London Press Lauds Wilson's Attitude

On Repeal of Exemptions to American Owned Vessels

Suggests Recognition of His Stand By British Participation in San Francisco Exposition—Considers of British Decision

(Canadian Press) London, March 6.—Laudatory comments on President Wilson's message delivered to congress yesterday, are published in most of the newspapers of this country today. The government organ, the Westminster Gazette, pays the highest compliments to President Wilson, for his attitude in regard to the question of Panama Canal tolls. It says: "It is not always convenient to hail a statesman of another country as a 'just judge' when he advocates your cause against a section of his own country. We cannot refrain however, from expressing respectful admiration of the courage and manliness with which President Wilson handles the Panama tolls question."

LOOKING FOR DRIVERS OF MYSTERIOUS RIG

(Special to Times) Digby, N. S., March 6.—The strange horse and carriage found in the woods yesterday is creating a lot of interest in this vicinity. Your correspondent this morning succeeded in obtaining a description of the occupants of the unknown rig. They stopped to feed their horse at W. U. Jones' stables at Digby, two miles west of where the horse was found. Jones described them as follows: "Two young boys, aged about sixteen and eighteen, dressed in blue overalls and caps, and a man in a dark suit and hat. They were inside coats inside their overall straps. No clue is obtainable of their whereabouts since that hour."

SAYS HORSE FLESH IS SHIPPED TO SWEDEN

Montreal, March 6.—The proprietor of one of the three equine stables on the South Shore stated tonight that each of these places between fifty and sixty horses are killed in a week, the animals being inspected before and after slaughter by a veterinary. The animals, all of which are housed in a large shed, are then shipped to Sweden. He denied that any of it was sold in Montreal. About three hundred pounds of meat were obtained from each animal, the hides fetch \$5 to \$8, and the bones, fat, blood, hoofs, hair, shoes and intestines for sausage casings, are all sold, bringing a profit of \$15 to \$20 on each animal. The Montreal Equine Company is capitalized at \$100,000.

RAILWAY LABORER HELD UP CAMP AT POINT OF REVOLVER

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., March 6.—A Russian railway navy named Victor Alberts, is in jail here charged with attempting to hold up the employees of a construction camp at Kingsclear at the point of a revolver. It seems that Alberts appeared at the camp yesterday morning with his Moslem and flourishing a revolver demanding money. His demand was not complied with and the employees of the camp made a hasty exit. A watch was kept on the desperado and late in the afternoon he was captured by eight of his fellow workmen and disarmed. They brought him to this city and turned him over to the custody of the police. He was arraigned in the police court this morning and remanded until this afternoon. An Indian named John Paul went on the warpath at St. Mary's Reserve last evening while intoxicated, and kicked up a rumpus. He flourished a ruse and threatened to use it. City police were sent for, but he managed to elude them and is still at large. Stefansson Plans Record Sled Trip

From Point Barrow To Prince Patrick Island

Mounted Police, With Despatches For Explorer, Set New Mark For Overland Trip — Brought Out Mail For All Parts of The World

(Canadian Press) Washington, D. C., March 6.—Vilhjalm Stefansson, the explorer who is now in the north, is planning the longest sled trip ever made, from Point Barrow, Alaska, to Prince Patrick Island, across the Canadian boundary line, practically 600 miles eastward, according to a letter received from Stefansson today by Gilbert H. Grosvenor, director of the National Geographical Society. When Stefansson's letter was written, he was on the ice of the steamer Kank, and the schooner Mary Sachs, conveying the proposed sled trip, Stefansson's letter says: "It looks easy to me."

REPORT ON BENEFITS AND DISADVANTAGES OF INCORPORATION

Proposals Considered by Fairville Board of Trade—Oppose Extra Year For Councillors

The Lancaster Board of Trade held its annual meeting last evening in the Court House at Fairville, Wm. J. Linton, president, in the chair.

General discussion was then participated in by W. I. Fenton, A. W. Anderson, W. A. Nelson, James McMurray, G. H. Allan and others.

ST. JOHN BILLS BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

Premier Seeks Power to Borrow Crown Land Fund - Can Be Invested in Government Bonds

Fredericton, March 5.—The house met at 8:30 p. m. Hon. Mr. Wilson presented petitions of the municipality of city of St. John in favor of a bill to amend the municipalities act, also a petition in favor of a bill to provide for the taking of a plebiscite as to whether or not it was desirable to grant the franchise to married women in civic elections in St. John. Mr. Lockhart presented a petition in favor of a bill relating to the General Public Hospital at St. John. Mr. Cranston presented a petition in favor of a bill to provide for electric light in the St. John Municipal Home. Mr. Baxter presented a petition in favor of a bill to provide for balconies at the General Public Hospital. Mr. Tilley presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to sewerage in the parish of Lancaster. Mr. Carson presented a petition in favor of a bill relating to the extension of the St. John Street Railway in the parish of Simonds. Mr. Pelletier gave notice of inquiry as to whether members of the government had acted as legal advisers for St. John & Quebec Railway Company. Mr. Baxter moved, with the unanimous consent of the house, for the suspension of the rules to allow introduction of a bill to amend the act for the government of the city of St. John by an elective commission. He explained that it was advisable to have the bill enacted so as to become law in time for approaching civic elections in St. John, and that there was nothing objectionable in the bill. To provide a sinking fund for the redemption debt, Premier Flemming introduced a bill in the local house yesterday, explaining that the province had already received \$255,017 derived from timber license renewals, while \$125,000 would be payable in August next. This the premier pointed out, was no ordinary revenue, but rather capital, from provincial assets, and should therefore be used to discharge the public debt. The object of the bill under consideration was to provide that such bonuses and other monies derived from crown lands be used to purchase bonds such as are issued for any expenditure on permanent account.

SOCIAL SERVICE CONGRESS DECLARES FOR MANY REFORMS

Ottawa, March 5.—The Social Service Congress discussed political purity at the session today. The speakers included Prof. W. W. Andrews, Regina; W. C. Good, president of the Dominion Grange and Farmers' Associations; J. W. M. Atkins, Dr. Adam Shortt, chairman of the Civil Service Commission. Several resolutions were passed at this afternoon's session calling on the dominion government to appoint a royal commission to investigate and make a report on the coal miners' strike on Vancouver Island; to prevent the manufacture, importation and sale of cigarettes in Canada; to establish free employment bureaus; to appoint a royal commission to investigate the unemployment problem; to enact a policy that will raise the Indians to a level of citizenship; to adopt a closer inspection of immigrants from southern Europe; to create a department of child welfare; to give pensions to mothers; to initiate an old pension scheme; and to assist the extension of co-operative societies. The congress went on record as being in favor of Women suffrage, labor unions, total abstinence and social survey work. A resolution recommending that civil servants be appointed for the outside service the same as they are for the inside service, and to give them their political rights—it was not decided just what these rights are—caused a warm discussion and finally the resolution went back for re-consideration to the resolutions committee along with one to ask the government to establish moral education in the schools.
