BRITISH EVACUATE HANKOW CONCESSION

SPREAD OF UPRISINGS  
FEARED BY OFFICIALS;  
INDEMNITY DEMANDED

Chinese Formulate Request Through Cantonese  
on British for Payment, Apology and  
Withdrawal of Warships

MISSIONARIES TO LEAVE INTERIOR

London Hopes Crisis Will Ease Without Extensive Bloodshed—  
Rosyth Fleet Ordered to Prepare for Possible  
Service in Far East

HANKOW, Jan. 6.—Representatives of laborers, farmers, merchants, students and soldiers of Hankow have formulated demands to be presented through the nationalist, or Cantonese government, to the British consul, including a demand for indemnity for Chinese alleged to have been killed and wounded in the disturbances of Monday, with withdrawal of gunboats and an apology to the Chinese government.

Three hundred armed Chinese troops and 200 Chinese pickets occupied the British concession here shortly before midnight last night, after all women and children were put aboard ships in the Yangtze River. British sailors, marines and volunteers left the concession and boarded British warships.

MISSIONARIES INSULTED.—All missionaries have been ordered to quit their stations in the interior of China, a Peking despatch to the Daily Mail, London, asserts.

Reports of anti-Christian slanders in the Yangtze region, and Szechwan, are being received daily, the correspondent adds. Missionaries have been maltreated, the women insulted and the mission stations looted.

Canadian Workers

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 6.—Missionary headquarters here of Canadian churches, resident in China, last night had no direct word of the position of Canadians in the troubled area of China.

Rev. Edgar Brownlie, secretary of the China Inland Mission, said they had a mission home in the Hankow British concession, and while there were only four missionaries permanently established there, the home was used a great deal by missionaries traveling to and from other parts of the country.

He explained that the British concession in Hankow was both a residential and industrial center for the foreign population of the city, and that most of the missionary societies had their headquarters there.

Smugglers' Rocket Signals  
Nearly Wreck Big Collier  
Off Glace Bay Last Night

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 6.—A run runner making rocket signals to smugglers ashore is believed to have been the real cause of the excitement at Table Head, Glace Bay, which took the big collier Fulham off her course last night and kept her circling about in a blinding rainstorm, near the dangerous coast of Cape Breton in a gallant but futile effort to locate and aid a supposed vessel in distress.

Seeing distress signals at Glace Bay, an appeal for assistance, addressed to all ships in the vicinity, was broadcast. It was picked up by the British Empire Steel Corporation charter steamer, Fulham, 4294 tons register, which was then about 50 miles from the spot, having left Sydney in the afternoon with a cargo of coal for Newfoundland.

WOMAN TAKES  
Out Insurance  
Of \$3,250,000

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 6.—Mrs. Henry E. Yester holds the second largest insurance policy ever written on a woman's life. She has taken out insurance in 12 companies totalling \$3,250,000. A woman in St. Louis is said to have policies amounting to \$4,000,000. Mrs. Yester is a sister of the late Julius Fleischmann, former president of the Fleischmann yeast company.

WOMAN DIES IN

SHERBROOKE, Que., Jan. 6.—Helene Dubois, 24 years of age, died at the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital between 6:30 and 7 o'clock this morning, as a result of bullet wounds she received in the tragic shooting which occurred on St. Henry street, in East Sherbrooke, early New Year's morning, when Edouard Valliere was killed and for whose death 65-year-old James Metz, an Italian, is being held.

ONTARIO TO AMEND

HELD ULTRA VIRES

Another Section of Grain Act  
Declared Out of Order

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 6.—Another section of the Canada Grain Act passed by the House of Commons in 1925, which lays down a specific form of contract for the purchase of grain by licensed dealers, has been held ultra vires of the Parliament of Canada by a judgment of the Appeal Court of Alberta. The judgment is written by Chief Justice Harvey and concurred in by Justices Beek, Hyndman and Mitchell. The decision arises out of a damage action for non-delivery brought in the district court.

French Radicals Need  
20 New Seats to Upset  
Ministry

TO ELECT 108

One-Third of Upper House to  
be Renewed; Indo-China  
Ballots on Jan. 16

PARIS, Jan. 6.—Overthrow of the Poincare national union government and the return to power of the Radical-Socialist coalition, are possible consequences, anticipated in certain quarters, of the senatorial elections to be held next Sunday. Veteran parliamentary observers believe, however, that the 20 new seats needed by the Radicals and Socialists to dominate the senate, will not be forthcoming.

