The speed at which Canadian products can be put on the market in England was strikingly



The Depártment of Colonization and Development of the Canadian Pacific Railway for any in Europe. The apples came from various Canadian provinces, and it is interesting that some of them actually left the producer and were on show in less than eight days. For instance, the Ontario consignment left Trenton, Ontario, at 2 a.m., November, by C.P.R., arrived Montreal at 8 a.m., left at 9 a.m., and arrived Quebec at 2 p.m. They were immediately placed on board the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Britain," which arrived Liverpool on Tuesday morning, Nov. 8. 



POULTRY WORLD HALL OF FAME

A short time ago the death of White Wyandotte hen No. B-162 occurred. Since this hen has had so much to do with the present high production in our strain of White Wyandottes now kept at this Station, her name deserves a place in the hall of fame of the poultry world, and her achieve ment told in story.

No. B-162 was hatched May 1st. 1917, and laid her first egg October 30th, 1917, being 182 days old. Her total record was: 1st year 257 eggs, 2nd year 153 eggs, 3rd year 107 eggs 4th year 4 eggs, making a total of 521 eggs. Of these 86 were laid in the winter of the second, 32 during the winter of the first year, 34 during



the fourth. At time of laving her first egg, her body weight was 5¼ pounds. Her eggs averaged 2 ounces to the dozen. That her pullets inherited her high

producing qualities was evidenced by their production. In 1919, twelve of her pullets gave an average of 232 eggs, the individual production being







Now, what is the best method of handling such land? It is useless to say "apply manure" because the farmer has already applied elsewhere all the manure that has been produced. As the land is usually far from the buildings and often poorly drained. it ould be unwise to plant corn or ots and to include it in the rotation used on the land near the buildings. The present practice is more prefer ble than that, but is the presen practice the best possible one.

rom the results of definite experients, that an impresement can be made in the present practice which will result in increased profits. One mprovement which is widely known but poorly followed, is surface drainage. The removal of surface water. by care in plowing and attention to outlets, materially improves the tilth of the soil and, in some years, greatly increases the crop vield. Another improvement which may be adopted in many districts is the growing of alfalfa. If a few pounds of alfalfa are included in the ordinary hay mixture one can learn at small expense when her alfalfa will grow profitably. If it will grow, it will be found to mater ially increase the yield of hay. Finally, as there ip not enough farm man ure. commercial fertilizers may

hay and timothy hay, application of fertilizers were as follows: on the mangels, 300 pounds superphosphate, 75 pounds muriate of potash and 100 pounds nitrate of soda: on each of the oats, clover, and timothy crops 'to pounds of nitrate of soda per acre sere appred. For the five year period, from 1916 to 1920, the total cost of these fertilizers on four acres of land, was \$142.32; the value of the increased crop over unmanured land was \$318.03; the net profit was \$175.71. Figured on the basis of one acre, the net profit was \$8.78 per year When one considers the extensive areas of land which never receive manure, it might be well worth while to plan to use some commercial fertilizers. If a small area were tried first, it would enable a farmer to decide whether such applications were profitable. The most profitable use of commercial fertilizers requires prudent buying and intelligent practice in making applications to the land. In Eastern Canada, including On tario and the provinces eastward, there are approximately 20,761,000 acres under cultivation, of which 9,686,000 acres are in hay. The live stock in these provinces can produce during the winter months only about 50 million tons of manure, an amoun insufficient to cover the entire area under cultivation when applied in any ordinary length of rotation. For this reason, extensive areas, estimated between one-quarter and one-half the entire area, never receive any applica tion of manure whatever. Such land is usually far removed from the farm buildings; it is left m hay and


