s generally understood If a Canadian born citizen goes to, let us say, the United States, and takes out naturalization papers as required by the law of that country, he incurs at once a heavy penalty under our statute of 1919. He may return; but he cannot recover his rights as a native born Canadian for five years. If he does return, at the end of two years automatically ceases to be an American citizen, and thus for three years he is a man without

He is permitted to come within our borders; but for five years he must bear the mark of a man who, o far as citizenship is concerned, has no rights. 
