Movement Organized to Affect German-Austrian Economic Union.

Norwegian Search Party Leaving Immediately to Locate Amundsen—Canada Will Dispute America's Right to Annex Territory in the Northland—600 Birthday Honours in the List.

GERMAN-AUSTRIAN UNION MOVEMENT. VIENNA, June 3. The German Peoples League is to be launched to-morrow with one million members, according to supporters of the movement for the union of Austria and Germany. The new league will demand that the Austrian Government ask the League of Nations to recognize the German-Austrian Economic Union as an accomplished fact. If this is refused the supporters of the movement say they will conduct a private plebiscite and submit the results directly to the League of Nations.

RELIEF PARTY FOR AMUNDSEN. OSLO, June 3. Subject to final confirmation to-day by the Commander of the Norwegian Air Force at Horten, Lieut. Lutzuw Holm will lead a party for the relief of the Amundsen North Pole Expedition. Holm hopes to leave Horten next Friday for Spitzbergen. With Holm will be Lieut. Svenbrun and L. D. Ellassen, experienced flyers, who were associated with Amundsen's exploring ventures in 1923, and four mechanics. The offer of Dr. Jean Carrot, noted French explorer, to organize a French relief expedition has been received with much gratification in official quarters here.

MORE BOLSHEVIST DUPLICITY. BERLIN, June 3. The Deutsche Zeitsche Zeitung claimed to-day to have possession of a document intended to be confidential according to which M. Lewitzky, counsellor of the Soviet Legation at Vienna, is to take advantage of his diplomatic immunity and direct Communist activity throughout the Balkans, bolshevizing Bulgaria first.

DAMAGE FROM ELECTRIC STORM. MINNEAPOLIS, June 3. Two persons are known to have been killed, eight more injured fatally and a score of others injured by an electric storm which struck Minneapolis and vicinity last night.

THE AFGHAN AFFAIR. LONDON, June 3. No official comment was forthcoming this morning on yesterday's report that British troops from the north-west of India were moving up towards the border of Afghanistan on account of tribal rebellions against their Emir. Uprisings throughout Afghanistan have been frequent during the past three months and, as a culmination of these 56 rebels were executed May 28th at Kabul.

BRITISH BY-ELECTIONS. LONDON, June 3. The Conservatives are not contesting Oldham, where a by-election was necessary as a result of the appointment of the Liberal member of this two-seated constituency, Sir Edward Grigg, as Governor and Commander in Chief of Kenya Colony. W. J. Trout, former Labor representative, who was defeated in 1924, will again be a candidate and Harcourt Johnston the Liberal. Colonel T. D. Williams, Labor, and Sir Reginald Hall, Conservative, will contest the by-election in the Eastbourne division of Sussex to fill the vacancy created through the appointment of Sir George Lloyd, Conservative member, as High Commissioner for Egypt.

ELECTIONS IN NOVA SCOTIA JUNE 25th. HALIFAX, June 3. The Government of Nova Scotia, headed since 1923 by Hon. E. H. Armstrong, having completed five years in office, will go to the people on June 25th, it was announced to-day. Nominations will be on June 18th. Candidates to contest the forthcoming election have been chosen at party conventions in practically all the counties. Premier Armstrong will contest Shelburne County with Hon. Robert Irwin, Speaker of the House as his colleague. The present administration is Liberal and a Liberal Government has prevailed in Nova Scotia for 43 years. Premier Armstrong came to the Premiership in 1923, when Hon. G. H. Murray, who had led the Government for 25 years, resigned to retire from public life. The House is now constituted as 48 Liberals, four Laborites, five farmers, two Conservatives and two Independents.

PRINCIPAL PATON SPEARS AT DALHOUSIE BANQUET. HALIFAX, June 3. Principal Paton, of the Junior College of Newfoundland, formerly headmaster of the Manchester, England, Grammar School, proposed the toast to the Canadian Universities at the

DUNNING GOVT. SUSTAINED.

REGINA, June 3. Forty-four Government candidates elected, and nine Opposition, were the known results of the Saskatchewan elections at 10:30 a.m. to-day, according to a statement from Liberal headquarters. A Government forecast of the final results predicts the election of but 12 Opposition members.

PASSENGER CARS IN COLLISION.

KOKOMO, Ind., June 3. Two passenger cars of the Union Traction Company, were in collision five miles north of here to-day. Ambulances and physicians were rushed to the scene. No word has been received as to the number injured.

Lord Dawson and Pent People

MORE MUSCLE BUT POSTURE NO BETTER.

Lord Dawson of Penn. Physician-in-Ordinary to the King, speaking to a gathering of health students at the Aeolian Hall, New Bond Street, W., deplored that in many minds physical education was still associated with the drab routine of the drill-master, whereas it comprehended not only body, but also mind and spirit, and meant harmony between mind and matter, with mind leading. It was far too common, Lord Dawson said, to find children born with chests that were too long and too narrow. They could not naturally expand their chests and were forced to breathe imperfectly with an over-use of the diaphragm. The result was that they could not aerate their lungs adequately, they grew feebly, and consequently the muscles of the abdomen became lax.

The wall of the abdomen protruded, its organs drooped, and later in life there was found another of those too familiar figures of people with rather shallow frames who never seemed to be able to stand upright and whose stomachs were distinctive by their "bow-window" pattern.

These people were really seriously handicapped; their power of breathing was not good, their range of activity was limited, they became fatigued easily, and were subject to catarrhs and other impediments of health.

There was no reason why this evil could not to a large extent be remedied. If taken in hand early in life, these people could have their chests made functionally efficient, they could be made to breathe correctly, and most of the afflictions of their adult life could be prevented.

