## THE FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

TEMPORAL COMMITTEE OF KNOX CHURCH, OTTAWA,

PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION,

HELD JANUARY 11TH, 1894.

In presenting the 49th Annual Report of Knox Church for the year 1893, your committee are reminded that next year will be our Jubilee, an enjoyable pleasure and gratification to those who are spared to celebrate it. While expressing hearty Thanksgiving to the God of all Grace for unnumbered mercies and blessings so fully and freely bestowed upon us we cannot but feel in reviewing the events which have transpired during the year that they have been of far greater import and deeper significance than usual, deeply affecting the finances of the Congregation. The resignation of our beloved pastor, the Rev. F. W. Farries, and the severance of the tie existing between pastor and people, cemented together in the bonds of Christian fellowship for nearly 18 years until the ever memorable farewell meeting which proved unmistakably how abiding, deep-rooted and tender the feelings and relationship between congregation and pastor had grown as the years rolled on, and also the high esteem and affection in which he was held by the entire community at large. In appreciation of Mr. Farries' valued services and his great zeal and devotion to the cause for which he labored so long in our midst, a testimonial was presented to him equal to a half year's salary. During the vacancy the pulpit has been supplied by a number of very good scholarly men, some of whom were regarded as candidates for the pastorate.

Two meetings have been held by the congregation to moderate in a call to a minister, which resulted in a call being given to the Rev. Robert Johnston, B.A., of Lindsay, which call was duly prosecuted on December 19th, before the Presbytery at Lindsay, by two commissioners representing the "Ottawa Presbytery" and three representing our congregation. Mr. Johnston declined the call leaving our pulpit still vacant.

During the year two important changes have been made in connection with the church which require special notice. We refer to the cushioning of the pews and the putting in of new heating apparatus. The former of these was undertaken, as you will remember, chiefly through the energy and generosity of our esteemed elder Mr. William Porter, and was carried out by means of a loan of one thousand dollars procured by your committee under the special authority and direction of the congregation, and which has proved to be an agreeable and important contribution to the appearance of our church as well as to the personal comfort of the worshippers. And as it is to be enjoyed at an expense to the congregation of only the interest on the said loan, pending the maturity of provision made by Mr. Porter for its payment, we feel that we cannot too highly appreciate his kindness and forethought.

The matter of heating the church having already been fully discussed at a meeting of the congregation called for that purpose, your committee beg further to report, that having as directed by that meeting had the old furnaces thoroughly examined and tested by competent persons, and having found them not only unsafe, but so far worn out as to be irreparable, they concluded to have them replaced; and from the best information available it was found that hot air was not only the least expensive but the most satisfactory medium for heating the church. Tenders for a hot air system were duly called for and a number received, and after a careful comparison of the merits claimed for each the tender of Douglas Bros. was accepted and the contract awarded to them for a system of three furnaces at the moderate cost of five hundred dollars, payable on the first of April next, subject to the furnaces giving entire satisfaction in the meantime. This contract has, we are pleased to report, been so far carried out and the furnaces are now undergoing the test of severe winter weather with favorable results. Your committee trust that apart from a considerable saving in the quantity of fuel used, the change will also give additional comfort and cleanliness, commending the wisdom of their action in this matter.

Referring to the finances for the year just closed without any desire to cause unnecessary alarm, your committee deem it a duty to call your attention to a serious falling off in the contributions to the Sustentation Fund, viz., from \$3,583.32 in the year 1892, it has been reduced last year to \$3,092.93, showing a loss in this important item of fixed revenue for 1893 of \$490.39, and although this may be accounted for in part by the extraordinary efforts made early in the year on behalf of Rev. Mr. Farries and also by the fact that no canvass was made by your committee for contributions in the beginning of the year and by the unusual stringency in money matters during the latter part of the year, may we not fear that it is to some extent due to the long unsettled condition of our church affairs. "Hope deferred maketh the heart sick."

However, while the treasurer's statement shows an apparent deficiency for the past year of \$429.53, an examination of the accounts will show that it is more than accounted for in the following items which may be properly considered as extraordinary, viz. :-

The God of Providence, who has led us all our lives long will, if we trust Him, increase our influence for good, and in answer to earnest prayer fulfill his own promise.

"Prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of Heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it." He says the gold and the silver are mine, and He is able to make all grace abound to you, that ye always, having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work. May this be the happy experience of our successors in office, and also of the entire congregation.

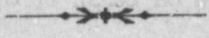

In presenting this report of the Sabbath School we first desire to express, on behalf of the Teachers, our deep sense of thankfulness to God for the great opportunity of sowing the seed of the Kingdom in young hearts throughout the past year. While we know that the sowing has been performed with less energy and more faint-heartedness, with less faith and more faltering, with less prayer and more inconstancy, than entire consecration to one of the best and most fruitful forms of Christian service should permit of, still we believe that by and by the harvest will be reaped. Let us hope and pray that it may be an early, rich, and abundant one.

