The United Christian Missionary Society, with headquarters at St. Louis, Missouri, is the general missionary and benevolent organization of the people known as the Disciples of Christ. It conducts foreign missions in ten of the great non-Christian lands. It has over three hundred and thirty missionaries in the foreign fields, where some have been at work for fifty years. Dr. A. L. Shelton of Batang, Thibet, who was murdered by bandits a year ago, was one of its missionaries. This society also conducts home missionary work in most of the States of the Union, in the Provinces of Canada, and in Mexico. It operates thirteen institutions for the relief and care of orphans and aged people in various parts of the United States.

Its Ministerial Relief Fund gives add to two hundred and seventy-five aged ministers and retired missionaries or their wives. Its Church Erection Fund has helped to build houses of worship in nearly every State in the Union and in the Provinces of Canada. The United Christian Missionary Society spends in its work annually approximately three million dollars.





WET AND DRY LEADERS
TO DEBATE PROHIBITION

Washington, Jan. 22—Wets and drys in the forefront of their, respective movements will debate prohibition before the Economics Club at that association's annual dinner in the Hotel Astor, New York city, Jan. 25. Representative John Philip Hill of Maryland and Col. Ransom H. Gillett, counsel for the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, will speak against "The Volstead Act and the Enforcement of Prohibition," while Wayne B.
