#### The Prince's Marriage (From the London Times.)

The keenest public interest centres around the Prince of Wales, and though there is the strongest desire to respect his privacy, the public watch him with almost parental anxiety. Everywhere fervent wishes for his health and prosperity are the staple of conversation. It would be strange if the tonic of his marriage were not very often on the lips and near to the hearts of his countrymen and countrywomen. He is twentysix, and the marriage of the Prince of Wales is inevitably a matter of deep public concern. We desire to speak of it with proper reticence, expressing, within these bounds, what we believe to be the real anxiety of the country that he should make wise choice. The war, in this as in most other things, has, we believe wrought a change in public opinion which—here and elsewhere in the Empire-would, we are convinced be strongly averse from the thought that there should be any compulsion upon the Prince of Wales to make a marriage of policy. For him, within the comparatively narrow limits that his position must impose upon him the British peoples would wish a marriage of true happiness; and this, it is our way to believe, means a marriage of inclination. It follows naturally that the hope for him is that his wife may be one of his own race; for, though there have been fortunate exceptions, it is certainly true that marriages of policy with Princesses of foreign birth have not always had the primary condition for happiness. Farther than to give exression to this national wish for the Prince we shall not go; adding only that we doubt whether there is now the need that there may have been before the war to limit the hoice of the Prince to the circle of the Blood Royal,

#### Telephone to Communicate With Dead

All Paris is stirred by the statement of Thos. A. Edison that he has invented a telephone to communicate with the dead. The opinion of Camilie Flammarion, the noted French astronomer and scientist, is as follows:

"Edison's apparatus need not be chimera. I admit I do not under corporal bodies of this world and the astral bodies of the other. Solenium perhaps, but it seems to me that ever the smallest human brain, or the brains of any living creature, dog or cat, would be more sensitive than any metal or metalloid.

"To our heads, within our skulls, we already have the instrument which enables us to communicate with the dead. No human invention will ever surpass it. We don't know how to use it yet. But that will come

"For the soul exists, survives after death. Matter is but a clothing of the spirit. Nothing disappearseverything changes.

"Our dead are still living. They see us. They hear us. In many cases they are still interested in terrestrial matters, and sometimes are able to convey signs of this interest in us.

"As a scientist I cannot affirm that the soul is immortal. But I do affirm that the soul lives long after the body is dead, and that in time man to a despotism more absolute, than is will be able to control the fluids which make communication between the realm of death and life possible."




