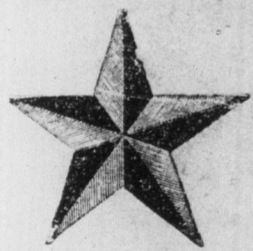

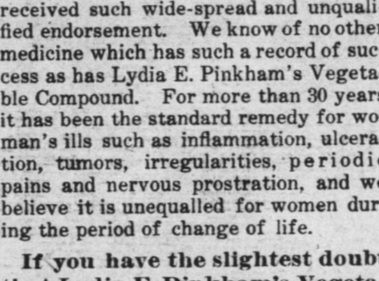



HALIFAX, To-day.
A wireless from the American patrol steamer Seneca, states she had a derelict two-masted centre board, 80-foot keel schooner in tow, which had been found bottom up. The name could not be made out. The craft was found somewhere in the vicinity of Sable Island. The Seneca is proceeding to Halifax with the tow and is expected here on Sunday.

NEW YORK, To-day.
A member of the Brotherhood of Trainmen is killed every seven hours fifteen minutes, and every nine minutes a man is maimed. This was the testimony of William Lee, representing the order of the Railway Trainmen, at a meeting of the Arbitration Committee of the controversy between forty-two Eastern railroads, their conductors, and trainmen over the employees' demands for more pay and shorter hours.

LONDON, To-day.
The recent appeal of Earl Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor, that both great political parties should confer with a view to a settlement of the Irish question by consent on the ground that the present Home Rule Bill cannot provide a permanent solution, excited tremendous interest throughout the country and may have considerable influence in future discussions of the Liberal Bill in Parliament. As a practical suggestion, however, it is believed, it will prove unavailing. The attitude of the Liberals is that the

proposal coming now when the Home Rule Bill is nearing a successful issue in its stormy career is altogether late. On the other hand, the Unionists would only be inclined to enter such conference as Earl Loreburn suggests, if Government first of all consented to drop their bill, which is an altogether impossible condition from the liberal point of view. John Dillon, on behalf of the Nationalists, says the conference would be utterly useless unless the Unionists first admitted the principle of Home Rule. Thus all parties are opposed to conference, and it is believed there is no chance for it to materialize.

NEWPORT, R.I., To-day.
Members of the New York Syndicate which placed with Nat Herreshoff an order for the yacht which is the candidate for defender of the America's Cup, became definitely known last night for the first time. The men who have agreed to subscribe funds towards the yacht's construction are Cornelius Vanderbilt, Frederic Bourne, J. P. Morgan, Henry Walters, Arthur Curtiss James George F. Baker, all are members of the New York Yacht Club. There will be a second syndicate, largely, if not wholly composed of New York Yacht Club members. The construction of the second candidate for Cup defence honors is practically certain. A third syndicate is being talked of, and may materialize.

OTTAWA, To-day.
A notice in the Canada Gazette has a hearing on the reciprocity controversy. B. F. Sturtevant Company Canada, advertises it is changing its

head office from Boston to Galt. This is the Company which Eugene Foss, Governor of Massachusetts, headed. It will be recalled that Foss sometime ago announced that the Sturtevant Company would be obliged to set up a branch factory at Galt. He stated the Company was reluctant to do so, but was forced by the defeat of reciprocity.

LIVERPOOL, To-day.
The six policemen, who were relieved at intervals stood at attention around the casket of Mayor Gavner all night and will continue this duty until the body is removed from the Town Hall at 7 this morning for the homeward voyage on board the Cunard liner Lusitania, on board of which a special Mortuary Chapel has been prepared. Eight uniformed guard masters will form a guard of honor, during the voyage, and carry the casket ashore on the arrival of the steamer at New York.

