THE NOBBY TAILORS.

Text of the French Bishops' Declaration.

Following is the text of the declaration of the French Bishops relating to the *modus vivendi* or working basis on which the Church may exist and carry on its beneficent work in France at present:—

We, bishops of France, invariably inspired by the double sentiment of love for souls and of our duties towards the fatherland, after having seriously meditated, both upon the sorrowful events that are harrowing the Christian soul of our country, and the proofs that have shown the real character of these events, as well as upon the legislative enactments which have not sufficiently corrected them, declare as follows:—

1. We remain unshakably faithful to our preceding declarations, relative to the laws and other dispositions attacking the Church in these latter times, and against those laws we maintain the protestations that we have made, in union with the Sovereign Pontiff. With His Holiness we claim for the Church of France respect for her hierarchy, the inviolability of her goods, and liberty.

2. The sacred possessions of which we have been despoiled we shall claim always as belonging by right to us, their legitimate administrators whom no one has a right to replace, even provisionally, without special authorization of the Sovereign Pontiff.

3. From the midst of the struggle now going on, and which can only be terminated by an honest reparation for the outrages committed, we are determined to do all in our power to maintain to the last possible hour the exercise of public worship in our churches, and to defend these sacred places, so far as it shall depend on us, from any profanation. For this cause, and this only, we will consent to make the trial of an organization of public worship, if the obscurities of certain texts of the law of 1907 can be dispensed to such a degree that our efforts in this regard may not be rendered useless.

4. An administrative contract, entered into by the prefects or mayors on the one hand, and the bishops or curés on the other, shall by the terms of the law avail to give to these last the use of the buildings for worship. As to the subject-matter of this contract, the law imposes on the civil side only one condition; the freedom of use. In declaring ourselves disposed to make the trial of conditions of this sort we claim the right to introduce there any clauses not contrary to public order, and that are destined to give us two kinds of guarantee which are rigorously necessary, the one concerning the permanence and moral security of religious services in the churches, the other having relation to the safe-guarding of the principles of the hierarchy. These clauses are stated in the form here annexed. They are legal. Our strict duty forbids us to retrench anything from them.

5. As it must not be allowed that the organization of the Church of France should depend on the arbitrary will of magistrates, we bishops bind ourselves in perfect unity, acting as one man, and we declare that this contract for the use of the churches aforesaid shall be accepted everywhere or we will accept it nowhere. These contracts are valid only from the moment when it shall be declared that the clauses, expressed here below, are unanimously agreed upon by the civil parties, representatives of the municipal authorities or others. The upright conscience of the whole country will appreciate our conditions. Once more, the country shall see whether we, in formulating them, are influenced by any other consideration than the interest of the souls entrusted to us.

Legal Form of the Lease.

Between M. X., mayor of— and M. Abbe Z., curé of P., acting in this capacity in virtue of the powers that have been conferred on him by Monseigneur—, bishop of—, with his express authorization, the following agreement has been made:—

From this day forth, and for a duration of eighteen years, M. Abbe Z., has the free use of the Church of—, and all its furnishings, under reserve of the obligations laid down in Art. 13 of the law of Dec. 9, 1905.

Subsidy Question Debated.

The actual business of the Legislative Session began on Thursday afternoon last, when the address in answer to the speech of the Lieut. Governor came up for discussion.

When the mover and seconder had concluded their remarks, Mr. Mathieson, Leader of the Opposition, rose and delivered a most powerful speech in which he took the Premier and his fellow delegate to the conference severely to task.

The Leader of the Opposition next pointed out how vast has been the increase of Federal taxation, and how great has been the increase in the cost of education, public works, asylums, etc.

Mr. Mathieson showed that our delegates to the Conference seemed to have wholly lost sight of these facts. They utterly failed to realize the character and extent of the needs of our Province.

It was seen by members of our Legislature last year that Prince Edward Island should be included in the exception in this resolution.

