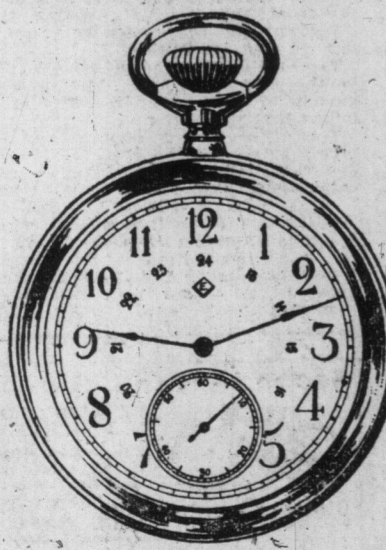

NATIONAL FOREST POLICY. Canadian governments, whether federal or provincial, ought not to require the scourge of public opinion in order to compel the formulation of a scientific and, in the best sense, conservative forest policy.

All over the states, chambers of commerce, scientific societies, forestry experts, the wisest sort of lumbermen, national clubs and other public bodies are besetting themselves to create a healthy public opinion in support of an enlightened and thrifty forest policy.

The Union League Club of Chicago not long ago passed a resolution demanding that a census of the standing timber in the United States be authorized by congress, and that the states should be urged to co-operate with the nation for the preservation and enlargement of the forest resources.

With the lessons provided by the situation in the United States and the evident urgency of the question that are now to be faced by the federal and state governments there is no excuse for Canada falling to profit by what is transpiring among our neighbors.

Recalling the effort made on behalf of the electric companies to induce the farmers of Ontario with the notion that the power policy of the government was a matter with which they had neither interest nor concern, the opinion of a German statesman

regarding the prospective value of electricity on the farm is of importance. In an address recently delivered before the Prussian Agricultural Society Herr Von Podbielski, formerly minister of agriculture, strongly recommended the employment of electricity for farming purposes.

The farmer is bound to use machinery instead of day labor, because the wages for the latter are steadily increasing. Electricity is the power wanted and is the best adapted to the work. Electricity is always at hand when the proper conductors are provided.

The use of electricity in agricultural work may be classified as follows: (1) About the barnyard as working the fodder cutter, corn cleaner, crushing mill, hauling and unloading of hay, and, on large farms, smithy and wheelwright work, and, further, for lighting the stables and the houses, and (2) in the fields, pulling the plow, running the machines, reapers, etc., and threshing.

A CLEAN ELECTION. BROCKVILLE LIGHT PLANT IS DAMAGED BY FIRE. Roof of Building Burned Away and Machinery Badly Injured by Water—Town in Darkness.

BROCKVILLE, Sept. 24.—(Special.)—For an hour this evening Brockville stood in danger of losing its municipal owned electric light plant, one of the best between Toronto and Montreal, owing to fire, which broke out in the building shortly after the machinery was put in motion.

Investigation showed a blaze had been in progress for some time, as the roof was completely enveloped and breaking thru in several places before the firemen arrived. It gained such headway on the dry timbers that huge quantities of water from half a dozen different lines of hose seemed to make little impression in staying its progress.

There was a false roof, which undoubtedly saved the machinery. The outside one was burned away, but the fire fighters managed to save the other, and the burning debris was prevented from entangling the machinery, tho the mechanism was soaked and thus greatly damaged.

Day's Doings in YORK COUNTY

MAYOR BAIRD IS LOYAL TO CAUSE OF CITIZENS

Turns Down Proposal in Favor of Private Company—Many Delegates Are Named.

WEST TORONTO, Sept. 24.—The Stark Telephone, Light and Power System, now in liquidation, is being reorganized under the name of the Interurban Electric Co. Ltd. A special meeting of the council was held to-night to confer with the company's solicitors about the terms of transfer, and the proposed changes to the agreement between the system and the municipality did not appear at all unreasonable to the aldermen. The only request in fact that the company made was that permission be given them to obtain power from outside sources, as the present plant of the company is inadequate for the demands of the public. But Mayor Baird fortunately discovered a point in the agreement which if it had not been noticed would have been the cause of much inconvenience to the citizens of West Toronto in the near future.

The first clause, said the mayor, "forbids the municipality, under the Concession Act, to enter into competition with the company, provided that the service given by the company is satisfactory. Now, this is an age of combination, and the Interurban Electric Company may become merged with the Toronto Electric Company. If then, the Hydro-Electric Commission, which in about a year will supply Toronto with cheap light and power, wish to extend their business out here, even the West Toronto is a ward of the city. I propose, therefore, to amend the first clause so that this municipality can compete with the company if the occasion arises."

Anderson even claimed that Zaklinsky was holding a gun on him, but the pastor is unable to leave his bed to-day, which raises a doubt as to the truth of the story. Zaklinsky says Anderson shot at him from his house not long ago, but both parties claim assault and have engaged solicitors to conduct the matter.

A meeting of the West Toronto Conservative Association will be held to-morrow (Friday) evening. Sheriff Holds Town, But Not for Very Long. WESTON, Sept. 24.—(Special)—J. H. Taylor, treasurer of the town, this afternoon received the writ issued by the Equity Fire Insurance Company, and the town is technically in the sheriff's hands till the judgment for \$10,315.16 and added cost amounting to \$280.42 more are paid. The final step has been long deferred, judgment having been given against the municipality in May by Mr. Justice McMahon.

FRUIT MEN PROTEST. Object to Auction Sale of Damaged Consignment. Fruit commission merchants in the city are protesting against the action of the city hall health department, in allowing the Canadian Express Co. to auction off damaged fruit, the result of the Clarkson wreck on Wednesday morning. Members of various firms on the market declare that the fruit is contaminated and in a filthy condition, owing to the fact that it was piled on top of the fruit car in the wreck. As the car stands in the market it presents a very badly battered appearance, with old straw and other refuse being strewn along the car and in the ventilating apparatus. The fruit was valued at \$3000, and over 50 per cent of the consignment was crushed to a pulp. The dealers say that if they attempted to sell fruit in a like condition they would be fined heavily by the health department, and they are asking why the Express Company should be allowed to dispose of it. Many dealers say the whole carload should have been buried.

MILNER VISITS TORONTO. Noted Britisher on His Way Across the Continent. Lord Milner, former high commissioner for South Africa, was in Toronto for a short time yesterday en route to the Falls. He left for the west last night and will return to the city in October. "This trip," said Lord Milner, "is a 'visit to Canada,' not a political trip in any sense. I don't intend to say anything about politics—particularly Canadian politics. On my way back I may make some speeches treating the subject widely and generally, but not exclusively with regard to Canada. He will be the guest of various clubs at Vancouver, and on his return journey will speak to the Canadian Club of Winnipeg. Returning to Toronto about Oct. 25, he will spend a week here. He is to address the Canadian Club, be entertained at dinner by the British Empire League, get a degree at 'Varsity,' and take part in the prize day exercises at Upper Canada College.
