Disposition of the Varied Amounts of Stock Interes s, Personalty and Realty, as Shown By the Verbatim Copy of His Last Testament.

This is a verbatim copy of the will of the late Hon, James Sutherland of Woodstock, as it has just been probated: This is the last will and testament of the Honorable James Suther-This is the last will and testament of the Honorable James Suther-land of the City of Woodstock, in the County of Oxford, and Province of Ontario, one of his majesty's privy councillors for Canada, made this 29th day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and five. 1. I appoint The Toronto General Trusts Corporation and my nephew, Henry Alexander Little, the executors of this, my will, nereby re-

voking all wills by me heretofore made.

2. I direct my executors to pay to my sister, Elsie Marjory McKenze, the sum of one hundred and fitty dollars monthly so long as she may live, the first of such payments to be made to her at the expiration of one mounts after my december.

month after my decease.

3. I direct my executors to pay the sum of five thousand dollars to each of the children of the said Elsie Marjory McKenzie after her decease.

4. I direct my executors to invest the sum of ten thousand dollars in such securities as they may think advisable and to pay the income derived therefrom half-yearly to my brother-in-law, John Alexander McKenzie, and after his decease to divide said ten thousand dollars among his children, share and share alike. All payments at any time heretofore made by me to or on behalf of the said John Alexander McKenzie were intended at the time of the making thereof as gifts to him, and he is not now in any way indebted to me.

In the event of any infant or infants under the age of twenty-one years becoming entitled to any money under this will, I direct my executors to invest the same in safe securities until such infant shall attain majority; and I authorize my executors in their (Sgd. H. J. Finkle, Geo. C. Eden) discretion to pay and apply the income derived therefrom towards the maintenance and education of such infant or infants.
