The Canadian Order of Foresters

This purely Canadian fraternal benevolent and insurance society was organized in 1879 and now has a membership of upwards of 40,000, distributed in every province of the Dominion, to which its operations are confined. The society gives insurance to its members in policies of \$500, \$1000, \$1500 or \$2000, the latter sum being the limit on any life. The premiums, payable monthly in advance, are as follows:

Table with columns: Between the On On On, ages of, \$500 \$1000 \$1500 \$2000. Rows: 18 to 25, 25 to 30, 30 to 35, 35 to 40, 40 to 45.

After paying upwards of one million and three-quarters in death claims the Order had a surplus in the insurance department of \$2,001,000 at the end of January last, all of which is invested in gilt-edged securities in Canada, or is on deposit in the best monetary institutions of the country. Not a dollar of the surpluses collected for the insurance fund is or has been used for the expenses of management.

The death rate per 1000 of membership in 1898 was 4.2, and for 1899, 4.43, and since the organization of the society, the average death rate has been only 4.92.

The Sick and Funeral Benefit Branch is a very popular department and upwards of 22,000 of the members of the society are participating in this feature of the order. The benefits are \$3 per week the first two weeks of illness, and \$5 per week for the following ten weeks, altogether \$56 during any one year, besides a funeral benefit of \$50. In case of continued illness \$5 is paid each year in sick benefits. The fees, monthly in advance, are as follows:

During the year 1900 over \$65,000 were paid out in sick and funeral benefits, and \$195,000 in death benefits. All physically and morally qualified males, between the ages of 18 and 45 years, who are not disqualified on account of occupation, are accepted for membership.

I am told that the nationalization of the telegraph systems of Canada is to come up this session. If the nationalization principle is once begun it will not be long until it has spread over the whole field of public franchise. There is no reason why we should not have a national telegraph system as well as a postal system—and if the carrying of letters and transmission of telegrams, why not the carrying of passengers and of freight? The twentieth century will see many of the franchises now owned and operated by the Governments Federal and Provincial, and by the different municipalities. And when that time comes it is to be hoped that public business will be conducted more on the lines of private business. If any private institution were run as our Government would be in the bankrupt court twice in a year.—Events Ottawa.

Capt. and Mrs. W. Folker having sold out their estate at Serwick moved to Hantsport on Saturday. For the present they will occupy the tenement on the bank at the foot of William St., lately vacated by Mr. John Reid.

We notice the "Beckwith" House a hotel at Bass River, is for sale. This hotel has been conducted by Mr Samuel Beckwith a native of Hantsport. Mr. Beckwith has been in the Klondike Country the past few years.

Mr. Leonard V. Marsters of Summersville, will be found in Windsor on Thursday with his team, or will be at Hantsport with ferry boat, for the conveyance of passengers and freight. His boat has been crossing regularly to Hantsport since Feb. 27th.

The Dominion Steel Shipbuilding Co. with a capital of \$3,000,000 is seeking incorporation through the Local Legislature. They may build in Halifax, and claim the \$200,000 subsidy offered by that city.

CONSERVATIVES POLICY

The policy of the Liberal-Conservative party is thus set forth in a resolution of which the leader of the opposition gave notice in the house last week. It is as follows:

"That in the opinion of this house the welfare of this country requires a pronounced policy of adequate protection and encouragement of all times to the labor, agricultural, manufacturing, mining and other industrial interests of Canada.
That in the opinion of this house the adoption of a policy of mutual trade preference within the empire would prove of great benefit to the mother country and to the colonies and would greatly promote the prosperity, unity and progress of the empire as a whole; and that the present time, when the Commonwealth of Australia is laying the foundation of its fiscal system, is particularly opportune for taking prompt and energetic steps towards the furtherance of this object.
This house is further of opinion that equivalent or adequate duties should be imposed by Canada upon the products and manufactures of all countries not within the empire in all cases where such countries fail to admit Canadian products and manufactures upon fair terms, and that the government should take for this purpose all such available measures as may be found necessary."

Founded upon the policy of the Liberal Conservative party, as laid down in 1876, 1877 and 1878 by Sir John Macdonald, the foregoing platform will certainly meet with the approbation of the party throughout the Dominion.

BUDGET SPEECH

"Millions for capital expenditure, not one cent for the reduction of the taxation of the people." This will be found by reading the Budget speech of the Finance Minister which was delivered last Thursday. It was the shortest on record taking but one hour and a half to be delivered. In opening it did not touch in every department of industry there was a gratifying activity.
While Canada has been favored with prosperity what has been done to reduce the debt of the country? Instead of being conducted on a basis of a government of the people and by them, money has been spent freely in the interests of party heeled who assisted the government being put back for another four years. Some thirty millions have been taken from the pockets of the people and instead of being used to reduce the debt it has helped to put on. It can be readily seen that had financing is the fault of the government and that it is telling upon those who intended to prosper by it. Every day demands for money keep pouring in and to supply them the minister levies millions for extra taxation. A surplus of eight million is handed us while the public debt is nearly two million larger than last year.

