament standard of Christian experience. Already the most salutary effects have been produced in the quickening of the

religious experience of the young people themselves and in engaging their active sympathy and work for the salvation of others.

We would remind you that the success of the Epworth League will depend very largely upon the degree of hearty co-operation and affectionate interest which it receives from the older members of the Church, and would suggest that all, but especially Pastors and Official members of our churches, should familiarize themselves with the constitution and aims of this thoroughly Methodist institution in order that they may be prepared to wisely direct its operations. There can be no question that the sainted founder of Methodism would have been quick to avail himself of this effective means of influencing young Christians, and training them for usefulness in the future.

We are convinced that there is hardly a Church throughout the Conference where it would be impracticable to form a League, as the department of Christian Endeavor, which is the very heart and soul of the movement, can be worked successfully, where the number of members is very small; and would recommend that wherever half a dozen young people can be gathered together, they should be organized into a League to work for God and the salvation of souls. Difficulties will have to be met and obstacles overcome, but we are convinced the results will amply repay the effort expended.

## SUPERANNUATION FUND.

*The Treasurer's Annual Report and Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1890, as passed by the Board.*

The estimates for the year just closed were made on the most economical scale, and were barely sufficient to meet the current expenses of the year. The various Circuits in the Connexion raised \$49,461.92, or \$1,254.48 more than last year; and the ministerial subscriptions were also a little in advance. There were, however, small deficiencies in the amounts expected from both these sources of income.

There was a falling off in the Interest Account, arising from our inability to get several comparatively large sums of interest which, though due and considered perfectly reliable, we could not realize before the close of the year; and also, because in one of our large investments a reduction of one per cent. had to be made.

I am happy to say that the Book Room has increased the annual grant to the Fund up to \$6,300, an advance of \$300.

Notwithstanding the increased expenditure incurred by the removal to our new premises, the expenses of the Fund have been reduced some \$68.

The additional amount required to pay claimants was \$2,398.69, and all have been paid in full and all expenses met; but the circumstances above referred to have left the Annual Account deficient \$1,010.56. Of this amount, however, more than \$800 are in the hands of reliable parties, who are expected to pay up in a very short time.

After writing off the amounts recommended by the Board, and without embracing the munificent legacy of William Gooderham, Esq., not yet received, the investments of the Fund now amount to \$176,503.76.

In accordance with the instructions of the Board, a competent committee of laymen have examined all the securities held on behalf of the Fund, and reported to the Board that they found the securities in a very satisfactory condition.

### INTERIM REPORT OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

In presenting the report of work done since the last General Conference, the Treasurer begs to say that the Committee appointed met soon after the rising of the General Conference, and after careful consideration of each case, decided to carry out the recommendation of the General Conference, and made the appropriations accordingly.

Many members of the Committee expressed great regret that no effort was to be made to raise any sum to reduce the obligations of the Fund, through the meetings to be held in March to celebrate the hundredth year of Methodism in Canada.

Your Treasurer also regrets to report that remittances have come in unusually slow, not so much from lack of loyalty to the Fund, as from neglect to take up and forward the collections on time. This necessitated the borrowing of money at high rates, in order to keep faith with claimants.

It is of the greatest importance that the ministers look after the interests of this Fund, promptly take up the collections as required by the Discipline, in October, and forward at once to the Treasurer. There are not probably one hundred Circuits in the whole Dominion where this cannot be done. The amount paid in to the Treasurer, and to the Rev. James Gray, who has acted in his absence, amounts to \$604.54 to the 15th May, 1891.

The foregoing is respectfully and loyally submitted, with the hope that the future may be brighter, and the collections larger

*From Minutes of 1887.*

## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

*Resolved*,—That wherever, and as soon as deemed practicable, the Superintendent of each Circuit and Mission shall request the ladies of our Church to unite, and, in accordance with the provisions and requirements of the Discipline, organize branches of the Woman's Missionary Society.

## CIRCUIT INVITATIONS.

The following preamble and resolution was reported to the Conference by the Stationing Committee, concurred in, and ordered to be printed in the Minutes:—

Whereas the work of this Stationing Committee has been rendered more difficult than otherwise it would have been by the fact that the Quarterly Official Boards of some Circuits within the bounds of the Conference had entered into private negotiations with ministers belonging to other Conferences, with a view to securing their services for these particular Stations, without due consideration being given to the convenience or comfort of ministers and their families now in the field, or to such an arrangement of the Stations as would ensure the most efficient administration of District and Conference work; therefore

*Resolved*,—That while we have, on this occasion, complied as far as possible with the expressed wishes of the Circuits concerned, we desire to kindly point out to the esteemed brethren composing the Quarterly Official Boards, that in so small a Conference as ours the pursuance of the course above referred to cannot fail to cause serious embarrassment to the Stationing Committee, lessen the efficiency of our Church as a whole, and disturb to some extent, the present state of good feeling and mutual confidence so happily existing between ministers and people, and among the various Circuits and Missions of our Conference. We would remind our people that our churches are not independent congregations, but a *Connexion*, and that the principle of the itinerancy can be given its highest efficiency only when both people and pastors loyally surrender into the hands of the Stationing Committee, elected by the joint vote of *laity* and ministers, their right to choose—on the one hand what pastors they shall have, and on the other what congregations they shall serve.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS  
OF THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE, SENDS  
GREETING.

