DISASTERS.
Bright Union, Muriel, of St. Andrews,
from St. George, N. B. to Falmouth, J.M.,
was abandoned at sea N. lat. 38.30 W. lon.
51.30, on the 23rd Dec. under last, lumber laden,
became water logged; crew taken into Port
St. John's, Newfoundland, by Bright Angolia,
Craze, from Domerara to Newfoundland.
Intelligence has reached the Vene that
the brig Clyde, Silaker, master, owned by
Messrs. J. Rod & Co. of St. John, and load-
ed with coal in Ball Verbeke November last
by Mr. J. I. Black, of Sakville, has been
abandoned at sea, near the Banks of New-
foundland. The crew were two days on the
wreck, without fire or food; they were taken
off and landed at a port in Newfoundland.
Further particulars not yet received. We
understand that both vessel and cargo were
covered by insurance.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

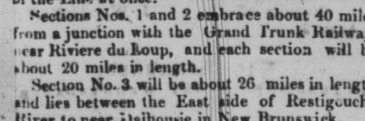
THE following was adopted as one of the