In the last report it was intimated that an effort would be made to increase the size of our Library. A collection taken up by the Congregation and amounting to \$52.62 was handed to our Treasurer by the Treasurer of the Temporal Committee. This was supplemented by a special collection in aid of the Library, taken up in the Sabbath School, and amounting to \$25.00, and with these two sums a substantial addition will be made to our inadequately equipped Library.

The efficiency of the Teaching Staff has been seriously impaired by the withdrawal during the year of several faithful and able teachers, but we sincerely hope that the Sabbath School has only for a time been deprived of the services of C. R. Cunningham, D. Masson, Mrs. Alexander and Miss Blackburn. The Sabbath School needs more teachers if its work is to be kept up to the highest standard of efficiency.

The average attendance is, we regret to say, less than that of last year. For 1892 it was 165, for this year it is 140. There are many young men and women connected with our congregation who fail to avail themselves of the privilege of studying the Word in the Bible Class and Sabbath School. We hope that a larger number of our young men and women, and of our old men and women too, will join us in 1894 in a systematic, earnest, and prayerful study of God's Word. We also desire to urge upon parents the necessity of seeing that their children are regularly in their classes with well prepared lessons.

Mr. Pearen's class with an average of 90 per cent. wins the Superintendent's prize for best attendance.

Milton Atcheson, Matthew Ashe, Willie Ashe, Douglas Corning, Merrill Corning, James Ferguson, James Garvock, Forester McKinnon and Kate Foley were present every Sabbath; while Lizzie Flood, Fanny Slattery, Willie McKinnon and Alexander McKinnon missed one Sabbath only.

In the Primary Class, Irene Leslie, Margaret Black, and Mabel McFarlane recited the Golden Texts for six months; Bella Ross for four months; and Ella Ross, Louisa Wardrope, Marion Masson, Ethel Ross, Mabel Labarr, Alice Temple, Bertha Temple, and Herbert Swinburn for three months.

Those entitled to receive Mr. Blackburn's prize for Scripture recitation are Connie Alexander and Millie McFarlane, while Lizzie Muir, Ethel Harrington and Ada Swinburne received the prize for reciting accurately the whole of the Shorter Catechism. Sidney McMorran recited half the Shorter Catechism.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's report a substantial balance is on hand. Let us work more heartily, faithfully and energetically till He come.

**SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT**

—OF THE—

**Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, Knox Church.**

In presenting the Sixth Annual Report of that department of the Church's work occupied by the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, the Society desire to express their thankfulness to God for the measure of success which, under His blessing, has attended the operations of the organization during the past year.

Besides the regular weekly prayer meeting maintained throughout the year, preparation for which by both leaders and participants calls for constant reference to and study of God's Word, the Society conducted a Sunday service at the Home for the Aged, Bank street, during November, and also the first two of a series of services to be conducted for the Rev. Mr. Whillans at Birchtou, one Sabbath in each month, in order to leave him free to organize a new service at a much neglected point in his charge.

Twenty-one dollars was taken in collection at the monthly Consecration meetings, fifteen dollars of which was contributed to the expense fund of the World's Christian Endeavor Convention held in Montreal in July last. In addition to this the Missionary Committee raised fifteen dollars from their plan of the systematic giving of one cent a week by the members. This amount will be handed over to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Mission Schemes of the Church.

Three addresses on Missionary subjects were delivered before the Society by Miss McIntosh, Miss Graham and Miss Cushing, who had been actively engaged in Mission Work, the former at the Presbyterian School at Point-aux-Trembles and the two latter in Foreign Fields.

At the semi-annual meeting held in October the Society for the first time adopted the Model Constitution, By-laws and Pledge of the United Society of Christian Endeavor.

Some fifty young people, members of the Church, attend the regular weekly prayer meetings, the majority of whom are closely identified with every phase of the Church work, as ushers at the Sunday Service, officers and teachers in the Sabbath School, or members of the Bible Class.

Fifteen members attended as delegates at the Montreal Christian Endeavor Convention, two of whom, Miss Forgie and Miss Mable Stalker, since presented the Society with a beautiful banner bearing the motto of the organization, "For Christ and the Church." The Society has received much benefit from the consecrated zeal of the delegates.



The Musical Committee also conducted a weekly song-service at the Home for the Aged during several months which seems to have been much appreciated.

Before closing, the Society would put on record its appreciation of the kindness done it by Mr. Macmillan, Mr. Donald Masson and Mr. Shearer, in opening their houses for the social reception of the members, and in a spirit which made the gatherings at once helpful and most enjoyable.
