Mr. Editor, I believe our countrymen are indebted to you for having discovered (perhaps I should say invented) me as a possible (though most improbable) candidate for the presidency. Allow me, then, to thank you for your early and frank demonstration that I can in no contingency be counted on or hoped for as a woman suffrage candidate.

But why should any man be the candidate for president of the woman suffragists? Logically and consistently, I feel that your candidate should be a woman. She ought, moreover, to be one thoroughly emancipated from the "aboriginal sin" of the "marriage tie," and the "hateful consuetudine" which I am too old to outgrow.

Could you not find one who illustrates in her own person and history what you so felicitously term "the liberal thought of an enlightened age?" Let her be one who has two husbands after a sort, and lives in the same house with them both, sharing the duties of one, and bearing the name of the other, (to indicate her impartiality in dressing the hair, and it is now pulled up on the back of the head and packed away in small a space as possible.)

The Ministerial Crisis in Spain.

Once more Spain is going through the throes of a ministerial crisis. After vainly endeavoring to hold together, the Serrano Cabinet, who, a few weeks ago, were ordered by his Majesty Amadeus to return to their posts on the ground that they had not sustained any parliamentary duties, have been obliged to succumb to internal differences of opinion elemental to the three political parties who entered into his composition. They have presented themselves to the King, and this time been cajoled enough to explain their differences to him.

He has accepted their resignation, and asked General Serrano to try to form a new ministry. Great controversy is going on as to whether it shall be a fresh one of coalition or whether it shall consist exclusively of men on one party only. Serrano resigned the finance department in consequence of a loud and unreasonable outcry having been made against him for alleged illegalities in the tobacco contracts.

It was quite true that, led away by his zeal for public interest, he had, after two ineffectual attempts to effect these contracts by public tender, effected them by the private treaty, laying aside certain formalities prescribed in the law; but it was clearly shown by the report of a special committee that he had done service to the State by the act, while at the same time he had injured no private interests nor served his own that of any of his friends.

I do not think he need have resigned, but was obtinate in doing so. The King accepted his resignation, and charged Minister Sagasta with his portfolio pro tem., until such time as the budget debates should conclude. Owing, however, to the great opposition the budget was receiving, and the fact that the heat was driving away the deputies by dozens from Madrid, it had been found impossible to continue discussing it item by item, so the whole thing has been put off till after the recess.

Competent Judges will be appointed for the different classes and the prizes awarded with the greatest impartiality. The Salt Lake City Tribune, of August 20th, says: Mrs. Harriet Hawkins of this city, has brought an action for divorce against her husband, Thomas Hawkins. She alleges that she was married to him in England in 1850, and that they have six children. She also charges that about six years ago her husband took another wife, and about three years ago he took a third wife, and has two children by each of them; that he has deserted her and her children; has abused her, even threatened her life, and a few months ago dragged her out of her house and beat her cruelly because she would not remove from it so that he might sell it. This case is pending undecided in the Third District Court.

The defendant lives at Lehi. Mrs. Hawkins has made another move in the game. She has made an affidavit charging her husband with adultery, and Chief Justice McKean has issued a warrant and caused his arrest under the following statute of the Territory of Utah, which may be found on page 53, section 31: "Every person who commits the crime of adultery shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding twenty years, and not less than three years, or a fine not exceeding \$1,000 and not less than \$500, or by both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court. And when the crime is committed between parties, any of whom is married, both are guilty of adultery, and shall be punished accordingly. No prosecution for adultery can be commenced but on the complaint of the husband or wife." The preliminary examination will take place in the court-room in this city at 10 A. M., to-day. Mr. Hawkins has been sent to Camp Douglas for safe keeping.

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Swing Sing, N.Y., August 17.

An extraordinary affair occurred at Sing Sing, N.Y., August 17. A boat having a small boat in tow, and being north, was approaching the pier with considerable rapidity. The guard warned the pilot to keep off, and the boat was apparently headed, notwithstanding the steamer glided close to the pier. Immediately a dozen convicts, understanding the whole movement, made a dash from their work, leaped on board the canal boat and ran pell mell over it and into the engine room. The engineer was dislodged and one of the convicts dashed into the pilot house and took charge of the wheel immediately. An alarm was given as quickly as possible, and many of the regular prison guards rushed towards the pier. They found their pieces at the convict and charged for him to stop, but he crooked over his shoulder, and the vessel still kept moving as quickly as possible. Mr. Luff, the warden, started up the track to the Sing Sing depot and got a loop under his arm with a pistol.

At this time the greatest excitement prevailed, as the news of their outbreak became known. Sing Sing village, and hundreds of people hurried to the prison. One of the vessels sent out to capture the convicts overhauled the tug near Rockland, when the convicts took to the small boats in the vicinity which some boys had, and rowing quickly to the shore, escaped to the mountains. One convict who got into a boat with a flag, was pressed so closely that he was by and ploughed him before him, so that the guard would not fire. The vessel did fire, not at the escaping convict, however, but with an intention to intimidate him and cause him to surrender. He kept on pulling instead, and reached the shore, where he joined his associates. Mr. Luff, Inspector, states that the convicts are now in the woods near Rockland, and says they will be captured, as they are surrounded. He believes the affair was planned to wage war by persons in New York city. The tug boat was the Dean Richmond, Capt. A. M. Norton, the engineer was Mr. Farrell. Both are under arrest.

1. That it shall be lawful for the Board of the said Railway to receive and accept of the said Debentures to the extent of TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS in sums not less than \$100 each, which Debentures shall be issued with interest at the rate of Five per cent per annum, and shall be signed by the said Board and countersigned by the Treasurer.

2. That the said Debentures shall be made payable in ten years from the date hereof, by instalments of one-tenth of the principal sum, and interest thereon, on the first day of January and July, in each year.

3. That the said Debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of their issue, and shall be payable on the first day of January and July, in each year.

4. That the purpose of the said Debentures, and the interest thereon, shall be to be applied to the purchase of land, and the construction of a line of railway, and the purchase of rolling stock, and other purposes, and the Board of the said Railway shall be authorized to apply the proceeds of the said Debentures to any of the purposes aforesaid.

5. That the said Debentures shall be deposited with the Provincial Treasurer, or a Receiver General of the Province, or with any Bank or other person approved by the Council of the said Township, and shall be subject to the order of the Board of the said Railway, and the interest thereon shall be paid to the said Board.

6.
