Goods for Private Use Charged to Public Account,

and Paid for by Checks on the Government-Mr. Cochrane's Case.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.]
OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—In the Public Accounts Committee of the House of Commons this morning Mr. Somerville, member for South Brant, took up the matter of further frauds in the Public Works Department

Sam Ashfield, an Ottawa dealer in china, was sworn and said when goods were ordered for the Government they were delivered at whatever department the requisition called for. He delivered goods in the Public Works office in charge of a clerk named Talbot. Witness denied giving any official commission on goods. He might have given

on his own purchases. Asked to give particulars of such cases, the Minister of Finance objected to this question, which was dropped.

H. Bourcier, drygoods merchant, was the next witness. In 1835 he dealt in readymade clothing. He was shown five accounts made out in his name, totalling \$650, tor goods sold the Public Works Department.



Some French Divorce Statistics.

The Journal Officiel publishes some read-ble statistics relative to the divorces and sparations decreed in France during a period of twelve months. The divorces aparations decreed in France during a period of twelve months. The divorces granted after less than one year's connubial happiness amount to 2 per cent. Then comes a tremendous jump to 23 per cent. in the case of unions having lasted from one to five years. The heaviest proportion of all is that for the period extending from the fifth to the tenth year, the number reached being 40 per cent. After that the figures drop rapidly. Only 23 per cent. of couples seek divorce between their 10th and 20th years of union; between 20 and 30 the proportion is only 6 per cent.; and, finally, only one pair in 100 seeks to cut the knot after sailing through life together for over 30 and under 40 years. After more than 40 summers of wedded happiness there is no instance of the French equivalent for "a decree nisi." Conjugal infidelity is only the cause of just one-fifth of the divorces granted.

Opening from this principal room was a larger one, set apart for the use of learned slaves busy transcribing with careful hand the work of illustrious Greek and Roman authors for personal use by Gallus, or for presentation by him to valued friends. In this apartment was also the "studying couch" of this luxurious owner and director of affairs.

The Germans will be loth to accept any evidence tending to show that their beloved beer is a source of drunkenness and crime, but they will have to come to that conclusion if they are honest in their investigations. The fact is that the German people, as a whole, are suffering under the curse of beer—beer in their brains and beer in their bodies. Beer stupefics, soddens and brutalizes the drinker. The typical German beer guzzler, with his bloated face and puffed up body, is about as near the standard of the beast as a man can well be. His very appearance is the best possible answer to the fallacy about the harmlessness of beer. His torpid intellect, his swollen and filthy body and his coarse and brutal nature are the natural products of years of beer-swilling. Beer is becoming more and more the drink of the masses, the drink that is making drunkards, criminals and paupers. This is true in the United States, and it will be found to be true in Germany.



A lady writes as follows: "Cuttings of flowers, such as roses, heliotropes, pleanders, etc., can be rooted in small vials filled with warmish water and suspended from the window casement. Everything depends on selecting the cuttings. If a slip is too young and full of sap it will fade away from too much evaporation; if it is hard and woody it will take a great while to strike root. You must take a cutting that is perfectly ripened and one from a rigorous shoot, yet a little hardened at the base. Have a bud or joint at or near the end of the cutting, as all roots strike from it, and the nearer it is to the base the greater your chances of success. Pull Manage Cuttings. of the lower leaves of success. Pull off the lower leaves of the cuttings, and ensert the end for about an inch into the vial, tie a string about the neck of the vial and hang it in the sun. When the little roots show themselves about an inch or more in length fill up the vial with a rich composted soil, let it hang two or three days longer, then break off the glass carefully, without disturbing the roots, and pot the plant. Unless the water evaporates a third or more do not fill the vial up."

As soon as a crop is off, even a single row in the garden, add a little manure, fork it in, and at once plant or set out anything which will grow for market before winter, othat will make feed for any kind of stock. Dollars can be saved and made by keeping everything moving lively. Vegetables grown late will keep in pits till spring, and stock not only relish it as a change, but thrive so much the better. This is one great secret in "money in the garden," and tends to keep down late weeds, which are more apt to be neglected than early ones. Clean culture must be maintained all the time. Will Bees Injure Fruit?

Many farmers who grow a considerable quantity of fruit on their place, object to keeping bees because they feel convinced that the bees injure their fruit. I, personally, doubt very much if a bee ever injured fruit. They certainly suck the nectar from grapes, cherries, and other fruits, but not until they have already been punctured by birds and other insects. Punctured fruits will decay anyhow, and can never be gathered in a sound, wholesome condition. The bees have been experimented with time and again, and in all cases it was found that they never disturbed the fruit until the outside skin was first broken by other creatures. Fruit kept in the green-lacuse, where the bees were allowed to fly around is never touched by them, but as soon as few of them were broken open the bees swarmed around the spot. Orioles, grobins, catbirds and other birds are gonerally the marauters, and the bees simply dollow in their footstens to prevent the nec-

DR. WELTI OF GLARUS.

The President of the Swiss Republic in



The chief official personage of Switzerland is Dr. Weiti, of Glarus, President of the "Bundesrath" or Federal Council of the Swiss Republic. It must be very interesting for Canadians to know something of the methods of the Executive of a Government that has been a republic since 1291. The Swiss President's authority does not resemble that of a President of the United States or a President of the French Republic. The Swiss President is a comparatively unimportant officer, yet the Swiss claim that theirs is a freer Government than that of the United States. The Swiss constitution vests the supreme executive power in the Bundesrath collectively, which consists of seven members appointed for three years by the General Assembly. To the Federal Councilous severally are allotted the different departments, namely, the Foreign Office, the Home Office, Department of Justice, the Army, the Finance and Custom, the Department of Agriculture, Manufactures and Trade, and the Postoffice and Bailroads Department. The President and Vice-President, elected for one year only and not re-eligible for the second year, do not appoint or control these Ministers or Councilors, but carry out the decrees of the Council as nominal heads of the confederation during their term of office. They have a voice in deliberating on its policy, but less real power than the Prime Minister of a kingdom with Parliamentary government. The President receives a salary of \$3,000 a year. The Federal Parliament consists of a Senate and House of Representatives. The Sanate is composed of two members from each canton, and the Lower House has 147 members, who are directly elected on the basis of one representative for 2,000 of population. Many of the cantons have also their own Legislature for domestic affairs. 
