

After the war General French returned to take command at Aldershot and in 1907 succeeded the Duke of Connaught as Inspector General. If the Canadian militia were a force maintained for military purposes, we would expect that General French could give the authorities valuable information and assistance. Lord Dundonald was an officer who had served in several wars, and he made the mistake of taking the Canadian militia seriously as a military instrument. If General French takes note of this and treats the force as a civilian club with political leanings he will get along all right with his civilian superiors. WORSE THAN MONTREAL.

The middleman has been making great hauls in Montreal street contracts. Mr. Brunet's achievements have been enumerated and classified by the Montreal Herald into separate transactions. First there was \$11.544 pald for cement sidewalks, which was \$3,224 more than was necessary to pay. Second 13,600 yards of mastic pavement at \$2.50 a yard when the work was 50fered at \$2.19; rake-off \$4.216. Third, 4,142 yards Hassam pavement at \$2.45 when it is said that a better one could have been obtained at 96 cents, a difference of \$6,171. Fourth, the city bought from this dealer 24,500 yards of Danforth stone for \$56,985, while bluestone as good would have cost \$46,550. The Herald adds these together, making \$24,046.

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

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


