

Rome, Aug. 14.-Vesuvius is again causing intense alarm in the surrounding region, the eruption of the volcano being very heavy yesterday From a fresh opening at the base of the principal crater two streams of lava are issuing, which within a few hours covered a wide tract of ground One stream is going swiftly towards the village of Ottajano, the direction taken by the famous eruption of 1872 The whole district around the volcano is shaken by frequent earth shocks, and a panic prevails, the population are crowding the churches to pray or gathering in open spaces for safety. Experts affirm that so far there is no reason to fear a serious disaster.
