**RECEPTION TO  
RETURNED SOLDIERS**

We regret a delay in receipt of report of a reception held at Port Williams in honor of their hero soldier boys' invalided home from duty.

Port Williams has done a noble part in this fight for liberty and right. Three of her sons are home, another now languishes in a German detention camp and the others are doing their duty in the trenches or in training.

Those who returned recently were Lance Corp. Vere Kindston son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Kidston and John C. Graves. The latter had contracted rheumatism and had to return home. Corporal Kidston was wounded in September last at the battle of the Somme a piece of shell passing through his nose and destroying his right eye. After a period in the hospital in which various operations were performed Mr. Kidston came home showing little of his terrible wounds and suffering. He did his part nobly and won a medal for conspicuous bravery on the field. He modestly refrains from mention of what particular action he did, saying they just gave him the medal and there was nothing special about it.

After these boys returned a reception was tendered them in Citizen's Hall at which a fine program was given, refreshments served. Warden Campbell was chairman, and spoke in most feeling terms of the efforts of the boys. Mr. Donaldson father of another boy fighting with the Princess Pats, also gave a fine address. Lance Corporal Kidston replied to the addresses in a short and most interesting address.

French snail farmers are making a tidy fortune out of the war. More than half the French supply of this delicacy has been cut off by the German occupation of Luxembourg, Belgium and Northern France and the market price has risen accordingly. The demand for snails has also been stimulated by the new food regulations which class snails with oysters as a "hors d'oeuvre," of which one may eat as much as one wishes. As many as half a million first quality snails worth \$5 to \$10 a thousand can be reared on an acre of land. They have to be fed only once a day preferably in the evening. A bed of 100,000 snails will consume a wagon load of cabbage in a few minutes and the noise which they make at their repast is like nothing else in the world.

**May Look for Increase in the Intensity of the Fighting.**

London, March 31—Both British and French troops today have apparently arrived before the "Hindenburg line." Field Marshal Haig reported British infantry "in contact with the whole new German front"—from Arras to near St. Quentin. The same phrase "in contact" was used in the French official several days ago to describe the position of General Nevill's forces. The French line extends from around St. Quentin down to Soisson. From now on London looks to see a vast increase in the intensity of the fighting, as the concentrated infantry of the Anglo-French forces are hurled against the German positions.

Battle front despatches today indicated that both British and French forces are still pounding away at their respective "wedges," inserted into the German lines. Artillery firing is increasing along almost the entire front.

**WILL WE HAVE GERMAN INVASION FROM THE STATES**

NEW YORK, MARCH 23.—A DESPATCH TO THE TRIBUNE FROM HARTFORD (CON.) SAYS:

Men hostile to the interests of the United States are holding regular nightly drill in Hartford and other parts of Connecticut, Governor Marcus Holcomb said, in an address before the Hartford Inter-Churchmen's Association yesterday.

That is one reason, he went on to explain, why he has hurried through the legislature the emergency measure for the protection of property in Connecticut—"The arsenal of the nation."

In the last few weeks the governor has provided for the establishment of a home guard and has had a census taken of the human and individual resources of the state. He amazed his audience yesterday by stating flatly that Connecticut was facing the peril of an attack from within its own borders.

Dr. David Webster announced the marriage of his niece, Miss Annie Albert Webster, to Mr. William Shepherd Dana, of New York City, on Monday, the first day of January, 1917, at Lexington, Mass. Mr. and Mrs. Dana will be at home after the first day of May, 1917, at their residence in New York. Miss Webster is the daughter of the late Albert A. Webster, of Cambridge. Mrs. (Capt.) E. F. Graves, Mrs. J. E. Kinsman, Mrs. J. M. Cross, of Kentville, Mrs. A. Len Brown, of Brooklyn Street, and Mrs. (Rev.) A. D. MacKinnon, of Lunenburg, are sisters of the bride. Another sister, Mrs. N. T. Bowles, resides in Biggar, Sask.

**Another German Raider at Work**

Rio Janeiro, March 30—The French barque Cambonne has arrived here with 200 men of the crews of various steamers and sailing ships sunk by a German raider off the island of Trinidad. They report that many sailors from the sun vessels were drowned.

