

Young Ladies' Mission Band meets on the first and third Thursday of every month, at 8 o'clock, p. m.

Weekly Prayer Meeting every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

The Regular Business Meetings of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of every month.

Young Men's Union every Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

The Ordinance of Baptism is dispensed on the last Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month, at the commencement of the Prayer Meeting.

The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of March, June and December, and the second Sabbath of September.

A Preparatory Service on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbaths at 8 p. m.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation is held on the third Wednesday in January.

When members charge their residence, they should give notice either to the Pastor or the Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

#### Revenue.

The whole revenue of this congregation is derived from weekly contributions by envelope and the plate collections.

All subscribers by envelope are supplied with envelopes on the first Sunday in each quarter.

Members and adherents who are not subscribers may be supplied with envelopes on application to any of the managers.

All subscribers are expected to contribute a fixed sum weekly, and if, from any cause, they are unable to do so, they shall be expected to make up all deficiencies at their earliest convenience.

Subscribers wishing to increase or decrease their contributions are requested to notify the managers, so that a corresponding alteration may be made in the books.

Subscribers are particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their names and pew number on the outside before they are handed in.

#### **Missionary Collections.**

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the last Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes which will be found on entering the church, just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the last of the month, any other time will do.

Envelopes will be found by any who wish them, in the small boxes at the church doors.

It is expected that, as far as possible, subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the Committee think it best.

Mr. James Dixon moved, seconded by John Donaldson, that the Session and Board of Managers be a Committee to take necessary steps to bring the Century Fund before the congregation.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. H. McLaren, seconded by Mr. A. Leitch, that the congregation hereby pledge themselves to endeavor to pay off the debt on our Sundayschool building during this the last year of the century. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. Givin, seconded by Mr. J. A. Cox, Resolved, that for the purpose of rendering to Mr. Johnson and the Choir necessary assistance in conducting the service of paise, the congregation deem it desirable to strengthen the choir by appointment of three soloists of competent musical ability and training to lead in their respective parts, and that the following persons who have for the past few Sabbaths satisfactorily discharged their duties, be appointed, namely, Miss Addison, soprano, Miss Kraft, contralto, and Mr. Green, basso, each to receive a salary at the rate of one hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly. The Music Committee, with the approval of the Session, to have power to discharge and fill the places of the singers mentioned if occasion requires. After some discussion it was finally declared carried.

Moved by Mr. James Dixon, seconded by Mr. Wright, that Messrs. L. T. McDonald and John Finlayson be appointed as the representatives of the congregation, together with two from the Session and two from the Board of Managers, appointed by their respective bodies, to compose the Music Committee.— Carried.

Moved by Mr. John Wright, seconded by Mr. J. A. Cox, that we, the members and adherents of Knox Church here assembled, express our highest appreciation and best thanks to the members of the Choir.

#### REPORT OF SESSION.

In the kind providence of God, as a church, we have been safely brought to the close of the year. It was a year of anxieties, and of worry, to some of us; but on the whole a year of the guidance of God, and of success. Our roll, as a church, continues about the same. As a session, the roll is 17, Malcolm McKenzie having resigned his eldership, and James Ogilvie and Colin Arthur their membership.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was regularly observed every quarter of the year. A change was made in the day of the September sacrament; hereafter the day will be the second Sunday of the mentioned month. The following was the attendance at the quarterly communion services: March, 539; June, 706; September, 717, an average of 646.

Seven male infants, ten female infants, and two female adults, were baptized : 19 in all.

The elders, as they were able, visited their respective districts during each quarter.

The weekly prayer meeting was fairly well attended. There is much room, and a loud call, for improvement in the line of this service.

The Sabbath School was diligenily and successfully operated during the entire year. The Mission Sabbath School, too, was energetically and satisfactorily carried on. The officers and teachers of these schools are a

most devoted and self-sacrificing company of laborers. Gratuitously, gladly, they are contributing their time, their strength and their talents to this extremely important work of the Lord—the work also on which the very existence of this church, in the future, so very largely depends. May they have abundant success.



