Be it enacted hy the Governor, Cunucil und Assembly , as follows:-

1. The fersons now holding the offices of president and governors respectively of Acadia Colleze, and their success)rs in ollict, and six additional governors and their successore iq offlice, shall be lesignated the Board of Govergors, and they are hereby coonstituted a body corporate under the name of the Governory of Acadia University, with perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to break, alter and change the same at pleasure, and by that name may sue and be sued, impleal aind be inpleaded, and be ahle and capable in law to take, purchase and hold apy jersonal property whatsoever ; and slall als, be able aad capable to take, purchase and hold to them and their successors not only all such lands, nuildings, hereditaments and premises as may from time to time be used or oecupied for the purposes of the sald university, and of Horton Collegiate Academy and Acadia Seminary, and of any other preparatory or academfal or other department and-for reaflences of the president, professors, principals, tutors, students and ,fficers of said university, academy and seminary, but also any other ands, buildings, hereditaments and premisis provided sucklands, puildings, hereditamenth and premisess shall not exceed in value ight hundred thousand dollars, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanding; and to accept on behalf of said university or any lepartments thereof, and on behalf of said acadeny and seminary, und of any other preparatary or acalemical or other department. iny gifts, devises or bequests of any progerty real or personal and oassume and execute any trust which may accompany such devises fifts or bequests ; and they and their successors shall be able and apable in law to grant, demise, alien, lease, or otherwise dispose of Ill or any of the property, real on personal, at any time belonging osaid university, and to invest the proceeds thereof upon such ecurities or in such way as shall seem best to said Board of Goverors and also to do all other matters and things incidental or apperaining to such body corporate.
2. All the real and personal property, rights, easements, privilegps and immunities of every nature or kind whatgoever, which re now held, occupied and enjoyed by the trustees, governors nd fellows of Acadia College or by any person in trust for them $r$ in their behalf, or by this act vested in the corporation hereby onstituted, subject to all trusts, attaching thereto respectively, and III leases and contracts made by or with the trustees, governors and fllows of Acadia College, shall be dealt with in alf respects as i he same had been made by and with the corporation hereby creat-

ed, and all debts, rents, interest and moneys due to the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall bé henceforth payable to and recoverable by the corporation hereby created, and all covenants, contracts and agreements made with or entered into by the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken in all courts of law and equity to have been made with and entered into by the corporation hereby created; and the president, professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and agents of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the president professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and graduates of said univertity, and all tenants of the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the tenants of the corporation hereby created, and the graduates of Acadia College shall be deemed and taken to be graduates of said university and entitled to the rights and privileges as such, and all academical honors and degrees, and all rights, powers, privileges and authorities now had, held or exercised by any person by virtue of the acts hereby repealed except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged or affected by or in consequence of this act, shall be had, held and exercised in relation to the said univerfty as fully as they now are had, held or exercised.
3. The said governors of Acadia University shall be entitled to receive and hold gifts, devises and bequests already made of hereafter coming into eflect by any person or persons, to or for the benefit of Acadia College, Horton Collegiate Academy and Acadia Seminary, or any or either of them, or to or for the trustees, gover. nors and fellows of Acadia College as fully and effectually as if the said corporation or university was named in such gifts, devises or bequests instead of Acadia College, Horton Collegiate Academy Acadia Seminary, trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia Col. lege or any or either of them. subject however to all the trustsin such gifts, devises and bequests provided, and shall have powet and authority to sue for and recover all damages arising from any cause which the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College would have been entitled to recover but for the passing of this act all debts, damages or demands due or accruing or arising upon any bond, covenant, contract or agreement made to or with the trustes, governors and fellows of Acadia College, and all persons shall have the power, any statute to the contrary notwithstanding, at any time to grant, devise, bequeath or convey by deed, will or otherwise, any real or personal property to the corporation hereby created, either for the purposes of the university generally or any department there of, now or hereafter to be established, or for Horton Collegiate Academy or Acadia Seminary, or any other preparatory or academi cal or other del artment, or utherwise as may be provided by sucl grant, devise, bequest or conveyance.
4. All legal or other proceedings heretofore taken by or agains the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, may be cont tinued under the same name or style of cause in which they har been instituted.
5. The Board of Governors may establish and manage profes sional and technical and other schools, and may support the sam out of the funds of the university.
6. The Board of Governors shall have the power to grant de