It was curious, Lord Dawson commented, that although the men and women of to-day, particularly women, were superior to their forebears in respect to the strength of their muscles, the tautness of their figures, and independence of artificial support, there had not been a corresponding improvement in posture, and that the majority of the population continued to walk with their shoulders forward instead of square. This defect still marred the perfection of beauty in our people.

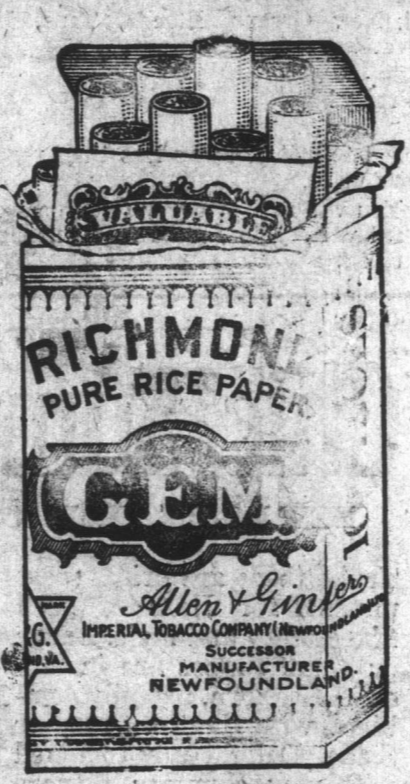

The Leading Topic

The favourite topic of conversation whenever English men and women meet is the weather. Stevenson terms it "the very nadir and scuff of good conversationalists"; and certain it is that English conversation would languish in a dreary fashion if the weather was not always providing food for conversation. A man may talk politics, sport, or work for a brief space, but he always gets round to weather. A woman is never allowed to get away from it, for her clothes are bound up with the weather; and whether she has got something to wear or nothing at all she cannot afford to ignore the climatic conditions. It must be admitted that English weather is worth talking about. We never know what variety will be handed out to us twenty-four hours ahead. Over a great part of the Continent of Europe they do not bother about the weather, for matters work out according to the calendar. The weather in May is much the same year after year; the seasons follow one another with monotonous regularity, and climatic conditions are more or less standardized. With us it is entirely the reverse. Spring may be actually colder than part of the winter; and every adult is aware of the fact that the English calendar is a lying jade. For the past three years spring has been a hollow fraud, summer a delusion and a snare, and autumn has been so closely related to winter that we have not noticed any change. "Oh, to be in England, now that April's there," wrote Browning, basking in the sun of Italy. April we know to our cost, is the month of 'flu; and though the poets exhort us to dance round the maypole in May, we refuse to dress up like polar bears in order to do their bidding.

English weather is becoming a serious problem, for there are big and important industries which make preparation for the summer only to find their stocks left on their hands. Apart from the ice-cream industry, which in England must be one of the most speculative and heartbreaking under the sun, the clothing trades are beginning to dread our new-fashioned English summers. "Never cast a clout till May goes out," runs the old proverb; but the opportunity for casting clouts and donning summer finery never seems to occur. Will this summer be any improvement on the last three? We have not had any summer weather to speak of since 1921, so a further instalment is overdue. But whatever happens, we will continue to talk about our weather and its infinite variety, and arrogate to ourselves the time-honored privilege of grumbling at whatever the gods may send. —Liverpool Post.

"Liberty, Equality, Fraternity"

Right Hon. Lord Killanin in the Nineteenth Century: France deliberately cultivates a policy of fraternization between her own sons and the natives of Morocco. She is not only tolerant of their language, religion, customs, manners, but neither on these grounds nor that of skin color does she recognize any inequality or showalooness in social or professional life. The races are mixed in the African settlements; they feed and sleep together. It is a most remarkable achievement. Elsewhere "conflict of color" is with difficulty adjusted; here its existence is denied. And accordingly the races do approximate; the Frenchman dons the fez, and the Moor, as he enters the harbor at Marseilles, throws his overboard. The Spahi becomes half African, and the Moor takes to using suspenders. It will be interesting to observe what will be the result of this close, level association between peoples of very different grades of civilization.

College Drinks

Stormy Scenes Follows Parson's Question at Presbyterian Assembly. There was a stormy scene at the English Presbyterian Church Assembly held at the Presbyterian Church, Regent Street, W., recently over the question of drinks at a raining college. The Rev. Gordon McLeod (Liverpool) asked whether alcoholic liquors were used at meals in the training college at Cambridge. He was informed that when there was any special dinner at which there were distinguished guests the professors provided light wines, such as claret. "If you have beer and wine, why the dickens don't you have whisky, is what I cannot understand," exclaimed Mr. McLeod, amid considerable interruption. He moved that in the dietary of the college no alcoholic drink be used. This was defeated, only a few of the members voting for it, and Mr. McLeod called out "Shame, shame!" loudly.

Arctic Regions and Monroe Doctrine

America is a stickler for the rigid observance of the Monroe Doctrine, and in that attitude she has the approval of the other powers. It is questionable, however, whether her intention to authorize MacMillan, who is setting out shortly on a Polar expedition, to raise the United States flag over any land that he may discover, will be considered consistent with the policy which the Monroe Doctrine lays down.

