# ARCHBISHOP O'CONNOR RESIGNS STATEMENT IS NOW DEFINITE

Toronto Paper Contains a Story Which Is Practically Confirmed Today in a Dispatch From Queen City---Also Stated Positively That Bishop McEvay Will Be Made Archbishop.

At the Bishop's palace in this city The Advertiser was informed that absolutely nothing is known of the reported resignation of His Grace the Archbishop of Toronto, and the rumored succession of His Lordship Bishop McEvay to the archbishopric.

A dispatch from Toronto, however, states definitedy that His Grace has resigned, and that within a month the Bishops will be called together to elect his successor.

The same dispatch also states that His Lordship Bishop McEvay will be the new Archbishop, and that while other names have been mentioned, it will be Bishop McEvay who will be chosen to go to Toronto.

STORY REITERATED. The Toronto Star had the following article on Monday evening:

Right Reverend Denis O'Connor, D. D., C. S. B., has resigned from the Archiepiscopal See of Toronto

The resignation was forwarded to Rome through the Papal Delegate at Ottawa, Most Rev. Donatus Sbarretti, D. D., and though no word has yet arrived stating it has been accepted, it is certain that such will take place, for so seldom is such a request made that it is done so for reasons so weighty that the Papal consent is invariably granted.

His Grace is at Collingwood today, where he administered confirma-

When spoken to about the matter, Vicar-General McCann said he knew nothing of the resignation. It did not come as a surprise, however, and only confirmed the rumors which have been going around for some

#### HIS GRACE'S HEALTH POOR.

It is understood that poor health is the principal reason advanced by His Grace for liberation from the duties of Archbishop.

In addition His Grace advanced personal reasons. It is known that when he was appointed Bishop of London he wrote to Rome asking to be allowed to remain a priest, but the late Pope Leo XIII. replied that it was his desire that he accept the see.

Similarly, when he was appointed Archbishop of Toronto he did not desire to accept the further duties, and it has always been his desire to get away from the burdens the control of a diocese necessarily entails.

#### WHAT HIS GRACE MAY DO.

His Grace is a member of the Brazilian Order, and when his successor is appointed he may betake himself to one of the order's houses. It is possible that he may make his residence at the novitiate in Deer Park, or he may station himself at St. Michael's College, or at Assumption College, Sandwich.

He will retain his title of Archbishop, however. This will mean that he will be appointed titular Bishop of some European see, to which no duties are attached.

Those conversant with His Grace would not be surprised were he to enter one of the stricter orders of the church, such as the Franciscans or Dominicans.

It is well known that he most austere in his mode of living, is much given to prayer and study, and would welcome a retreat in a monastic

If he takes such a step it will mean his departure to Montreal, for none of the monastic orders have houses in Ontario. WHO WILL SUCCEED?

Regarding his successor are mentioned the names of Right Reverend F. P. McEvay, D. D., Bishop of London, and Right Reverend D. J. Scollard, D. D., Bishop of Sault Ste. Marie.

It is worthy of note that both Archbishop O'Connor and his predecessor, Archbishop Walsh, came to this city from London, where they administered the diocese as bishop, and it would not be surprising if the next Archbishop of Toronto came from the same city.

The name of Bishop Scollard, however, is mentioned as a possible successor. He is the youngest bishop in Canada, having been appointed to the Diocese of Sault Ste. Marie in 1904. Though he is thoroughly conversant with the French language, it is said that the priests of the diocese, who are for the most part French, would prefer one of their own kind, and the raising of Bishop Scollard to the dignity of Archbishop would make way for such an appointment.

### FATHER TEEFY AS BISHOP.

In either case a vacancy will take place in the Ontario hierarchy, and to fill it the name of Rev. J. R. Teefy is persistently mentioned. Dr. Teefy, who for years was president of St. Michael's College, is one of the bestknown clergymen in Canada, and were he appointed Bishop the See would be well taken care of. Before the installation of Archbishop O'Connor, Dr. Teefy's name was mentioned as his possible successor, and now that His Grace has resigned the same is taking place. It is unlikely, however, that Dr. Teefy will be raised to the Arch bishopric without first having adminstered a diocese as bishop.

### HIS GRACE IS SILENT.

Collingwood, April 27 .- When your correspondent called upon His Grace Archbishop O'Connor he declined to be interviewed in regard to the report of his intended resignation. Rev. Father O'Leary, with whom he is staying while in Collingwood, stated that His Grace had nothing to say whatever in respect to the report. As far as he knew, the aged prelate was yet vigorous and full of enthusiasm for the work of his church, and he would undoubtedly continue in the work until the end.

#### SEEDING IN WESTERN ONTARIO

Seeding in Western Ontario is well along, fully seventy-five per cent of the grain being in the ground.

In the northern part of the Peninsula seeding is not so far advanced, but the lake counties are perhaps somewhat above the percentage.

The ground is in splendid condition for the seed, and if showers are at all as anticipated, there should be good crops this year.

The farmers are very hopeful, and in spite of the fact that the season has been somewhat cool so far, it has been excellent working weather. A few warm showers will overcome the difficulty.

Fall wheat is looking fine. Not for many years has there been so fine a prospect. Of course the acreage is not so large as formerly, but a fair acreage is sown. There are few bad spots and the grain is growing well.

The clover looks well—the best in four seasons. Little of it is winter killed, and most of it has a good start. Timothy is also looking first-class.

The pastures are coming along well. The grass has grown very fast during the past few days and there is now a good showing. Cattle will be turned out next week.

In Elgin County the corn land is being prepared, and the middle of May will see all that crop in. The ground is working splendidly for the crop.

If warm showers are at all frequent during the next month the farmers are assured of good crops.
