The Murrells have escaped from the London prison even when special guards are placed to keep them from doing so. It seems to me that the country is bearing needless expense in keeping up prisons at all. The Murrells may be caught—I sincerely hope that they will. If you, sir, had known the Melbourne community, and known the Melbourne community, and known the man whose life was taken, you would feel as hot as the Melbourne citizens do. But the Murrells' capture has nothing to do with the fact that they got away, and they made that get-away under the very nose of those who were charged with their keeping. If we have many more such instances the people of this country will not feel called upon to assist in keeping law and order. It is such things as this that make for disorder, robbery and murder, instead of tending to check it.

4. Milk should not be exposed to

4. Milk should not be exposed to the air any longer than absolutely necessary, as this seeds the milk with a fresh lot of germs. This means the keeping of milk in a closed vessel and not in an open dish.

5. "Left "over" milk from meals should not be put into the general supply, as this causes the whole lot to spoil.

8. "Left over" milk from the sick room should be pasteurized or designed.