Mr. Fielding takes credit for remitting customs taxation to the amount of \$3,292,230 a year, or 1.87 percent out of the whole rate of 18.28 percent collected on imports for home consumption in 1896. We do not think that is a very satisfactory achievement in view of the magnificent opportunity which offered. For the current fiscal year, which closes on June 30 next, Mr. Fielding estimates that the total revenue will amount to \$51,029,994 and the ordinary expenditure to \$42,975,279, showing a surplus of \$8,054,715 for the year. This large surplus is a matter for congratulation, as it indicates, prosperity, but it would be a matter for further satisfaction were it intended to be applied to the relief of the people from the unnecessary taxation which it implies. In view of it, the taxation on coal oil, on farming machinery, upon other necessities

of the people might have been lowered or abolished. But the government has no such purpose. The coal oil and all others duties are to remain unlightened, but the whole of the surplus and more in addition is to be spent. Ten million seven hundred thousand dollars are to be spent upon capital account before the end of the year, so that the surplus will all be gone, and an addition of \$1,800,000 will be added to the national debt.

To make this one long to be remembered by the aged couple, their children from the States, relatives and friends throughout the province and town assembled to participate in the happy event. All the children were present with the exception of one who resides in the West.

The interior of the house was very tastefully decorated in yellow and many jonquils added to the artistic effect. The guests were served by Misses Alice Chipman, Hattie Moore, Roberta Blanchard, Laura Chipman and Alice Pabli cover, while Mrs. C. H. Day served tea etc.

The happy couple were recipients of many valuable presents which were all arranged on a table. Over \$100 in gold coin was received.

One present Mrs. Masters received was a gold embroidered scarf from Mrs. West who now resides in the Western States. She was the bridemaid for Mrs. Masters, being at that time Miss Woodbury of Wilmot.

The music of the evening was furnished by Mrs. Pyke on the piano and Mr. Enoch Harrington on the violin.

Mr. Charles Andrew Masters was born at Kentville on May 4th, 1823, and is thus seventy-eight years old on his next birthday. He is the son of Silas Woodworth Masters and Rebecca Rand, whose family numbered 13. Mr. Masters is the eighth son in a family of eleven, all now dead except his sisters, Mary (Mrs. E. Tupper) now living at Minneapolis, and Rebecca A. (Mrs. Jas. A. Calkin,) now living with her daughter, Mrs. G. V. Lansing at New York.

Mr. Master's great grandfather, Abraham emigrated from Salem, Mass., to Falmouth, Nova Scotia, arriving there on November 15th, 1760 in company with his two brothers and many other emigrants. He drew lot of land No. 74. The emigration at that date was in response to large tracts of land offered by the British Government made vacant by the expulsion of the Acadians.

Mr. Masters is the oldest man now living in Kentville, who was born in the town. He has always been identified, particularly in younger and middle life, with the development and growth of the town, and is today one of its most respected citizens.

On March 17, 1851 he married Miss Charlotte G. Morse, daughter of Beniah Morse of Berwick. They were married at Wilmot by the Rev. Ingram Hill. After the ceremony they drove to Kentville where they took up their abode. Mrs. Masters was born in 1833.

Her life had been during these many years most exemplary as wife and mother—always striving to encourage by word and deed the best and noblest qualities in those around her.

Throughout life Mrs. Masters has been a most devoted member, as also Mr. Masters, of the Baptist Church, always most active and foremost in every phase of Church work. She has

also been a most staunch advocate of temperance.

4th. Labor—The plant is constructed with every modern labor-saving device, and after that interval of time necessary to get every new plant well organized in its labor department, our cost sheet will challenge comparison with that of any steel plant elsewhere.

5th. Cost of Production—I am confirmed in my opinion, after expressing the value of the by-products from the coke ovens, the cost of our pig iron should not exceed \$5.50 per ton after everything has been reduced to steady practice. The quality is all that could be desired. In conclusion, we are safe in counting upon a reasonable profit from the start and a handsome increase in the same as the product reaches its maximum.

Value of Export

The United States is now the greatest exporting nation in the world. We export \$35,000,000 more than the United Kingdom, but our population is greater by thirty-six million. We export \$400,000,000 more than Germany, but our population is twenty-four millions greater than hers.

The increase of French exports in the twenty-five years has been only five per cent. The British increase has been thirty-four per cent. The German increase has been seventy-three per cent, which may be regarded as little short of phenomenal, and as presaging a close rivalry between Germany and Great Britain for the primacy in European commerce.

Germany's rapid increase in population, the beneficent effects of the imperial union, and the aggressive colonial and commercial policy which the Government has consistently pursued. But, finally, the United States has made an increase of no less than 192 per cent.

Those figures make our rate of increase of population, great as that has been, seem petty by contrast. If the same ratios should be maintained by these four nations for the next quarter of a century their order would be the same that it is today, though Germany would almost have caught up with Great Britain. But the United States would then have an export trade much greater than those of Great Britain and Germany put together, and almost equal to theirs and that of France combined.—Ex.

THE STRATHCONAS

The following stories are going the rounds: A Strathcona trooper was captured by Boers and he was brought before DeWet; the latter asked him what right had he as a Canadian to do battle with them, when their fight was with England. The Canadian, facing him boldly and prefacing his remarks with a most expressive ejaculation said:—"Don't you know you are fighting the British Empire, and Canada is the biggest part?" DeWet smiled.

The Canadians have many stories to tell, illustrative of the independence and daring of the Strathconas. The daring cow boy was brought before the commanding officer for so humiliating one of Her Majesty's officers. Upon being asked why he had done so, he replied: "Well, he asked me what it was for, and that was the quickest way to explain it."