#### Board of Managers of Knox Church

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1899.

The Board of Managers of Knox Church take pleasure in presenting this, their fifty-sixth annual report to the congregation.

We have to report a substantial increase in the ordinary revenue of the Church for 1899, and trust this is the result of a prosperous year in the congregation.

Your Board are pleased to report an increase of \$614.65 in the envelope collections for the year, but have to report a slight decrease of \$18.87 in the loose collections compared with 1898. However, there is a net gain of \$595.78 on Sunday collections over the previous year.

The following are the exact figures as taken from the Treasurer's statement :

1898	1899
Envelope, \$4751.57.	\$5,366.22
Loose, 516.88	498.01

The number of subscribers by envelope for 1899 was 535, as against 506 for 1898. The average giving per Sunday by envelope for 1899 was \$101.25, and the loose collections per Sunday averaged \$9.39, compared with \$91.39 envelope and \$9.94 loose in 1898.

Your Board has paid the note of \$350, and there are no floating liabilities against the Church property, though there is still \$4,000 of a mortgage against the Sunday School.

The basement of the Church has been generally cleaned and repaired, which will make it more pleasant and comfortable for those using the same.

Your Board had new cement sidewalks and approaches to the Church and School-Room laid down. The lawn has been graded and sodded, and we think the work has greatly improved the outside appearance of the Church.

The Managers who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. James Dixon, James A. Cox and W. H McLaren.

In conclusion, your Board desire to express their gratefulness to the Divine Master who has so bountifully dealt with us during the past year, and as we advance into the last year of the century we can look back on the year 1899 as a thoroughly prosperous one in the financial statistics of Knox Church.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The year 1899 has drawn to a close, and the year 1900, the last of the century, is now opened to us. So with Knox Sunday-school, we look back on our year's work and ask ourselves what progress we have made in this year of 1899.

For our sixty-third review of the work in connection with Knox Sunday-school we have to present a good, healthy report; one of which our school is proud.

By a careful examination of these figures we find we have not advanced any in attendance, but we trust the slight falling off has been more than balanced by the earnest and zealous work of our teaching staff. We

have an efficient body of men and women who are earnestly working for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom among the young people. The band of teachers who devote their Sunday afternoons to teaching and many hours to studying the lesson do not receive enough encouragement from the parents of the scholars. It would be of great assistance to the teachers if the parents would see that their children are prepared with their Catechism and Golden Text each Sunday before going to Sunday-school.

A very pleasing and practical result of the work of the teachers has been the number of pupils who have joined the church from the Sunday-school. Four joined in March, eight in June, one in September and four in December—a total of seventeen in all. We trust the first spiritual seeds sown in Knox Sunday-school will blossom into powerful Christian men and women.

Prizes were awarded to Ella McConnell, Bessie Warmington, Harry Truscott and May Truscott for the perfect recitation of the catechism.

Looking for a moment at the Treasurer's report, we are pleased to note the splendid contributions of the School, a grand total of \$786.04 having been collected from all sources. This is considerably in advance of last year.

While we have been reviewing the many pleasant thoughts in connection with our work last year, we are saddened by remembering the sorrows that the past year has brought to so many. God has indeed been good to us; but five of our members, whose work was finished, have been called to their rest. Miss Louisa Simpson, one of our teachers, was called upon on Jan.

Our library, which has been in the efficient hands of Mr. James Greig and his assistant, has over 1200 volumes in constant use, and during the past year has been well patronized. The librarian reports that the only drawback to the successful handling of the libraries is the dilatory way some of the pupils have of returning their books. Each pupil is allowed two weeks to read the book and return it, but some apparently find this not long enough and keep the books ranging in periods of from four weeks to six months. Of course this is to the disadvantage of those wishing the book.

We have again started to give out an illustrated paper, "The King's Own," each 'Sunday, and we are pleased to see the hearty reception it has received from the scholars. Picture lesson cards to the Primary classes and lesson leaflets to the rest of the school are also being distributed, and we have every opportunity for the thorough knowledge of the lesson.

