Clinch Possession of Main High-SIX HOME FROM way to Peronne from North

Combles Now Cut Off and Foch is in Good Position For Blow at Peronne; British Hold Grip on Ginchy; Offensive in Balkans Developing Successfully

Instead of resting on the ground won in yesterday's great attack north of the Somme, the French continued their thrust last night, capturing the village schavesnes, and a wooded area nearby.

Bouchavesnes lies to the east of the Bapaume-Peronne road, cut in yesterpossession of this main highway to Peronne from the north.

Combles is now cut off from the south and in a dangerous salient, while General Foch is in a favorable position for a stroke from the north at Peronne, which appears seriously threatened by the new advance of the French, one of the most important they have made in any single operation since the be-ginning of the Somme offensive.

The British, who hold the lines northwest of Combles, are maintaining a

BROTHERHOOD ACTION AND GOV'T OWNERSHIP

New York Times.)

In the enactment fixing eight hours as the measure or standard of a day's work the brotherhoods have won an increase the measure or standard of a day's work the brotherhoods have won an increase of pay, they have lost much for labor and for themselves. They have dulled the edge of their chief weapon, the strike. Perhaps they have broken it. Labor disputes between the railroads and their men will henceforth come under the reign of law. The issue will not be determined by violence or by threats of violence. And there will be a tendency, powerful and increasing in power, to extend the control of law over all controversies about hours, wages, and conditions of labor.

The men of the brotherhoods have used for the last time their power to coerce Congress. They will never again be able to override the constitution, compel the nation's lawmakers to do their bidding and put upon the people the shame and humiliation of seeing statutes enacted, not because they have willed it, but because compliance was the shortest and easiest way of escape from a national peril. This Congress has yielded, no other Congress will ever dare to yield. The brotherhoods will now see their demands for shorter hours or higher wages pass into the control of a power greater than themselves, greater than the railroads.

There are objections to the fixing of scales of wages by law of Congress, but the whole country now sees that if the Interstate Commerce commission is to regulate the rates charged by the railroads it must, upon the other hand, Interstate Commerce commission is to regulate the rates charged by the railroads it must, upon the other hand, take jurisdiction over the men's demands upon the railroads for higher pay. There is no escape from it in logic, and, what is more to the point, justice and the inexorable law of business demand it. The eight-hour standard day act itself sets up a commission to study the operation and effects of the basic day, which grants at once an increase of 25 per and effects of the basic day, which grants at once an increase of 25 per cent. in the wages of the men. The facts will be before Congress and before the country, There is no likelihood that they will be used as a basis of repeal legislation. The grant of an increased wage is not likely to be recalled. But Congress and the country will have the means of judging the justice of any future demand.


