The effect of this repeal will be that while the county may, if it so wishes, grant the townships the moneys provided in the bylaw, and the various townships may expend this grant under their own supervision, they will not, nor will the county, receive from the Government any portion of the moneys so expended, so that without the rebate of the one-third of the amount expended, which under the bylaw the Government gave the municipalities, the bylaw would be of little value either to the municipalities or the county. The county councilors feel that a serious injustice is being done in thus repealing the bylaw before they have a chance to work out its pro-

A Grievous Injustice.

Councilor Glass, when spoken to concerning the matter, said that the repeal of the bylaw at this particular time would impose a grievous injustice, as the county, acting in good faith under the bylaw, as it was enacted, passed at the last January sittings of the council the grant of \$9,000, to be apportioned to the municipalities pro rata according to assessment.