In August, 1923, on the occasion of the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of its promulgation, Mr. Charles E. Hughes, then Secretary of State, in an address before the American Bar Association, reviewed the circumstances which led to the adoption of the policy and defined its scope. From the opinions which he expressed we quote the following:—

"The Monroe Doctrine is not a policy of aggression; it is a policy of self-defence. It was asserted at a time when the danger of foreign aggression in this hemisphere was very real, when the new American States had not yet established a firm basis of independent national life, and we were menaced by threats of old world powers directed against republican institutions. It still remains an assertion of the principal of national security. . . . The Monroe Doctrine does not infringe upon the independence and sovereignty of other American States. . . . The declaration of our purpose to oppose what is inimical to our safety does not imply an attempt to establish a protectorate, any more than a similar assertion by any one of the great southern republics of opposition to conduct on the part of any of the others endangering its security would aim at the establishment of a protectorate.

"We utterly disclaim as unwarranted the observations which occasionally have been made implying a claim on our part to superintend the affairs of our sister republics, to assert an overlordship, to consider the spread of our authority beyond our own domain as the aim of our policy, and to make our power the test of right in this hemisphere.

"Such assertions do not express our national purpose; they belie our sincere friendship; they are false to the fundamental principles of our foreign policy."

Washington, according to yesterday's despatch, appears to be puzzled over messages from Ottawa indicating that Canada expects to claim sovereignty over any lands that may be discovered to the northward of the present Dominion. The Dominion of Canada, as defined in Whitaker's Almanac, is the territory which occupies the whole of the northern part of the North American continent (with the exception of Alaska and part of the coast of Labrador) from 49° North Latitude to the North Pole, and from the Pacific to the Atlantic Ocean.

Just what value the wild wastes in the Arctic regions may have in the future no one can even make a guess, but it has

been suggested that with the development of air transport bases may be established there, and industries may be started. Whether or not these things come to pass, Canada is unlikely to remain quiet while her neighbour on the south and on the North west erects another boundary on her northern frontier.

Reception at Government House

In honor of the anniversary of His Majesty a reception was held at Government House last night by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Allardyce. It was attended by many church and state officials and private citizens, and a musical programme, in which several of our most prominent artists took part, was thoroughly enjoyed.

Bridge Replacement

Under the direction of the Highways Commission, the old wooden bridge, just beyond the Lunatic Asylum, and known as White's, is being removed and replaced with a concrete structure. The road at this point is being diverted a little so as to eliminate an awkward turn.

Projecting Car Rails

At Rawlin's Cross the street car rails, projecting above the street surface in such a manner as to be dangerous, should be attended to at once. Drivers of vehicles complain of the difficulty experienced when the wheels catch in the obstruction, and fast moving machines, such as the fire engines, run a risk of being overturned if the same thing happened to them.

Get Busy With the Number Plates

Within a space of five minutes this morning seven motor cars drove along Water Street either without number plates, or with the plate missing on the front or rear. We understand that this is due to the difficulty of issuing all the new licenses at once, but whatever the cause, surely it is not impossible to devise some temporary identification marks instead of having the law as it stands disregarded.

Portia Delivered Mails

After the arrival of s.s. Portia at Port aux Basques on her last trip, the railway management arranged to hold her there in order to obtain the mails for the West Coast, which was despatched by rail from St. John's on Sunday last. The Portia has since covered that part of the coast having arrived at Argentina last midnight.

Motor Car Accident

Yesterday afternoon whilst Mr. A. Duffy was motoring up Hamilton St. he knocked down a 3½ year old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Elton but fortunately the child escaped serious injury. The car was proceeding slowly when the little fellow suddenly ran from behind another car which was parked near his home. Mr. Duffy swerved his car to the right but not enough to prevent the child being hit by the dasher. In the fall a sucker stick which the boy had in his mouth was driven through his cheek. Mr. Duffy called Dr. Moores who dressed the wound.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

PREMIER DUNNING'S THANKS. REGINA, Sask., June 3. Premier Charles Dunning issued a statement here to-day thanking the people of Saskatchewan for their confidence in the Government and promising the continuation of "same and efficient government." He declared that he regretted the defeat of Attorney-General J. A. Cross in Regina as the result of what he termed a campaign of slander and vilification. "I am convinced that the Province needs the services of Colonel Cross. I intend to make every effort to ensure that the Province is not deprived of his services in this capacity."

GRAVE SITUATION IN CHINA. CANTON, China, June 3. Extensive movements of troops are being made here. Officials regard the situation as extremely grave and say fighting may be expected at any time. The train service has been suspended on all three railroads entering Canton.

CONDITIONS SERIOUS IN SHANGHAI. WASHINGTON, June 3. Conditions in Shanghai were described as exceedingly serious in a cablegram received by the State Department to-day from Consul General Cunningham with indications that the trouble would spread beyond the international settlement at that city. The Municipal authorities in the international zone, the message said, were believed to have conditions well in hand.

COMPLETE PICKETING OF N.S. MINES TO-DAY. SYDNEY, N.S., June 3. O. McLeod, President of District 26 U.M.W. of America, announced to-night that, beginning at seven o'clock to-morrow morning, a one hundred per cent picketing policy would go into operation against the collieries of the British Empire Steel Corporation in Nova Scotia whose twelve thousand coal miners have been on strike since March 6th last following a wage dispute. This step is taken to mean that no maintenance work will be permitted in any of the mines which have been kept open and ventilated by Company officials, on the strike order issued three months ago.

