ENLARGE RETRIBUTION.
 The law against combinations in restraint of trade is either too rigid, too weak or too carelessly administered. Allegations of breaking the law are made right and left against firms which, if they were made against individuals, and involved nothing more than the improper transference of silver spoons from one sideboard to another, would cause a terrible hubbub in the circles frequented by the individuals. But many men seem to keep their trade consciences under lock and key and out of the reach of social pains and penalties. It will soon be no virtue to be above suspicion. Indeed, in such a case the cynic would say the business leader who is in a lonely isolation, if not in a state of active torment. The minister of finance, sitting on the tariff commission the other day, questioned a witness as to whether there was a combine in a particular industry, and made no bones about stating that there was general public suspicion and assertion that such was the fact. Go among almost any company of business men and you will hear it said that the prosecuting attorney, if he would get after the wholesale grocers, rubber manufacturers, sugar people—almost any department of trade—he would find each of them working the other.

Last week the public was edified by the spectacle of a pork packer offering to take an oath upon a stack of Bibles a mile high that he was in no sort of agreement with other packers with a view to regulating prices. Twenty-four hours after that statement was made it was proved that this same man had signed an agreement, the only reasonable cause for which could be the influencing of prices; for those who broke the agreement were liable to stringent penalties to be enforced by a court of summary jurisdiction which compelled the defendant to prove his innocence—a proceeding against every practice of British law and every natural instinct of fair play.

Obviously, the state should provide an efficient check for this kind of thing. In Toronto the prosecuting attorney is a strong independent and fearless man, but he cannot do everything. The machinery at his disposal for unearthing iniquity is not commensurate to the means which can be used by the great aggregations of capital for conspiring against the pocket of the consumer.

Some people think that a special and permanent commission should be set up for the detection and punishment of trade malpractices. It might be difficult to find a satisfactory personnel for such a commission. Already there is a commission, the head of which is, in some businesses, an active partner with the equity who have obtained concessions concerning which the commission is expected to be impartial in the country's service. Unhappily, it yearly comes more and more difficult to induce the public to place real confidence in persons nominated by governments to serve public interest without fear or favor.

The state appoints a superintendent of insurance, gives him power to examine anything which he suspects to be a misnomer in insurance companies. To obtain the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, from directors, managers, secretaries, clerks and other officials of the companies, the power in his hands is so wide and unquestionable that they can mislead him only by running foul and declared risk of being prosecuted for perjury. But the superintendent of insurance, unless his acts belie him, no more thinks of himself as the high constable of the nation in regard to a business in which the nation has undertaken to guarantee sound management of hundreds of millions of dollars belonging to the people, than he regards himself as the descendant of the Archangel Gabriel.

When the state creates instruments of fair dealing, such as the superintendent of insurance and the prosecuting attorneys, the state should exact from them in unmistakable terms periodic reports, not only as to whether the letter of the law has been observed, but as to the respects in which the law might be strengthened in order to safeguard public well-being, and to make it easy for directors to be square, and hard for them to be crooked.

The joint stock laws of Ontario, for example, are unsatisfactory. The Do-

minion parliament does compel insurance companies to disclose annually all the names of their shareholders, but if you wish to know the names of those who are interested in ordinary joint stock companies you have to be almost as wily as a combinationist lawyer if you want to discover who are behind various enterprises.

For example, it is said that the controllers of certain insurance companies which will be named in due course have established subsidiary companies for the double purpose of handling securities of insurance companies, whose directors are paid for that purpose, and to add to the income of certain insurance directors by take-overs and commissions which they do not take, if they transact all the insurance business, they ought to transact, for those whose money they handle, and whose money makes them rich.

It has been said that a country gets exactly the kind of government it deserves. The public sometimes appears to be growing accustomed to be pulled and to like the experience. Still it is true that you cannot fool all the people all the time.

CONSIDER THE LADIES.
 From a letter given in another column it appears that in rearranging their scale of salaries the finance committee of the school board might with propriety have treated the female teachers more generously. All that seems to have been done regarding them at this time is to raise the minimum salary to \$380, a proposal which benefits about 28 beginners. As the reasons put forward for substantially increasing the salaries of male assistants apply with equal force to female teachers, most of whom are also wholly or partially home supporters, a valid ground of complaint apparently exists which in fairness should be considered on its merits.

The propriety of the general policy of the board in maintaining a separate scale of salaries for female teachers, there is no disposition to question. But the work they do to some extent coincides with that of male teachers—occasionally even in the higher branches—it certainly looks curious that the initial salary of a male assistant should only be \$10 less per annum than the maximum salary a lady receives after 13 years' successful work. Cases we believe are also to be found where ladies act as assistant principals, a circumstance well deserving special provision. As the finance committee has shown itself desirous of meeting the claims of the teachers in a fair spirit, it will doubtless be prepared to reconsider the case of the ladies and give due weight to their representations.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP MAN NEEDED
 Toronto is vitally interested in the question of public ownership, and with a vacancy to be filled in the representation of the city in the legislature care should be taken in the selection of a man who is friendly to the adoption of the principle.

Many matters causing clashes between private corporations and the public interest are admitted and free traders. Nor is it at all improbable that an influential section of the Trade Unionists may ultimately develop protectionist inclinations. There are meantime kept in check by the present industrial boom which, despite the unemployed agitation, is too marked to be regarded as a period of industrial depression, with the consequent aggravation of social troubles, cannot but lead to a more general recognition of the evil of restricted markets. This in turn would demonstrate the necessity for some effective lever for breaking the high tariff walls erected by British trade competitors—a lever only to be found in a tariff policy.

