A COLD DAY

For the Tories of Ontario.

But Seasonable Weather for Little Oliver.

A Grand Victory for Good Government.

All The Ministers Re-elected by Large Majorities.

And a Majority of About 1800 for the Reform Administration.

The provincial elections are over and the Mowat administration has been handsomely sustained. The latest returns show that out of the ninety seats the Liberals have carried sixty, the Tories twenty-eight, leaving two not heard from—Bruce, North, and Grey, Centre—which will probably return one of each party.

Both parties claim North Grey, Creighton, the Mas of Dufferin, says he has seven majority, but Mr. Cleland says there is a Reform surplus.

One of the most surprising turnovers is that in Stormont. The Tory majority in the two constituencies merged to make this one was 253. Mr. Mack has converted this into a Reform majority of 206.

It is to be noticed that in every constituency in which Mr. J. L. Hughes went the Liberal majority has been increased. It is to be presumed that the objection of the Liberal school trustees to the payment of Hughes salary for the month will now be dropped.

A gang of thirty men commenced cutting ice for the M.C.R. at Waterford yesterday. About 400 tons will be cut, which will be stored at Waterford, Victoria and St. Thomas.

Wm. Henderson, of Bayham, was taken to the county jail yesterday, by Bailiff White, of Aylmer, on a commitment for forty days for contempt of court in not settling a judgment for \$25 claimed against him.

Mr. F. W. Mitchell offered a pair of gold cuff studs to the person guessing the nearest the result of the election. John Brown guessed 20 majority for Ingram, no one guessing 19, the exact majority.

The Detroit aldermen last night passed the following resolution:—Resolved, The Board of Councilmen concurring, that on and after 12 o'clock midnight, January 1st, 1887, meridian time shall be established in the city of Detroit and standard time abandoned.

Mr. W. Reid, teamster for Messrs. Hay & Co., of Woodstock, was mysteriously shot in the thigh on Saturday night last, while carrying in wood, at his kitchen door. It is the most mysterious case of shooting ever heard of in the town.

Mr. A. McLaughlin, returning officer for the East Riding, will make the official announcement of the result of the voting in that riding at the court house, on Friday, Mr. McLaughlin left this morning on a tour of the riding, collecting the ballot boxes.

TO CARRY THE HEARD BY-LAW (TAKES TWO FIFTHS OF ALL THE FREEHOLDERS TO VOTE FOR IT.)

A meeting of a number of young people connected with Grace church was held at the residence of Mr. J. E. Pollock, Talbot street, last night, when a Chautauque Reading Circle was formed.

The New Year's market this morning was a fair one, a large number of farmers being in attendance, and the amount of flour, butter and other farm produce offered for sale being more than sufficient to supply the demand.

Large numbers of fowls were sold, there being a shortage in prices worthy of note. Mr. John Farley states an unusual occurrence for this time of the year.

This morning a robin was seen by him and other members of his family flying about his residence. Robins in this time have come at this unusual season of the year to announce the overwhelming victory secured by the Little Hero.

E. Moylan baggageman and brakeman at the Detroit & Orl. Springs station of the M. C. R., fell into a pathfinder while hauling cars at Orl. Springs Monday night. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and was found to be very seriously injured about the head and body, but it is thought the unfortunate man will pull through all right.

The St. Thomas Amateur Minstrels will give their first entertainment at the Opera House on Friday evening, 31st inst. The organization is composed of the best musical talent in the city, and a rich treat may be looked forward to. A splendid programme is in rehearsal and when the boys make their debut, they should be greeted with a bumper house.

Mr. B. Housinger offered a box of cigars to the person guessing nearest the result of the election. Ingram's majority is now given at 19, and a Constable Metcalfe guessed that number, he will likely secure the cigars.

Albert Miller guessed 18, and R. J. Fitzsimmons 21, either of whom who the night before last Mr. Albert Marlatt, who resides on Regent street, was driving into town with Mrs. Marlatt.

At the first collapse on the Aylmer gravel road he met three men driving in an opposite direction in their cutter, one of whom took his whip and struck the colt Mr. Marlatt drove, an accidental blow. Mr. Marlatt lost control of the animal, which started along Talbot street, up Elgin, and turned into Mr. Marlatt's gate to the stable. In turning in the cutter was almost upset, and Mrs. Marlatt was thrown out and badly shaken up.

FREEHOLDERS CAN VOTE AS MANY TIMES AS THEY OWN PROPERTY IN DIFFERENT WARDS FOR THE HEARD BY-LAW.

A CLOSE VOTE.

Ingram Wins a Hard Fought Battle.