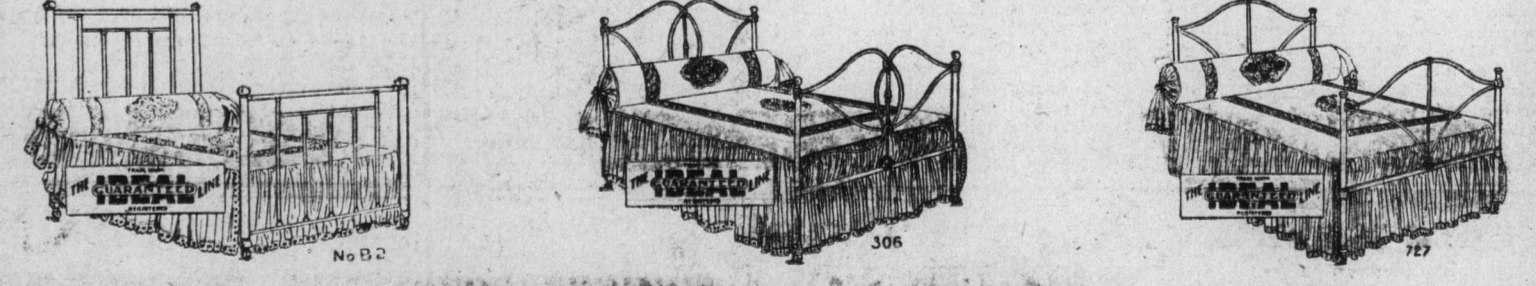

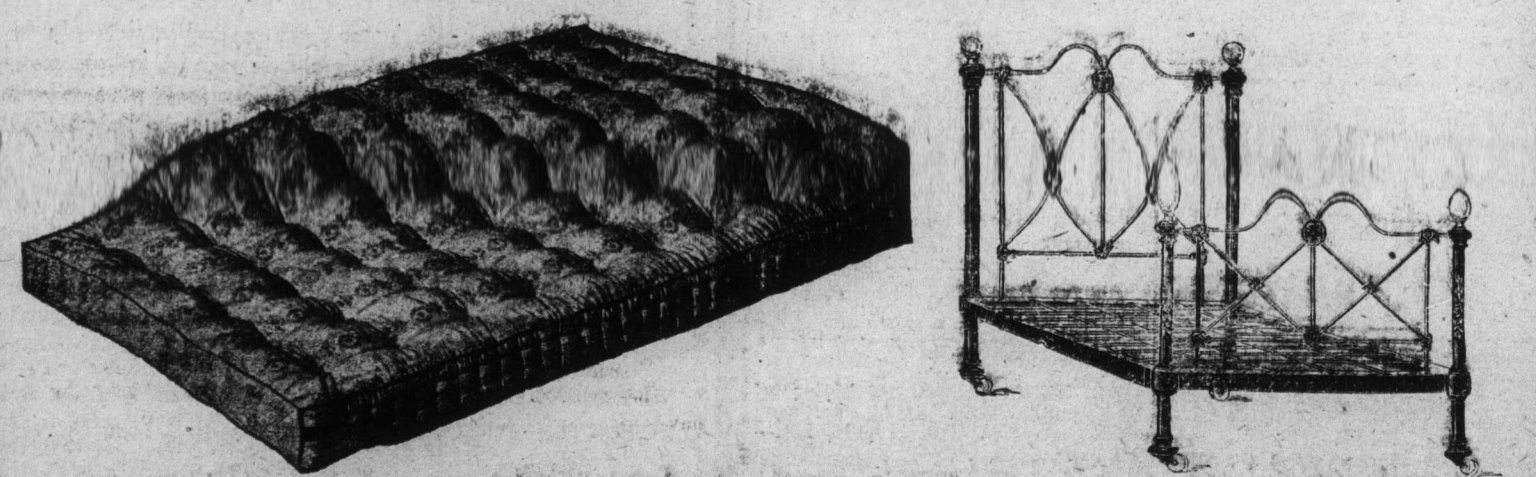

MUNSTER, Germany, Sept. 12. Aviator Hans Lorenz was killed here to-day as he was completing a two hours' flight.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12. Falcon and Hope Islands of the Friendly and Tonga groups in the South Pacific, have disappeared from the map. The islands were said to have been the most part of natives and a few white men.

