

FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Ladies of the PROTESTANT ORPHAN ASYLUM of the City of Montreal, was held in the house of the Institution, Saint Catherine Street, on Wednesday, the 13th of January, the Rev'd. W. Snodgrass presiding, when the following Annual Report was submitted, read and adopted :--

REPORT.

Another year of quiet usefulness has gently glided over the existence of this Institution, and rendered it incumbent on us to place before our friends and patrons the "simple annals" of our humble mission.

Few and uninteresting have been the events of the past year, save to those benevolent spirits, who have steadily fostered our Charity, and taken a lively interest in the care and nurture of those, whom the Almighty has been pleased to deprive of their natural protectors, and place in the charge of the Orphans' friends.

As will be seen from our statistics, most of the older children have been advantageously placed out, and our present charge consists chiefly of very young ones, which, though it may increase the care of those in immediate attendance on them, will afford us more time to bestow upon their moral, religious, and educational training. Let it not be forgotten that we receive and protect Orphans from their *earliest infancy*, and thereby incur a very great additional responsibility.

By the Treasurer's statement it will be seen that we have had but one Legacy during the year, of twenty dollars from the executors of the late John McLeod, Esquire, of the City of Ottawa. No Life memberships have been taken up,—the casual donations have been much less, and what we most deplore, the Annual Subscriptions have fallen off.

Our total receipts from all sources during the year have only amounted to one thousand six hundred and ninety-nine dollars, twentythree cents, whilst our expenditure with every economy, came to one thousand seven hundred and thirteen dollars, twenty-two cents, making a balance against us.

The cost of living for the Matron, Teacher, two servants, and fifty-two children, has been under thirty-one dollars each per annum.

These shortcomings have been caused, we are persuaded, not from any diminution in the interest taken by the public in our Charity, but from an erroneous opinion entertained of our wealth. We are but partially endowed our expenditure cannot be defrayed without voluntary contributions—on this account it is only by constant and unremitting exertions that the annual income can be sustained.

Death, change of circumstances, and various other causes, exercise their influence year by year, and it is absolutely necessary, in order to ensure the maintenance of the Charity, that these painful voids should be filled up, and the number of the subscribers increased.

To the Honorable the Provincial Legislature we offer our annual thanks for their very necessary aid, only regretting that the amount was *less* than in former years to us, as well as to all other institutions in the Province of a similar nature. The President and Directors of the City and District Savings Bank have not been forgetful of the Charities they so benevolently foster,—to them we owe and offer many thanks.

During the past year, we have to regret the loss by death of three valued friends, and regular contributors, namely, Mrs. Auld, of Summer Hill, Mrs. Dugald Stewart, and Thomas Dawes, Esquire, of Lachine, whose benefactions, we are happy to record have been generously continued by their representatives.

FIFTX-TWO CHILDREN, twenty-seven boys and twenty-five girls, have benefited by this Institution during the last year.

There are also eighteen orphans now indentured out in various parts of the Province, for whose benefit the treasurer has at interest in the Savings Bank two hundred and four dollars, eighty-four cents.

A further sum of three hundred and sixtysix dollars, sixty-seven cents, is also held in trust for seventeen orphans, who have either completed their indentures, or who have had moneys left them.

Seven orphans have received in whole, or in part, during the past year, their indentare fees, amounting together to two hundred and forty-seven dollars, forty-three cents.

One orphan has received twelve dollars from the Reward Fund alluded to in former Reports.

For all other financial statements, we refer to our Treasurer's explicit report, printed in detail.

It is satisfactory to us to be enabled to state that some families have taken several children from us in rotation, thereby proving, we trust, that our training has not been without success.

Mr. Cribb, late superintendent of this Asylum, and whose resignation, from declining health, was mentioned in the last report, departed this life on the 7th day of March last, after a long and faithful course of duty (twenty-four years) in the service of this charity.

Mrs. Cribb continues to perform the united duties of Superintendent and Matron to the perfect satisfaction of the Ladies.

Miss L. Tracey's services as Instructress, and her kind attention both to the Matron and children have merited our full approbation.