HALF ARE RADICALS.

Of the 109 outgoing senators, about half belong to the Radical-Socialist group. The classification by party divisions is as follows: Gauche Democratic (Radicals and Socialists), 54; Union Republicans (Premier Poincare's government), 38; Gauche Republicans (Moderate Conservatives), 8; Union Democratic, 3; Radicals of moderate tendencies, 8; Royalists, 2; Independent, 1.

SITUATION UNCERTAIN.

The situation is uncertain. A great many members of the general council elected as radicals are said to be quite moderate in their views on finance. They are expected to vote for the franc, for Poincare and for the maintenance of the national union government.

Willison Denies  
Appointment Report

TORONTO, Jan. 6.—Asked about the rumor reported in a despatch from Ottawa that he would be selected by the Ontario government as head of the commission to administer the new government control of liquor act, Sir John Willison, well known Toronto publisher and financier, stated that so far as he knew, there was nothing in the report at all.

SIX NAVAL SHIPS OFF TO NICARAGUA

U. S. Vessels, Carrying 400 Marines, Ordered to Disturbed Area

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Six additional naval vessels have been ordered to Nicaragua carrying an expeditionary force of 400 marines.

Governor Ferguson In Pardoning Mood

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 6.—Governor Miriam E. Ferguson is issuing pardons at the rate of almost 25 a day as the state's first woman governor draws to a close. She added 52 clemency proclamations to her list yesterday, bringing the record up to 3,037. Twenty-five of the proclamations were full pardons.

SENATE POWERS UP

Counsel in Gould Case Continue Technical Argument

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Arguments over the powers of the senate under the constitution, to deal with its own membership, was argued today before the senate elections sub-committee investigating bribery charges against Senator Gould, Republican, Maine. Counsel for Senator Gould contended the senate was limited by the constitution in its powers over its membership, and that in the Gould case it did not have the right to expel for an alleged offense committed long before his election, involving a railroad contract in the Province of New Brunswick.

Opposed To British Policy In China

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Japan has taken a definite attitude against Great Britain's Chinese policy, as outlined in the British memorandum recently submitted to the powers, according to reliable information given to British United Press this morning. Although no notes have as yet been received from Tokio, it is learned that diplomatic conversations have taken place, news of which has reached London.

Lady Beaverbrook May Enter Politics

CHICAGO, Ills., Jan. 6.—Lady Beaverbrook, wife of the noted English publisher, stopped here long enough yesterday on her way to Muskogee, Mich., to admit that she may run for parliament now that her children are grown up. "A woman can't be a success as an M. P. if she has young children," Lady Beaverbrook explained. "You can't rear babies and run the government simultaneously. It is why I refused the seat at Aston in 1919, when I was asked to run on the coalition ticket. It's different now."

Arctic Territory Not Settled Yet

TORONTO, Jan. 6.—While Rev. A. L. Fleming, of Saint John, N. B., has been appointed first archdeacon of the Arctic, a newly created position in the Church of England's missionary services, it is stated today that the extent of Rev. Mr. Fleming's jurisdiction has not yet been determined. In about a month missionary officers will have decided the territory which Rev. Mr. Fleming will supervise from Toronto, with the objective of bringing work among the Eskimos under one head. Meanwhile, the missionaries already established will continue their individual work.

Seek Restoration Of Whipping Post

OWATONNA, Minn., Jan. 6.—The recent crime wave in Southern Minnesota has inspired a movement to restore the ancient whipping post for the punishment of criminals. A measure restoring the whipping post will be drafted Saturday by Southern Minnesota's crime prevention association, to be submitted to the Minnesota legislature, now in session. The association also intends to ask for the return of capital punishment in Minnesota, formation of a state constabulary and revision of the criminal code.

LAUDS PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION ACT

Temperance Secretary Says The Fault of Govt. If Not Enforced

Canadian Press. FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 6.—"There must be a disease in New Brunswick, the only real medicinal cure for which is a cocktail," remarked Rev. Archibald Sutherland, General Secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, during an address on "The Temperance Situation," which took the place of the sermon at the week of prayer service at the Brunswick Street United Baptist Church. The attendance was the largest of the week, so far, the church being well filled. Rev. Mr. Sutherland's reference to cocktails was brought about by reports of court proceedings showing that some cases of cocktails were included in 22 cases of liquor stolen from a C. N. R. car recently at McGivney Junction while en route from Ontario distillery to the New Brunswick Liquor Commission, which distributes liquor to retail vendors, the sale for medicinal, mechanical and sacramental purposes only being provided by the Prohibition Act.