MONTREAL, Sept. 12. It developed to-day that Drs. Gurd and Beauchamp, physicians engaged as alienists by the Immigration Department of the Board of Industry, sitting in Thaw's case, refused to declare him insane.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. More than fifty youths were arrested during the night for smashing straw hats to emphasize their opinion that the straw season was over. Most were fined \$5 or \$10. The young rowdies were for the most part working on trolley cars.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Sept. 12. District Attorney Conger left for Albany this morning with extradition papers asking for Thaw's return from Colebrook, New Hampshire. As soon as acting Governor Glynn signs the papers, Conger will take them to Colebrook.

LONDON, Sept. 12. The Emperor sailed to-day with the largest number of souls ever on board a ship, 5,019, including passengers and crew. The crew, with nearly 200 extra stewards, numbered nearly 1,400. The Emperor's record cannot be lowered until the new giant Cunarder, Aquitania, is commissioned.

BERLIN, Sept. 12. Death to-day claimed its fifth victim in the aeroplane accident at Buechen Hermsen, yesterday, when a military machine, piloted by Lieut. Schneider, crashed into the spectators, four of whom were decapitated by the propellers and two others badly injured. To-day's fatality makes the twenty-fourth death due to aircraft disasters in this country during five days.

LONDON, Sept. 12. Learned experts attached to the Admiralty are investigating a privately built dirigible of 1,500 miles radius, called the Britannia. The airship is stated to have a lifting capacity of five tons. Two years ago, following the collapse of the Mayfly, a British airship of the rigid Zeppelin type, experts in airship construction were reported to have begun to build secretly at Barrow in Furness, another airship similar, but of an improved pattern.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. The Board of Estimates has been called together by Adolph Kline to arrange for a public funeral to be held here after the arrival of Mayor Gaynor's body aboard the steamer Lusitania, which is due here Tuesday. The recent resignation of John Mitchell, now a candidate for the Mayoralty, from the presidency of the Board, has placed Kline, Vice-Chairman, in the Mayor's chair, and so left that body without a head. The new Mayor is a Republican, and will serve until Mayor Gaynor's successor, or to be elected in November, is installed on Jan. 1st. He has announced his intention to carry out Mayor Gaynor's policies, so far as he knows them, and to make no changes in the officials, none of whom will probably resign.

Obituary.

The many friends of Col. Rees, head of the social work in Canada of the Salvation Army, will sympathize with him deeply on the occasion of the death of his daughter, Gwenie and his son-in-law, Capt. Wakison of Peterboro, Ont., says the St. John Globe. Both these deaths occurred in Toronto in the same week and were due to typhoid. Captain Wakison was stationed in Peterboro, Ont., but has been in charge of the Army's fresh air camp near Toronto. Col. Rees was a well known figure in Toronto and here.

Morris's Boast.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—We wonder what Morris hopes to gain by flinging in the face of the people all the time that he gave the people \$150 a day on the railway. Of course he did not do it, but if he did what is it? What did a member of the Legislature say about railway employment. He said this: "During the construction of the road the men have obtained only a miserable living, with greater exposure and greater toil than their fellow-fishermen have been called upon to endure. Out early in the morning and home late at night, forced to pay high prices for provisions with out incidental charges and with no time allowance except when their backs have been bent and their brows bathed in perspiration, toiling along with pick and shovel the railway laborers have worked harder and profited less than the fishermen of the Colony."
This picture presents a condition of things that no man can gainsay, and that must be remedied when the new Government takes office. It is but little good to laborers to give them \$150 with one hand and take half of it away with the other hand. Bond is the Only Man Who Can Apply the Remedy.

The railway laborers must be protected from imposition—\$150 clear of charges for incidentals is not too much for a laborer. There is a great cry about \$150 a day, as if our people were overfed beggars, but when they are charged with picks and shovels and other things, what they have to bring home to their wives and families will not pay for their home expenses while they have been away. This matter must receive proper consideration. Not by Morris, but by Bond.

BOND: Morris is a Red man, nobody can deny that. The time is come now for the people to ask to have their rights protected. They must get \$150 a day with no incidental charges whatever.
I have known of cases where the poor mother and her helpless children have been waiting anxiously for weeks for the bread-winner to return from the line with something to supply their wants, and I have witnessed the disappointment when it was found the means were so small.