Christmas again gave ample proof that the

hearts of our friends were as usual generously open, and abundant provision was made, both within and without our walls, for the enjoyment, by our young ones, of that holy and festive season,—the effect of which is made manifest by the frequent allusion thereto made in the letters received from the children who have left us. This doubtless will afford sincere pleasure to those who annually contribute to make the orphan happy.

George Macrae, Esquire, solicitor, and R. P. Howard, Esquire, M. D., are entitled to our grateful thanks for their able and disinterested services.

To J. Gardner, Esquire, chemist, for his gratuitous supply of medicines we owe our sincere thanks.

From all the foregoing, it becomes evident that an earnest appeal to our friends becomes necessary, and we now anxiously make it, leaving it to our patrons to say in what manner it shall be answered ;—we know that in this country such an Institution can never be permitted to languish, much less to decay. No one has a stronger claim upon the sympathy of every Christian than the ORPHAN. Surely every parent who reflects upon what might be the state of those who are now clinging round him in affectionate dependence, if suddenly deprived of such parents' guidance, must feel the *inestimable benefit to the poor of* such an Asylum as this.

At this glad season, and when our temples have so recently resounded with hearty thanksgivings for a most abundant harvest, we cannot supplicate in vain for an institution which snatches helpless children from sorrow and privation, and provides for them a happy home; which seeks to train them for usefulness in this life, and for happiness in the life to come. "It is not the will of your Father which is in heaven that one of these little ones should perish."

In conclusion, we respectfully and hopefully place our case in the hands of a generous public, before whom we have never pleaded in vain, reminding each of our friends of the saying of the Patriarch of old, "When the ear heard me, then it blessed me; and when the eye saw me, it gave witness to me, because I delivered the poor that cried, and the fatherless, and him that had none to help him."

REFERRED TO IN ANNEXED STATEMENT TRANSMITTED TO THE AUDITOR GENERAL.

The Ladies of the Protestant Orphan Asylum of the City of Montreal are a Corporation created by the Provincial Statute 7 Vic. Cap. 52, amended by 23 Vic. Cap. 143, and originally established in the year 1822, who, at their annual meeting on the second Wednesday in the month of January in each and every year elect their Directresses and Managers, Secretary and Treasurer by and through a majority of whom, all matters and things relating to the said Corporation are transacted. The Office Bearers are a First and Second Directress, a Secretary and Treasurer and a Committee of Management consisting of twenty-nine ladies of the Protestant Churches of this city elected as above, and who meet at the House of the Institution on the First Monday of every month for the transaction of business,—eight forming a quorum—every Protestant lady subscribing Five dollars annually being a member of the Corporation and eligible to office, and Fifty dollars paid at one time constituting life membership.

The special object of the Institution is the reception, care and maintenance of Protestant children of both sexes (having lost both parents vide Bye-Law IX) coming from any part of the Province whether their Fathers were civilians or soldiers, who are instructed in the elements of reading, writing, geography and arithmetic, &c., &c., by a competent female teacher, as well as sewing and housework, according to the ages, capacities and sex of the pupils.

Registers are carefully kept of all matters connected with the said orphans who at a suitable age (the boys at 12 and the girls 14) are apprenticed to worthy and respectable members of any Protestant Church who must be previously recommended as deserving of such trusts each recipient paying the Corporation for each child an annual fee of Four dollars during the period of apprenticeship which is placed at Interest in the "Bank of Montreal Savings Bank" until the child has attained the age of majority or had a legal tutor duly appointed to him or her when the accumulated amount is paid over to them for their own use, provided they have performed their apprenticeship faithfully.

The Revenues exclusive of the Provincial Aid are derived from the annual subscriptions of the members of the Corporation, the voluntary contributions and gifts of charitable individuals, and the interest, and dividends on Legacies and Gifts invested as the commencement of an "Endowment Fund," and Interest from the Bank on the Current Deposit account.

Replies to subsequent queries, asked for by Mr. Langton, Auditor-General.

The number of inmates benefitted by the Institution during the year has been 52 orphans, Matron, Teacher and 2 female servants. Total 56.

The aggregate number of days the whole were in the Institution was 14812 or an average of 2644 days each inmate.

The Total cost of the maintenance of the 56 inmates was \$1713.22 or an average of \$30.594 each.

But if all the 56 had been in Institution for the whole year, the cost of maintenance at same rate would have been \$2364.18, or an average of \$42.212 each.