Edward Island should be included in the exception in this resolution. This would safeguard us from losing any of our per capita allowance, and ensure to us its reception on our maximum population, without any reduction in consequence of loss of population.

The Montague Meeting.

A very large and representative meeting of electors assembled in the hall at Montague on Friday evening last to hear the discussion of the action of our delegates to the interprovincial Conference held at Ottawa in October last.

Moved by Mr. P. Koughan, seconded by Mr. Frederick Mellish: Resolved that this meeting of electors of the Third and Fourth districts of Kings County held at Montague ask the Legislature now in session, not to give its consent to any reduction of the per capita subsidy now allowed by law to this Province.

Resolved that the government of this province do present to the government of Canada the claim of this Province for additional subsidy to meet the increased expenditure of this province for education, maintenance of asylums, agriculture and public works.

After a hearty vote of thanks had been tendered the chairman, and suitably acknowledged the meeting adjourned.

P. E. Island's Case.

STARTLING FREIGHT CHARGES.

None of the Opposition members spoke of secession as necessary or justifiable. But they read from the press and from public speeches delivered in the Province to show that a repeal feeling was growing and that if justice was not done it might assume dangerous proportions.

THE GOVERNMENT DOES IT. The situation in this respect was more noticeable because all the transport agencies concerned are under government control.

A STEP IN ADVANCE.

It is not necessary to go over the arguments and facts presented. They are pretty well known already to your readers. It is enough to say that the presentation of the case in yesterday's debate marks a distinct stage in the movement toward better things.

MR. BORDEN'S POSITION.

If Mr. Borden has his way the matter of the tunnel will be at once taken up. It will be ascertained definitely what the cost will be and how far the project would be an effective remedy for existing conditions.

INDIFFERENT MINISTERS.

While Mr. Hughes, in presenting the claims of the Province, offered excuses and apologies for his leaders, the main defence was put up by the Minister of Marine, Mr. Brodeur, who was the only minister to seek sufficient interest in the matter to stay in the House during the whole discussion.

THE PREMIER HAS CHANGED.

Sir Wilfrid might indeed have had something to say. His own famous letter of 1891 declaring that the tunnel should be undertaken if it were reasonably feasible was read and discussed.

THE MINISTER'S DEFENCE.

As stated above Mr. Brodeur defended his own Department and the Government generally. He declared that the Dominion had done all that could be expected and that there was no real grievance.

FROM OTHER PROVINCES.

One of the speakers from other Provinces was Dr. Barr, Conservative Member for Dufferin, Ontario, who declared emphatically that the whole Country would be bound to support any outlay that might be necessary to redeem the good faith of the Dominion.

SIR WILFRID AFTERWARD.

As Mr. Brodeur was the only Minister to speak and the tunnel was not a matter for his Department, Sir Wilfrid did not get much attention from Cabinet Ministers.

The story of the Transcontinental Commission's purchase of envelopes from Mr. O'Gorman has been explained on the witness stand by that eminent campaigner. It takes the form:

Mr. Robert Reid is one of the commissioners charged with the construction of the Transcontinental from Moncton to Winnipeg.

When the government buys land it does not buy it from the man who has it to sell, but from an intermediary, who takes a profit equal to or more than the original price of the land.

When it sells land in the West for settlement, it does not sell to the farmer, but to a middleman who sells to a farmer at five or ten times the price which he pays the government.

that the landlord of the building occupied in Ottawa by the Commission was one of the witnesses in the police court, and testified that he went to London during the campaign accompanied by some friends and carrying a sum of money which he did not take back with him.

O'GORMAN AFTER PATRONAGE.

About the time that the Transcontinental Commission was getting down to its work Mr. O'Gorman decided to do some business with that Board, concluding that his own name would be just as well left out of the public account, he found a young clerk named Munro, engaged him and took the name of the Munro Commission Company.

FORTY PER CENT TOO HIGH.

It turns out that this was a very good offer. In fact it was just 40 per cent above the regular price at which a Toronto firm was already selling the same goods to another department of the government.

