TO THE FREEHOLDERS OF THE COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.

Campobello, June 10, 1850.

GENTLEMEN.
There are few men in this world, I be-
lieve, (however they may disguise it,) upon
whom the approbation and praise of their fel-
low men, fail not to make some gratifying
impression; at least some I own were, my
feelings on receiving the respectable and nu-
merously signed requisitions from the Free-
holders of the County of Charlotte, inviting
me to come forward as a Candidate at the
present Election; and, in consenting thereto,
I beg leave to return you, many thanks for
the honor done me; that honor in my opinion
not consisting so much in the office as in
the way that office may be obtained. I there-
fore tell you frankly, that it is not my in-
tention to go about and beg votes, like a Pauper,
or resort to unfair practices—such as I ob-
served taking place at the last Election in
this County—neither is it my wish to say one
word against any of my brother Candidates.

The Electors have a right to choose for them-
selves; and I beg leave most explicitly to
say, that I have not entered into any arrange-
ment whatever with any other person, or en-
gaged in any coalition; but stand solely and
entirely on the requisitions you have been
pleased to offer me; and therefore leave my
self entirely in the hands of my friends.

I shall certainly pay my respects to as many
of the Freeholders as the very limited time
given admits of; and those whom it will not
be possible for me to see before the Election,
I pledge myself to call upon afterwards; and,
in carrying out this plan, I would suggest to
my friends to call a meeting of my supporters,
on different days, in each Parish; and it
would give me much pleasure to attend and
give my views and any explanations that
might be wished, as to the policy to be adopted
for the good of the Province and County
generally—there being a great difference be-
tween answering any questions from a Free-
holder, and hearing his opinions, and suppli-
cating and cringing for support.

It has been the practice in this County, and
I believe in the Province generally, to take
the man entirely as the object in view, in the
case of choosing a Member, without regard to
the measures that man might adopt when
elected; permit me to say, with all due de-
ference, I do not think this altogether correct;
and, certainly, as yet we have not seen a
work particularly well. Much as is to be
disputed all electioneering "clap traps," and
promises put on paper which can never be
redeemed, even if those who made them had
the power—which, in nine cases out of ten,
they have not; still, there is one point on
which, as a Freeholder, I should refuse my
vote to any man—and that is, where the Can-
didate would not promise me to advocate, to
the best of his ability, "The surrender of the
Initiation of Money Grants to the Govern-
ment." I consider this to be the foundation
on which must be built all our future opera-
tions in reforming any existing abuses; for,
until that is obtained, no permanent good
can be done. It will certainly do away with
all petty jobs of corruption; but the greatest
point gained will be, we shall have some one
answerable for the expenditure, instead of
having—as at present, the whole House of
Assembly; verifying the old maxim, "What
is every-body's business, is nobody's."

And, let me tell you, our *Chancellor of the
Exchequer*, (whoever he may be,) will have
no easy job at first in bringing forward his
budget. Other changes are now being talked
of, but in my opinion of very inferior moment
to this. *Get this*, and the rest, if they are
worth having, will follow. There will be
few larvae and fishes; and those that there
are will have to be well earned before being
received; besides, on the present state of
Colonial subjects, it is impossible to say how
one would act; but there ought to be that
confidence between the member and his
constituents, that he does not lose his charac-
ter of member and become that of a mere
delegate, but that, on the contrary, if ques-
tions arise that will require urgent and active
decision, he will be trusted to do what he
thinks right in such a case; for, I consider
the present state of all our Colonies in British
North America is in such a position as they
never were before; and, in speaking of this,
there is another, and a more important point,
I would beg most particularly to call your
attention to at this period—return no man
who has not some stake in the Country, who,
in fact, has not something to lose if the Pro-
vince is ruined. Would a meeting of Stock-
holders of a Bank, or Insurance Office, vote
for a Director, a man who had not a share
in the company? I think not.