The situation thus lends itself to an effective alliance between the two main sections of the opposition, as a consequence of which Mr. Balfour and Mr. Chamberlain could scarcely fail to be brought nearer together. The rapprochement cannot but be greatly aided by Mr. Chamberlain's refusal to follow a directly divisive course. To all appearance the trend of circumstances is such as to compel the approximation of the two leaders, a motion facilitated by the personal loyalty of Mr. Chamberlain to the titular leader. Union in opposition will advance co-operation in the more positive aspects of the common policy and pave the way for identification when the time comes for another appeal to the great jury of the people. Altho the verdict pronounced at the general election is so overwhelming in the house of commons, it must not be forgotten that 46 per cent. of the votes polled were cast for the opposition. A party commencing such a worthy of that name—adduced on behalf of the proposed increase in the aldermanic salaries, does not produce

a favorable impression. It is of little consequence what amount of time the aldermen consume within the precincts of the city hall. The true quality is the quality of their work. If they are not protecting the interests of the ratepayers in matters that are vital for the free development of the community and for the protection of the public utilities and services, the number of hours consumed in windy controversy is of less than no importance. Nor is comparison with the remuneration paid in other communities of greater relevancy. The aldermen must justify their demand by weightier considerations if they expect to be supported by the voice and vote of the citizens.

A gratuitous boost in the salaries of the aldermen is all the more indefensible now that practically all the responsible part of the work of the city devolves upon the board of controllers. Looked at in that light, it appears preposterous that an alderman should claim to be paid one-third the salary of a controller, who is expected to devote his whole time to his duties. But in any case, our aldermen, whatever the extent of their services, are to be severely reprimanded for their own valuation. Nor does it seem very desirable that members of the council who offered themselves for election on the old basis, should immediately clamor for three times the salary on which they were elected to their share in the burden of administration.

One member of the aldermanic body is reported to have stated that he knew of no deliberate body, but the British house of commons, which was made up of millionaires, that paid no honorarium to their members, is expected to say the least of it, and could hardly be further from the mark. The house of commons is certainly not composed of millionaires, but it is of more importance for the argument that no salaries are paid in Britain to the members of city or town councils, or of any other deliberative body, nor are they, as a rule, members of the legislature. Furthermore, as the whole work of the municipality is done by the council itself, and its committees, the demands on the time and energy of the councillors are infinitely greater than those required from Toronto aldermen.

It is a point well worthy of public attention, whether at this stage of the city's development, better results could not be obtained by withdrawing aldermanic salaries altogether. Some of the speakers at Monday's discussion indicated their disbelief in the position of the experiment might well be tried. Considerations important at a time when the city had not thoroughly established itself as a great business center, are inapplicable now, when there are thousands of citizens of standing and ability able to take the position of their time to public affairs. What Toronto needs is the awakening of a spirit of genuine civic patriotism and the recognition that loyal, unselfish service for the public benefit is its only honorable reward. It is not the aldermen's salary that is the issue, but an opportunity should assuredly be provided for referring the proposal to the electorate before it becomes operative.

IS THE INSURANCE EXCESSIVE?
 The board of education will receive a deputation this week from the anti-vaccination league, who will ask for the rescission of the bylaw which prohibits the admission of unvaccinated children into the public schools of Toronto.

The anti-vaccinationists are in a woful minority. Very few people believe that vaccination is a delusion and a snare to the general public, which the medical profession in the main encourage, partly because it is a source of revenue, and partly because the homoeopaths are almost alone in the condemnation of the use of Jenner's discovery.

Medical men on the whole believe in the gospel of glycerinated lymph with all their heart. To them it is the greatest system of insurance ever devised against the ravages of smallpox. Like another system, they believe in it as a grievous tax to be borne until the reward comes in immunity from attack from the smallpox field stalks the world. Whatever the merits or demerits of vaccination, smallpox is not the scourge of humanity that it was once held to be. It is a disease which village apothecary to allow himself to be impregnated with the virus of cowpox as a precaution against the major pestilence. It is only fair to give one of the anti-vaccination arguments a hearing.

After all, the greatest enemies of disease are fresh air, soap and water, and if vaccination were blotted out from the list of defences against sickness, there could not be, under modern sanitary and domestic conditions, a return to the state of things existing about one hundred years ago, when every third person on the street was pock-marked.

The argument for the Toronto bylaw on the score of protection of the public health, is not as strong as it seems. What are the chances that a yearling, who comes from a cultured home, will of herself introduce smallpox to a public school? Even in England, where many persons have been incarcerated because they would not have their children endowed with sure and certain cowpox, as an uncertain insurance against a far-distant and probabilistical attack of smallpox, the law has not inflicted a penalty upon the children for their parents' contumacy. It is pretty rough on a child that it should be denied the instruction in the three R's which its parents has paid for, unless it is vaccinated. Smallpox does not originate with children's bodies. The bylaw places the penalty in the wrong place, and the board of education ought not to find it difficult to see that this is so.

FEMALE TEACHERS' SALARIES.
 Editor World: Please call attention to the injustice of the present salary increase of the teachers' union, because some worthy teachers are being benefited. It is admitted that living costs have risen more than ten years ago, and no one is objecting to the teachers' salary increase. NEW MEMBERS SWEAR IN KING'S SPEECH MONDAY

London, Feb. 13.—Altho the ceremonial and formal opening of parliament will not occur until Feb. 15, and while no legislative work can be undertaken until after the King's speech has been delivered on that occasion, the second parliament of King Edward assembled this afternoon for the election of a Speaker of the house of commons. Upon the withdrawal of the commons the peers met to present their votes and to subscribe the oath in the meantime, the commons had proceeded to the election of a speaker.

The clerk of the house, who is not permitted to speak, solemnly rose and pointed his index finger at Sir William Lawley, who had been elected speaker. Mr. Lawley was re-elected unanimously. The house then adjourned until tomorrow.