EXCELLENT MEASURE

"Our prohibition act is an excellent measure and, where properly enforced the conditions are perfectly satisfactory. Where conditions are not satisfactory that fault must be placed with the government, for it alone controls the enforcement officials, and decides the policy of the liquor commission," said Rev. Mr. Sutherland.

The son is Paul, at home; the daughters are Ruth, Reg. No. 1, home; Constance, Mrs. Lewis Lansing of Missoula, and Katherine, Mrs. Frederick R. Crandall of New York. Mr. Keith also leaves three brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Arthur Keith of Lower Ridge, Luke W. Keith of Needham, Mass., and Fleming Keith of Boston. The sisters are Mrs. Wilfred L. 4 GERMANS FREED OF ASSAULT CHARGE

British Court Holds Them Blameless For Brawl in Cafe

BERLIN, Jan. 6.—A British police court at Wiesbaden, in the occupied region of Germany, has acquitted four young Germans who were accused of attacking two British soldiers in a row in a cafe. One of the soldiers was severely injured. The British prosecutor held that the soldiers were to blame for the attack. The "Vossische Zeitung," commenting on the case, compares it with the recent French court martial at Landau, also in the occupied territory, when six Germans were sentenced for an attack on a group of Frenchmen. The Germans subsequently were pardoned.

BOMBS FOUND.

CALCUTTA, British India, Jan. 6.—Discovery of thirteen bombs and two revolvers with ammunition in a house in the northern quarter of the city today, was said by the police to have "considerable political importance." Two Bengali youths were arrested.

Shinjuku Gardens to be Transformed for Sad Rites

British United Press TOKIO, Jan. 6.—Thousands of workmen are preparing to transform the Shinjuku imperial gardens, scene of the annual cherry blossom fête at which few foreigners are welcomed to Japan, into a place of sombre splendour for the funeral of the late Emperor Yoshihito.

This great landed estate of the imperial family, where each April in past years diplomats and a few hundreds of fortunate visitors have had the chance to take tea with the Emperor of Japan, will be the setting for Yoshihito's funeral service, which will be held at midnight, February 8.

In addition the entire diplomatic corps, leading foreign business and social representatives in Tokio and practical representatives from all nations which will begin their journeys to Tokio soon.

A GREAT ASSEMBLAGE

Members of titled families will attend the services. The Shinjuku gardens are used chiefly for entertainment of distinguished foreign visitors and while regarded as the most beautiful of the imperial estates in Tokio, they are seldom open to the public.

The funeral of the late Emperor is being planned along lines as elaborate as that of the great Emperor Meiji, who died in 1912.

His interment is to be in the Imperial Mausoleum at Sakawa, near Tokio.

**A GOOD RECORD**  
THE view was expressed at a meeting of the Board of Health yesterday that probably no city in Canada gives more careful supervision to infants born within its borders.

The Board said that under the care of nurses engaged in child welfare work under direction of the Board. The other half are assumed to be in homes where financial conditions enable the parents to provide all needed care, and therefore it is assumed that with adequate supervision, almost all infants born in the city are the subject of proper care.

**THE VICIOUS CIRCLE OF ILLITERACY**

ALLOWING that statistics do not tell the whole tale, and that New Brunswick's percentage of illiteracy as recently published may not take into account all the factors that ensure proper comparison with her sister provinces, the problem of illiteracy is, nevertheless, one to which attention may profitably be directed.

The bearing of the industrial conditions of a city on non-attendance at school is reviewed. Where the women of a community are employed as much as possible outside their homes in textile manufactures, domestic service and like activities, school attendance is worst.

The conditions favorable to illiteracy are summed up thus: "1. First and foremost, illiteracy of the community. Although it may be argued that illiteracy is really the effect of school non-attendance in the community, this argument merely pushes the explanation further back.

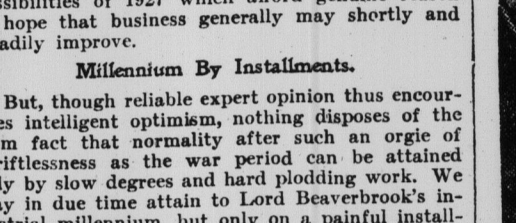

There is No Reason Why a Woman Should Be Bound to Past Mistakes—If She Truly Desires to Reform She Can Go Among Strangers and Be Respected for What She Is Instead of Judged by What She Was.