I know it is the fashion to listen to, and, in
some instances people are led away with some
popular orator for the time. He talks of the
reform he is going to make, and the abuses
he is going to correct &c., these are the most
expensive animals we have in the Province;
lengthening out debates in the House of As-
sembly until every word uttered has cost the
Province a shilling, and the chances are in
many instances, that very shilling would be
about the value of the whole debate. It
has been said in the House of Commons:

"one good Committee man is worth a dozen
popular debaters—one gets through the
business—the others, in many cases, only
retard it;" and is not, very often the same
with us on a small scale?

In conclusion, I beg leave to state, it is my
opinion every man in a Community is bound
to give his time and attention for the good of
that Community, to the best of his abilities
and power. I have done so for the County
Charlotte for these last three or four years
to the best of mine, at a considerable personal
inconvenience; but, consider myself more
than repaid by the kind manner I was receiv-
ed, on my return from England, by your so
handsomely giving me a public dinner, as
well as your now gratifying compliment.

It has been said of me, that I am trying to
get some place in the, or under the Govern-
ment. I give you my honor as a gentleman
there is not a single place in the Province of
New Brunswick, with a Salary attached to
it, that, if offered to me, to-morrow morning,
I would take, much less ask for.

I shall have the pleasure of meeting you
all, Gentlemen, at the Hustings, on the
21st inst., and beg, until then, to tender you
my sincere thanks.

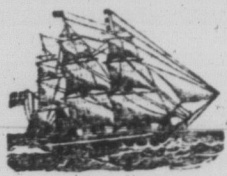

Arrival of the Steamship



Cambria.

The R. M. Steamship Cambria, with the mail of the 8th inst., arrived at Halifax, at 5 o'clock Friday morning, in a little less than 13 days from Liverpool.

The new American steamer Pacific arrived at Liverpool on the 7th, in 12 days and 12 hours from New York.

The steamer City of Glasgow, arrived on the 1st June at Glasgow, in 14 days from New York. The steamer Washington arrived at Southampton, in 14 days from New York.

The steamer Niagara, arrived at Liverpool on the 3d June, in 12 1/2 days from New York.

The news from the Continent is rather pacific in its character, and in a commercial point of view, is considered very satisfactory—much more favourable than for a long time past.

The continuance of favourable weather in England has had a decided effect upon the Corn market. Breadstuffs of all kinds were dull, and prices had a downward tendency. No change in Flour, but transactions were limited. Corn dull and inactive at a decline of 1s. per quarter; best yellow 31s.; white and mixed 30s. to 30s. 6d.

Cotton remains as at last advices. The sales of the week reached 60,000 bales.

The Timber market is depressed in consequence of intelligence received from North America, that an overwhelming importation may be expected this spring and summer from that quarter.

The money market was easy. Consols closed on Friday at 93 1/4.

Exchange.—Dead weight continues depressed; measures of goods abundant. In passengers there is no alteration.

Coffee was in lively demand at an advance of from 3s. to 5s. per cwt.

The news from Cuba has had a very material effect upon sugar, and prices have somewhat advanced.

The news from the Manufacturing districts is very favourable; every establishment is fully employed, and the operatives are quiet and contented.

From all parts of the country the accounts of the weather and the prospects of the growing crops continue most favourable—indeed a more favourable season so far was never known.

Intelligence of the Cuba invasion had reached England, and created a very great sensation both in and out of Parliament; the invaders generally were looked upon as a band of pirates, and that as such they ought to be treated. It is said that instructions had been forwarded to the British fleet on the West India Station to assist the Government of Cuba, if necessary, in the destruction of the invaders. The Members of both the Lords and Commons, and of all political parties, seem to be of one opinion on the matter.

The difficulty between England and France arising out of the Greek affairs, is not yet settled; but no apprehension now exists that the friendly relations of the two Countries will be disturbed. At the same time, it is stated that the British Ministry have been placed in a very humiliating position, and that the settlement after all must be made in terms of the London Convention, thus yielding to France all that she asked, and giving that Nation the proud satisfaction of having forced the British Government into their terms.

FRANCE.

In the French Assembly the new Electoral Law has been passed by a large majority, notwithstanding the strong opposition which it encountered, and at present, no apprehension exists as to the public peace being disturbed.