FARMED OUT.

Mr. O'Gorman took the contract to Barber & Ellis, of Toronto, who supplied envelopes of various kinds, rendering account at Mr. Ogilvie's prices, the bill amounting to \$391.00. This sum the officers, at O'Gorman's request, sent to Barber & Ellis.

THE PURCHASING AGENT.

When the refund reached the commission the secretary sent it to Mr. Ogilvie, ordering him to hand it to the accountant. Mr. Ogilvie did not do so. He sent it back to Barber & Ellis and asked them to supply more envelopes.

CONFIRMED BY THE AUDITOR.

The auditor-general has made the late discovery that the North Atlantic Trading Company has been receiving \$5 a head on European emigrants without proper vouchers or evidence that the money was due.

GRAFT JUSTIFIED.

The alarming feature of the transaction is the purchasing agent's justification of his original bargain and payment, and his sworn declaration that he finds it better to buy from commissioners and middlemen than direct from the dealers.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The weather Friday night Saturday and Sunday night, was extremely cold. The depression below was the coldest recorded at Charlottetown but at some points the mercury was down to 14 below.

A public meeting to discuss the Provincial subsidies and other important questions is being held at the Province and the Federal Government will be held at Mount Stewart on Friday evening next March 1st at 7 o'clock.

The College de Marcelline in a town in Central Vermont, was destroyed by fire on Saturday and 236 scholars are billeted with surrounding farmers. No lives were lost. The damage is \$150,000, insurance \$50,000.

Fourteen below was a record breaker at Halifax on Sunday, Monday a snow-storm was raging. The Victorian arrived on Saturday at midnight, landing a thousand passengers and discharged two thousand tons of cargo.

Senator Gowen, of Ontario, has resigned. He is a Conservative and has been in the Senate since 1885. He had been a Judge of the County Court of Simcoe for forty years, prior to his call to the Senate. He is 62 years of age.

It is understood at Ottawa that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir F. Borden have booked passage by the Empress of Britain, sailing from Halifax. They go to attend the Colonial Conference. Messrs. Fielding Broder and Paterson will go by the same boat if the session is over in time.

After thirty hours incessant efforts, the Dutch lifeboatmen rescued ten survivors of the steamer Berlin, near the Hook of Holland on Friday last. Though buffeted and driven back many times on Saturday, the Dutchmen refused to relax their attempts to rescue the shipwrecked persons and launched their boat repeatedly.

Two steamers wrecked, were reported to London at a late hour last Friday night. One was off Flamborough Head, in the North Sea, and the other off Beachy Head, in the British Channel. The names of the vessels were not known and no details had been received. The weather was stormy, especially in the North Sea.

The British Embassy at Washington is now the best paid post in the British diplomatic service, the salary of the Ambassador having been raised with the appointment of James Bryce to \$50,000 per year. Mr. Bryce is also given \$10,000 to pay the expenses of installing himself in the Embassy.

The snow storm of Monday caused quite a blockade to traffic. No trains reached the city yesterday from Souris or Tigris. The Murray Harbor train came somewhat behind time, and the train from Georgetown arrived about noon. A train arrived from Summerside late in the evening. The steamers are stuck in the ice since Monday. No mails Monday or yesterday.

The hardest task experienced by Capt. Dalaney in running the steamer Bruce was encountered on the trip from Port at Basque Nfld., to North Sydney, on Thursday last. From five o'clock Wednesday morning until noon Thursday the steamer was battered with ice packs extending from off Cranberry Head to the terminus wharf; but the Bruce was successfully docked at North Sydney.

The steamer Berlin, with passengers and crew, numbering one hundred and forty-one persons from Harwick to the Hook of Holland, was wrecked off the Hook of Holland Thursday morning. All were lost but one. Among the lost were a German Opera Company coming from England and also King Edward's messenger, Arthur Herbert. The Berlin was a British ship commanded by Captain Ablett.