Our Young Ladies' Bible Class is being well patronized, but our Men's Class, under the capable teaching of Mr. Wm. Brennen, is not meeting with the success it deserves. The class meets every Suuday afternoon at 3 p. m., in the session room, where an interesting discussion of the lesson is held for half an hour.

In conclusion, we have much to be thankful for during 1899. Everything has been harmonious during the year, and we have never had a more efficient staff

of teachers than at present, and we believe there is a great deal of good being done in our school.

As we go into the last year of this wonderful nineteenth century we believe that the sixty-third mile-post which we have just passed will always cherish most pleasant memories for those connected with Knox Sunday-school.

And as we look over our own work and the many mercies we have received, we must not forget to thank Him who taught us first to say, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done."

We regret that during the year our assistant superintendent, Mr. J. W. Stevenson, a most faithful and zealous worker, was compelled to leave us on account of change of business position. His removal has been keenly felt, and we sincerely thank him for the good work done while with us, and trust it has not been in vain. We also deeply regret having to report that we have been unable as yet to find anyone to take his place. Several other teachers have left us during the year but God has been pleased to send others to take their places among us.

During the year the scholars of the Primary Class have been supplied with "Sunbeam" and "Primary Lesson Leaflet," weekly, and the other classes with "The Sabbath School Visitor" fortnightly, and "Home Study Leaflet," weekly.

We trust that God will continue to bless our efforts in the future as He has done in the past, and that He may be with us in our endeavors to bring the scholars to the saving knowledge of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### Knox Church Missionary Association.

The Missionary Association of Knox Church have much pleasure in presenting to the congregation their thirty-first annual report.

As a beginning to the work of the year, after well discussing the matter, the Association decided to try to augment the decreasing subscriptions by a personal canvass of the congregation. The congregation was divided into twelve districts and canvassed by the members and several friends in the church, who kindly assisted.

The results of the canvas were good, quite a few new subscribers being entered on the books of the Association.

During the year, as a means of stimulating true missionary spirit, Dr. Fraser on two occasions gave very interesting illustrated lectures at the missionary prayermeeting on the mission fields of Formosa and Honan. In his desire to interest and help in the cause of missions Dr. Fraser purchased a lantern to be used on these occasions.

#### FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE Fnox Church Young Men's Union.

In presenting their first report the Young Men's Union do so with a feeling of pride, justified by the splendid success which has met their efforts.

Being our first report, it will be appropriate to give a short history of the Union. It had for a long time been felt that a special society for the young men of the church should be inaugurated. A meeting was called on October 27th, and several young men responded. Plans were talked over and an open meeting was called for November 3rd. At this meeting 12 young men were present, and the club was organized and put on a firm basis. We now have a membership of 42, with an average attendance of twenty-five.

# CONSTITUTION of KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse. Burying Grounds, and any other houses or real estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said congregation. in full communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the sixth day of September. in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in full communion with the congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said congregation.

8rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the members of the congregation, which shall have been called from the pulpit of the Church by the officiating Minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require, but the election shall be by the members of the congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in clause third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine Managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the congregation. three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occuring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave, shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall select their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings either from the pulpit

on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Three Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more members of the congregation in full standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any special meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular chartered bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, moneys from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the congregation shall be under the control of the Managers with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the congregation from all sources shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of stipend, salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the congregation. The "Poor Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for missionary and benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The members of the congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss and regulate salary of any one who may set as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate statement of the income and expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the annual meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the congregation at any special or annual meeting.

18th.—A committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of the Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the congregation, together with the list of office bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting, and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be chairman of the said committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the congregation shall elect three , Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing Rules shall be in force until altered or amended, and no motion to alter or amend said Rules shall be put unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the congregation, and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the congregation shall be called to consider the same, not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing Rules no one shall be held to be a member of the congregation who is not in full communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said congregation, and no others than members in full communion shall be allowed to vote at any congregational meeting.