CHASE AND CAPTURE OF SEIZED VESSEL. ST. PIERRE, Miq., June 3. The English liquor schooner Marie Second, recaptured early to-day by the French steam trawler Asl after seven members of her former crew had seized her here and sailed off with her, was brought back to this port late to-day. Captain Wynacht of Lunenburg and six British sailors, whom he is alleged to have led aboard in the seizure, were arrested on their arrival here. It is expected they will be charged with piracy. The Marie Second was commandeered by Wynacht until she was sold here recently to Louis Hardy and registered under the French flag. She lay in the roadstead with 4000 cases of liquor aboard yesterday when Wynacht led his raiding party aboard and turned the French crew in charge adrift. The first officer, Rio, of the Marie Second said: "I was aboard with second officer Lafitte waiting for Capt. Telechias, who was ashore clearing the vessel, when Wynacht and his men came aboard. Wynacht gave orders to get the schooner under way and we protested. Wynacht came from the cabin with a revolver in one hand and steel knuckles in the other and struck me in the face. I fell on the deck almost unconscious. Lafitte came to my rescue, but Wynacht struck him furiously with an oar breaking his arm in three places." Fortunately for us Pilot Lebluands came along side and took us ashore. As soon as the seizure was known, a wireless was sent to Capt. Gaston of the Asl ordering him to overtake the Marie Second and bring her back. Capt. Gaston said he received the message when the Marie Second had a ten mile start, and immediately put on full steam to catch her. I was within 50 yards of her by eight o'clock," he said, "and ordered her to stop, but a strong breeze sprung up and she widened the gap to 300 yards. Two hours later, the wind abating, I succeeded in getting across the schooner and broke her main boom. Three of her men surrendered and came aboard, but four others including Wynacht refused to abandon the ship. I then gave Wynacht five minutes to come aboard my ship before I ran him down. They all came aboard, and I got them under guard."

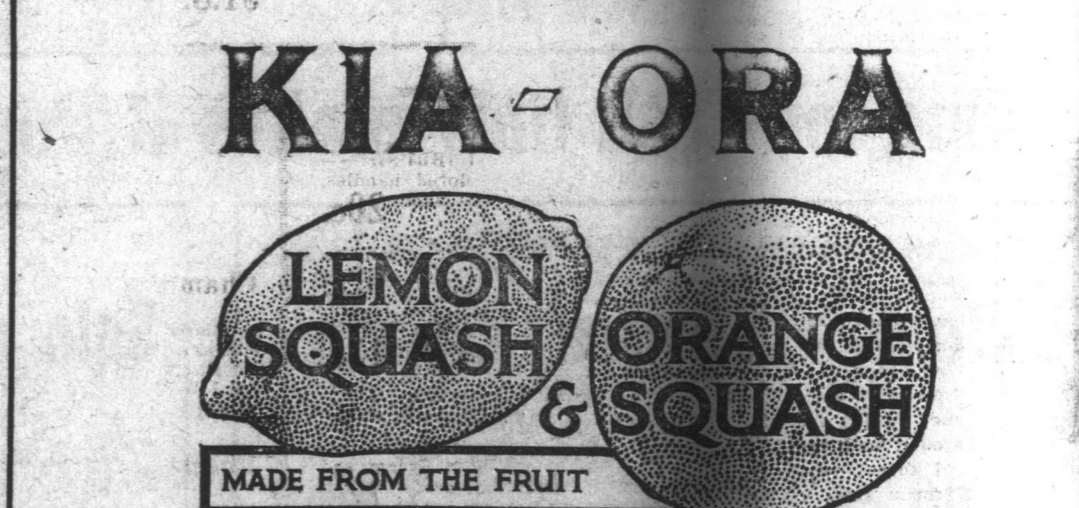

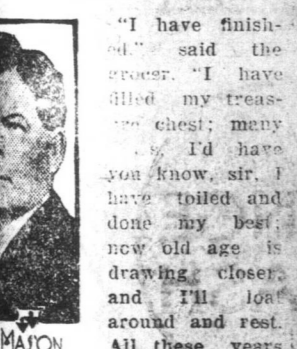

NOTICE.

TO OWNERS AND OPERATORS OF MOTOR VEHICLES.

On and after Monday, June 1st, 1925, The Highroads Commission will register and issue permits to owners of motor vehicles and licenses to manufacturers of and dealers in same; also to chauffeurs and non-professional drivers; to owners of garages and repair shops and to persons engaged in the buying, selling, storing and wrecking of second-hand motor cars (i.e. cars already registered in the Colony). Application forms can be obtained in St. John's at the headquarters of The Highroads Commission, Government Engineer's Office, Court House building (Water Street entrance) and in other districts from the Stipendiary Magistrate of the district in which the owner or operator resides. These forms must be fully filled in before permit or license will be granted.

To save the time of applicants they should ascertain the following information before applying for registration:

In the case of passenger cars:

- (1) The weight of the car in lbs. fully equipped with hood and usual accessories but without gasoline, oil or water.
- (2) The Motor number.
- (3) The serial number.
- (4) Bore of cylinders in inches.
- (5) Number of cylinders.
- (6) Previous registration number.

In the case of commercial motor vehicles, busses, tractors, etc.

- (1) The weight of the vehicle including the body and all necessary equipment exclusive of the load, gasoline, oil and water.
- (2) The maximum loading capacity. (In the case of busses plying for hire the seating capacity).
- (3) Motor Number.
- (4) The Serial Number.
- (5) The width of rear tires, and whether solid rubber or pneumatic.
- (6) Previous registration number.

