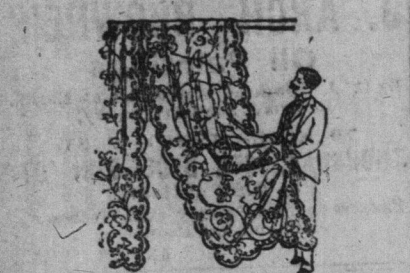

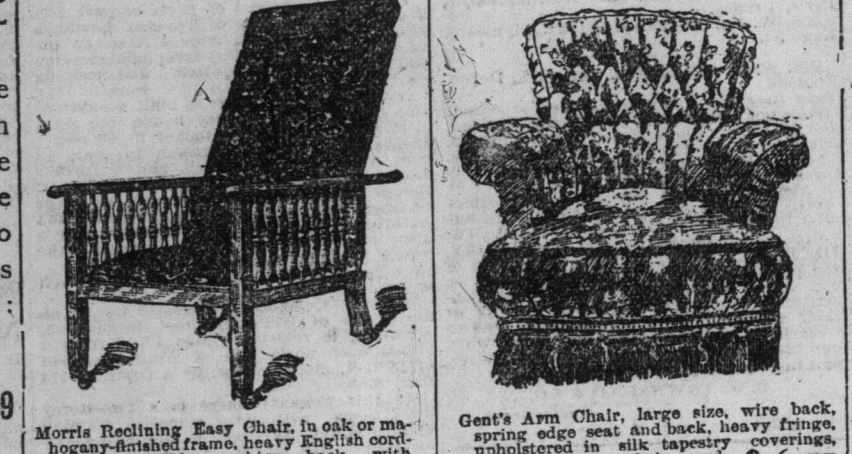

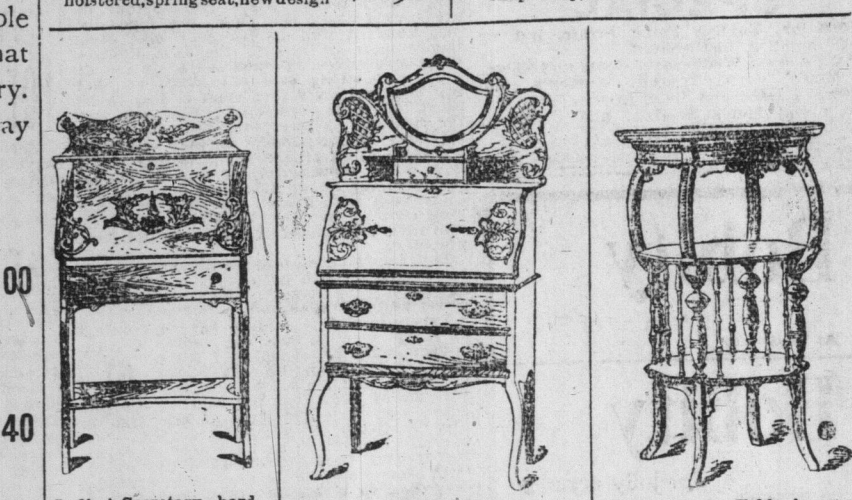

THE BOARD OF TRADE GRATUITY FUND. The Board of Trade scheme for insurance on the lives of its members—known as the gratuity fund—has come to grief. A stormy meeting was held yesterday, where several proposals were considered: one to liquidate the fund and divide it among the subscribers; the other to alter the system and continue to insure members to present subscribers to the fund. There seems to have been so much discussion yesterday that on the whole it would be a good plan to retire from the business. There are quite a number of lame ducks in the public pond, and the Board of Trade has despatched the better for all concerned.

ANOTHER SIGN OF PROSPERITY.

The increasing receipts of the Post-office Department tell the same story of the improvement of business throughout the country as do the weekly railway statistics. For the four months ending Oct. 31 the receipts of the Post-office Department were \$242,000 more than for the corresponding period last year. In October the increase was \$81,000. When we consider that the ordinary net revenue of the department is under three million dollars, the increase for the four months referred to must be accepted as very strong evidence that the business of the country is rapidly expanding. The return for October represents an increase of about 25 per cent above the average receipts. All of which is another forcible argument in favor of reducing the postage in ordinary and drop letters.

THE ENGINEER'S MISLEADING REPORT.

