



There was a large number of railroad contractors present. It is understood the bids place the cost of the road from Trail to Robson close on to \$600,000, but whether this is for a narrow or standard

guage line cannot be learnt. When General Superintendent Gutelius was seen by your correspondent, at 11 o'clock he said: "There is nothing I can give out for publication. Mr. Gifford of New York, Mr. Heinze's partner in the railroad will arrive on the steamer tomorrow evening and the matter will remain in abeyance until then. I expect the contract will be let at that time and as soon as it is I will give you all the information about the new road that






