

There were 111 boys and 94 girls, ranging from 15 days to 15 years. Of this 205 it was necessary to bring 83 before the magistrate and make the Children's Aid Society their legal guardian during minority. Of these 55 were placed in foster homes. The balance of the 205, that is 150, were either returned to their homes under supervision, or placed in temporary homes pending the improvement of their own. The remaining cases, involving the welfare of 302 children, were satisfactorily dealt with by continued visits to the home, with advice and warning to the parents. 