7. The Board of Governors shal! have full power and authority to fix the number, residence, duties, salary, provision and emolument of the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, academy and seminary, an I any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may also appoint the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, acalemy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may from time to time remove the said president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants, including those who at the passing of this act held any of said ottices or positions under the acts hereby repealed.
8. The Board of Governors, shall have the control and management of the property and funds of the said corporation and shall have power to adopt and carry into effect by-laws, resolutions and regulations touching and concerning the instruction, care, government and discipline of the students of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and touching and concerning all other matters and things of every nature and kind within the scope of this act which to them may seem good, fit and useful for the well ordering and advancement of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, provided the same be not repugnant to the provisions of this act or any law in force in this province, and they may from time to time alter, vary or rescind the same.
9. It shall be the duty of the Board of Governors to keep proper records and minutes of all their proceedings and to keep, proper books of account of the financial atfairs of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and to present a report of the work of the university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department accompanied by a duly audited financial statement to each annual meeting of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.
10. The persons now holding the offices of president and governors, respectively, of Acadia College, and their successors shall exercise the power and carry into effect the provisions of this act until the appointment by the said convention of the six additional governors of the said university herein provided for, after which the management and administration of said university shall devolve upon the president thereof for the time being, who shall be ex officio a governor thereof, the eighteen persons now holding the office of governors of Acadia College and six additional governors. Those now holding the ottice of governors of Acadia College shall be entitled to continue governors of Acadia University for the respective periods of their appointment, subject to the rules and regulations of said convention, and their successors in office and the said six, additional governors and their successors shall be appointed by said

convention at such time and for such feriods, and subject to such rules and regulations touching their appointment and removalas shall from tame to time be adopted by said convention.
11. Seven governors or such larger number as the board may fix shall constitute a quorum of the board, and all questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present at the meeting of the board.
12. The Board of Governors shall appoint a body to be known as the Senate, to consist of the president of the university and of such other persons not being governors as the said board shall appoint, whose duty it shall be to advise the board from time to time upon all matters concerning the system and course of education pursued in said university, academy and seminary, and the examination of all departments thereof, and concerning the courses of stady and the qualification for degrees and the granting of the same, and concerning the establishment of additional branches of instruction, and the appointment of the professors and generally concerning all matters relating to the literary welfare of said university, academy and seminary, which shall from time to time be committed to silid Senate for their advice and recommendation or action, who shall report to said board at such times as may be determined by the board. The present members of the Senate of Acadia College except those who are or may be hereafter appointed governors if said university, shall be members of the Senate under this act for the unexpired portion of the time for which they were respectively appointed. The Associated Alumni of said university shall have the right to nominate one-third of the members of such'Senate.
13. The Board of Governors may appoint the members of the Senate for such period as they shall deem best and may remove them on account of non-residence within the bounds of said Convention, non-attendance at meetings of the Senate or for any other cause which they shall deem sufficient.
14. The proprietors of scholarships of Acadia College shall henceforth be deemed and taken to be proprietors of scholarships of Acadia University, with the same rights and privileges and subject to the same conditions as were attached thereto previous to the time of the passing of this act.
15. All acts and parts of acts of this Legislature in so far as they are inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.


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## Datriculation.

The regular examinations for admission to the Freshman class will take place on Tuesday, September 28, begimning at 9 a. m .

