

CIVIC BOWLING GREENS PROPOSED

Toronto, July 28.-Ald. Welch has a new scheme for the recreation of the sons of toil in Toronto who have not the time nor the cash to enjoy themselves as richer men do in summer

He would establish civic bowling greens for the masses in the parks, and charge a small fee for the maintenance of them. "They do that in Edinburgh, Scotland, and they only charge two-pence per hour for a rink, which is one cent per man. This paid the cost of keeping them, and at the end of the season

the city had \$1,500 of a surplus," said the alderman. "Nowadays the workingmen can't afford to buy a bowling outfit, and they have no opportunity for sport or recreation. They have to sit on the front steps and smoke their pipes in the evenings. Toronto might easily establish bowling greens in Alexandra Park, St. Andrew's Square, and other playgrounds and parks where the population is congested. A charge of, say, 5 cents per hour would cover expenses. I am getting more data from Edinburgh, and I'll bring it before the city council in September."

Controller Hocken says the scheme is one of the best recreation plans yet outlined for the mass of the people.

NELSON RIVER ROUTE THE MOST FAVORED

For a Government Road From Winnipeg to Hudson

Ottawa, Ont., July 27. - Mr. M. J Butler, deputy minister of railways and canals, leaves next week for Winnipeg and Western Canada, for an inspection trip over all the new railways building under Government subsidy between Winnipeg and the coast. At Winnipeg Mr. Butler will meet Chief Engineer Armstrong, of Hudson Bay Railway survey, and will go over reports of field parties that have now practically completed surveys of the two aternate routes, via Churchill and Nelson Rivers. Reports sent in to the department, so far, all seem to favor the Nelson River route. The engineers intrusted with the

drafting of plans for the new Quebec bridge are expected to meet in Quebec on Aug. 6 to confer as to their final report, to be made to the Minister of Railways. It is hoped that the plans for the new structure will be completed in time to allow of calling for tenders next winter.

OUSTED FROM OFFICE

Twenty-five Thousand Turkish Clerks To Be Dismissed.

Constantinople, July 27. - The ewspapers announce that 27,000 officers and officials will be dismissed or retired on pension by the retrenchment cheme of the new Government. These include the hundreds of hangers-on at Turkish ministries and the followers of the late sultan, who are a little rmy in themselves.

Of late years the monthly pay list of the treasury had swollen to nearly \$1,

Thus, at the ministry of public works there were nearly a thousand clerks, where a hundred would have been amply sufficient. So great was the overcrowding that there was never room for all to be present at the same time, and the clerks, therefore, used to divide into batches, which relieved each other weekly.



Hudson's Bay Company Mulcted in Beaver Skin Case.

North Bay, July 28,-Three thousand two hundred and forty dollars was the fine imposed upon the Hudson's Bay Company yesterday by Police Magistrate Weegar, on a charge of having unlawful possession of fif teen beaver and thirty-nine otter skins on June 29 last. 


