Housing of Ducks.

Ducks do not require the heat or elaborate housing that hens do. Dry, clear air, freedom from draughts are the chief requisites as far as the buildings are concerned. The floors must be well covered with clean, dry straw, and this straw must be kept dry. It is well to board off one corner of the house with a three-inch board for nests. The nests should be about fifteen inches square and filled with cut straw. This makes it easy for the ducks to bury their eggs, which they invariably do.