Give Sir R. Bond a Strong Hand.

We must give Sir R. Bond a strong hand to deal with this matter in the interest of our fishermen and laborers. How can our people live at all under such circumstances with taxation crushing their very lives, while the present public office-holders and their accomplices in extravagance are swagging away every year with hundreds of thousands of dollars. Fishermen, you must stop it quickly by turning the rascals out before your country is cursed with hopeless ruin.

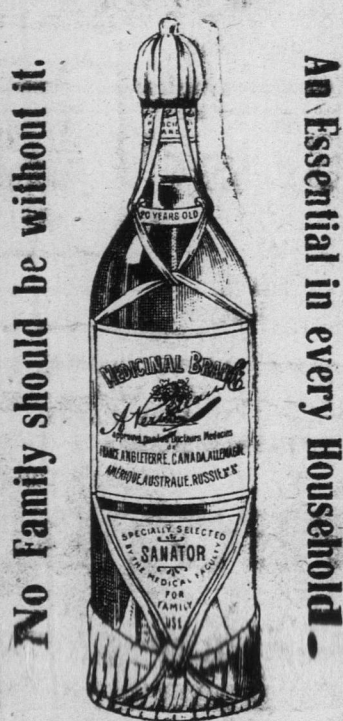

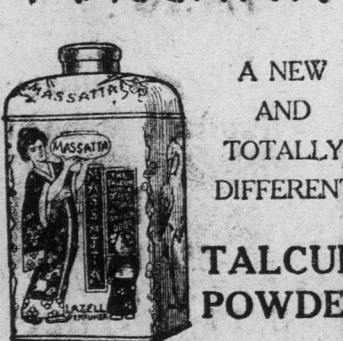

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 12. Tommy Atkins has been so frequently kicking about the nation which was served him once a week, that it has been cut off the soldiers' menu entirely. The troops will be fed henceforth on the "Royal Best of Old England" from the Argentine.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 12. The body of W. J. Gaylor is lying in state to-night at the foot of the Grand Strand of the Town Hall, Liverpool. It was an unprecedented honor that was paid to the dead executive head of the American Metropolitan, for never before had anyone laid in state in this historic edifice. Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack draped over it and the casket rested on a catafalque brought here from Westminster Abbey, London, and on which has stood the bodies of many of England's most famous men. It was last used for Field Marshal Wolsey in St. Paul's Cathedral last March. Candles in great golden candelabra from Westminster Abbey, cast a light up the wide stairway and picketed men from the Liverpool Police force stood guard all night about the catafalque. John Sutherland, Lord Mayor of the city who is absent on a vacation, telegraphed to the city officials to do everything in their power to honor the dead Mayor of New York. The steamer Baltic, on board which Mayor Gaylor died at sea, on Wednesday, arrived at 8.30 this evening and a great crowd assembled. The Lord Mayor of Liverpool's Secretary assisted by a delegation of civic dignitaries received the body at the Town Hall. When the coffin was placed on the catafalque, one end of it was covered by wreaths of lilies of the valley from the Lord Mayor and the citizens of Liverpool.

Accident Insurance. New

Accident insurance is a form of protection which enables a policy holder to trade off a cold in the head for a weekly indemnity. If the cold develops into pneumonia, the owner can cash it in for enough to pay the doctor's bill and buy a second-hand touring car. Accident insurance would never have been thought of if it had not been for the back-firing corn shredder. 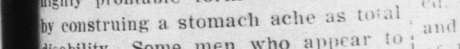

New Motor Fuel Found.

Coal By-Product Gives Cheap Substitute for Petrol.
London, Sept. 5.—A discovery which, it is claimed, will revolutionize the motor spirit industry and make Great Britain partly independent of foreign supplies is announced by a joint committee appointed some time ago by the Royal Automobile Club and other automobile associations. The secretary of the committee says they tested a substitute for petrol, which is a by-product of coal, and which hitherto has been unsuitable as motor fuel. The experts of the committee made the fullest investigations with excellent results. A big commercial plant is now being built, and the indications are that when the process is fully going forty million gallons a year will be produced. It can be sold at 28 cents a gallon, as compared with the present price of 42 cents. It is figured that the present British consumption of petrol is 100,000,000 gallons a year.

