### Three Ways to Cook Peaches

Peach and Coccanut Cream.—Remove the milk from the interior of a large coccanut and place where it will become cold; meanwhile press through a fruit sieve a quart of peaches that have been pared and sliced (reserve a few bits for garnishing); add to these a cup of confectioner's sugar and place directly on lee. At serving time add to the fruit a plach of powdered cinnamon, one plant of stiffly-whipped cream, add sufficient ieed milk to the coccanut milk to form two quarts; mix and serve from pitcher in which has been placed a pint of cracked ice, dusting the top thickly with grated nutmer, garnish with sheed peaches.

Peach Pie.-For two pics use eight Peach Pie.—For two pies use eight halves of peaches, three eggs heaten well, one tenspoon of cinnamon, one-half teaspoon of nutureg, one-fourth teaspoon of allspice, one pint of milk or one cup of milk and one cup of peach judge, one-half cup syrup or three-fourths cup broken cugar. Mix well together. Bake in moderate oven, crust and mixture together.

Peach Roll.—Make a rich biscuit dough, cut it into pieces of even size and roll each piece out thin. Spread with thinly-sliced ripe peaches, sprinkle well with sugar, add several small bits of butter to each portion, then roll up and pinch the ends together. Place in a deep pan, add one cup of sugar and one-half cup of butter to every four rolls; pour in hot water enough to just cover the dough and bake in a hot oven one-half hour.



# Paper Bag Cookery

These Cooking Bags are now available by mail or at The London Advertiser Office in quantity and at cost, as stated on coupon, which must be clipped out and presented or sent with order. A Paper Bag Cooking Coupon will be found in every issue of The London Advertiser as long as the bags are on sale.

### Directions---How to Use Cooking Bags:

1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked. 2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the case of vegetables, or when water is to be added.

3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag while you insert the contents.

4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing.

Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer it with contents undisturbed to another bag.

5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average even heat should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the oven this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a

6. The oven door will not require to be opened every now and then "to see how the roast is doing." The whole force of the heat is playing upon the bag and from within

7. Exercise care in taking the bag out of the oven, and if gas is used the bag should be kept out of danger of contact with the flame. A plate inserted under the bag will best remove it from

8. When taken out for use the bag should be ripped open from the top and the fragments thrown away.