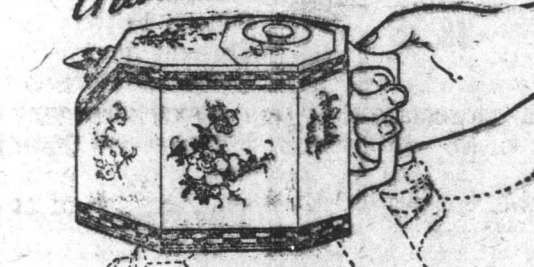

Lectures for District Midwifery Service

On Monday evening Dr. J. Sinclair Tait gave an address at the Public Health building to the nurses who comprise largely of the District Midwifery Service. It is the beginning of a series of Dr. Tait's lectures arranged by the President, Mrs. Hiscock to complete the season's instructive programme. Dr. Tait was introduced by the President, who referred to the veteran doctor as being one who was ever ready to respond with "time and talent" to anything which meant for better conditions. These lectures in the interest of health maternity and the welfare of children with improved nursing conditions have been going on for the past five years and have been the stimulus for greater effort.

The nurses comprising this organization are greatly indebted to Mrs. Hiscock and the various doctors who have contributed lectures in giving them this opportunity of improving their knowledge and so helping the mothers and babies at a time when better nursing means so much to both. It was decided to omit the maternity exhibit which has been given annually to the Child Welfare Association and the general public during health week this year, as Mrs. Hiscock did not feel she could give the time owing to the demand on her services in other branches of social work.

Work at Quidi Vidi

The work of building a breastwork along the north shore of Quidi Vidi is progressing apace. Considerable frontage has been reclaimed by driving piles in the foreshore and filling in so as to form a broad walk along the edge. It is understood that in future the old time narrow wharf from which so many duckings occurred will not be necessary as the boats will be able to lie alongside the breastwork. The Council are deserving of great credit on the manner in which the work has been done.

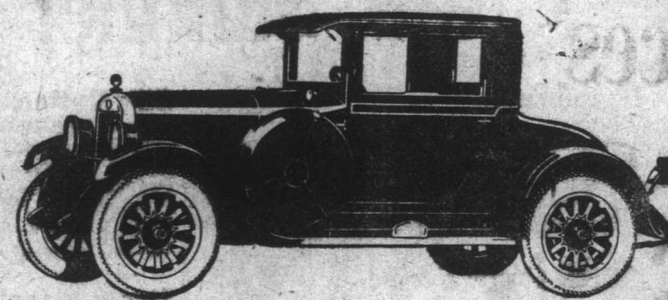

Gigantic Ground Values in London

Royal Family Not Enriched Though Land Belongs to the Crown—Huge Revenue—New Leases Bring Ten Times as Much as Old.

All the new leases have now been granted for the sites in Regent street, London. In another twenty months or so this great reconstructed shopping thoroughfare, from the Queen's Hall to Piccadilly Circus, is likely to be completed.

Much of the ground is Crown property, and the ground rents are in many cases ten times as much as the old. It will mean an addition of hundreds of thousands a year to the Crown Land revenue.

But the Royal Family will not be the richer. One of the best bargains this country ever made was when the land revenues of the Crown in the United Kingdom were surrendered by George III. in 1760 in return for a fixed annual payment of the Civil List.

The excellence of the deal was not apparent at the time because the revenue amounted to about \$89,000, and the net return was no more than \$11,000.

But in the past half century these revenues have advanced by leaps and bounds. For the year ended March 31, 1924, the total receipts amounted to \$1,000,000. The expenditure was \$25,000,000, and a sum of \$20,000,000 was paid to the Exchequer.

It is estimated that the annual revenue to the Exchequer within the next few years will exceed a million and a half.

Against this there is to be set off the allowances to the Royal Family. By the Civil List Act of 1910 there was granted an annuity to the King of \$470,000, but all but \$110,000 of this which is credited to "Their Majesties' Privy Purse" goes in salaries

He was sold afterwards for over \$200,000. Lord Glanely, on the other hand, who won with Grand Parade in 1819, must have spent more than \$100,000 in attempts to carry off the prize.

Paid Tribute to One of Britain's Noblest Enemies

Prince Lald Wreath on Steyn's Tomb—Lunched With Citizens.

Bloemfontein, S.A., May 27.—The Prince of Wales to-day with only two members of his staff, visited the simple tomb of President Steyn at the base of the impressive obelisk erected to the memory of the women and children, who died in a concentration camp in the Boer War. The Prince stood bare-headed for a full minute and placed a wreath on this resting place of one of Britain's noblest enemies. (President Steyn of the Orange Free State took a most active part in the Boer War. After the occupation of Bloemfontein by Lord Roberts, Steyn wandered about South Africa, carrying on a semblance of Government, and on one occasion taking charge of military operations. He was considered the most irreconcilable of the Boer leaders, but took part in the preliminary peace negotiations. He died in 1910.)

Later the Prince attended a brilliant banquet of Free Staters at which President Steyn's name was also a guest.

Otherwise the Prince's second day here was spent quite informally. He was entertained at luncheon by the Bloemfontein Club, there being sixty guests, mainly solemn Dutchmen, with few speeches, but the greatest good-fellowship. In the town itself, gaily dressed girls turned out in force and the Prince delighted his youthful admirers by posing with his best smile while hundreds of them clicked their cameras.

