DESPITE excellent current reports for industrial output and trans-Publication of the complete poems of Duncan Campbell Scott gave the well-informed reviewer of The Ottawa Journal an opportunity the other day to speak of the relations between Mr. Scott and John Masefield, one of the greatest of living

English poets.

This is a petition by William Reginald Joseph Fitzhebert Herbert- Ruddleston, of Clytha Park, Monmouthshire, and of Sawston Hall, Cambridgeshire, claiming to be co-heir to

the Barony of Montagu. The Huddleston family has had a most remarkable history. Sir William Huddleston married Isabel, fifth daughter of John Marquis of Monte-scute, brother of the Earl of Warwick, the "King Maker," and entered into possession of the manor of Swanston on the partition of the Neville estates

Sir John Huddleston, grandson of Sir John Hiddleston, grandson of Sir William, sheltered Princess (after-wards Queen) Mary, daughter of Henry VIII., after the death of her brother, Edward VI., and he contrived her escape to Framlingham Castle. There is a tradition among the Huddiestons that the Princess quitted the house in servant's dress with a milk pail on her arm, and that when she reached the Gog-Magog Hills, near Cambridge, she saw the house in flames. 