It is generally believed that the answer of Lord Palmerston on the Greek question will be satisfactory to the French Government, and that diplomatic relations with Great Britain will immediately be resumed.

ITALY.

Very great and increasing discontent is manifested in Rome; and all through Italy affairs are very unsettled. His Holiness does not feel by any means comfortable in the Vatican.

IRELAND.

The agitation regarding the tenant right is fast gaining ground, and persons of all creeds and all shades of politics, are uniting in the endeavour to obtain a more secure and lasting tenure of occupation to the agriculturalists.

GREAT FIRE AT MONTREAL.—On Saturday afternoon, we learn from Captain Armstrong, of the steamer Montreal, a fire broke out in a carpenter's shop, in Griffin Town, caused it is said, by some sparks from a tobacco pipe having fallen amongst the shavings. In spite of every exertion to prevent it, the flames spread, with unaccountable rapidity, to the surrounding properties, and, the wind, which was high, when the fire began, increasing, the burning embers were borne to a great distance, igniting houses, considerably removed from the outbreak of the fire, so that in a comparatively short space of time, 110 buildings were enveloped by the devouring element.

The Alliance which arrived yesterday morning also, did not leave Montreal until 5 o'clock on Saturday evening. By her news has been received to the effect that 120 houses in all have been destroyed, including two churches, the English and Methodist.

It was feared at one time, that the extensive warehouses by the Lachine Canal would be destroyed, but we learn that they have escaped.—[Quebec Chronicle.]

FROM THE UNITED STATES.

We are indebted to Favour and Gunnison's Expresses for our files of American journals. The Boston papers state that it has been decided by the supreme Court that Professor Webster, who was found guilty for the murder of Dr. Parham, and moved for a writ of error, is not entitled to a new trial. Flour is selling in New Orleans at \$10 per barrel.

BURNING OF THE STEAMER G. P. GRIFFITH—TWO HUNDRED LIVES LOST!

The steamer G. P. Griffith, Capt. Roby, which left Buffalo on Sunday morning last, for Toledo, with over 250 passengers, mostly emigrants, on board, was burned to the water's edge, destroying the lives of some 200 persons. From the Buffalo Express we learn that she was within 20 miles of Cleveland, when the fire originated. Capt. Roby and family are among the lost. The mate swam on shore, and reached Cleveland for assistance. He reports about 30 saved in all.

ROBBERS FRIGHTENED.—An attempt was made on Friday night to break into the store of I. M. Field, Jr., of Rochester. Being observed, the robbers discharged a pistol the ball of which entered the front of the watchman's cap, and slightly grazed the top of his head. The watchman returned the fire, which was supposed to have taken effect as one of the robbers exclaimed, "Thompson, I'm wounded." The wounded thief was taken up by his comrades, three in number who put him into a wagon near by; but in their haste, the rogues forgot a cap and sundry other articles. The Mat-tapan Bank is over Mr. Field's store.—*Boston Courier.*

From Jamaica.—The 7th instant was set apart as a day of fasting and humiliation, being the anniversary of the great earthquake, which destroyed the town of Port Royal in 1692. A proclamation had been issued by the Governor, calling the Legislature together for the despatch of public business on Tuesday the 25th inst. The capture of the Clementine, a Brazilian brig, by H. M. sch. Bernadine, and the bringing of her into Port Royal, with a cargo of slaves on board, created some excitement.

Dates from Bermuda to the 5th report a severe drought at Anigua, which had not suffered so much since 1837.

Lady Franklin.—In a letter, under date of June 1, to a friend in New-York, she says: "I am on the eve of starting for Aberdeen, where our last little supplementary Arctic Expedition for the search of a part of Regent's Inlet is, fitting out, principally on what remains of my funds." Notwithstanding all that has been done in England and America, and the sending of sixteen sail of vessels in search of her husband, Lady Franklin has discovered a point in Regent's Inlet which they probably will not visit, and for that search she embarks her all.