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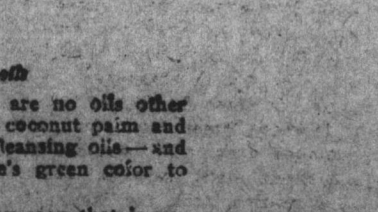
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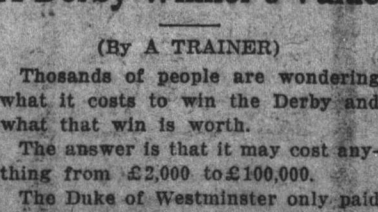
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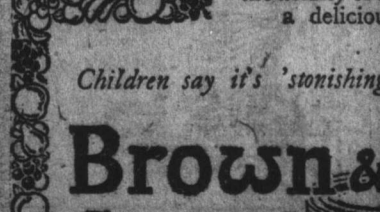
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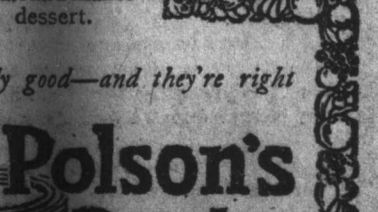
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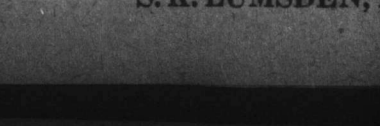
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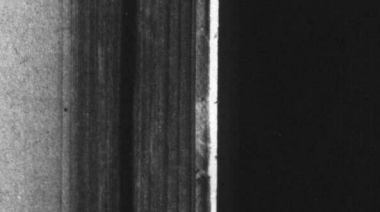
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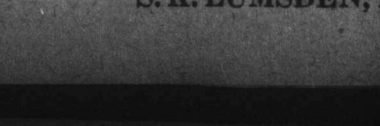


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Consult Dominion on Foreign Policy

LONDON, May 28.—Canada and the other Dominions will shortly be asked by the Imperial Government for definite views on the foreign policy of the Empire in order that the British may know exactly what to do in order to hold the support of a united Empire.

Hitherto the Dominions have merely answered specific questions that have been put to them, but the time is rapidly approaching when positive views will have to be expressed in order to settle the controversy over foreign policy which has been raging within the Cabinet with varying intensity. The Dominions have been informed of the general views of the Government, but now that France has replied to the questions submitted by Mr. Chamberlain with regard to a Security Pact the Ministers are going to try to work out a definite policy upon which the Dominions will be fully consulted. This consultation will have to be largely done by cable unfortunately, for the cable is admittedly inadequate for such a purpose, but the Dominions have shown no eagerness recently for a formal conference on foreign policy.

Meanwhile Brundage's replies to Chamberlain's questions show the wide divergences between British and French policies. The French want the right to send troops across Germany to defend Poland under cover of League action, while they also demand guarantees that Germany will not attempt even peacefully to revise the eastern frontiers or to abolish the Danzig corridor.

The British say they do not hope that any pact can be secured if France persists in such demands, and it appears that Britain and France may have to pursue separate policies unless France changes its attitude. This is the chief reason why it is considered essential to consult the Dominions specifically at this time.