DEARLY BELOVED,— We avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded by our annual gathering to send you greeting in the name of the Lord, and to renew to you the assurance of our affectionate regard and our deep solicitude for your spiritual and eternal well-being; as also to offer such words of counsel as the circumstances of the time seem to require.

The review of the year has called forth deep thankfulness to God for the many encouraging aspects of our common work. New churches have been built, largely increased congregations in some instances, blessed revivals of religion here and there, and the opening of new and widening fields, calling for a considerable addition to our staff of laborers. We are glad to report a net increase of 584 to the membership of the Church for the year.

Our Conference sessions have been pleasant and profitable, and fraught with a blessed spiritual influence. Our discussions have covered many practical subjects of deep importance to us all. We have not failed to recognize the great significance of our times and the importance of the position we occupy in common with other Churches in this land, in relation to the future of this new and developing country. We earnestly pray that as a Church we may, by divine grace, nobly and adequately match our responsibilities and opportunities. Our one essential mission is to crush out sin and build up the kingdom of God by spreading Scriptural holiness in the land. To this end we need the culture of Christian character of no feeble kind, but enlightened, energetic and aggressive. Our noble heritage of Christian doctrine, covering the great saving universalities, gives us an adequate equipment under God for our stupendous yet blessed work. We have no misgiving as to the divine provision and saving design relative to every human soul, so that we can go forth with an unwavering and commanding confidence to perform the functions of our mission. Let our people be the living embodiment of these blessed and saving doctrines, and everywhere the illumination of their manifestation will "chase the gloom of hellish night." Let us as children of the light never be found pleading for a lowering of the standard of the Christian life, but rather covet for ourselves and for all the attainment of the divinest ideals. Let us aim at their realization in our politics, in our business, in our social and domestic life, in our church relations; then shall we realize the privileges and ennoblement of our stewardship to God, and escape the incubus of a materializing worldliness which quenches all spiritual aspiration. Let us not come under the deadly spell of the spirit and prevailing sentiment of the world of unbelief, but rather let us live under the constant influence of the powers and pleasures of the world to come. To this end we must be diligent students of the Word of God, and equally active in the translation of that Word into life and practice. In our daily dealing with material values, we must not forget the moral obligation which they can never

outweigh. We must seek to leaven this whole country with our conviction of the supreme importance of moral and spiritual interests in themselves and in their bearing upon material interests and our country's weal.

There is much in our surroundings that is admonitory, and that calls for unremitting vigilance and united action. Great inroads are being made upon the sanctity of the Sabbath. We shall guard it best on our part by constantly keeping it, permitting no seductive sentiment, subtle and plausible reasoning of delusive example to override divine precept and sanction. Let us not allow ourselves to become accustomed to this, or any other evil, but cultivate all the more a delicate sensitiveness towards the divine will, and permit God's truth to have a voice through us, and His will an embodiment in our conduct. The great question of Intemperance is always one of recurring and burning importance; the position it is being forced into in great public issues is full of hopeful significance, looking to the ultimate triumph of right. Let us consistently continue to honor the record of our Church in relation to it, by bringing to bear all the forces of truth and righteousness at our command for the overthrow of this justly dreaded and reprobated evil.

Social purity should ever find in us a firm ally, and we should lose no opportunity to visit the penalty of a scathing denunciation upon the infamous doctrine, far too prevalent, that vice is neither necessary nor useful. Personal purity in man and woman must be insisted upon with all the emphasis of the love of God, the wrath to come, and the judgment of the Almighty. Our young people must be admonished of the disastrous recoil of promising wickedness, or the seductive temptation will prove their ruin. We would counsel the recognition and cultivation of individual responsibility in relation to all the means of grace, and in them all the maintenance of happy and vital communion with God as the true safeguard against formalism.

It is also well that we should guard ourselves against the subtle tendency to narrow our interest and solicitude to our merely local church affairs. God would educate us into largeness, and would have us partners and helpers together with Himself in all the wide enterprises of His kingdom. Our various missionary fields, domestic and foreign, merit our intelligent and prayerful support, and together with other connexional interests, furnish the opportunity for our benefactions.

Our connexional periodicals should find an increasingly generous support from all our people, and our aim should be to have them guests in every home. As we deliberately plan to save human souls, so should we plan for the introduction of Methodist literature, history and biography into our homes and Sunday-schools, in order that our young people especially may get the spiritual benefit and inspiration, and partake of the enthusiasm of the unique and providential history of our Church.

We ask you to unite with us in the prayer that this year may be one signalized by extensive revivals of religion in all parts of this Province. To this end we need to have much before our minds the supreme peril of human souls, the glory of God, and the importance of a delicate adjustment of ourselves to the mind and methods of the Holy Spirit.