The steamer Pomeranian arrived at Halifax last Thursday evening from London, and Haver 28 cabin, 160 steerage passengers and cargo, and anchored at quarantine. When health officer McKay boarded the ship he found a mild case of smallpox. The assistant-medical officer remained on the ship. The patient was landed at Lawler's Island, after which the ship remained quarantine.

Hon. Jabez Bunting Snowball, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, dropped dead at five minutes to seven last Sunday evening, while walking to church in Fredericton. Heart failure caused death. He was seventy years of age and had been Lieut. Governor since January 1902. Previous to his appointment he had been a member of the House of Commons and later a Senator. He had conducted an immense lumber business on the Miramichi and had immense mills at Chatham.

David Trapp reports that a man named Radcliffe of Estevan, Saskatchewan his wife and three children are the latest victims of the "flea" fever. They had a coal and Radcliffe with oxen and slight went for fuel. On the way home he was frozen to death. The family were all found frozen stiff sometime after. The family emigrated from England last spring.

By a vote of 6 to 5, the House Ways and Means committee at Washington the other day defeated the bill taking off the duty on Canadian coal imported into the United States at such time as Canada might remove the duty on American coal imported into Canada. This is the first tariff or reciprocity bill upon which the committee has voted this session, and the close vote is regarded as significant. Representative McCall of Massachusetts following the sentiment for revision expressed in Massachusetts by the petition of the Legislature, voted for the bill with the Democrats, broke with his Republican colleagues and came out flatfooted for reciprocity.

The Legislative Council, the Upper House of the Newfoundland Legislature, recently adopted by a vote of 11 to 2, an address to Lord Rigin, British Secretary of State for the Colonies, protesting against the modus vivendi arranged last October between the British and American Governments for the regulation of the herring fisheries on the west coast of Newfoundland. The Lower House adopted the same address last week by a vote of 23 to 3. LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

The Supreme Court met at Georgetown, yesterday, Mr. Justice Hodgson presiding.

Rev. E. J. Rattin, B. A. delivered a very interesting lecture in the C. M. B. A. Hall, at Kensington, on Friday evening last. His subject was "London Metropolis of the world." The lecture was illustrated by excellent maps and views of many interesting places and buildings. The lecture was highly instructive and entertaining. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was moved by Very Rev. Mgr. Gillis supported by several other and tendered the lecturer.

The sad intelligence reached here by wire a few days ago, of the sudden death of Mr. John G. McCormack at Houghton, Michigan. Deceased was the eldest son of the late Daniel McCormick, St. George's of this city. Deceased leaves to mourn one son, who was with his father at the time of his death, and two daughters, attending school in San Francisco, besides an aged mother, five brothers and four sisters. Particulars of his death will be furnished later.

The second of special Lenten sermons in St. Dunstan's Cathedral was preached on Sunday evening last, by Rev. Dr. MacLellan. His theme was the rule of faith, and his text was from the first Epistle of St. Peter, 1st. Chapter and 25th verse: "But the word of the Lord endureth forever, and this is the word which by the gospel hath been preached to you." The Rev. preacher pointed out the value of faith. A first cause can be proved by human reason alone; but belief in God, almighty, all-powerful, infinite, is an act of divine faith. The nature of a principle is reflected in the action flowing therefrom. God is an infinite being, infinite in intellect and intelligence, and our knowledge of infinite attributes are made known to us by Him. He alone can do this. Through his own goodness He has deigned us for supernatural aid. He has left us as the laws and the means of attaining thereto. The Rev. preacher here referred to the rule of faith. The Bible is held by some to be the only rule of faith. He then enumerated many of the great qualities of the Bible. In the book of Genesis are narrated the great events pertaining to the creation of the world and of man and other great events connected with the beginning and early history of the human race and God's relation thereto. Likewise the New Testament gives us an account of the founding of the Church, and gives a history of the Sacraments. These Testaments are inspired. How do we know these scriptures are inspired? The Church has so announced. In the beginning of the church the Apostles were sent out "to preach the gospel to all nations." They were told to write or distribute Bibles. The New Testament was not yet written, so

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly. I most heartily welcome you on the occasion of your Conference for the performance of your Legislative duties, and congratulate you and the Province upon the general prosperity which has been vouchsafed to us through Divine Providence.

