In time of peace the navy will be under the supervision of the minister of marine and fisheries, but will be managed by a director of the navy who shall rank as rear-admiral. In the event of war or other occurrence for the handing over of the naval forces to the imperial authorities, the government will have power to act, but parliament must be called together within fifteen days to give its sanction to such a course. WOULD KEEP TAX

At a meeting of the bills and bye-laws committee of the common council last night it was decided to recommend to the council for the next five years, the tax rate should not exceed \$1.90. The rate this year will be about \$2.10.