To Hunt Seals With Aeroplane.

If Captain Farquhar, the veteran of the sealfields, who left last week for England, succeeds in his mission, he will revolutionize seal hunting in the Gulf and Atlantic waters. Captain Farquhar's mission is ostensibly to give the contract for a new steamer to work in conjunction with the Seal, which is unable to cope with the ever-increasing traffic offering, and on his arrival in the old country will conclude arrangements for the new boat.

As is well known, the veteran Halifax mariner and seal killer was one of the high liners last year, as well as in other years, in the hunt for seals. And it was on his trip last year that he conceived the idea of lessening the dangers encountered by the men who risk their lives on the ice floes and at the same time facilitating them in their work. This new idea is the use of an aeroplane or flying machine, which would enable the aviator to fly over the ground where the seals are supposed to be, and then reports back to the ship, which would enable the hunters to locate the pack without danger and without disappointment. Not only this, but in cases where steamers are rendered useless by reason of their being wedged or crushed by the immense ice floes, communication could be made which would bring immediate relief to the victim, and thereby lessen the danger of loss of life.—Ex.

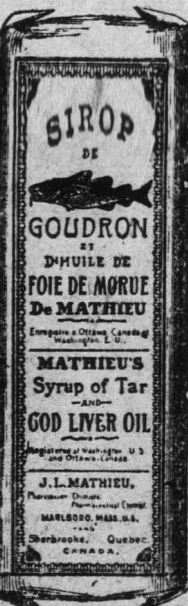

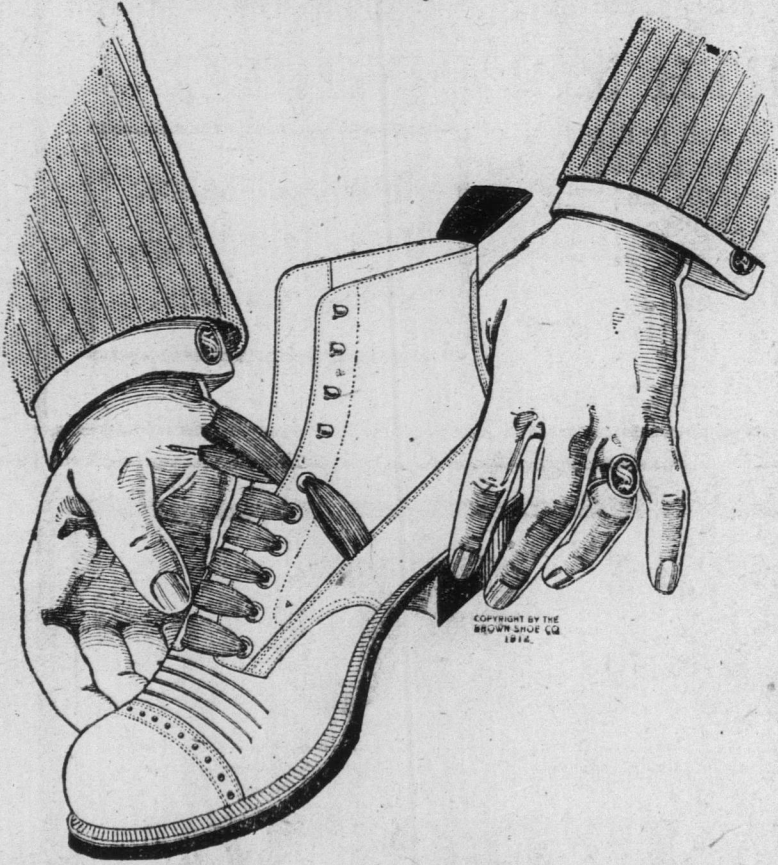

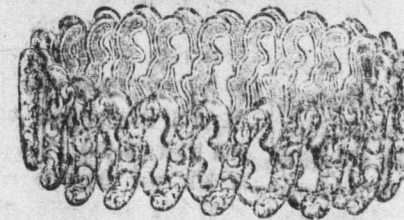