Coyne's Majority in the County 423; Ingram in the City 447.

Nainn Exceedingly Redeems a East Elgin.

The elections of the city yesterday created a great deal of excitement, both parties putting in an enormous amount of work in bringing voters to the polls.

The Reformers, especially the younger men, worked with a will, and that the result was so disastrous cannot be laid at their door.

Shortly after 5 o'clock the returns from the various polling sub-divisions began to arrive at the JOURNAL office, where a large crowd was in waiting to receive them.

From the very first it was seen that the result was not to be so favorable as had been expected. Of course none looked for anything, but a large majority for Mr. Ingram in the city, but the majority he did receive was even beyond the calculations of his most sanguine supporters.

Nos. 1 and 2 wards, always largely Conservative, were expected by the Reform canvassers to give a very much reduced majority for Mr. Ingram, but the first returns, which were from those two wards, showed plainly that the men who had been working in Mr. Coyne's interests in those wards had been grossly deceived.

Scores of voters who had pledged themselves to Mr. Coyne or his friends in Nos. 1 and 2 wards must have deliberately come back upon their pledge, and voted against him. In No. 3 ward the result was not far different from what was expected, it giving Mr. Ingram a majority of eight.

The three east wards, always very difficult to canvass, gave extraordinarily large majorities for Mr. Ingram, but this did not excite so much surprise.

When the city returns were all in, and it was found that Mr. Ingram had received the large majority of 447, it was generally felt that the contest was decided, and that Mr. Ingram was elected, as few imagined that the riding could poll a Reform majority at all approaching those figures.

As the returns came in, however, between 6 and 9 o'clock, the excitement rose to fever heat as the Conservative majority in the city was gradually polled down.

First came three divisions in Southwold, giving Mr. Coyne forty-four of a majority, where formerly the vote was about even. Following this a tremendous show went up from those in waiting, and the announcement was made that the grand old banner township of Dunwich rendered the splendid majority of 274 for Mr. Coyne.

This sent Coyne a stock away up, as Aldborough might go 100, and if it did this, and gave Mr. Coyne as much as it had given Mr. Casey, the former would be elected. Southwold was the next township to be heard from, and when the telegram told that it gave Mr. Ingram the splendid majority of 116, cheer after cheer went up.

This left Mr. Coyne with only 29 to make, and strong were the hopes that Aldborough would meet the emergency. It failed, but sent in the very creditable majority for Coyne of 38.

This left Mr. Coyne in a minority of 19 and it was by that small number of votes that he lost the election. The following is the result of the polling in the different parts of the riding:—

that they were safe out of the woods, and when the final result was announced that Ingram had been elected by about nineteen, the cheering in the city hall made the old bricks shake.

A torch procession was then formed at the Conservative club rooms, and headed by the L. O. F. band, marched up Talbot street to the city hall, Mr. Ingram, being seated in a mitre, which was hailed by his enthusiastic supporters.

Arrived at the city hall the procession turned down Talbot street again, and proceeded to the Grand Central hotel, where Messrs. A. B. Ingram, T. W. Crothers, C. O. Ematinger, L. D. Gillet and J. C. McCall: the band played "God Save the Queen," and the crowd slowly dispersed.

Mr. Crother's reference to the fact that Mr. Coyne's native city had given a heavy majority against him, and his comments thereon, were of a nature that no man with a sense of what was proper and seemly in dealing with a defeated opponent, would have made use of. They were unkind, uncalled for, and ungentlemanly.

THE CHEERING NEWS FROM EAST ELGIN, that began to arrive shortly after 6 o'clock, to some extent counteracted the depressing result in St. Thomas. It was soon seen that Mr. Nainn was elected by a very handsome majority, Aylmer alone, where both he and his opponent, Dr. Marlatt, reside, giving him the routing majority of 22, where he got only 55 in his contest with Mr. Ermatinger in 1885.

Several instances at the Election Yesterday. Several glaring instances are told of attempts made to perorate, to vote twice and otherwise to secure Mr. Ingram an election by unfair means.

We are not aware that Mr. Ingram or any of his agents were parties to those attempts, but that they were made, admits of no doubt. One case, of a most glaring character, occurred in the north part of No. 5 Ward, when a young lad, named William Glassey, said to be only sixteen years of age, swore that he was David Glassey, and was of age, and he accordingly voted. His father was the man who was entitled to vote, and it would appear that young Glassey and those with whom he was connected, had planned to have his election avoided. Other cases, in which attempts at peroration were made, and instances of polls closing before 5 o'clock, are also given, and it may be that a scrutiny will be held to determine how far these irregularities affected the result.