### BELGIANS IN GERMAN CAMPS DYING FROM STARVATION

HAVRE, March 27—The Belgian Government has received by trustworthy means letters from responsible Belgians who have been deported to Germany. The letters, dated at the end of February or early in March, were written from the camps in which the men are being confined. Some passages follow:

"Since Feb. 1 we have had only two meals a day. The one in the evening has been discontinued. That was the best one, because we had corn."

From another letter: "It is frightful here. We are dying of famine. We have a ration of bread, water and beets. That is all. We are skeletons covered with skin. Thirteen were counted in the morgue yesterday and fourteen today. That is from among the 3,000 or 4,000 here. Conditions are more frightful in the — and — camps. If anyone give us a little soup or something else to eat he is punished with five days in prison."

From another letter: "The situation becomes more unendurable from day to day. Every morning two or three dead are found in the auto. The doctors decline all responsibility. Today 120 are dead at Camp —. We hope for our deliverance by the great offensive."

#### No Liquor on Kings Table

London, March 30th.—It is no longer according to etiquette to place any wine or liquors on the table whenever King George is a guest at military messes or with the fleet, says the Spectator, which is conducting an active campaign for prohibition during the war. The King's orders barring the use of alcoholic beverages in his places during the war is being adhered to rigidly. No wine is served even at dinner parties at Buckingham Palace or Windsor.

The Spectator recalls the fact that after the Kings accident in France, when he was thrown from his horse, his physicians prescribed a small amount of wine. As soon as the doctor's orders were withdrawn, however, the King renewed his abstinence.

#### General Maude Sweeps on North of Bagdad

London, April 1st.—After a fortnight's silence news comes today of General Maude's further advance northeast of Bagdad. The advance was accompanied by considerable difficulty on account of the tedious work of bridging a number of small rivers and canals. The Turks put up a desperate battle, but nevertheless Sharobankzil and Robat, on the route to Khanikan, was captured by General Maude's troops. The British are only 25 miles from Chanikan.

General Maude also reports progress in his force, proceeding in three different lines thru the rich country, while the Turks defeated at Kut have been reinforced 36 miles west of Bagdad. On the route it is evident that the Turks have been stiffened up by fresh units, but there is every reason to hope that the approaching junction of the British and Russian forces will result in new captures of the Turks.

Major Morant, the famous German Military writer, who declared that the retreat of the German army in France was a notable success, is not pleased with neutral comment on his judgement. He insists that the retreat was a bold strategic move, and nothing else. By the same token, says an American correspondent, if the Germans again retreat after the enemy's lines have been reformed, another German victory will be achieved. If repeated often enough the Germans will victoriously find themselves out of Belgium and Luxemburg as well as out of France.

Hants Journal—Major C. H. Morris is now en route home, his wife having received a cable announcing his departure from England for Canada. It is expected the Major will arrive the latter part of the week.

#### TRANSPORT SINKING, WHOLE REGIMENT CHEERFULLY SANG

LONDON, March 28.—The British transport Tyndareus, with a battalion of the Middlesex Regiment aboard, struck a mine on February 9 off Cape Agulhas, the southernmost point of Africa. The men were paraded on deck, and after roll call began to sink while they waited for the ship to sink.

The Tyndareus, however, was saved, and the troops were transferred to two rescuing steamers, having upheld, as expressed in the official admiralty report, "the cherished tradition of the Birkenhead."

The admiralty issued tonight the following statement on the incident:

"The admiralty transport Tyndareus, with a battalion of the Middlesex Regiment aboard, struck a mine in the evening of February 9, off Cape Agulhas. A strong southwesterly gale was blowing, and immediately after the explosion the ship began to settle by the head, with propellers out of the water.

"Assembly" was sounded, and the men donned lifebelts and paraded in perfect order. Roll was called, and upon the order "stand easy," the whole battalion began to sing.

"Two steamers, despatched to the rescue, arrived on the scene within half an hour. During this trying time, although faced by the probability of imminent death, the troops maintained steadfast courage and discipline. News of the tradition of the British army more worthily upheld than on this occasion.