I am happy to inform you that an Inter-provincial Conference was held at Ottawa in October last, called by the Prime Minister of the Federal Parliament, to consider the terms of the financial subsidies paid to the Province, at which Conference my government was represented by the Premier of this Province and by Hon. Mr. Hughes. I have reason to believe that the deliberations of the Conference will result in the payment under the terms to which this Province, of a largely increased subsidy for the support of its Government and Legislature, thus putting the Province in a position to improve the public services without necessitating any increased taxation, and without rendering the Province liable to any deficit between revenue and expenditure.

I am also pleased to say that negotiations are in progress by my Government with the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa to have an Experimental Farm established on the Island. These negotiations, I trust, will soon be satisfactorily concluded, and the necessary legislation for carrying this object into effect will be submitted for your consideration.

My Government has also under consideration the question of the affiliation of the Prince of Wales College with the University of McGill at Montreal, which I have reason to believe will result in great benefit to our Island students. The necessity of building a new Jail and Poorhouse will be brought to your attention, the present buildings which are used for these purposes having become entirely unsuitable and unsanitary.

Measures regarding our Stock Farm will be submitted to you. Negotiations are still in progress between my Government and the Federal Government with regard to the Fisheries; which question I trust will shortly be amicably arranged to the advantage of the Province.

Other matters of importance to the Province will also be submitted for your consideration. The Public Accounts for the past fiscal year will be laid before you, and the Estimates of the Legation and Expenditure for the current year will be submitted. I feel assured that you will find the Estimates of Expenditure have been prepared with due regard to economy and the requirements of the public service.

I now invoke for your labors the blessings of Divine Providence, in the firm conviction that your efforts will result in great benefit to our Province and people.

An English Priest to a Radical Paper.

(From The London New Age.)

Sir,—When the courteous Editor of the New Age asked me to write something about the state of affairs in France from a Catholic point of view, my first impulse was to refuse. But on second thought I decided to try my best to gratify his wishes, for the request itself seemed to sum up and reduce to its common denominator the many thoughts and feelings which mingled confusedly in my mind.

What, then, are the facts of the case? On the one hand, we have the Catholic Church in France, with the Pope at its head, and the cordial sympathy of over two hundred millions of Catholics all over the world at its back. On the other hand, we have the so-called French Government—a pitiful collection of rabid, narrow-minded speculators, unable to agree among themselves on any one point except hatred of God and all that speaks of Him.

The English Press sneered at such obstinacy, and loudly praised those who trusted the word of the Government, and asked for "authorization." It was refused, and they also had to go, with the additional bitterness of feeling that they had merely facilitated the work of their treacherous persecutors. Then the Concordat was broken, Dissolution of partnership is usually a mutual act.

The French Bishops to the Holy Father.

Following is the text of the address of the French Bishops to the Holy Father on occasion of their recent plenary council, held in the "Chateau de la Muette, near Paris:

Most Holy Father: At the moment when, for the third time, we, Cardinals, Archbishops and Bishops of France find ourselves united in plenary assembly to deliberate on the interests of that very noble portion of the Catholic Church of which we are the pastors, our first care is to send to your Holiness the expression of our most profound gratitude for the new pledge of very paternal and apostolic solicitude which you have been pleased to give us, to ourselves, to our clergy, and to our well-loved people, by addressing to us the encyclical of January 6.

To this sentiment of gratitude we hasten to add the assurance of our entire and convinced adherence to the judgment of your Holiness on the legislation in religious matters which began with the law of 1905, and has just been continued by the law of January 2, 1907. Was it possible, Most Holy Father, to throw, better than did your Holiness, on the most obscure points of all this dark enterprise, the clearest and most decisive light? We do not think so.