Candidates for Matriculation will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects.
I. Latin. Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I., or Books II. and III. ; Vergil's Æineid, Book I. ; Cicero, two Orations against Catil ine, or the Manilian Law ; Latin Grammar (Harkness' is preferred); Smith's Principia Latina, Part IV., Exs. r- 25 or the equiyalent.
II. (a) Greek. Dr. Smith's Initia Greca, Part I. ; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I., or Book IV.; Greek Grammar, (Hadley's or Goodwin's is preferred) or-
(b) French. Grammar as in Otto's French Grammar. A thorough knowledge of the conjugations is especially insisted on. Translation, La Belle Nivernaise, (Daudet), or an equivalent.
III. Mathematics. Arithemetic ; Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations ; Geometry, as in Hamblin Smith, Books I.IV, (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.
IV. English. Grammar; writile from dictation; a short composition upon a subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Julius Cassar or Merchant of Venice ; Longfellow's Evangeline ; Macaulay's Lays of Ancient Rome; Scott's Lay of the Last Minstrel. The composition must be exact-in expression, in division into paragraphs and in punctuation and spelling.
V. History and Geography. Canadian and British History ; Smith's History of Greece ; Smith's History of Rome ; Geography of Greece, Italy and Asia Minor ; Modern Geography.
VI. Physiology. Martin's Elementary Physiology.

Graduates of Horton Collegiate Academy, of the St. Martin's Seminary, and of approved High Schools may be admitted without examination, upon presentation of certificates that they have completed the prescribed studies and passed satisfactory examinations thereon.

The holder of a certificate or license required of teachers of the first class in any of the Provinces of Canada will be exempted from examination in English, History, Geography and Mathematics.

Students desiring to enter upon the full Course or to take general studies should report themselves to the President for registration on the day before the opening of the College. A fee of one dollar is oharged for registration, and an additional fee of one dollar for martriculation.

Applicants for admission must be sixteen, years of age and must present a certificate of good moral character.

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COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

## Courses of Instruction.

## Courses of Study for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

The subjects of the Undergraduate Course form a system of prescribed and elective study. The subjects of the first two yeąrs have been selected mainly for their disciplinary value, and with the exception that a choice is offered between Greek and French, are strictly prescribed. In the last two years the element of personal choice is more freely introduced, the prescribed studies occupying in the Junior year six of the fifteen hours of instruction each week, and in the Senior year four of the thirteen hours.

In addition to the regular class instruction, Honor courses have been arranged for the advantage of students who may be able to do more than the ordinary assignments of their classes. These are open to the election of any undergraduate of first-class standing, The value of the work performed in these studies will be determined by examination, and Honor Certificates of the first or second class will be given according to the results of these examinations.

Students cannot be admitted to the Honor courses if regular efaminations are overdue. Any undergraduate, even though not having first-class standing, may, by vote of the Faculty, be permitted to give special attention to a particular study. Such student, and also one whose standing may have required his discontinuance of Honor studies, shall be entitled to a certificate of the work done.

A fee of five dollars is charged for the course. Three exercises a week duriny the year.

Honor Course. - This course is open only to those who have taken Junior Mathematics. It will comprise a brief study of Analytic Mechanics and the applications of the Cal culus to the Solution of Physical Problems.

## 36 GENERAL STUDEVTS, EXAMINATIONS

## General Students.

The studies of the College are arranged with reference to the wants of students who intend to take the full course. Provision is also made to accommodate all who may wish to study for a short period in any deparment, if, after examination, they are found to be prepared to work with the regular classes. The studies selected by general students must in respect to number and character , be ap proved by the Faculty. General students, on leaving the College, can have certificates of proficiency according to their attainments.