GET a great many pathetic letters from women who have taken a step aside from the straight and narrow way and who ask piteously if they must always be doomed to walk in the downward path or whether they can go back and make a fresh start.

SOMETIMES, as in the case of a letter that I have received recently, the writer is a woman who has the drink habit which she is trying to conquer, but who is ostracized by the community in which she lives and whose little children are taunted with having a drunken mother. She, too, wants to know what hope there is for her to win back her place in society.

UNDoubtedly it is harder for the woman sinner to come back than it is for the man sinner. This is not only because the world judges a woman harder than a man but because the woman sinner so often accepts her damnation as final.

MANY a girl who makes a false step in her youth is not bad at all. Often she is betrayed into wrongdoing by some noble and generous impulse, and the suffering that she has to undergo as a result of her mistake is a three-headed furnace that burns up the dross of her nature and leaves only what is good, fused into fine gold.

SUCH a woman could become a grand and noble character, a blessing to herself and society, except for her foolish and cowardly belief that a woman can never come back, that she is bound down to her past.

MANY a woman goes on doing wrong because she has once done wrong. She believes that there is no turning back upon the pathway which she has set her feet and so she pursues it to the hard and bitter end. And she has set her feet and so she pursues it to the hard and bitter end.

IT is a tragically distorted view to take of a terrible situation. Because a woman has sinned the hem of her skirt shall she never brush off the dirt? Or must she always wear a soiled garment instead of having the wisdom and the strength to cast it from her and clothe herself in a fresh robe?

THERE is no earthly reason why a woman should not reform, why she should not reform, as the poet beautifully puts it, rise to higher things on the stepping stones of her dead self.

THE woman with a past should cut herself loose from it, instead of letting it do a million about her neck that pulls her deeper and deeper into the mire. Whatever the error that she has committed, however her feet have stumbled, she should realize that she still has the future before her in which to make of her life what she chooses.

WHAT is written is written, says the Koran. We cannot change that, but we can make whatever daily entry we please in the great Ledger of Life.

WOMEN complain that society has a long memory for a woman's faults and that if a girl once makes a false step it will be whispered about as long as she lives. This is true.

THEREFORE, the woman who wants to make a fresh start does well to burn her bridges behind her and go off to some place where she is not known and where gossip will not follow her. The world is wide and full of opportunities now for women, and any woman who is good and useful and helpful can go to any community and make a place for herself where she will be honored and respected and where she will be judged by her present instead of her past.

IT is not necessary nowadays to have the road back to respectability set with thorns of cruel gossip, nor for a woman to be scourged by the curious and pitying observation of her friends. Let her go among strangers and there will be no hideous surmises if she dares to enjoy an innocent deahp with a man and where no eye will be watching to see if she is into the pit of drink if she takes a glass of wine.

HE wisest and strongest of us make mistakes, stumble and fall and the best we can do is to pick ourselves up and be more careful of the pitfalls in our way. It is worse than folly, it is fatal, to be bound by our mistakes and to lie supinely in the dust.

AS is true of women as it is of men, and whether a woman can come back or not depends entirely upon the woman herself.

THERE is no reason why the woman sinner should be crucified upon the cross of sin that she has forsaken as long as she lives. She can work the miracle of her own resurrection and from the tomb of her past she may walk forth clean and whole.

# ANOTHER CLAIM TO TITLE MADE TO COMMITTEE

## House of Lords Body Already Has 5 on Waiting List

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Another claim to a peerage has been added to the list of 5 already awaiting hearing by the Committee for Privileges of the House of Lords.

This is a petition by William Reginald Joseph Fitzhugh Herbert-Rudolston, of Clytha Park, Monmouthshire, and of Sawry Hall, Cambridgeshire, claiming to be co-heir to the Barony of Montagu.

The Huddleston family has had a most remarkable history. Sir William Huddleston married Isabel, fifth daughter of John Marquis of Montacute, brother of the Earl of Warwick, the "King Maker," and entered into possession of the manor of Swanton on the partition of the Neville estates in 1496.

Sir John Huddleston, grandson of Sir William, sheltered Princess (afterwards Queen) Mary, daughter of Henry VIII, after the death of her brother, Edward VI, and he contrived her escape to Framingham Castle. There is a tradition among the Huddlestons that the Princess quitted the house in servant's dress with a milk pail on her arm, and that when she reached the Cop-Magog Hills, near Cambridge, she saw the house in flames. She thereupon promised that if ever she became Queen of England Sawton Hall should be built of stone. In the courtyard there is an inscription showing that the hall was rebuilt in 1537.

