FRENCH DEMAND **SOVIET EXODUS** FROM RUSSIA

Condition To Rescuing Country

TERRIBLE CONDITIONS

Authors of Frightful Cataclysm Must Be Thrown

Paris, Sept. 13 .- There is a growing demand in France that the famine relief to Russia be accompanied by the exodus of Bolsheviki from power Whether as preliminary conditions, or whether as attendant circumstance or whether as ultimate result is not considered so important, the French believe Russia is suffering much less from drought than from the Soviets and that other nations owe

much less from drought than from the Soviets and that other nations owe it to Russia and to themselves to see that Russia is not in the same plight again next year. And they believe that Russia's sorry condition can best be remedied by removing the causes—namely, Lenine and Trotzky.

Communist circles in France say the bourgeois officials are trying to make a change in their Government the price to starving Russians of a piece of bread. That is unfair, French statesmen have for two years consistently fought the Soviets, first by arms and then by diplomacy. They have always held that the Soviet regime would bring to sorrow any country that embraced it. That belief has been back of the rigid suppression of Bolshevism in France and their effort to discourage it in Russia. The supreme council will consider Russia next week, and it goes without saying that compassion for the starving Sussians will ge accompanied by consideration of whether the means are offered to end the activities of the rule of Moscow. For the past two or three days French newspapers have been publishing voluminous stories of the horrors of the Bolsheviki regime beside the most recent reports of famine and cholera. More than that, a good many editors have come right out and say that it is perfectly all right for other nations to tax themselves to feed the starving Russians, but that they might as well make a complete job of it and remove the fountain head of Russia's

Only three of the fourteen chief Euro-Only three of the fourteen chief Edio-pean gold holding countries showed a diminution in their gold stocks from January 1 to July 1, and these losses were relatively slight, their combined total amounting to less than \$12,000,000. This loss was more than offset by gains among the other eleven countries, the among the other eleven countries, the net increase of the fourteen combined amounting to \$1,199,000.

Yet between January 1 and July 1, the Yet between January 1 and July 1, the gold stock held by the Federal reserve banks in the United States increased by \$402.601,000, or nearly 20 per cent of the \$2,059,330,000 they held the first of the year, almost two-thirds of the increase being made up by the gold from European shipping points, the rest coming from non-European and domestic sources.

coming from non-European and domestic sources.

An analysis of this gold movement shows that present European gold reserves are not being drained to swell America's holdings but that shipments are chiefly accounted for by newlymined supplies from Africa coming by way of London; of gold yielded up by India, also coming by way of London; and of metal thought to have originated from Russian sources.

The movement of gold from Russia to the United States is not definitely traceable. It is thought to have come