Mayor Shaw has very wisely decided that the City Engineer should amend his report by giving an estimate for an overhead system of electric lighting in addition to the underground system referred to in his report. It would be interesting to know what the Engineer estimated on an underground service. Did he assume the responsibility himself? If so, perhaps he will give us the reason for his act. What was his estimate? It was to prepare an estimate comparing the cost of lighting the streets by a civic plant with the cost under the present contract. We would naturally suppose that he would, in making the comparison, have the conditions identically the same in either case. He did not do so, however. He was handicapped to do so by an expensive underground system, whereas the Toronto Electric Light Company has no wires underground at all. It is absurd to compare the relative cost of the two systems under such different conditions. The people want to know which is the cheaper method of lighting the streets by a civic plant or by contract. The Engineer's report does not answer that question. The report is misleading. It gives the cost under two entirely different sets of conditions. It would just

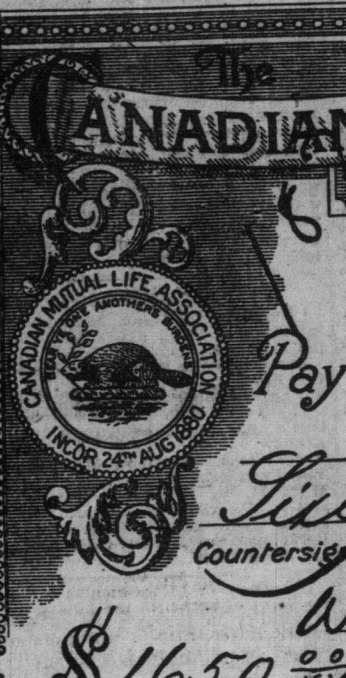

THE TEMPLE COMPLETED

Charity Concert in Aid of the Fire Sufferers to be Given.

The Building is a Marvel of Architectural and Ornate Beauty—It Contains a Complete and Perfect System of Heating, Lighting and Ventilation—Description of its Fine Offices, Superb Assembly Rooms, Grand Banquet Halls and Spacious Lodge Rooms.

On Dec. 10 there will take place an event in Toronto which will be of international interest. On that date the Foresters' Temple, the pride of the order, will be formally opened, and the manner of the celebration will be the best order. The great building is now finished within and without, and in honor of the completion a grand charity concert will be held in aid of the Foresters, who recently suffered by the disastrous forest fires in the Ottawa Valley and in Windsor, N.S. The fitness of such a form of celebration for a great order, founded upon the principles of fraternity and mutual benefit, is at once apparent and is an evidence of the solicitude of the institution for the welfare of the members, as well as a token of the solicitude and enthusiasm which inspires every one of them where the interests of the society are concerned.

A Magnificent Home. The building where the event will take place is a home worthy of an institution of such magnitude, and can well be claimed to rank as the finest office building in the Dominion. It is perfectly equipped from the rest of my body with every device which science has evolved for the convenience, comfort and safety of man. It is lavishly and thoroughly ventilated, hygienic and perfectly regulated as to temperature. The interior cannot be described as a room without having his attention attracted. The stairs and lower walls are of marble, the upper walls and ceiling are painted in which are inserted the emblems of the order, a Maltese cross, with a moose head in the center. Passing through the visitor naturally gravitates to the Foresters' office, and it is as lucky as he can be to see the president, an interview with Dr. Oronovatekha, the Supreme Chief Ranger, and get a thorough insight into all the beauties of the building.

The doctor's office is the executive chamber, sumptuously furnished, but in a comfortable leather-covered arm chair, a carpet, in which the feet sink deep, and couch which invites repose. From this room there opens a smaller one, the doctor's surgery. It is similarly furnished, and several fine pictures adorn the walls. The splendid offices. These offices are at the southeast corner of the eighth floor, all of which together with part of the seventh, are occupied by the offices of the order. The World was shown by Dr. Oronovatekha, the head bookkeeper, and his assistants. Here there is a room where the cashier makes up the money received during the day. Next door to it is the office of Dr. Stillman, the physician, who, with aid of assistants, examines and passes upon applications for membership, which number thousands during a month. Across the corridor is the mortuary chamber, where death claims are established. If all right, these are sent to the Supreme Chief Ranger, and the cheque is sent by return mail. Every claim received is examined before three o'clock on the day of its receipt.

The Reception Room. The reception room, a spacious apartment with a southern exposure, is well equipped.