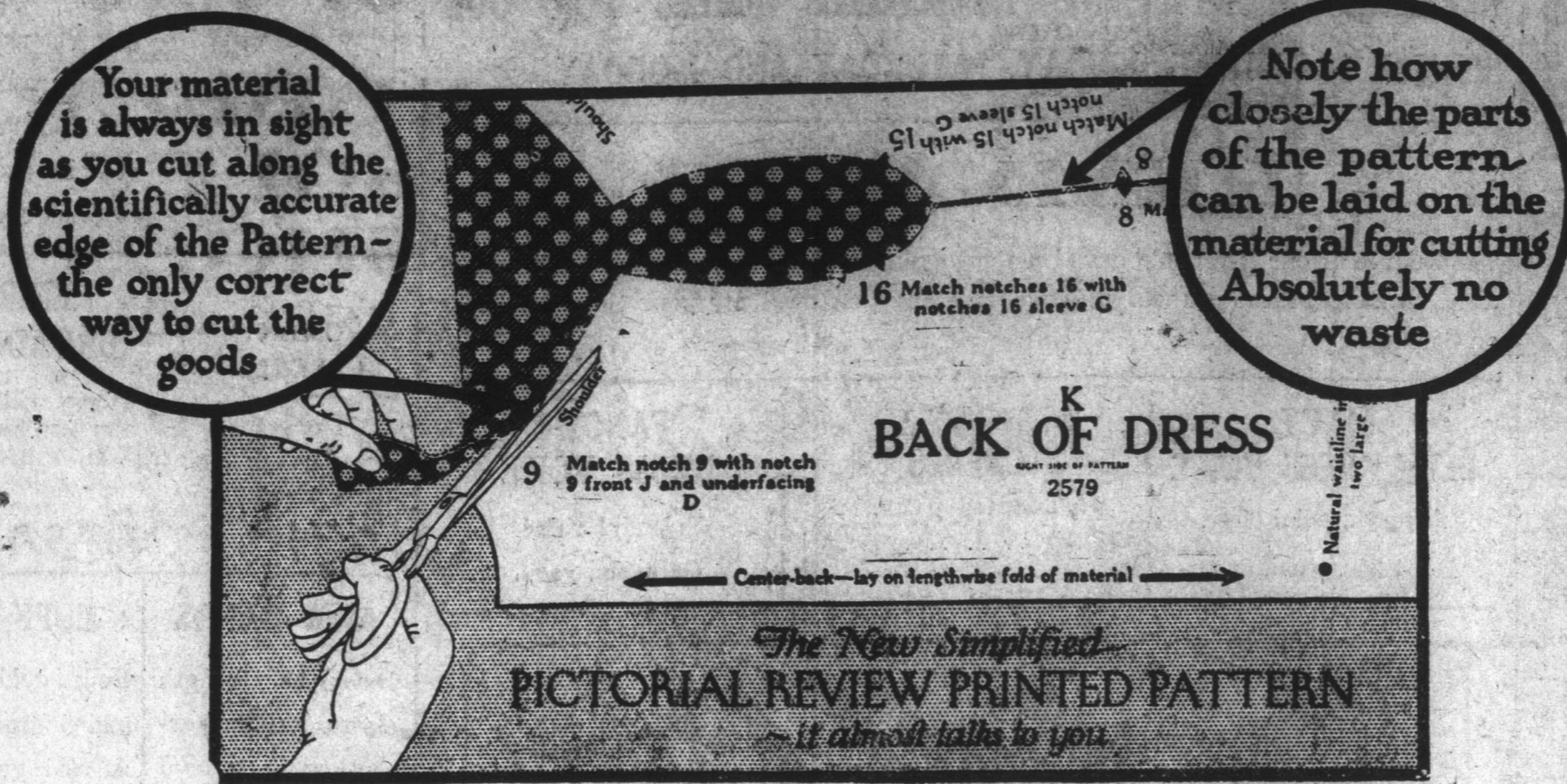

American Medical Men

ASK THAT VOLSTEAD ACT BE MODIFIED.
Want to Issue Prescriptions for More Than a Pin.

Atlantic City, N.J., May 27. (United Press)—The American Medical Association has declared itself in opposition to the Volstead Act, and through the passage of a resolution has asked Congress to modify the Volstead Act to permit physicians to prescribe as much whiskey, brandy or gin as they think necessary.

At present only one pint is allowed within ten days is allowed to be issued under the law. "The alcohol resolution passed by the House of Delegates of the American Medical Association in 1917 by a very small majority," Dr. T. C. Chalmers, of New York City, said in introducing the resolution yesterday before the general meeting, "declared that alcohol was not necessary to the treatment of disease and this was quoted by the Circuit Court of Appeals of the seventh district of New York in reversing the decision given by Judge Knox of the United States Court, in favor of Dr. Samuel W. Lambert of New York against the prohibition commissioner." Chalmers said, "and it is now before the United States Supreme Court. The American Medical Association, through its house of delegates, now unanimously declare that alcohol is a drug essential in the treatment of diseases. The association also declares that it is unanimously opposed to physicians prescribing alcohol in any way except as a drug and that those physicians who prescribe it for those who are not sick should be disciplined."

Condemnation of the state of Tennessee by the association was asked in a resolution proposed by Dr. Horace Manchester Brown, of Milwaukee and which was aimed at the new anti-epitiation law of the southern state.

"The study of evolution," Dr. Brown said in bringing before the convention his measure, "is necessary to the proper comprehension of scientific medicine, and any restriction of the study of scientific fact in a regularly established scientific institution is inimical to the progress of science and to the public welfare."

Medical science thinks it has discovered the fiery serpent that bit the children of Israel when they wandered through the wilderness. The serpent, according to Dr. William D. Haggard, of Nashville, Tenn., president of the American Medical Association was probably the guinea worm.

"The guinea worm," Haggard said, "enters the body as a water flea, develops, and ultimately lies coiled under the skin, from one to six feet in length."

"It was formerly coaxed out by winding it on a stick, little by little, each day. Then the zoologist found that it sought water in which to lay its eggs, and will patiently crawl out if the affected arm or leg is simply submerged in water for a few hours."

Dr. Haggard, in his inaugural address, urged periodic health examination for everyone in a "drive for the prevention of illness." Dr. Haggard reviewed the romantic developments in the field of medicine in the last few years, pointing to discoveries of the functions of ductless glands as one of the "marvels of modern medicine."

"The thyroid gland," he said, "presides over our growth. Its absence makes the gnome-like, grotesque idiot. Administration of the life-giving thyroid extract veritably restores the dead in mind and brings dazed bodies back into blooming youth."

"It seems incredible that the pituitary gland at the base of the brain, weighing only two grams, will, when diseased, cause the prodigious growth of a giant, and when its secretion is deficient, will produce the enormous fat deposit of the unnaturally obese. "Gottis is largely due to a deficiency of iodine in food and water. It should be prevented in childhood by the administration of iodine in small quantities to children twice a year."

"These wonder-working ductless glands largely determine personality. Individuality seems, after all, to be largely the product of the chemistry of our bodies."

Dr. Haggard added that there remained a great deal for physicians to learn as to the cure of diseases. Among these he mentioned a specific for pneumonia and the discovery of the bacterial causes of cancer.

In advocating the co-operation of physicians and newspapers in teaching preventive measures in medicine, he said:

"It is astounding to think that there are 225,000,000 days of sickness a year in the United States. If it were possible, by nation-wide effort to reduce the amount of sickness by 25 per cent the total economic gain

yearly would be around a quarter of a billion dollars as well as a tremendous conservation of human resources."

Ambulance Must Obey Speed Law

Judgement in Superior Court Says Vehicles Not Privileged.

The Quebec Motor Vehicles' Act does not confer any special privileges upon ambulances, said Mr. Justice Desaulniers, in the Superior Court in dismissing an action for \$2,500 taken by Frederick A. Wray against Dechaux Freres, Limited.


Wray claimed that one of his ambulances had been almost completely demolished on the evening of July 14, 1924, by a motor truck belonging to Dechaux Freres, Limited. The latter pleaded that the ambulance was travelling at an excessive speed and that this tort relieved them of their responsibility. Mr. Justice Desaulniers pointed out that the ambulance was being driven along Park Avenue at a speed of 25 miles an hour, and that this speed was unreasonable on a public street, especially an avenue like Park, which is one of the city's main arteries. His Lordship added that when the accident occurred the ambulance was crossing at an intersection at a speed of 15 miles an hour.