Melancholy Accident.—On Thursday last a respectable man, whose name we understand, is Michael Garvey, met with a watery grave while attempting to sail down the River St. John, in the neighbourhood of this City, on a piece of large pine timber. The accident happened by the steamer "St. John" passing near where the unfortunate man was snail on his insecure means of transportation, which caused an agitation in the water, and, losing his balance, he sunk to rise no more alive. Every exertion was made by those on board the steamer to save him, but all proved unavailing. The body was recovered on Sunday last, after a diligent search, and delivered to his friends for interment in the Roman Catholic burial ground. The funeral took place on Monday last.—[*Head Quarters.*]

IMPORTANT RAILROAD PROJECT.—Mr. Morton, an Engineer of high respectability and attainments, from the United States, recently arrived in this Province with the view of ascertaining what steps can be taken for the purpose of extending a line of Railway through this Province, from the state of Maine, in order to connect the traffic from Europe with America through this Province and Nova Scotia. Mr. Morton visited Halifax, and the Nova Scotian thus speaks of him and his project:—

Mr. Morton appears to be a very gentlemanly and well informed man. He states that there are four wealthy and influential Corporations interested in the success of the Maine Lines.—That each of these have a direct interest in the extension of a Line to Halifax, either by a powerful steamer from Portland to Windsor, with Rail to the Gut, or round the Bay by Cumberland, to connect at our frontier with the lines which may be formed by the Governments and Companies of New Brunswick and Maine.—Mr. Morton is indifferent which route is taken, provided it be the shortest—best—or most profitable. In the construction of one or the other, he is quite confident that we shall have the cordial sympathy, if not active support of the Associations already formed among our neighbours.

Snow in June.—The "oldest inhabitant" can scarcely remember a spring with more variable weather in presenting sudden changes than the present, from cold to warm and from warm to cold. The thermometer on one occasion varied to the extent of 50 degrees in 24 hours. On the night of Wednesday the

23d ult., the snow fell on the hills and back settlements of this county, in some places to the depth of 16 or 18 inches. After some days of beautiful spring weather we have again had a touch of old winter, and on Tuesday afternoon some of our hills were again white with snow.—[*Pictou Eastern Chronicle June 13.*]

GENTLEMEN,
In announcing my intention of being a Candidate for your suffrages at the approaching Election, I stated that I would explain on the Hastings my political opinions, but as many of you will not have the opportunity of being here on the day of Nominations, and within the short period which intervenes before the Polling Day, I shall not be able to visit many sections of the County. I deem it right at this particular crisis in Colonial affairs, to take this mode of briefly explaining my views on some of the leading measures now agitated in the Province.

I was born an Englishman, and have lived for the last 23 years of my life in the County of Charlotte, and in a British Province; and much as I may regret many of the measures of Colonial policy adopted of late years by our Mother Country, yet I am not disposed to renounce her allegiance for the sake of annexation to a neighbouring Government.

The Initiation of Money Grants I am decidedly in favour of vesting in the Executive, as the only mode of ridding the Province of the present corrupt system by which its Revenues have been so wantonly squandered, and, under the present system of Provincial Government, it cannot be considered as depriving the Representatives of the People of that control over the appropriation of public monies, which they are constitutionally entitled to.

I am an advocate for a Reciprocal Free Trade with the United States and other Nations; but not for that one sided system which, while it benefits other Countries, deprives our own of the protection which its Agriculture, Fisheries and Manufactures absolutely require.

On the subject of Retrenchment and Economy, I can only say, that I am decidedly of opinion that our Official Salaries have been too high, and I shall be ready to approve of any plan of prudent Economy and Reduction which may be proposed, not only in that, but in many other items of Public Expenditure.

The management of our own local affairs by the means of Municipal Corporations may, I conceive, in some parts of the Province be judiciously adopted; but I am not for forcing this system on all the Parishes at once, and without any regard to the wishes of the Inhabitants, or their fitness for the change.

The Internal Improvement of the Province by Railways and other Roads, I deem of essential importance, and a subject which will require the especial care and exertions of your Representatives.

The cause of Education is one also of great moment to our future welfare; and, while I should deprecate any partial system, I shall always advocate the combining of scriptural with secular knowledge, as the only true mode of educating a people.

With these views, Gentlemen, should I be elected, my best services shall be at your disposal.
