## MIKADO'S LITTLE 'UNS AGAINST HEAVIEST THRASHED THE RUSSIANS

A Bow-to-Bow Fight in Which Three Jap Destroyers Met and Routed Six of Enemy's.

### JAP'S SHELLS MAKE PORT ARTHUR A CITY OF DEATH

Russian Report Says Sixty-Five Were Killed in the City-Jap Gunners Show Marvellous Accuracy-Mikado's Tars Rescue Crew of Sinking Russ Destroyer.

Port Arthur by the Japanese fleet on March 10, which reached Tokio late Saturday, says: "Our squadron, prearranged, attacked the enemy at Port Arthur on March 10. Our two flotillas attacked the mouth of the harbor at Port Arthur at 1 o'clock on the morning of the 10th. Finding no enemy, we waited until dawn, one flotilla engaged in sinking special mines in the harbor entrance. Notwithstanding the enemy's fire, our flotilla succeeded in sinking the mines. The other flotilla met the enemy's torpedo flotilla, consisting of six boats, in Liao Thie Shan channel, south of Port Arthur, at 4:30 o'clock. A hot engagement occurred at close range for thirty minutes. The enemy then took to flight. Our fire greatly damaged the Russian ships, one of which was hadly crippled by a shot through the boilers, and another was observed to be on fire. So close were the two flotillas to each other that our destroyers, the Asashio, Kasumbi and Akat-suki, nearly touched the enemy's ships, crews could even hear the eries of agony of injured men on them. ### THE WAR SITUATION.

Sensational rumors are flying about to the European capitals that Port Arthur has been evacuated or captured by the Japs. Dalny is reported destroyed although whether by the Japs or Russians as preliminary to evacuation is not made clear. New Chwang is threatened with an army of 10,000 Japanese. Later reports of the torpedo flotilla fight at Port Arthur and the bembardment of the strenghold show that Russia has suffered heavily. Russians military and naval efficers at Port Arthur have quarreled, the latter being accused of cowardice. Harbin. the Russian base in Manchuria, is threatened with a famine of food and fuel. A strong Russian squadron is preparing to sail to the Far East early in May. It is again said the Czar is to command the forces in person. The day's news all points to a collapse of Russian operations, although it must be remembered that few of the dispatches are official. Nothing definite is known of Jap operations in Korea, the censorship being as rigid

Washington, March 12. - The only witness on the stand yesterday in the investigation of the Senator Reed Smoot case before the senate committee on privileges and elections, was E. B. Critchlow, former assistant United States attorney for Utah. He continued his history of the Mormon Church, detailing instances where the high officials of the church have manifested their power over the members in order to compel obedience in all matters and where excommunication

Mr. Critchlow stated a case at Brigham City, where a controversy arose between leaders of the church and the people. Mormons and non-Mormons over municipal affairs. The people of Brigham City were demanding municipal ownership for an electric light plant and this was opposed by the mayor, who took the case to Charles Kelly, president of the state. According to the story of Mr. Critchlow, who announced that his story came from a man opposed to formation of the Kelly company, Mr. Kelly then received a revelation from the Lord to the effect that a company should be formed to take the lighting plant and that he should be the president of the concern. The revelation was submitted to the general conference at Brigham City and was there rejected. Many of the Mormons who opposed the transaction were disfellowshipped.