Lord Birkenhead on Trade Gloom

HOPE IN EMPIRE COMMERCE.

Lord Birkenhead uttered a grave warning of the serious condition of British trade at an Empire shopping week demonstration at the Dome, Brighton recently. He said:

I speak with some official knowledge of the views held by the Board of Trade when I say that the present outlook is one of extreme gloom. It is not the slightest good using optimistic language when no real ground for optimism exists.

If you take steel or coal, the basic interests of the country, there is abundant ground for pessimism, and I can see hardly a gleam making for hope.

The world as a whole, far from becoming an immediate market, is month by month becoming a more difficult market for our goods. I am bound to make perfectly plain the position, and it will not, in my judgment, improve until we can export our manufactures. Our position will not become more sanguine until we have equipped ourselves on terms of equality with foreign countries, as we must if we are to keep our industrial heels above water.

The attitude of our industrial population, compared with that of foreign countries, has hampered us in competition. Mutual trade between the parts of the Empire, if safeguarded and encouraged, might become the one foundation of the country and enrich the populations beyond the seas.

Our population is rapidly approaching a degree where it will be impossible for these islands to support it. We are giving the dole while the Dominions are crying aloud for men. The more men that we send there the more would be removed from the demoralizing conditions that must come to men in idleness.

Empire Luncheon.

Cabinet Ministers, Dominion High Commissioners, and the chief of the House of Commons, Mr. Paul Ferrer, were all delighted by an "Empire" luncheon given by Lieut.-Commander A. C. Rawson, Conservative M.P. for Brighton, to mark the opening of the Brighton Empire Shopping Week.

"This is not a luncheon but a banquet," Mr. L. S. Amery, the Colonial Secretary, said.

All the food, drink, and cigars had been produced within the Empire.

At the end of the luncheon Commander Rawson noticed that one of the guests, Sir Arthur Cocks, Agent-General for New South Wales, was about to light a foreign-made cigar. "You must not smoke that here. Have one of these Jamaica cigars," the commander said. Amid cheers and laughter the Agent-General lit a Jamaica cigar.—Daily Mail.

No Birth Control in Germany Now

ILLEGAL OPERATIONS RUNNING TO 500,000 OR MORE YEARLY.

BERLIN, May 27.—Birth control, popular here under the Socialist and other Republican regimes since the war, will be fought by President von Hindenburg's Minister of Justice.

With illegal operations running 500,000 or more yearly in Germany, the Minister has announced that he will oppose to the utmost any attempt to modify the code, which provides sharp punishment for offenders—but is more honored in the breach than in the observance—since the revolution. The Minister also declines to harken to appeals for modification of the divorce laws, which in Germany are especially rigid.

Supporters of the Minister say that any relaxation of the two laws would be bad for the nation, and hint that Germany needs more rather than less babies if she is to again get her "place in the sun."

If Women Were to Build Our Houses

(By E. F. FORSTER.)

The niece of a peer has become a draughtsman in the office of a famous architect.

She has told us that she does not see why women should not be architects themselves, and goes on to say that they ought to be better than men at domestic architecture.

By "domestic architecture" one may assume, that the lady means houses to live in. One gathers that as yet women do not wish to compete with men in the designing of town halls, railway stations and similar stately erections. But in the planning of a house—oh, there a woman architect would be in her natural element.

After all, a woman spends more time in the house than a man does; she has to run the establishment, and she is thus better qualified to judge of its difficulties.

When one considers it from a practical point of view, how pitifully inadequate is the average man-designed house for its functions!

For one thing, the kitchen is so far away from the dining-room that endless time and shoe leather are wasted in transferring the viands, at meals, from one centre to the other. A woman would contrive that this inconvenience would be cut out. She would also see that the odour of cooking did not permeate the entire house, and that guests arriving for dinner were not plunged into that "haunch of mutton vapour bath" spoken of by the novelist.

I suspect that she would do this by building the kitchen at the top of the house and sending the joint and the vegetables down to the dining-room in a lift.

Another thing that the woman-architect would insist on would be large, airy bedrooms for the servants.

She would appreciate the difficulty of securing and keeping domestic aids and make it one of her first cares to see that they were comfortable. In fact, I am rather afraid that a woman-architect would overdo the bedrooms in her designs.

To a woman her bedroom is the shrine of the sacred toilet, the receptacle for all her finery, the home of her jewellery, and an inviolable city of refuge, or sanctuary, when she has a headache or a "pain in her temper."

A woman-designed house would be rich in cupboards. No male architect can understand, or attempt to gratify, a woman's passion for cupboards, which is similar in intensity to that of Mrs. Todger's boarders for stoves. There would be cupboards in every room, especially in the bedrooms and in the nursery. No housewife yet ever acknowledged to having enough cupboard space.

I suspect that the man of the house, or wage-earner, would come badly off as regards accommodation. He would wear in vain for a den of his own in which to read the paper and smoke.

Perhaps, though, he could be fixed up in one of the aforesaid cupboards.

An Advertising Pioneer

The late Mr. W. E. Catesby was the pioneer in this country of harnessing newspaper advertising to the power of business building. He was the first business man in England to use large spaces and illustrations every day in the newspapers for store advertising and mail order advertising on the lines of American publicity.

This method, following a visit to the United States, developed the huge cork lino and furnishing business from a small shop in a side street to the vast premises it now occupies in Tottenham Court Road.

Mr. Catesby was a descendant of Guy Fawkes' friend, Robert Catesby, and possessed several relics of these two historic figures.


The Pride of the Poor