"Thanks to the devotion and perseverance of the captain and the officers the ship was saved. The troops were transferred to the two steamers and taken to Simonstown, where the Tyndareus subsequently returned under her own steam with two holds flooded and another leaking.

"The King has graciously expressed his deep admiration for the conduct of all ranks in upholding the cherished tradition of the Birkenhead."

If he accepts he will be here the first of May. Mr. Kennedy has a wife and one daughter. — Hants Journal.

The newspapers declare that candy containing germs of epidemic diseases, fatal to any person eating it and handbags and pocketbooks filled with dangerous, explosives, which detonate on contact, have been cast down by German fliers.

### The LONGEST TUNNEL IN AMERICA OPENED

Its mileage is 18,233, viz: C. P. R. and lines worked, 13,377; owned and controlled, 4,856. Its equipment is valued at \$506,577,255.25, not including ocean, lake and river steamers. Its equipment includes 2,255 locomotives; 2,781 passenger cars; 87,108 freight cars, and other cars, 8,287. It has 65,000 employees with a monthly pay roll of \$3,625,000 in 1916. It carried 13,832,978 passengers in 1916. Its capital stock is \$260,000,000; preferred \$90,681,921; debenture stock \$176,284,852; mortgage bonds \$6,389,180. It has given 7,000 men to the British Empire; 179 have been killed and 408 have been reported as wounded. It has 12,500 miles of pole lines and 102,700 miles of wires. It has a fleet of 59 steamers, exclusive of the Atlantic service: Great Lakes, 5; ferry service, 2; B. C. Lake and River, 24; B. C. coast service, 26; Bay of Fundy service, 2. Its gross earnings, according to the annual report in 1916, were \$129,481,585; expenses, \$90,255,965; net earnings, \$49,225,620. Its ocean services include Canadian Pacific Trans-Atlantic, Trans-Pacific Lines and Allan Line. It circles the world by land and sea. The irrigation project of the company in Alberta will irrigate portions of a tract of 3,000,000 acres of land, east of Calgary. The western section, comprising 1,699 miles of canals and ditches providing for the irrigation of 370,000 acres of land has been completed. The great irrigation dam of Beasane, Alberta, built by the C. P. R., was opened April 25, 1914. It is 7,400 feet in length and contains more than a million cubic feet of earth and concrete. The Canadian Pacific Railway has seen Canada increase from 4,000,000 population to 8,000,000; it has seen capital wealth increase from a few millions to \$2,320,000,000; it has seen 3,500 miles of railway lengthened to 35,800 miles, with annual salaries and wages of \$111,762,972; it has seen scientific farming produce million dollar crops, tremendous strides in medicine and surgery and a transformation in social conditions. It has seen the trade of Canada develop for 12 months in 1916 to \$2,025,660,738, an increase of \$881,214,237 over 1915. Canada has seen eight Governor-Generals since the Canadian Pacific Railway began operation. They were the Marquis of Lorne, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Minto, Earl Grey, Duke of Connaught and Duke of Devonshire. The following premiers have held power since its inception: Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir John Abbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert L. Borden; and the great railway company has seen Canada come third in the world's wheat crop estimates in 1916, with 376,205,690 bushels and 711,681 occupiers take farms and holdings.

London, March 30.—In answer to questions from the representatives of the Associated Press concerning German submarine activities, Sir Edward Carson, First Lord of the Admiralty, said:

"German statements are exaggerated, but no one suggests that submarine warfare does not cause very serious damage, both to neutrals and belligerents. The losses, however, do not exceed the estimates on which we have based our policy, and after the most careful consideration it is abundantly clear that German hopes of starving us out are quite illusory. So far neutral countries have suffered more from German methods than have belligerents."

The British Armies in the Field, April 3rd — An entire German Battalion massing for an attack against the advancing British Forces east of Templeux, was mangled by the British artillery today. The British forces continued to make progress in the neighborhood of St. Quentin, despite the sudden fling back into wintry weather. Dawn today saw eight inches of snow and a high wind which piled the drifts five feet in some places.
