

Any person who shall sell or give, or cause to be sold or given, any cigars, cigarettes, smoking or chewing tobacco, snuff, or any other form or preparation of tobacco or opium for smoking, to any person, having reasonable cause to believe such person to be under the age of sixteen years, shall on conviction thereof, in a summary way, before any two justices of the peace or a stipendiary magisin a summary way, before any two justices of the peace or a stipendiary magistrate, be liable to a fine not greater than the sam of twenty dollars for each flence under this section; and in case of a fine, or a fine and costs being awarded, and of the same not being upon conviction forthwith pald, the justice may commit the offender to the common gaol, there to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding thirty days, unless the fine and costs are sooner paid.