### HELPED KING CHARLES

The Huddlestons have always been Roman Catholics, and the priest who received Charles II. into communion when the King was on his death-bed, was a Huddleston. He is said to have assisted the King to escape from Cromwell's soldiers at Worcester.

One member of the family was hanged, drawn and quartered, and there is a priest's hiding-hole at the hall.

It is said of Ferdinand Huddleston the Emperor Eugenic before her marriage to Napoleon III. He met her in London, and was her friend for many years. The letters written to him by the Empress are preserved at Sawton Hall. He was succeeded by D. I. Huddleston, brother of the present lord of the manor. There are three extinct Montagu titles—a dukedom became extinct in 1790, when most of the estates passed to the family of "Accleuch, one of whose members had married the daughter and heiress of the last Duke.

The barony, which was also held by the duke, passed on his death to his grandson, Lord Henry James Scott-Montagu, the son of the heiress. Baron Montagu had four daughters, but no son, and on his death in 1845 the barony became extinct.

### 3 Boston Car Barn Bandits Executed

BOSTON, Jan. 5.—Edward J. Heinlein, first of three men to pay the death penalty for the murder of a car-barn night watchman in 1925, went to the electric chair in the Charlestown state prison shortly after midnight.

He was placed in the chair at 12:03 and was pronounced dead at 12:13.

John J. Devereaux was the second man to be led to the chair. The switch was thrown at 12:15 and physicians pronounced him dead at 12:21.

The third condemned man, John J. Laughlin, was executed at 12:22. He was pronounced dead at 12:29.

The three were convicted of the murder of James Freineau, watchman, at the car barn of the Middlesex and Boston Street Railway on Oct. 4, 1925.

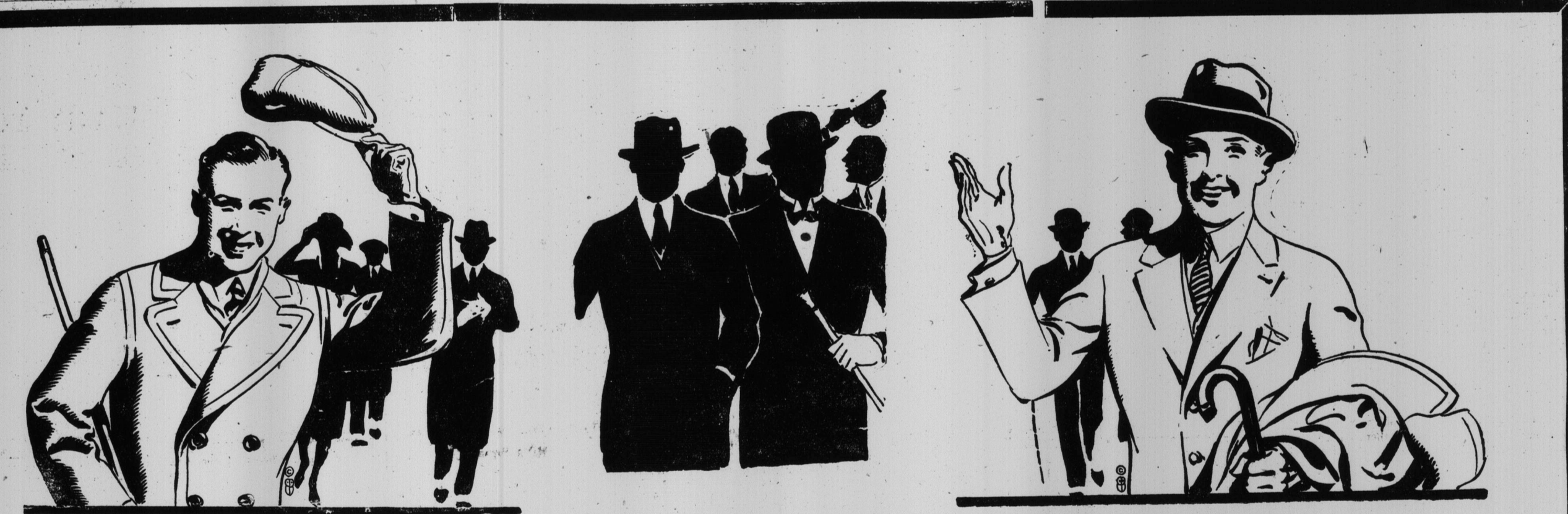
