The Harmsworth organization has built a \$5,000,000 paper mill at Grand Falls, Newfoundland. The Albert Reed Company has followed their example and one of the leading American publishers is preparing to do the same; not because of any particular fondness for Newfoundland but simply as a business proposition-because, and only because, it pays them to do so. Would it not be well for other large organizations, who are using or purposes to use the raw materials of Newfoundland, to consider whether it would not pay better to export them as finished pro-

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
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