## סxaminations and Stanaing.

1. Candidates for the degree of B. A. must complete their matriculation before they can enter upon the studies of the Sopho more year.
2. Before a Candidate for the degree of B. A. can enter upos the studies of the Junior year he must pass any supplementary 0 special examinations that may be due from him on the work of the Freshman Year. Also any examinations due on the Sophomor Year must be passed before such candidate can enter upon the woit of the Senior Year.
3. If a candidate for the Degree of B. A. fails in any ord subject of the final examinations of the Senior Year the Senat may, at its discretion, instruct the Faculty to grant the degree such student whenever he shall have passed the nccessary axamina tion. If in the final examinations of the Senior Year a student shas fail in two subjects he must take the subjects of the last half of tit Senior Year again.

on the studies of the session. These Examinations will be conducted for the most part by written papers ; but oral Examinations will be introduced at the discretion of the Faculty. The results of these examinations will be combined with the record of the daily exercises to determine the standing of the student. An average of 75 per cent. of the maximum must be made to admit a student to first-class standing. In addition to these regular Examinations the Faculty may, at their discretion, require special Examinations of any class or member of a class upon any subject included in the course of study.

A special examination in English will be held at the close of the first term of the Freshman Year, the results of which will be averaged with the marks for the other subjeets in determining the student's standing for the term.

A similar Examination of a more advanced character will be held at the close of the first term of the Sophomore year.

The members of the Junior Class will be required to present two essays in each term, the average marks of which shall be entered as representing one subject in the record of the second term.

The members of the Senlor Class will be required to present three essays during the year, the average marks of which shall be entered as representing one subject in the record of the second term.

Supplementary examinations will beheld at the opening of each College Year on a day named in the Calendar. Any student who, at the close of the examinations, shall be deficient in more than one of the subjects of the previous part of his course will not be permitted to enter upon the studies of the year.

In order to maintain standing a student must make 45 per cent. in each subject taken, both in term work and examinations. Absence from class exercises will affect the student's standing.

At the close of each session the standing of each student will be reported to his parent or guardian, if desired.

## Course of Study for the Degree of Ma.

The Degree of Master of Arts will be granted according to the following regulations passed by the Senate at its meeting in June, 1892 :

1. That the M. A. Degree be given only after the candidate has passed a satisfactory test in a prescribed course of study.
2. That such course of study be equivalent to a full, year's course of advanced study ; i. e., something more in quantity and higher in quality than the requirements of the Senior year.
3. That the assignments be arranged so as to secure a large acquaintance with some one subject, rather than a slight acquaintance with several.
4. That the manner of testing be, by written examinations, by the presentation of a thesis on some assigned subject, and by the preparation of a critique or review of some author included in the course selected.
5. That the thesis and critique be placed in the hands of the President on or before the first day of April, and the ri turns from the last examinations be in his hands before the tenth day of May of the year in which the Degree is to bex conferred.

A full Course is required for this degree; but the applicant is liberty to choose any two half Courses.

The times for Examinations on these studies will be detof mined by the Profescor under whose direction the Course is taken.

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## Fees and Current ©xpenses

1. A fee of one dollar is charged for registration, and an additional fee of one dollar for matriculation. The fee for an Honor Certificate is one dollar; for the Degree of B. A., five dollars; for the degree of M. A., ten dollars. The fees for Honor Certificates and Degrees must be paid before the Annual Meeting of the Senate. If a student is excused from a regular Examination, he may have a special Examination, for which a tee of two dollars for each subject will be charged.
2. Board and rooms for about 60 students are provided in Chipman Hall. The charge for board, which includes room, rent, fuel, washing of one dozen pieces per week-everything except ight-ranges from $\$ 2.75$ to $\$ 3.50$, according to room. Board and lodgings can be obtained in approved places in the town at reasonable rates.

Rule of the Board-University students shall pay to the reasurer at the opening of each term, all Tuition and Incidental ees, etc., for the term on which they are entering, and pay to the reasurer or secure to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee Il board bills, room rent or other bills due the University as foiws: For the Fall Term on or before Dec. 5 th; and for the Winr Term, on or before April 5 th, in each College yeaf. Students. iling to comply with this rule shall not be admitted to examinaons after the dates named respectively, and no student shall be raduated until he is clear on the books of the Treasurer of the niversity.

