Russia Commands Turkey to Cease Hostllities.

Freece Protests at the Delay in Ar ranging an Armistice-Autonomy May Fail to Pacify Crete.

WAITING FOR THE SULTAN. London, May 14.-The Greco-Turkish news does not change the situation. Everything is waiting on the Porte's action. There is no confirmation of the report printed in the Journal, of Paris, that an armistice has been arranged, The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Constantinople says the sultan resents the mediation of the Freece directly. If this is refused the Turkish demands will be more exact-

The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Larissa telegraphs: The feast of Bairan has commenced, and there will be no military operations except when necessary.

Pessimistic reports from Constantinople and Paris assert that hope is almost gone of reducing the Porte even to the partial pliability which it displayed before the property of the property displayed before the war. It is be-lieved that the scheme of reforms for the Ottoman Empire must be wholly abandoned. The Constantinople correspondent of the Standard declares that the pro-posal for an armistice is far from pal-

table to the Turks, who fear that they will be derived of the fruits of their victory. Hitherto Russia alone has been in a position to act promptly. It is no secret that she has 100,000 troops, armed and equipped, on the shores o the Black Sea, and that transports are ready to land them anywhere in 36 hours. At the same time, Russia loes not pretend to conceal her anger with Greece, or her intention to re

frain from compelling the Turks to evacuate Thessaly. Sir Charles Dilke, M.P., who is generally accepted as an authority on foreign affairs, said that he had great confidence in King George of Greece, who was one of the ablest statesm living. Greece's interests, Sir Charles added, would be better cared for in the hands of hi Greece's interests, Sir Charles his hands than in the hands of his ministers. Moreover, the king was on personal terms with the sultan.







Some packers profess concern lest now that corn is free the farmers of Canada will "kill the goose that lays the golden egg" by feeding that commodity, either in whole or in large measure, to their hogs, thereby deteriorating the value of Canadian bacon. In this connection, the views of Prof. Robertson, the Dominion dairy commissioner, are quoted:

"I have found the best results to be obtained from using such grains (a mixture of peas, oats, barley and corn; or a mixture of peas, corn and bran) ground fine, and soaked for not less than 30 hours before they are fed. 1 think hogs should be kept so as to permit, and even to cause, them to take a good deal of exercise until after they weigh more than 100 pounds each. In the growing of young pigs it is important that they should receive a daily allowance of skim milk for six weeks or two months after they are weaned. Skim milk is the great fleshorming, or muscle and bone-forming food; and if the young pigs are stunted in these regards at that time they annot be developed into the best class of hogs, no matter what breed they may be of. In my judgment it is highly important that the quality of Canadian hogs, in regard to proportion maintained and improved, if the best