## Gids

Scholarships in the Endowment Fund.
The Governors hold a few Scholarships, which can be assigned to needy and deserving students subject to the following regulation :-
"The Scholarships owned by the University shall not be granted for a longer period than one year, and only on a written application to the Scholarship Committee, through the President, before the 5th of November in each year."

A certificate from a Scholarship-holder, accompanied by satis factory eviderice that such Scholarship-holder is legally qualified to grant the use of the Scholarship, may be presented to the President, to be forwarded to the Committee on Scholarships; and if such certificate is satisfactory, the student presenting the same will be credited with the proper sum on account of the Scholarship. All certificates from Scholarship-holders granting to students the privileges of Scholarships, must be in the hands of the President of the University before the 5 th of November of each year.

II The DeWolfe Soholarships
There are five of these Scholarships,-one of the value of $\$ 25.00$ a year, two of $\$ 30.00$, one of $\$ 40.00$, and one of $\$ 50.00$. The nomination to these Scholarships, which by the terms of the bequest can be granted only to male students, will be determinel by the Senate, according to the class-standing, needs and genera conduct of the applicants.

Acadia Athenaum.-The object of this Society is the improvement or the students in debate and public speaking. The laws and regulations of the Society are subject to the approval of the Faculty. Besides its weekly meetings, arrangements are made for a course of Public Lectures during each College year. The Society has under its control a Reading Room furnished with a selection of newspapers, provincial and foreign, and other periodicals.

Acadia Amateur Athletic Association.-A large and convenient campus gives abundant opportunities for Athletic Games in the spring and autumn. There is also on the University grounds a large and well-equipped gymnasium. From the first of November to the first of April, the students have regular gymnastic drill under the director of the Gymnasium. Experience has shown that this practice is highly conducive to the health of the students. In May of each year a public field day is held.

The Propyleum is a Society composed of the young ladies in the Arts course. The meetings are held on Friday afternoon. The exercises consist of studies and discussions on assigned topics. Occasional public entertainments of a social and literary character are given by the Society.

College Young Men's Christian Association.-A branch of this Society has been formed and is in a flourishing condition. At present there are about ninety members. Addresses are deliver ed monthly before this Society by clergymen invited for the pur pose. The Executive Committee of this Association publishes, in the summer vacation of each year, a College Hand-book, containing a large amount of information that is useful to the students.

College Young Women's Christian Association.-A society bearing this name has been formed and includes all the young women attending the University. In addition to regular meetings a prayer service is held every Sunday morning of the College year.

Acadia Missionary Society.-This Society holds public monthly meetings. Its aim is to cultivate interest in Missionary work, and especially to gain information respecting Christian Missions in foreign lands.

Prayer Meetings conducted by the students are regularly held on Sunday morning and on Wednesday evening throughout the College year. These religious meetings have been maintained ever since the founding of the College.

All students are required to be present at morning prayers, and also to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath. Parents and guardians are requested to give instructions as to the place of worship, which they wish the students under their care to attend. Religious services are held every Sabbath in the town in connection with the Baptists, Church of England, Methodists and Presbyterians.

Special rules concerning conduct and good order will be announced from time to time as circumstances may require. It is assumed that studentsare in attendance for the purpose of intellecnual and moral improvement, and that they will readily comply vith all regulations that, in the judgment of the Faculty, are help. ful in the accomplishment of this object. Inattention to study or nisbehaviour of any kind will subject the offender to reproot or uspension at the discretion of the Faculty.

## PROF. WORTMAN, French.

This Academy is under the control of the Governors of the University, and its Courses of Study will be determined by the University Senate. A special committee of the Senate is appointed to aid the Teachers in promoting the efficiency of the School. Provision is made for two courses of Study,-the College Preparatory and the English.
